I knew him. He was a Lewis Gunner, (No. 1). He was thin, fair, about 5ft 8" in height, and about 22 or 23 years of age. His mate, Pt. Mackay, D. of the 2nd Batt., D.C.C. (now with the Battalion) had a letter from Mc.Kenzie when he was in Hospital in England wounded. Mackay told me later that Mc.Kenzie had died of wounds in the same Hospital. I do not know where it was.

Re your enquiry of 21.12.17 concerning 6293, Pte. A. M. McKenzie Lewis Gunner, 2nd battn., died of Wounds 6.4.17, addressed to Pte. D. McKay of the same Unit. He has handed it over to me for reply.

Being a friend of deceased and having received an enquiry from his parents I have made exhaustive enquiries concerning his death and interment, also cause of same. I was not an eye-witness myself "being a casualty in the same battle", but I will narrate it as it was to me, by men who were with him at the time.

We were on foot about 8 p.m. on the morning of 4.5.17, heavy shelling was going on at the time and Alick, as he was called by the boys, was hit by a piece of high explosive. His wound was dressed by Sgt. Robinson and J. Lee. He walked out and that was the last time he was seen by his comrades. He was buried at Greville's Cemetery, about one and a quarter miles from Bapaume and I think on the 8.5.17, I have lost the record of his burial, but it can be obtained at the Australian Base Records Office, Horseferry Road, London.

I saw him there about 3 or 4 months ago, and he was waiting for a boat to go to Australia.
