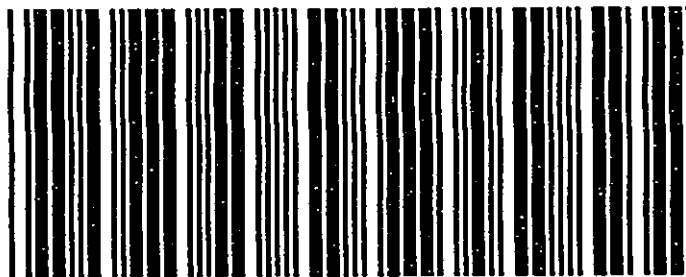

France

If through any of the wonderful
agencies of your valuable Society

you can find out in what way
he is missing if he was taken
Prisoner by the enemy, the Court-
states he has been missing since
Sep 3rd. The last letter we had from
him was written Aug 17th & received
here Sep 2nd, if you can learn
anything that will relieve the
hearts of anxious parents, we
shall indeed be grateful
