# "Missing 26.9.17"

Re 3076e Pte.F.H.A. Larkman Missing since 26.9.17. Pte.Larkman on the night of the 26.9.17 was detailed as a guide to guide the 60th Battn. In to relieve us, the other guide who went with him was blown up and has since died of wounds. I think that Pte.Larkman was also blown up he has not been seen since this occurred in Glencorse Wood Ypres. Description of Phe.Larkman is as follows:- Height about 5/10" Brownish hair and moustache. Rather slim build, brown eyes. I have asked all the other lads in his company if they could give any information, they all say that he was never seen after leaving Company H.Qrs to guide in 60th Battn.

### "Missing 26-9-17"

It was at Phlygon Wood, near Ypres salient, the line was in a half circle. I remember it was Tuesday Sep.25th 1917, that Larkman went out behind, with another man to guide in the relieving Battn, about dusk, the other man, I do not know his name, was found in an unconscious state, and died at the dressing station, without regaining consciousness. It was supposed Larkman was blown to pieces. Artillery fire was very heavy. I had the information a week later from men of C.Coy. to which Larkman belonged, and of his Pltn. No.12. The fire was so heavy, it was a chance of one man in a hundred getting through. We were to be relieved at midnight, the advance was to take place 6 a.m. next morning. The relieving Battn. got cut up themselves coming up. I knew Larkman personally, he and I were in No.12 Pltn. for some months. C.Coy. Ground held.

I know that this man was sent out to guide a Coy. of the 60th Battn. on or about the date named, who were relieving our Coy. This was near Black Watch Corner, Polygon Wcod. He was accompanied by Pte.Yates. The next we heard was that Yates was in a Hpl., (in France I think), where he died of wounds. Nothing more has been heard concerning Larkman. The ground was held.

much afraid give proof of his death, and though they are rather dis
tressing we feel you would like to have them.

Sgt. C. Hems 58th Batt. A.I.F. states that on the night eff 26-9-17 Fte. Larkman was detailed to guide the 60th batt. in, to relieve them, with another man, who was hit by a shell and has since died of his wounds. Sgt. Hems adds that he thinks your son must have been killed instantaneously by the same shell, as he has not been seen or heard of since that took place in Glencourse wood near types. He describes your son as being rather slim, about oft. low brownish hair and moustache. He also says that he has questioned all the men in hea Coy. and they all say that Pte. Larkman has never been seen since he left the Coy. Headquarters to guide in the 60th Batt

No. 2659 Cpl. T.C. Gou 58th Batt. states- "I knew himfor two months, he was in my platoon and Coy. He joined us after Etillecourt and had been in Egypt with the 6th Batt. He was medium height, glim. dark and about 55, religion C. of E. Was an Englishman, but had been a warehouseman in Melbourne. I was told of his death by Pte. 3. Foreman".

We wrote to Pte. Foremen and received in reply the statement from Sgt. Hems which we have quoted above.

With further reference to your enquiry for your son - 3076a Pte.F.H.A.LARKHAN. 58th Bettalion. A.I.F.

We very much regret to inform you that we have now received a reply from 16096 Pte.S. Foreman, whose statement unfortunately confirms the report previously sent you.

General Hospital, (Cowley Section) Oxford, stated that he linew your son personally and describes him as of medium build with a dark, watache and 5.7" in height. Pie. Foromen further stated that on Tuesday Sept 25th 1917, at Polygon Wood near the Ypres Salient your son and another man went out behind to guide in the relieving Battalion. Later the other man was found unconscious and he died at a Dressing Station without regaining consciousness.

The artillery fire was very heavy at the time and there was very little chance of anyone getting through and the relieving Battn suffered immany casualties in coming up.

Pte. Foreman fears your son wast have been dilled instantancousty. This report has also been confirmed by Lieut.R.A. Trengrove of the same Estation, who was in the 3rd London General Hospital, Wandsworth recently and we fear that there can be little hope of his being alive.

Should we obtain further details we shall immediately andvise you as we realise how very anxious/you must be. With our sincere sympathy.
