Witness saw Howes badly wounded in the head at the landing at Anzac. Later on he saw Howes' dead body lying at a point at least a mile from the beach. He must have died of his wounds on the day of the landing. There was no roll call for several days, which accounts for the difference between the date above and the date of Howes casualty.
