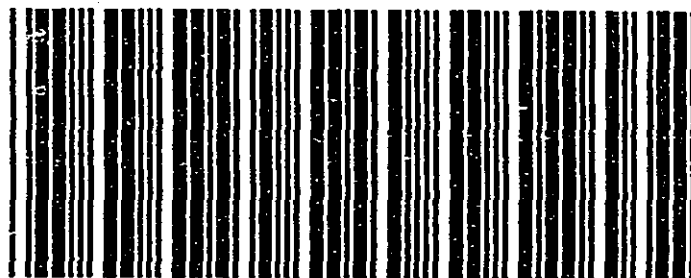

"Died of Wounds 5.4.18."

Informant says, that as Private Anderson was carrying a wounded man out of the line, he was sniped and fell badly wounded. He was picked up by a stretcher bearer and soon after died of his wounds - believed true. This was told to his mates, who had come over from New South Wales with him and who called to enquire for him at the Casualty Hospital. They had (his regiment) only come into line the night before to stop the enemy, he had no knowledge of his burial. The ground was held. Private Anderson in C. Coy
