"Capt. Moule was wounded in the abdomen by several Machine Gun bullets and was carried to the Casualty Clearing Station at Poperinghe where he died on Oct. 6th. He had been operated on and seemed to do well at first, but suddenly died of Collapse. He was a charming man and the most popular in the Battn. absolutely fearless and a great loss."

He was O.C. of C. Company. He had chopped the bugs at 6 a.m. on the 4th October at Brodseinde Ridge and had got no more than 100 yards when I saw him hit by a shell full in the body. He got half a shell to himself and was done for at once. I carried him 200 or 300 yards and he told me to put him down as he did not think he could live long. I laid him in a shell hole. He lived about 20 minutes and died then. He is buried in this shell hole on Brodseinde Ridge. It was too bad to put up anything to mark it. There was a barrage on day and night.

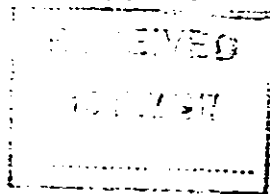

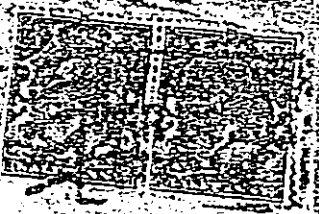
