	31st Battalion		2nd Lieutenant LAWRENCE JAMES THOMSON	At PETHILLON on 19th/20th July 1916, exhibited great gallantry in maintaining a continuous service with his Lewis Gun. He established himself on top of enemy's parapet, and with only one man assisted materially in holding the position in the German main trench all night. Lieutenant ARTHUR KILWORTH FLACK	At PETHILLON on 19th/20th July 1916 this Officer was wounded in our own trenches before the Infantry advanced, but in spite of this he took his guns into action, with the exception of three men, all of his detachment were killed or wounded, but by firing one gun himself he kept both guns going and succeeded in bringing them both safely back to our own lines.
