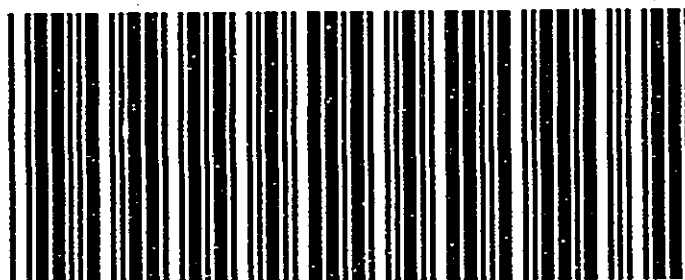

I have the honour to inform you in reply to your letter, dated November 9th. that it is with great regret I am unable to give you any details regarding No. 329 Private C.M.E. Tyson, 18th. Batta. A.I.F. who was admitted to this ship at Gaba Tepe on August 31st. 1918 and died on board on Sept. 2nd. All the Medical officers, Sisters, and Nursing Orderlies of that time have left the ship, some of whom would probably have remembered him and details about him. Personally I was on board at the time and quite well remember him by name, and no doubt saw him, but unfortunately I do not remember any particulars. It was the time of great pressure of work, when so many were brought on board it was impossible to keep a record of each case, but I can assure you that everything that could possibly be done for him, was done. I beg to express my regret I am unable to supply you with any information you desire and wish to extend my sympathy to his brother in his great loss.

Dear Sir,

We should be very glad if you are able to send us some details of the death from a bullet wound in the chest of No.329 Pte.C.M.E.Tyson, 18th.Battn.A.I.F.who we are told died on your ship on September 2nd.1915. and was buried at sea off Lemnos.

These events happened a long time ago, and you may not have been with the ship at the time, but we hope that you may be able to find someone who knew him, and who can tell you something about his last hours. His brother who is in Harefield Hospital is most anxious to get all the details he can, before he returns home to Australia
