I knew Pt. Bill Symons. I knew him in Mackay, Queensland; he was a printer, and worked in the Mackay Mercury Newspaper Office. I saw his grave in the Wytchamte Military Cemetery; there is a cross on it.

Quite a number of us were sitting in a dugout in the line, on the left of Messines, when a shell landed amongst us killing some, and wounding quite a number, he being amongst the killed. I was wounded at the time and did not see his grave, but I was told by the Pltn Sgt-Sgt. H.S. Warfield that all the men that were killed were buried at Bata HdQtrs behind the line, and that the graves were marked with crosses bearing all the particulars. I knew him very well there was no other of that name in the Coy.

Symons was about 5ft. 6" in height, very quiet, had a big nose, fair complexion, and about 21 or so years of age. Kirk came from Charters Towers, North Queensland. He had thin features, big eyes, very young looking, and fair. Pope was very young looking, stoutly built, and freckled. Those three men, and Pts Soutery/Millard (all H.Q. Signallers and runners) were killed by one shell that blew in a Dugout on them in the front line at Gun Farm, Wytschaete, about August 11th. I had a party of men to dig them out. They were killed outright. I recognised Kirk, Pope, Symons and the others, and took their paybooks off them. The bodies were taken back, and buried at Dorry Farm, near Ulster Dump. There is wire round all the graves of the 47th Batt. there. These men each had a separate grave with a cross for each with his name & on, and the Rising Sun Badge. I saw the crosses after they were put up. They had been in my platoon before; I knew them well.

With reference to your enquiry for 2256 Pte. C. E. Symons 47th. Batta. A. I. F. who is officially reported killed in action on 11.11.17. We are forwarding a letter and official reports we have received concerning him.

Informant, 4202, Pte. H. Henderson states: "A number of us were sitting in a dug out in the line on the left of Messines when a shell landed amongst us killing some and wounding quite a number, Symons being amongst the killed."

I was wounded at the time and did not see his grave, but I was told that all the men that were killed were buried at Battalion Headquarters behind the line, and that the graves were marked with crosses bearing all particulars. I know Symons very well. There was no other of that name in the Company."

We are still pursuing our enquiries for Pte. Symons and will advise you as soon as we obtain further particulars.
