I knew Smith, he came from North West Tasmania and joined about the same time as myself. I was told by Pte William C. Coy IX platoon that he had helped to take Smith's body out of our lines at Hoplines on or about April 9th and that he had been killed by a whizz-bang. I also heard that he was buried at Ecoivres Cemetery.

The raid was driven off and Smith's body was buried in the Military Cemetery at Armentieres and the grave is marked. I have visited it as he was a friend of mine and in the same platoon.

Yesterday one of my men Mr Williams received a letter from you asking for information of No 589 C. A. Smith. I gave me the letter as I am his platoon Sgt. to answer.

C. A. Smith was killed on the 9.4.17 We were in the line & he was sent on a message. Having delivered the message he was on his way back when a shell fell almost on top of him. He was killed instantly. As far as I know he was buried in a military cemetery behind the line. He was a man about 5 ft 6 inches tall, fairly broad, light hair with a light moustache & blue eyes.
