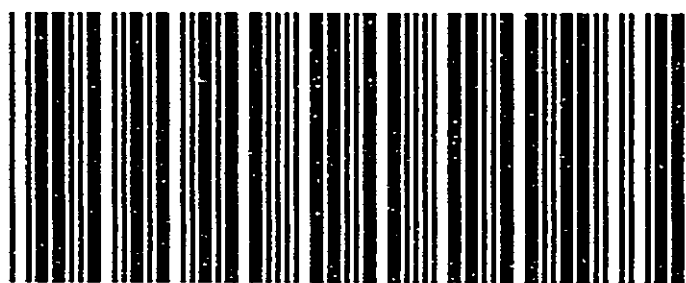

Informant states that on the 20th April, 1916, at Levan-tie, Reid was in his billet behind the firing line when it was blown up by a shell. He got out safely himself, and was helping to move the wounded when he was killed instantaneously. He was buried just outside Levan-tie with 26 others of the same Battalion. A Cross was placed on each grave with the man's name on it."

Informant states that "on April 20th 1916 near Saily, we were in supports in billets, not in the firing line. A chance shell intended for a Battery came our way. The men we lost that day, among whom was Reid, were buried in a field 500 to 800 yds. from the trenches, close to Weathercock House, near Saily (3 miles distant) near V.C. corner, just off the road from Saily to the firing line".

Informant states that there were a whole Company (C) in a billet 3 miles from Saily, part being some of the Band. At mid-day a shell came and killed 20 men, one being A.H. Reid, and another Reid too (a 3rd Reid in the Co., was not killed.) A. Co. of the 3rd Batt., relieved us at night. I carried the bodies out for burial about 5.30 the the evening of same day. Capt. Lundie, Presbyterian Minister, Chaplain of the Unit read the service over them. He went back to Australia about the end of June.
