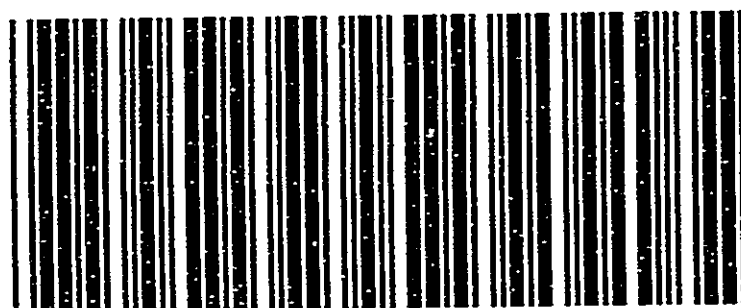

He was suffering from Gun shot wound of the back, with fracture of the Vertebrae; unfortunately paraplegia supervened and he died on Oct. 11th 1916. I knew England well, he was in the 10th Reinforcements, the same as I. I knew him as "Freddie"--he came from New South Wales, and was fairly tall, fair complexion, and between 22 - 25 years old. I did not know he was wounded until I was on board the "Wiltshire" returning to Australia, when I was told by Private H. Walsh, also of the 20th, but an original, that he was in the next bed to England, in an English hospital, the name of which I forget, and that England had died from an injury to the spine, sustained at Pozieres. He said England passed away quietly. England was paralysed when he died, but was in good spirits. Walsh is a baker at Military Road, North Sydney.

England was a 10th Reinforcement of the 20th Battalion, and joined up after the informant had left the Battalion. He joined up about the 4th August, 1916.

The informant had previously met him at Tel-el-Kibir, early in 1916, and went with him to France.

England came - so the informant believes - from Ryde; age about 21, short, not robust.

Informant was in the 3rd London General Hospital, Wandsworth in October last, he met England there, hit in the spine, and the lower part of his body paralysed, he was with him in the hospital for a fortnight, and saw him constantly, and was able to discuss matters.

Informant left Wandsworth early in October last, and was told by Brown of the 8th Battalion, now at Randwick that England had died at Wandsworth, early in October while he was there, and just after Informant left.

England was in C.I Ward.

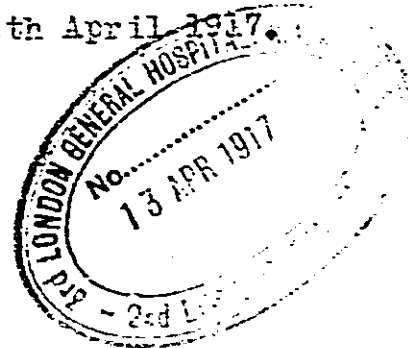
