Informant described Lloyd as about 6ft. high, heavy build, dark complexion, over 30. Informant states that they both belonged to the 12th Bty.

On a date before 28-9-18 the Battery was in action at Reigel. About 6.30 a.m. when at the gun Lloyd was hit by fragments of a shell that landed alongside the gun, and which also hit three others. Informant was 30 or 40 yards away on another gun and saw the explosion. He also saw Lloyd being carried out on a stretcher and heard later that he died of his wounds.

According to Informant Lloyd was well thought of by his mates.

Re Pte. Lloyd. He was admitted into No.1. on September 19th with a bad shell wound in head and face, also left leg; his jaw was broken and his head very badly injured; he lived till the 26th when he died at 9.30; he was only semi-conscious all the time he was here. His relatives were written to by the Sister and Padre and everything possible done to make him feel easier and happier. He is buried in the St. Sever Cemetery and the number of his grave is 6878; He was buried on the 30th.

We are all in a cheerful humor here. The
unit expects to leave here this week so
far we have heard nothing from Boulogne.
So don't know what your fate is to
be in the meantime we are hanging
because this short note but I am
