Re 5861 Pte. A.L. Green 16/18th Batta. He was wounded on the 5th May, a compound fracture of the thigh, and wounds in the face. He died the same day, shortly after reaching our C.C.S. I expect our letters to his next of kin went down in one of the torpedoed mail boats. Pte. Green was buried at Greville's Military Cemetery. It is no trouble at all to write, all we regret is that in the majority of cases of death in a C.C.S. there is so little to tell, as death, if it occurs, so frequently follows closely upon admission.

5861. Pte Green 16/18 Batt, was wounded on the 5th May a compound fracture of the thigh, and wounds in the face. He died the same day shortly after reaching our C.C.S. I expect our letters to his next of kin went down in one of the torpedoed mail boats. Pte. Green was buried at Gréville Military Cemetery. It is no trouble at all to write, all we regret is that in the majority of cases of death in a C.C.S there is so little to tell, as death if it occurs, so frequently follows closely upon admission.

It is no trouble at all to write all we regret is that in the majority of cases of death in a Casualty Clearing Station there is so little to tell, as death if it occurs, so frequently follows closely upon admission."
