1386 Pte. H.O. Quince was admitted to this Hospital on the 13th November last suffering from Influenza which developed into Broncho-pneumonia from which he died on the 2nd December 1918.

He was buried on the 4th December 1918, in the British Military Cemetery St. Pol. (Grave No: - D.11. Plot 3,) which is situated one mile south of St. Pol Railway Station on the Lillers-Doullens Road.

The officiating Chaplain was the Reverend B.E. Booker, C.F., and the effects of the deceased were forwarded to the usual channels for disposal.

Dear Madam,

I am in receipt of your letter of the 30th December, 1918., and in reply would inform you that No. 1386 Pte H.C. Quince was admitted to this hospital on the 13th., of November last suffering from Influenza which developed into Broncho-Pneumonia from which he died on the 2nd., of December, 1918.

He was buried on the 4th., of December, 1918, in the British Military Cemetery St. PCL. (Grave No:- D.11. Plot 3.) which is situated one mile South of St. PCL Railway Station on the LILLERS & DOULLEN Road.

The officiating Chaplain was the Reverend B.E. Barker C.F., and the effects of the deceased were forwarded to the usual channels for Disposal.
