Re the late V.H. Pitfield. 3425. 7th L.T.M. Battery. A.F.A.
He was admitted into this Hospital on the 30th September 1918,
suffering from gunshot wound Compound Fracture Femur. He received
a trans fusion of Blood on the 31st September but his condition
did not improve, and he died at 4.5. a.m. on the 3rd October 1918.
His body was interred in Boisguillaume Cemetery, Rouen, on the 4th
October 1918. Grave No 16A, Row F.

at 4-5 a.m. on the 3rd October 1918.
