Admitted to the Greek Hospital 15.12.15 unconscious, suffering from pneumonia. He was given oxygen and revived, but died early morning on 16.12.15. I was informed that a "priest" was sent for, who came and was with the man some little time before he died, and from what I could gather it was Dr. Mackie of the Scotch Church, Alex, who was called in. I have interviewed Dr. Mackie and he told me that the man was conscious when he saw him, through naturally his mind was somewhat confused, he had written three letters to Dr. Mackie since his arrival at Hospital all somewhat vague and in the same strain. Dr. Mackie told me he was with him for some time, and that he prayed with him and the man seemed to understand, though he could hardly speak he said "Thank you" when Dr. Mackie left. This I understand was either late at night or early in am. of 16.12.15. Dr. Mackie went to the Greek Hospital later in the morning of 16.12.15 and found the man had died in the early hours of the morning. He had no personal property with him, only his identity disc.
