"He was wounded at Heislon (small town) with his machine gun and carried to an Ambulance, and as he was being put in was killed by a shell. I was attached to a Batt: of the Australian Medical Corps."

At Hebuerne, North of Albert, killed in front line trenches by shell. Part went right through his temple. Buried about 1/2 mile from village just behind the line, 150 yards off the Road going from Village towards Rossineil Wood. I saw the grave and cross up.

"He was a member of my platoon, and on the afternoon of the 29th March he was observing when a shell burst on the parapet of the trench and killed him instantly; a piece of shell passing through his head. I always admired him for the cheery way he had of doing things, and by his cheeriness he inspired others who were likely to become a bit depressed, during the din and roar of battle. He was buried just outside Hebuterne, and a cross was erected over his grave."

I saw him killed by a bullet, whilst we were in the front lines at Hebertune. He was buried close to where he fell, by a party from the coy, a temporary cross was erected at the time. I only knew him in the coy, I could not say where he came from.

"Killed. 29.3.18."

He was killed outright in one of our bombing raids at Hebbiaton (? spelling) at about the end of March/18 and was buried the next day about 20 yds. behind the front line which was about half a mile in front of the village. There were about a doz. graves altogether and he was buried with Lt. Hall of A. Co. 14th Batt. A.I.F. who was killed in the same raid. (The latter's name is now cancelled A.G.C.)

Capt. Roland, padre of 14th Batt. A.I.F. conducted the service. The Germans had not yet got close. I did not see them killed but was present at the funeral. I did not know Revill personally. He belonged to A. Co.
