

I have the honour to inform you in reply to your letter, dated Movember 9th, that it is with great regret I am unable to give you any details regarding No. 329 Private C.M.E. Tyson, 16th, Battn. A.I.F. who was admitted to this ship at Gaba Tepe on August 31st. 1915 and died on board on Sept. 2nd. All the Medical officers, Sisters, and Mursing Orderlies of that time Medical officers, Sisters, and Mursing Orderlies of that time have left the ship, some of whom would probably have remembered him and details about him. Personally I was on board at the time and quite well remember him by name, and no doubt saw him, but infortunately I do not remember any particulars. It was the time of great pressure of work, when so many were brought on board it was impossible to keep a record of each case, but I can assure you that everything that could possibly be done for him, was done. I beg to express my regret I am unable to supply you with any information you desire and wish to extend my sympathy to his brother in his great loss.


