

At about 11 a.m. on the above date, we had just reached our objective beyond Morlancourt when Swain was killed. I did not see him killed, but Pte. Wallis A Co. told me that Swain was buried at Morlancourt in a small burial ground outside the village. My mate Wallis was acting as S/B and himself buried Swain, but was also killed the same day. He told me about Swain just before he was himself killed. I did not know Swain.

Informant described Swain as about 5 ft 5 or 6 in. high, fairly heavy build, medium complexion, aged about 25 or 26.

They hopped over half an hour afterwards. He never saw Swain again and cannot say where he was buried as they went forward about 10 kilometres and never returned to the spot where Smin had been killed. According to Informant Swain was a very popular chap.

SYPMSY MUREAU.

"Filled 8.8.18."

Swain and I were together in "C". Company. I first met him when he joined up in France in April 1918. I knew him very well. He was a stretcher bearer. He was lightly built and about 5 ft 5 inches in height and was of dark complexion. I can't describe the locality but we were just about to engage in a stunt and were occupying some shell holes. Swain and another stretcher bearer named Clause were together in a shell hole about 10 yards away from the shell hole where I was. I saw a shell burst. Swain was killed outright by the shell and Clause was badly wounded. I rushed up and dragged Swain off Clause. I carried Clause in to a dressing station but he died soon afterwards.

Informant described Swain as about 5'6" high, rather slight, fair, aged 20, was a "Military Medalist". They left Australia together per the "Port Lincoln" on 14/10/15. that they both belonged to "D" Company - Swain being a Stretcher-On 8/8/18 the Battalion was in action between Warfussee bearer. and Corby. They hopped over at daybreak. At the hop-ever Swain was helping to carry a stretcher with a wounded man on it when he was killed outright by a shell. Informant was about 50 yards away and saw Swain fall, but could not muit to investigate, as he had to go on in the advance. He never saw Swain again, but aftermerds saw his grave in the open near to Vere Tood. A few other graves were scattered about. . Swain's grave was marked with his steel hat and one of his discs, and it was intended to put up a cross later. Informant added that Swain was well thought of by his mates.

SWAIN, Private A.V. No. 3470

"Killed 8/8/1918".

We were in action at Villers Bratonneux. Just before the hop-over a shell landed on the top of the trench. Swain happened to put his head up and he was killed instantly. We had just received orders to advance. Swain was the first man killed till we reached the objective. I cannot say anything about his burial and I did not hear anything after. He was attached to either "A" or "G" Company. I was in the same Battalion "D" Company as Stretcher-bearer.
