## "Died of Wounds 26.6.18."

Re the death of Ic.2169 Pte. Greig W.R., "A" Ccy. 48th Bn.

I will be pleased to furnish any information I can. On
the night of June the 24th or 25th, we were on ration fatigue, and
Pte. Greig who was Storeman for A. Coy. was a member of the
party; on arriving at the ration dump an enemy aeroplane
dropped a bomb which wounded Pte. Greig; he was quite conscious
when taken to the Dressing Station. He was reported to have
died about two days later. On being relieved from the front
line, I saw his grave in a soldiers Cemetery between Vaux
sur Somme and Sailly-le-Sec. Map reference Sheet 69 D.
J.27.45.40. In giving a personal description of Pte. Greig,
I am afraid I cannot help you much there, but I hope this will
help you:- Height about 5ft.7ins., fair, Grey eyes, Medium
build, weight anout 11 stone, quiet disposition. I might add
here that he was well liked by all who knew him.

## "Died of Wounds 26.6.18."

I am enclosing this short note in with. Sergt. Carter's letter, thinking that any slight information I may give would be helpful to the enquirer. I am Quartermaster Sergeant of "A" Company and Pte. Greig was recommended to me by the Company Commander'as a suitable Storeman. I found him excellent in every way, both in assisting me in issuing rations and clothing etc., Buring his period of service we invaraibly shared the same bivouse or dugout and had all things in common. It was on one accasion when he was taking the rations up to the Company in the line, and it was while the ration party, including Pte. Greig and working under Sgt. Carter, were occupied with the rations (time of tea and stew, bags of bread, butter, etc.,) that the enemy plane flew over and dropped a bomb which wounded him and eventually caused his death. This same as a great shock to all concerned and personally I feel the loss of a good Storeman and commade. He was liked and respected by all who knew him, and in his passing the A.I.F. lose a good soldier and Australia a gentleman.
