Letters have been returned marked "Killed in Action." signed by Lieut. J.T. Tait, who was formerly a Sgt. Mjr. at Broadmeadows, and knew the casualty well.

Walter E. Thorn, No. 602, A. Coy. 6th Btn. who is possibly at Malta doing coast duty, on the 10th October wrote as follows:-

"At Cape Hellas we did an advance of 1,000 yards over a country as flat as a table. As soon as we got to where we had to make the firing line, I passed word along to find out if the casualty was alright, but I got no news of him. I saw the pioneer Sgt. and he told me that he found the casualty dead with a coil of telephone wire over each shoulder, and carrying two signalling lamps, but as somebody had taken the casualty's identification disc, he would not swear that it was he, but all the same, from the description he gave, I think it was."

Signallers told me after our teturn from Cape Helles to Anzac about May 13th that he had seen Edgar shot dead in charge of May 5th on attack on Krithia. Linnie is now at Paisley, Scotland permanently unfit. Cpl Rowe in pack store Horseferry Road could give Lennis's exact address."

Witness was with Edgar in the charge at Cape Helles early in May. They had a bit of apparament about a telegraph wire that had to be carried. Edgar took the wire a short distance and fell. He did not rise again. Witness was not able to ascertain if he was dead, in the rush. He concluded, however, that he was dead when he saw him fall. He was never seen or heard of again, and could not have been taken prisoner as he fell behind the position held. Edgar was a well-built man. He had red hair and a reddish complexion.
