

FIRST (QUEENSLAND MOUNTED INFANTRY) CONTINGENT.

LIKE the early Contingents in other States, the first despatched by Queensland was ordered to be raised from officers and others serving in the local defence forces, namely, 250 of the Queensland Mounted Infantry, and a Machine Gun Section from the Royal Australian Artillery (Queensland). They were to be equipped strictly in accordance with the Field Service Manual for the equipment of a Mounted Infantry unit. With regard to this, however, Lieut.-Colonel Ricardo, who commanded the Contingent, stated in his report :—" Out of 262 of all ranks enrolled, 123 were then serving in the Queensland Mounted Infantry ; but 46 men, who had served, also joined ; this left 93 to be recruited from outside. Of this number, 25 N.C.O.'s and men of A Battery (Royal Australian Artillery), volunteered ; they were some of the best men we had, and their example had a very good effect on the Contingent. The remainder were made up of men who said they were, or had been, members of the Queensland Defence Force."

The Contingent was practically enrolled, organized, and equipped with arms, clothing, horses, saddlery, transport wagons with fittings and stores, between the 13th and 28th October—a record of the indefatigable way in which the Staff, the Comptroller of Stores, the medical and veterinary authorities, and the embarkation officers must have worked. The horses were selected and purchased by Veterinary Major Irving, P.V.O.

ESTABLISHMENT.

Staff :—One major, 1 sergeant-major, 1 quartermaster-sergeant, 4 privates ; total, 7 ; with 4 riding and 4 draught horses ; total 8.

Machine Gun Section (Royal Australian Artillery) :—One lieutenant, 1 sergeant, 1 corporal, 2 bombardiers, 5 drivers, 7 gunners ; total, 1 officer, 1 sergeant, 15 rank and file, with 6 riding and 14 draught horses ; total 20.

No. 1 Company :—One captain, 3 lieutenants, 1 company sergeant-major, 4 sergeants, 1 sergeant-artificer, 3 artificers, 2 buglers, 6 corporals, 92 privates ; total, 4 officers, 109 others, with 100 riding and 20 draught horses ; in all, 113 of all ranks, with 120 horses.

No. 2 Company :—The like.

Supernumeraries :—Two officers, 8 privates, with 14 riding and 18 draught horses ; in all, 10 of all ranks, 32 horses.

Grand total :—One major, 2 captains, 9 lieutenants, 1 regimental sergeant-major, 1 quartermaster-sergeant, 2 company sergeant-majors, 9 sergeants, 2 sergeant-artificers, 6 artificers, 4 buglers, 13 corporals, 2 bombardiers, 208 gunners, drivers, and privates ; in all, 12 officers, 248 others, with 224 riding and 76 draught horses ; altogether, 260 of all ranks, with 300 horses.

DEPARTURE AND RETURN.

The Contingent left on 1st November, 1899, comprising 14 officers, 248 others, with 284 horses, besides machine guns and wagons. Ten died or were killed, 1 officer was transferred, 1 commissioned in the Imperial Army, 7 were struck off in South Africa ; 12 officers, 231 others returned to Australia.

PROMOTIONS, ETC.

Major P. R. Ricardo, promoted to Lieut.-Colonel, 13th December, 1899.

Captain H. G. Chauvel was appointed Adjutant on 13th February, 1900, and held the local rank of Major in South Africa, from 30th November, 1900, to 21st January, 1901.

Captain R. S. Browne (Special Service Officer) held the local rank of Major in South Africa.

Captain P. W. G. Pinnock to Brevet-Major.

Lieutenant D. E. Reid, promoted to Captain, 13th February, 1900. Brevet of Major.

Lieutenant R. Dowse served as Captain and Adjutant at the Maitland Camp, 6th November, 1900, to 12th December, 1900.

Lieutenant H. Bailey, similar service, 18th April, 1900, to 12th December, 1900.

Lieutenant R. Gordon, promoted Captain and transferred to command of Mounted Infantry Company, 1st Battalion, Gordon Highlanders, February, 1900, to January, 1901.

Lieutenant (Supernumerary) C. H. Anderson-Pelham, was appointed 2nd Lieutenant, 12th Lancers, 18th April, 1900.

For promotions of N.C. officers and men, *vide* nominal roll.

SERVICE.

The Contingent embarked in the transport *Cornwall*, on 31st October and 1st November, 1899, and went to sea on the latter day. Arrived at Table Bay on 12th December; landed at Cape Town on the following day, and proceeded to Orange River in two trains. Their transport and ammunition wagons had been taken over by the Ordnance authorities at Cape Town, but fresh were issued at De Aar, comprising five buck wagons (nominal load 3,500 lbs.) and five Scotch carts for the ammunition. Subsequently, however, the Army Service Corps took over all transport. The wagons brought by the Contingent were used chiefly by the Royal Engineers, who spoke highly of them as being very handy, well and faithfully built, and very light in the draught; but, as every wagon required two drivers, it was more economical to have a vehicle that would carry a heavier load.

Owing to the weight of the machine gun carriage and the condition the horses were in, it was found that even with four horses per gun they could not keep up with the Column, and were, therefore, worse than useless. The machine guns were therefore handed over complete with harness and all spare parts to Colonel Chambier, Royal Artillery, at Kimberley, and, being required for further service, were retained when the Contingent returned to Queensland.

From Orange River the Contingent proceeded to Belmont, whence it took a prominent part in the engagement at Sunnyside (1st January, 1900) and the Relief of Douglas (2nd January, 1900), as part of an expeditionary force under Lt.-Colonel T. D. Pilcher.

In February, 1900, the Contingent took part in the Relief of Kimberley (Alderson's Brigade, General French's Division), and from thence proceeded to Koodoosrand, and was employed in the operations at Paardeberg (17th to 26th February).

After the surrender of General Cronje, the Contingent formed part of a mounted brigade under Lt.-Colonel Martyr (General French's Division), and took part in the engagements at Poplar Grove (7th March) and Driefontein (10th March), and the occupation of Bloemfontein on the 8th March, 1900.

At Bloemfontein, the 2nd Queensland Contingent joined by order of the Field Marshal Commanding-in-Chief. The regiment went into rest camp at Springfontein until the 31st March, when the two companies of the 1st Contingent under Lt.-Colonel Ricardo formed part of the earlier relieving force at the engagement at Sanna's Post (31st March).

During April, 1900, the regiment, then consisting of three companies, with the 3rd Mounted Infantry Regiment (Imperial) and the 1st and 2nd Contingents of New Zealand Mounted Rifles, formed the 3rd Mounted Infantry Corps under Lt.-Colonel T. D. Pilcher, joined the 1st Mounted Infantry Brigade under Major-General Hutton (French's Division), and left Bloemfontein on the 1st May, when the general advance on Pretoria commenced. The regiment took part in the

engagements at Brandfort (3rd May), Constantia (4th May, 1900), Vet River (5th and 6th May), Zand River (10th May, 1900), Klipriversberg (28th May), Johannesburg (29th May, 1900), Pretoria (4th June, 1900), and Diamond Hill (11th and 12th June).

After the occupation of Pretoria, strong inducements were offered to Australians and New Zealanders to join the South African Constabulary, which was then being formed, and a considerable number of the members of the 1st and 2nd Contingents were transferred; and, though many afterwards rejoined their regiment, the strength of the two Contingents was much reduced.

Lt.-Colonel Ricardo, considering that he was left without a command corresponding to his rank, applied for other employment, which was granted in Pretoria, and handed over the command to Major Chauvel.

Reformed into two squadrons, the regiment was engaged in the operations at Reit Vlei (13th to 16th July, 1900), and was then transferred to Mahon's Brigade (Ian Hamilton's Division), with which it took part in the first eastern advance as far as Balmoral (25th July), the action at Zilikat's Nek (2nd August), the operations about Rustenburg (August, 1900), and the pursuit of De Wet's force northwards to Warmbad, including engagement at Oliphant's Nek (17th August). The regiment then returned to the Eastern Transvaal, and, with the exception of half a squadron which accompanied Mahon's Brigade to Barberton under Lieut. Glasgow, formed part of a mounted force consisting of the 3rd Mounted Infantry Regiment (Imperial), Queensland Mounted Infantry, and 3rd Brabant's Horse, under Major Chauvel, which was employed in minor operations in the Middleburg District (Brigadier-General Barker), including the action near Pan (11th October, 1900), subsequently joining General Smith-Dorien's command at Belfast.

Early in November, orders having been received for the return of the 1st Contingent, the horses and saddlery were handed over, and train taken to Cape Town. The men were, however, detrained at De Aar, under Captain Pinnock, and proceeded to Worcester, remaining there until the meeting of the Afrikaner Bond had been held, when the journey to Cape Town was resumed.

On 13th December (anniversary of the day of disembarkation), embarked on transport *Orient*, and arrived at Brisbane on 17th January, 1901, after having called at Albany, Melbourne, and Sydney *en route*. Disbanded on the 23rd.
