During the evening of the 6th November 1915 an opening was driven into a turkish listening tunnel in front of LONE PINE. The work of reconnoitring was at once taken in hand by Captain Barber and his party under difficult and extremely hazardous conditions. Over 70 feet of the enemy's heavily timbered main gallery was occupied, barricaded and surveyed within an hour of the first entry being made. The party had to enter the enemy work one by one through an untimbered hole barely large enough to crawl through. Their prompt action gained for us additional and most valuable protection for the LONE PINE front.	/

McGregor, Henry Arthur	2nd/Lt.	-	23rd. Bn.	8th. Novr. 1915. LONE PINE.	After the seizure of the enemy tunnel and gallery at LONE PINE on the 6th. Novr. Lieut McGregor and Corporals Graham and Arnold carried out a daring further reconnaissance of the enemy's under ground works extending 55'. Turkish sentries were seen at two points. Valuable information gained and two barricades were made by Corporal Graham in the enemy tunnels. The nature of the work is shown by the fact that the return journey took seven minutes to cover a distance of under 20 yards, the tunnels being almost blocked by fallen earth.	32
