	52nd Battery, 25th F.A.Bde 5th Div.Art.	✓ 1634	Bombardier <b>STANLEY FRANCIS CHIPPENDALE</b>	At PETILLON on 19th/20th July 1916, Bombardier Chippendale served as telephone specialist in the front line trenches during our bombardment and infantry attack on the enemy's position. He worked unceasingly from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. on 19th inst. keeping up communications between trenches and battery under very heavy shell and rifle fire. In the early stages of the engagement Bombardier Chippendale was buried by the explosion of a shell. On being released, his first consideration was that of communication, which he speedily restored and maintained until he was relieved.
