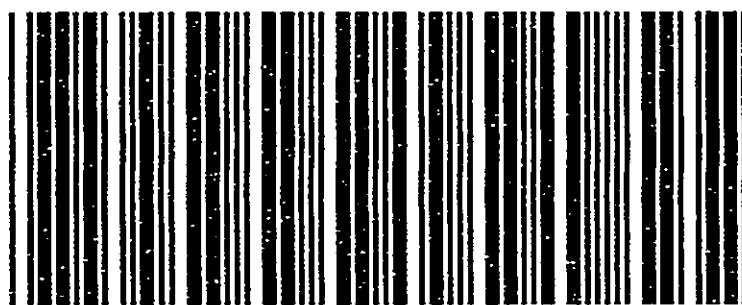

D/W 18th Sept 1918. Det D/B.

He was my platoon commander. About the 18th Sept we had just finished our stint in front of Rosillos, and were going to dig in, when Mr. Elliott was hit by a piece of shell through the legs. I bandaged him up, and he was put on a stretcher, and taken to the D/Station. He died there, and I saw his grave at Fincourt.

His Christian name is Douglas, and he was returned to Australia from Gallipoli. I came back with him in 1916 to Europe. We were attacking east, about 5 kilometres East of Roiselle, and Mr. Elliott was hit in the leg by a M.G. Bullet, and I believe his leg was broken, and the artery severed. I was with him just before he was hit but did not see him after. I saw his grave at Tiencourt near Roiselle, about 5 days later. It was a properly completed grave with a cross etc.

"Died of Wounds 18.9.18."

At Tinnecurt I saw him shot through the thigh and groin, on the stretcher when I passed, he was badly wounded; this was nearly 500 yds to our objective at Belcourt. He was taken to Dressing Station and died there. I saw his grave at Tinnecurt Cemetery. He was one of the whitest men, good fellow and well liked by all. If they were all like him they would be alright.

I knew 2/Lieut. Elliott. He was buried in a Cemetery near Reisel alongside O'Hellen, Major Darnell and others. I saw the grave and cross, and the inscription. Description:- Fair, medium build.

This officer's name is Douglas. He was a young man and came from W.A.

I think he must have been killed by M.G. Fire because at that time the M.G. Firing was very heavy, and there was practically no shelling. I saw his grave afterwards at Tincourt in the Military cemetery. His grave was a very nice one with a fine cross painted with the Regimental colours, brown and blue.
