I am in receipt of your communication of 31st inst. and in reply have to advise that the above mentioned M.C.O died in our Hospital from compound fracture to the left leg, shell wounds to the left arm and face, received in action on 27th November 1916. He was buried the following day in the soldier's cemetery at the Quarry siding near Montauban, Somme.

We must apologise for troubling you, but we should be extremely grateful if you could furnish us with particulars of the wounds, death and burial of No. 916. Cpl. George Regelsen, C. Coy. 29th Battn. A.I.F. who is reported to have died at 13th Field Ambulance 27.11.16.

We wrote to the O.C. of the latter unit, but he replied saying he had no trace of any such man and thought possibly it was the "B 13th. Australian Field Ambulance, to which Regelsen had been taken.

We have had an urgent cable from our Melbourne Office, inquiring for these details,^{to} which we wish to reply and should therefore be greatly obliged if you can help us in the matter.
