He was very badly wounded in the head when I naw him, and he was quite unconscious. We afterwards heard that he had died of rounds. I think he got to the hospital before he died. Derga. John Horton (1.8. VIII) was carrying him away. He could probably give definite information.

We made an atlack at outquet Farm on August 20th, we took the German first line and held it, diffing ourselves in beyond. We were all helping to carry the wounded may afterwards.

They got into the trench but the Germans came up from behind and they all got cut off. The Sergt. and all his men took shelter in shell holes and all fought to a finish. He I thinks the majority of them were killed as they were determined not to be taken alive.

We regret to say that we have received some unofficial reports from men in his battalion, about your son -

Nc.438. Sgt. G.G. KOORE 21st Battalion. A.I.F. which are cuite conflicting in nature.

One informant - Ko.485. Gpl. T.A. Saxon, 21st Battn.A.I.F + who, when he gave the report, was in No.5. General Respital, B.E.F. states that Sgt. Moore was carried down on a stretcher from Hongaet Form. A piece of his helmet had been driven into his head and he died the next day at a place just outside Alvers. He was buried close by.

On the other hand two other men state that Sgt. G.G. Moore had been reduced to the rank of private and they saw him with his battalion on the Somme about Oct. 25th. We think that they must mean some other Sergeant Moore.

We should be vary glad if you would let us know whether you have heard from your son since you gave us your inquiry on Septr. 28th. We note that you reported that your son was thought

unofficially to have died of wounds and we hope that this report
was incorrect and that you have heard from him since. Will you
let us know whether this supposition is correct. We hope the
reports are true and that your son is now with his bettelion.

With regrets that we have only such conflicting reports to send you.
