	7th A.L.H. Regiment		Major Nathaniel Barton	During the recent Operations at ANZAC this Officer did excellent work and showed great gallantry and devotion to duty until he was severely wounded. On the 27th March 1915 his Squadron was on the left of the position held by 7th L.H. and he made several determined attempts to advance, but each effort was stopped by exceptionally heavy M.G. and rifle fire. About 1500 and Squadron of 6th L.H. made good a ridge on the left of Barton's Squadron and the latter at once advanced several hundred yards and began consolidating the line. About 1600 the 6th L.H. were forced back by very heavy fire and as Barton's Squadron was now being infiltrated he was compelled to withdraw. He did this in a very quiet and orderly way and in doing so was wounded, but owing to the critical situation he remained on duty until he was again wounded, his leg being broken. During the trying day he displayed great courage and set a fine example to all ranks in his Squadron. Throughout the Gallipoli, Sinia and Palestine Campaigns his work has been consistently good and he has always set a very high standard of duty to his command.	Colonel Lieut.
