

On the evening of May 8th, Twiss was with his company, holding the line. During the morning. Lee.Cpl. Orr, and Private Fentman, both of the same company, were sitting in the trench when they were caught by German enfilading fire, and Twiss was struck in the side by a fragment of shell, and Lee.Cpl.Crr stated that he was killed instantly, As a heavy barrage of our line continued, no doubt Twiss's body got buried. He was tall and strongly built, and was about 35 years of age, and was a married man.

# K. May 8th 1917. Det D/B.

He was a L/Cpl. and was in charge of a small post in the Hin denburg line at Bullecourt on May 8th. We were supporting Scotch troops to our left at the time. I did not seek him killed, but I heard at Battalion H. Qrs. that out of the 5 men on the post, 3 including Twiss were killed and the two others wounded by the one shell. Twiss was buried in the trench. He came over with the 6th Reinforcements for the 19th.

#### K. May 8th, 1917.

Ho was killed at Bullocourt on May 8th by a shell in the front line trench. I saw his body soon after death, took his belongings from it, and handed them to Battn Hdqrs. We were relieved that night and the body was not buried up to that time. I knew him well. He lived at 46 Corkes Road, Centeninial Park, Sydney.

I saw him killed by a 5.9 inch shell at Bullecourt on May 8th. Beath was instantaneous. He was killed in the front line. I saw his dead body. I know nothing as to burial. He belonged to B.Coy. He was talking to me at the moment he was hit. I knew him well in the Buttn.

#### K. May 8th, 1017.

They were blown up by a shell at Bullecourt on May 8th. They were in the front line at the time. I was close to them and saw them blown up. Davies was killed outright. I saw his dead body. Twiss was taken to the Aid Post. He died there. I saw his body there after death. I know nothing as to burial. Both belonged to VIII pl. B.Coy.

## \*Killed 8.5.17\* ...

Twies was in my platoen I met him in France and knew him well. Before the Jar he lived in Darlinghurst. He told me he had a wife and child - this was as he was dying. He stood 5 feet 10 inches - dark.

He was killed at Bullecourt, 8th May, 1917. I saw him struck by a shell. W. Irvine and I carried him back to the 9th Battalion Doctor who gave him an injection. He died soon afterwards. The Doctor said it was no use our taking him any further. Twiss asked us not to leave him, so we stayed. It was there that he told us about his family. Davies was killed at the same time - there were seven of us at this post. Twiss and Davies were killed and three others were sounded. Twiss was a good chap - everyone liked him

To make sure about him he wrote to the Battalion and got a reply back caying that his brother was badly wounded and was in a Hospital. I forget whether he told me what hospital or where.

With reference to your inquiry for - .

2853 Pte.J.E.TWISS - 4th Battn.A.I.F. - who is officially reported killed in action on 8.5.17 we are ferwarding on unofficial report which we have just received concerning him.

Informant 2714 Pte.P.H.Middleton states "Twiss was a L/Col.and was in charge of a shall post in the Hindenberg line at Bullecourt on May 8th. We were supporting Scotch troops to ou left at the time. I did not see him killed but I heard at Sattelion Headquarters that out of five men on the post 5 including Twiss were killed outright and the two others wounded by one shell. Twiss was buried in the trench. He came over with the 6th Reinforcements for 19th."

We are still pursuing our inquiries concerning Pte.Twiss and will advise you as soon as we obtain further news of his death or burial.

We regret to inform you of further unofficial evidence about the death of your brother

instantly by a shell when in the front line trenches at Bullecourt and he took his belongings from his body handing them into the Battalion Headquarters. He knew your brother well and gave his home address as 45, Corkes Rd, Centumpal Park, Sydney.

Ho 2779 Ptc.G.Graham, stated that he saw Ptc.Thiss killed by a 5.9. shell at Eullecourt on May 8th, when he was talking to him. Death was instantaneous but he knows nothing of his burial.

Opl.W.Popplewell and Pte.F.G.Venteman, stated that your brother and another man were killed by a shell at Bullecourt when in the front line and they helped to earry him to the Aid Post, neither of them know where your brother was buried.

Should we obtain further news of your brother's death we shall immediately forward 11 to you and trust that it will be some

comfort to know that his death was instantaneous,
