

I saw his dead at Fleurs, he was caught by a shell during a charge then, death was instantaneous. I saw his grave at Fleurs and it was marked with a cross bearing his full particulars. I knew him well he came from Perth. W.A

K. November 3/6, 1916.

I last saw him on November 5th at Fiers in a shell hole in No Man's Land wounded in the arm by a bullet about 11 a.m. He tried to make his way back to the trenches and got shot and killed (so I heard) on our parapet. Do not know who told me this. He was in D Coy and his brother is now in same Coy and I believe saw him just after he was killed. I think his brother who is a L/Cpl may not like to write home with all details but he must know all about it. I think he came from Maylands in Western Australia.

I saw Cpl. Tanner D. Coy, killed about 11 a.m. at Flers. Sgt. Williams 28th Bn D. Coy & I were in a shellhole & Tanner was in another about 10 yds away - he came over to ours & just as he jumped in he said "I'm hit" - he was hit in the arm & we bound it up & he was alright, but wouldn't stop with us & started back to R/A/P but he hadn't got far when we saw him fall, killed instantly by machine gun or sniper's bullet through groin. We went back that night & the body was left in No Man's Land. After Fritz retired we couldn't see any trace of his body but there were a lot of graves to unknown soldiers. Tanner's effects were handed in.

Description: Nearly 6' high, fairly dark, moustache, very popular with his men. Was a policeman in Freemantle before the war.

In answer to your letter of the 25<sup>th</sup> I am afraid I cannot give many details.
