I knew Sculley - he and I were in the same M.G. Co; his initials were C.E. and I saw him after he was wounded in the back at Pozieres on Monday 24.7.16; he seemed very bad; it was caused by a piece of timber. S/Bearers took him out. I believe Wat Tyler was one. I heard since in hospital that he had died of wounds. He was a married man and was a driver on the tramways in Sydney; his brother James is in on the Vickers gun 1st. Brigade.

I knew him well and was in the same L.G.Sec. as him. He has a brother Jim Sculley with the Battalion who asked if I had heard from him, as he had not and he was getting worried. That was about Sept. 15th.

C.E. Sculley was wounded in Pozieres, a shell blew some timber into his back. I saw him on his way to the dressing station about 50 yards off. I never heard before that he died: he was missing. There was heavy shell fire just west on his track back.

The piece of wood was driven right into his body. His brother belongs to the 1st.Bde.M.G.C. and knows all details. I believe the brother has written home. I do not know in which hospital he died.

I knew Sculley; his initials were C.E., and he was a 7th. Inf. to 4th. and his No. would start 24--. He was in L.G.S. from B. I saw him being carried away on a stretcher on 25.7.16 at Pozieres with a big hole in his back. He was bandaged up, but you could see the blood oozing through the bandages. I did not hear how long he lived, and read of his death some time afterwards in a paper. He was the only C.E. Sculley in the Battn. so far as I knew. He was about 5 ft. 8-9; medium complexion, well built, and came from near Sydney.



Dear Sir,

We have had the following unofficial Report about your brother No., 2481 Private C.E. Sculley, 4th Battn., Lewis Gun Section, who died of wounds on July 25th 1916, and hasten to send it to you. Informant - L/Cpl A.B. Macaulay No., 2482 Lewis Gun Section, 4th battn., states that your brother was wounded at Poziers^{es} by a shell, which burst and blow some timber over him. He saw your brother on the way to the Dressing Station about 50 yards away, and the route was under heavy shell fire at the time. He did not hear that he died, but ^{toughly} was only missing.

We regret that this information is scanty and indefinite and are doing our best to get further information for you. Assuring you of our sincere sympathy,

Please thank you for your welcome letter of the 20th ulto. I have previously had from other Fellows in the gun section, in which my Brother, ^{CESCOLLEY} was attached, the same, or almost the same, particulars, which you were so good to let me have.

The news I should like most to get is what happened at No. 3 Gas, Clearing Station Poyiers, whether my Brother died on the way or otherwise. I was wondering if it would be possible, ^{for me} to communicate with this clearing station but am afraid that, being the first advanced centre, it would be almost impossible to get any information from this source. No doubt the clearing stations are further advanced by now & probably changed their numbers.

At present, much as I would like to get this information, I don't want to import on your kindness as I know how many cases you must have in hand.

Dear Sir,

Mr. G. C. Peck, Lt. Btr.

I am in receipt of your very welcome letter of the 23 inst, the contents of which has caused my mind a great deal because, I had heard from various friends that in all probability my brother was not properly buried as, around the Ed. Cavalry Cemetery there shells were scattered up the ground hasty fashion.

Therefore, as it is, I will send you my thoughts & my brother's reply you keep (at a copy of it) & believe me it will be a good subject to start. Of course I have previously written & told him all, that you & the rest have informed him, & you can imagine when I left him off, I was under the impression that ~~he~~ was the case. Could you explain this affair for me etc. My brother has been reported as "died of wounds" in a certain paper but in a special paragraph it was stated that his name of him was not known. I, personally, did not read this paragraph, but the facts were told to me by one of my officers. If you will think that such a thing

as this is a very serious state of affairs
especially in view of the fact that the
British and Australian governments in
Sydney (of which my brother) had a wife
mother in England & even if the
expenses of the Home Record Office is
fully paid, surely they should have had
I am in the belief to award given them
any compensation which they might
legitimately afford themselves for trouble
in a dutiful, proper service of course to my
people before my letter arrived would
give them a ready check.

Had enough made me mortified
to find that the Home Record
Office would tell me that my
brother communicated with his wife by
cable.

It seems to me a quite sufficient
such a state of things should be a blow
for confidence.

We have just received a further unofficial report about your Brother 2481 Pte C. E. Scully, 4th Battalion, A.I.F., from a man who knew him - L. Hayes of B.Coy. He says - "I knew Scully, his initials were C. E., and he was a 7th Reinf: to 4th Battalion, and his No. would start ²⁴ 24. He was in L. Q. S., from B. I saw him being carried away on a stretcher on 25-7-16, at Pozieres wounded in the back, and he was bandaged up. I did not hear how long he lived, and read of his death sometime afterwards in a paper. C.E
He was the only Pte Scully in the Battalion, so far as I knew. He was about 5ft 8-9- medium complexion, well-built and came from near Sydney."

We very much regret that we still cannot give you no definite details of your Brothers' death & burial, but will continue our search, and immediately we receive any reliable information we will send you word.

We have communicated with Headquarters regarding the report that your Brother's next of Kin was not known, and they inform us that this is quite an error, they have his next of Kin recorded - his wife, and cannot understand how such a report arose. Perhaps your Officer was mininformed.


