He was wounded while carrying a patient from the Cordial Factory on the night of 9/10/17., and died at C.C.S., Remy Siding which is near the town of Poperinghe and buried 11/10/17. Grave, Plot. 21D20B.

"Died of Wounds"

Re the death of Pte. Lockwood, L.A. 17562, of this unit. He was one of a party of reinforcements sent to us whilst we were in the line. He was wounded on 10.10.17: and was evacuated to 10th Casualty Clearing Station but succumbed to his injuries the same day. He was buried in the Military Cemetery at the C.C.S. This is situated at Remy Siding close to Popperhingé.

"Lockwood was a reinforcement and arrived the night before the 2nd Passchendaele Stunt on Oct. 17th. He was badly wounded in the abdomen; I dressed his wound and heard he died at the C.O.S. I only saw him that once."

Re the death of No. 17562, Pte. L.A. Lockwood, I have already supplied the information to your Society, but as it has evidently gone astray, I will do so again. Len. Lockwood was wounded while stretcher-bearing on the night of 9.10.17. and died at the C.C.S. Remy Siding (near Ypres) on 10.10.17. He was buried at C.C.S. cemetery there. 11.10.17. The number of the grave is Plot 21. D.20.B. There is a white, wooden cross erected over his grave, a photo of which has been sent to his parents in Australia. As I had been with Lockwood during his entire military career, both in Australia, England and France, there is no doubt as to his identity. His parents reside in Chatswood N.S.W. and he had also relatives at Pateley Bridge, Yorkshire, England. The wound which was probably caused by shrapnel, was in the small of the back, as he was one of the rear men carrying the stretcher, when hit.

Re your inquiry for particulars of the death of No. 17562 Pte. L. A. Lockwood. - I have already supplied the information to your Society, but as it has evidently gone astray I will do so again.

Len. Lockwood was wounded while stretcher-bearing on the night of 9/10/17 and died at the C.C.S. Remy Siding (near Ypres) on 10/10/17. He was buried at the C.C.S. Cemetery there 11/10/17; the number of the grave is Plot 21 D20B. There is a white wooden cross erected over his grave, a photo of which has been sent to his parents in Australia. As I had been with Lockwood during his entire military career, both in Australia, England and France there is no doubt as to his identity.

His parents reside in Chatswood, N.S.W.

and he had also relatives at Pateley Bridge,
Yorkshire, England. ✓
