

ends dative G.O.C., A.I.F. has approved (subject to your concurrence) of one artist being appointed to the Australian War Records Section in Egypt on conditions similar to those which have already been notified in A.I.F. Orders :-

> (a) The artist will be subject to the control of the War Records Section, but he may be required for camouflage duties under such conditions as may be decided -Holdes by you.

(b) Necessary equipment and materials will be issued by

the Australian War Records Section.

(c) All artistic work produced by him will be the property of the Australian Government. He will not be permitted to undertake work for any other authority or person, nor for his personal gain.

(d) The applicant selected will, in the first instance, be appointed in his present rank for a period of 3 months on probation. At the end of this period if confirmed in his appointment he may be granted honforary rank on the General List with pay of lieutenant. If at present holding a commission he will be transferred to the General List with his present rank.

2. I attach hereto copy of a note drawn up by Mr Bean and Lt. Will Dyson regarding the employment of artists in the A.I.F. to advise and instruct in camouflage. It was for the object referred to in this memo that artists were appointed. At the same time, however, it is not anticipated that their duties as camouflage advisers and instructors will occupy the whole of their time, and when not engaged on these duties they will be employed in painting pictures for the galleries to be formed in connection with the Australian War Museums.

- you should call for applications for this appointment to be submitted to the War Records Section representative in Egypt, and from these the selection should be made. If an Australian official artist is in Egypt at the time he might it is suggested assist in the selection. The rank, name, and unit of the man selected should be communicated to this Headquarters.
 - 4. Instructions regarding the control of this artist, and the disposal of pictures painted by him will be forwarded direct by the Officer i/c, Aust. War Records Section to the Officer i/c, E.E.F. Sub-Section, A.W.R.S.

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Note from Mr. Bean and Lieut, Dyson as to Camouflage

We believe that to get the full military combatant value out of your artists, they should be sed to teach the troops especially the infantry and artillery, at schools or on the ground, the knowledge of what is and what is not effective camouflage - effective concealment. Dyson and other artists, and even I for that matter, notice on passing behind the lines, thousands of hours completely wasted on effective campuflage; we notice laborious work undertaken about guns or dugouts under the mistaken impression that it will conceal them, when half the work performed with knowledge would make them completely invisible, or what is as good, "urmeaning" to the enemy plane. We believe five or aix men could teach this rapidly through the force as gas officers do: we could get not fancy artists, but some first class artists who are as used to smellfire as anyone, who know the front and are soldiers. What if it dad mean takingout of their present (half artistic) occupation three or four privates and an officer or two: if they managed to deceive a single plane on a single night they might/well/four or five times their number to be force within twenty four hours.

You could give them a month at the camouflage school here. They could teach men in any old barn by shewing at twenty yards how a spetted camouflage is useless, while big broad line completely throws the eye out; how shadows have to be broken and tracks avoided; and if you saved one gun by their work, the expense of their training would be returned to you many times.

With the coming importance of air offensives, and the new ideas of concealing your infantry posts by day, and even deceiving the enemy, this so much appeals to me that I think of worth suggesting, for I know that the artist is the only man who sees these things by nature and genius - the importance of shade, line bold colour or the reverse. And our men are quicker than any others to learn.

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AUSTRALIAN WAR RECORDS SECTION ARTISTS IN F R A N C E.

CONTROL.

1. The War Records Section Artists in France are included in the establishment of the B.E.F.Sub-section and upon arrival in France come under the command of the Officer i/c, that Sub-section, who is located at Headquarters, Australian Corps. No artists will however be moved without the concurrence of the division concerned. The primary duty of these artists will be to act as advisers and instructors in camouflage as may be required by the General Staff of the divisions to which they are attached, who will issue instructions as to what they are required to do.

When not required for camouflage duties they will be employed in painting pictures for the Australian Government. The subject of these pictures will as a rule be left to their discretion except that any one of them may be required to paint some special subject considered desirable by the Australian War Records Section or by the Official Correspondent. Instructions as to these subjects will be communicated by the Officer i/c B.E.F. Sub-section, A.W.R.S.

Each artist will keep a weekly diary showing the amount of time spent on camouflage duties and on war record work respectively. This diary will be complete to Saturdays and will, after being initialled by an officer of the General Staff concerned, be forwarded on Sunday to the Officer i/c, B.E.F.Sub-section, A.W.R.S. attached Headquarters, Aust. Corps. The latter officer will, when the diaries are no longer required by him, forward them to the Officer i/c, Aust. War Records Section, London.

ACCOMMODATION MOVEMENTS,&c.

2. Arrangements for the accommodation and rationing of artists, the provision of facilities to enable them to carry out their camouflage duties and war record work, and movements in connection with the former, will be made by the divisions to which they are allotted. Any special moves necessitated by their war record work will be arranged by the Officer i/c,B.E.F.Sub-section,A.W.R.S.

REPORTS & CASUALTIES.

Reports on artists will be rendered to the Officer i/c, B.E.F.Sub-section, A.W.R.S. Any casualties affecting them should also be reported to him.

LEAVE.

4. Leave will be arranged by the division concerned after the concurrence of the officer i/c,B.E.F.Sub-section has been obtained.

MATERIAL.

5. nThe material required by artists will be supplied by the Australian War Records Section. In the case of the artists who were in England prior to taking up their appointments, the initial issue will be made in that country and will be taken to France by the artists concerned. In the case of the artists who took up their appointment in France, the material will be obtained by the War Records Section, London, and forwarded to the B.E.F.Subsection, who will issue it to the artists concerned. Further supplies may then be obtained by artists by demanding upon the A.W.R.S. Sub-section, who will be kept supplied by the A.W.R.S. London. As it will only be possible to keep small supplies in France, artists will give early advice of their requirements.

DISPOSAL OF PICTURES.

6. Completed pictures, together with their titles, will be handed to the Officer i/c, B.E.F.Sub-section, who will arrange their transmission to the A.W.R.S. London.

I beg to submit my application for position of Official Artist, and under seperate cover am sending examples of work.

My training as an Artist was first at the Royal Art Society Sydney,
Julian Ashton, and Norman Carter, the Portrait painter: later in America
at the school of Fine Arts Philadelphia, and Henri's school New York,
and Julaan's, Paris.

I have Exhibited at the Victorian Artists Society Melbourne, and the Royal Art Society, Sydney.

I joined the A.I.F. in April 1915, and have served continuously since then.InAugust1915 I landed on the Peningular and worked as a stretcher bearer. and in Dec. was loaned to Capt. Beanto sssist on the Anzac Book. In Man.Irejoined my unit, and in May1916 was selected by, and laaned to, The Survey of Egypt, for work in connection with Military Maps: after a special training Iwas sent to Mesopotamaa with the Survey of Egypt Photo Mapping Section, and for twelve months worked on the compilation and reproduction of Operations Maps from Aerial-Photographs. In August 1917 the section was recalled for urgent work in Egyptand Iwas promoted and given responsible work in the Reproduction office

I understand that part of the duties of the Artist selected will be the modelling of the country over which the Australians have fought: I would be glad to submit a scheme by which this work could be done, and I feel that I could organise, and carry out the whole work I am conversant with the methods employed by the Survey of Egypt in the making of the GAZA model, although I did no actual work on it. I trust that my application will receive your due consideration, and thanking you fin anticipation of all favourable reply.
