
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
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

Submitted for information, report of proceedings of H.M.A.S. "ATR GUIDE" for April, 1946.

- 2. With reference to the efficiency report, the cause of excessive smoke and high lubricating oil consumption, together with loss of revolutions, points to worn cylinders and piston rings. Working parts generally show signs of fair wear and tear.
- 3. The auxiliary "Onon" motor requires a top overhaul with a renewal of the petrol pump and a new flexible fuel hose fitted between pump and carburettor.
- 4. The hull appears sound. The ship was last slipped in September, 1945.

SUBJECT: REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS FOR MONTH OF APRIL. 1946.

Submitted in accordance with CNO 97/43 and COTO 19/15 the following report of proceedings for the month of April 1946.

- On 2nd April proceeded from Dreger Harbour to Langemak Bay. At 1730% on 3rd, proceeded with "Air Faith" under tow of H.M.A.S. "Wilcannia" for Thursday Island.
- Due to strong winds and heavy seas encountered in Coral Sea, where tow parted, and vessel was making exces sive water, proceeded to Port Moresby for shelter. From 1850K 7th to 13th April, at Moresby, effecting repairs to electrical circuits, and waiting for weather to abate.
- At 0850E/14th April, proceeded from Port Moresby with "Air Faith" until taken in tow by "Wilcannia" at 1750. Secured alongside "Wilcannia" anchored outside Thursday Is. Harbour at 0250%/ 16th, and proceeded into harbour at 0650.
- Proceeded at 0830K/17th under tow "Wilcamia", arriving Townsville at 0710K on 21st. From 21st to 24th at Townsville, while "Wilcannie" offected repairs.
- Proceeded at 1715E/ 25th under tow, anchoring off Pile Light Moreton Bay at 2359K/29th. At 0645/30th. proceeded up Brisbane River, securing alongside "Wilcom ia" at New Farm Wharf at 0850.
- With the exception of one rating discharged at Port Moresby, and one at Townsville for hospital treaten t, the health of the ship's company has been fair.

Efficiency Report.

Main Engines. Both engines are using excessive oil and smoking badly, with general wearing of all working parts.

Auxiliary Engine. Requires spares which were not available on passage.

Hull. Long overdue for slipping.



Submitted in accordance with CNO 97/43 and CCNO 19/45, the following report of proceedings for January, 1946.

- 2. From 1st to 9th alongside at Morotai. At 1005I on 10th, proceeded on search of local islands and waters for five Japanese P.O.W. escapees, returning after an unsuccessful search at 1605I.
- Proceeded at 0730I/11th, carrying out a search from the northern end of the Halmahera Group to the entrance of Kau Bay. The search was unsuccessful, and returned to harbour at 1610I.
- At 1300I/14th, embarked parties of R.A.A.F. Crash Investigation and War Graves (A.I.F.) personnel, and proceeded to Kau Bay, arriving Subaim 1645I. Aircraft crashes in the area were investigated A.M. 15th, and the remains of two pilots were recovered. Proceeded from Subaim 1345I, arriving Morotai 1700I.
- Rendezvoued with H.M.A.S. "Murchison" outside Morotai Harbour at 0655I/18th and delivered large scale charts. The remainder of the month was spent alongside at Morotai.
- 6. With the exception of one member of the ship's company, admitted to 2/9th A.G.H., the health of the ship's company has been satisfactory.

7. Efficiency Report.

Main Engines. Although the port engine is smoking excessively, the main engines have functioned satisfactorily.

Submitted in accordance with CNO 97/43 and CCNO 19/45, the following report of proceedings for December, 1945.

- 2. From 1st to 14th alongside in Tarakan, rigging tow and preparing ship for passage to Morotai.
- 3. December 15th, proceeded at 1250, under tow of H.M.A.S. "Gawler", arriving Morotai 1110/18th.
- December 30th, proceeded at 2210 with an L.C.V.P. in company, in search of Army O.R. reported adrift in a canoe to the south of Morotai. After an unsuccessful search, returned to harbour at 0505/31st. At 1340/31st proceeded on further search, locating missing man at 1657, and returned to harbour at 1730.
- Sub-Lieutenant E.N.Littlewood R.A.N.R. assumed command on 13th December vice Lieutenant E.B.Hopkins R.A.N.V.R who was discharged to Gawler for passage to "Torrens" for demobilisation.
- With the exception of Flight Sergeant A.J.Campbell R.A.A.F., admitted to 2/9th A.G.H. for 14 days, the health of the ship's company has been satisfactory.
- 7. Efficiency Report.

Main Engines. Two major mechanical defects were experienced:
Starboard water pump on starboard engine
was replaced; Electric fuel pumps for port
engine ordered from Madang, and forwarded
thence 3rd December have not been received.
Substitute aero-type pump at present in
operation. With these exceptions, the
engines have performed satisfactorily.



MONTHLY REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS. (Submitted through N.O.I.C New Guinea)

The following is a report of Proceedings,

Operations, and Maintenance, etc, of H.M.A.S. "Air Guide". 1st Sept, 1945. Harbour Routine - Painting. Run to Bunya Island - Recreational purposes. 2nd. Lieut. R.H. Webb joined. Trip to Sadau Island to 3rd, pick up Airman requiring urgent medical attention. Five Japanese prisoners also picked up and handed over to Aust. Army at Tarakan. Mustering stores for turning over charge. 4th - 5th Lieut. R.H. Webb, R.A.N. V.R. assumed command p.m. 7th relieving Sub. Lieut. A.B. McLean, R.A.N. V.R. 8th Run to Selor with party of R.A.A.F. Officers to make inspection and obtain some fresh food. 9th Sub. Lieut. A.B. McLean discharged to "City of Fortworth" for passage to Morotai. Docked in U.S. Navy floating dock as S/LT. McLean 10th advised that one propellor was slightly bent. Both propellors changed, one spare being borrowed from A.S.R.921. Bottom scrubbed. Refloated 2 hrs after docking. Shifted out into stream at 0500 because of hard 11th on shore breeze. Refuelled. Painting resumed. Propellors collected from U.S.S. "Wachapreague" where same had been straightened. 12th - 16th Painting, cleaning, scraping and general maintenance work. Buoys laid for Catalinas tested by giving 17th moorings steady pull. 18th A.S.R.921 commenced top over haul. Arrangements made with C.O. 921 to have a minimum of one complete crew available at all times, out of the two crews plus a fire party for 921. That arrangement to continue while 921 immobilised. Call received at 1015 to proceed to scene of 19th crashed Douglas aircraft. Lieut. Webb ashore on duty. Sub. Lieut. Stringer took over and proceeded at 1030 to position appro 100 miles, 080' from Tarakan. 1439 heading back to base. 1905 berthed at Tarakan. Lieut. Webby took over command. Refuelled and adjustments made to motors. 2008 slipped and proceeded to position given of rafts sighted by Catalina, namely 03°08' N. 119°10'E. 2115 amended position given vy catalina as 03°10'N. 119°26'E. 2348 Catalina sighted fine on Port bow. 20th Continued on practically same course at same speed (25 knot) taking direction from Catalina. 0128 alongside 3 rafts, 24 men taken on board, four only suffering from minor injuries. Men given hot drinks and all available quarters, towels and blankets were also provided. Rafts and gear taken aboard. Position 130 miles 0920 from Tarakan jetty. 0200

by R/T. Refuelled at 0915. Harbour routine. 1450 - 1640 sweeping paths for 3 Catalina to land and guiding same to buoys.

Proceeded back to Tarakan at 21 knots. 0815 berthed

at Tarakan. Transport provided as requested earlier

Slipped at 0615 and proceeded to sweep path for Catal# inas to take off. Last one airborne at 0716 heading for Darwin. 1011-1100 testing Catalina Buoys and making adjustments to same.

23rd September, 0900. Catalina observed circling. Proceeded to clear path for landing. Directions for landing passed by R/T.

24th Scraping and painting. Draining board metalled with

duralium.

25th 0648. Slipped and proceeded to sweep path for Catalina

to takeoff, thence to Sadau Island to obtain timber for

awnings. Additional Catalina buoys tested at 1530.

26th - 29th Painting. Spare set of mooring lines prepared. Admidships.

Awning erected with new ridge pole and battens. Sunday routine. A.S.R.921 completed top overhaul.

RADIO EQUIPMENT.

Now satisfactory after same was over hauled by R.A.A.F. during past ten days.

HEALTH OF PERSONNEL. Good on average. Stoker Bently has some sores which are taking a long time to heal. Lieut. Wedd has several patches of Dermititis on the feet. Lotion, etc obtained from R.A.A.F. Medical Officer so far ineffective.

CONDITION OF HULL. Hull appears to be in fair condition, although there is definite evidence of strain. The planking has at some time been damaged in two places, near starboard side of transom, and near stem post starboard side.

BATTERIES AND ELECTRICAL SYSTEM. Good condition.

ARMAMENT. Gun barrels rather rusty, apparently this has been largely due to leaky covers.

MAIN ENGINES. In good order and running well, but just due for the 500 hour overhaul, which is being commmenced 2nd October, 1945,

- 2. During the month Operational Air Sea Rescue patrols were carried out from Tarakan, Borneo, main points as follows:
 - Aug. 1. An urgent journey was made to Ali-agau village from where a N.I.C.A. patrol launch was towed back with a native woman hospital case aboard.
 - " 12. Proceeded to Sadau Island Radar Station in connection with local work.
 - " 17. Proceeded to Babatoe village with Group Capt. Reid and Intelligence Officer aboard in search of some information of crashed plane in that vicinity. Trip unsuccessful.
 - 19. Proceeded to Noenoekan Island and Tawau region in an endeavour to gain information on crashed Kittyhawk pilot. Unable to contact S.R.D. Officer. Some information gained from N.I.C.A. police guard.
 - " 24. Proceeded to Babatoe village. Five (5) Japanese prisoners taken under guard, brought back and handed over to Army authorities.
 - Proceeded in company with two American P.T. boats to Tawau vicinity with Intelligence Officers aboard to investigate report of two Japanese motor boats towing 20 praus towards Tarakan. On interrogating natives and N.I.C.A. police it was established that the japanese were congregating forces and civilian population near Tawau in readiness for surrender.

 Matter passed to Army authorities for action.

- 2. Aug. 29. Proceeded inland to Seloe area with Col. Woolfe and Intelligence Officers aboard to investigate news of crashed airman in emeny held territory. Air cover and spotting carried out by Kittyhawk planes. On information received it was decided to send in two U.S. P.T. boats the following day.
 - Aug. 30. Crashed Spitfire pilot was rescued in the sea off Tarakan. Report passed to Airforce.
- 3. Radio functioned very satisfactorily throughout the month.
- 4. Health and morale of the ship's company is excellent. They have been occupied on interesting work this month.
- 5. Fire exercises were held on 6, 14, 26th August.
- 6. Action Stations were exercised on 6, 13,
- 7. On the announcement of Peace the 'main brace' was spliced.
- 8. During the month a jeep was loaned through the Airforce for shore transport of personnel. The being under the control of the two Commanding Officers only.
- Efficiency Report.

Main Engines. Still running somehow. Still no engine spares received, Spark plugs have done 400 hours operating on 100 octane fuel and substitute plugs have proved highly unsatisfactory.

Auxiliary Engine running satisfactorily. Recently overhauled.

Guns In excellent order.

Hull In good order.

Sufficient bentralastores of a very limited range have been obtained.

One case of engine spares ordered through Base Engineer Officer Brisbane on 17th April, and eventually consigned per H.M.A.S. "Latrobe" has not yet come to hand.


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

Submitted in accordance with CNO 97/43 and CCNO 19/45.

2. During the month operational Air Sea Rescue patrols were carried out from Tarakan, Borneo; main points as follows:

(a) Two damaged planes were covered on their return flight when approaching the airfield.

(b) Sea coverage was given to two main air strikes.

Rescue was attempted when a Kittyhawk plane crashed into the outer harbour. Both 'plane and Pilot were lost in the crash. A few pieces of floating debris only were saved.

(d) All peak take off and landing periods from Croydon

Airstrip Tarakan, were covered.

- 3. On 8th July, I proceeded to a small village 15 miles inland on the Muara Liangau river where two (2) Japanese prisoners were captured and with them 5 hand grenades and a Japanese 'woodpecker' machine gun. They were handed over to the army authorities.
- 4. Between 25th. and 28th. July, the ship was in dry dock (P.T. dock) where the bottom was scraped, antifouled and the hull painted.

New cutlass bearings were fitted and underwater fittings checked.

The phenerock preparation on the hull had peeled and lifted badly and had fallen off in many places taking with it the anti-fouling surface and leaving bare timber. This seems to be a fault worth noting. In such cases the phenerock was well scraped down to a hard surface and covered with copperiod supplied by the American P.T. Tender.

5. Due to constant trouble and unreliability the H.F. Radio (TCS-5 set) was replaced by the Airforce with a 58 Bomber set which has functioned satisfactorily since installation. All

 other radio units were serviced and are giving every satisfaction.
- 6. Health and morale of the Ship's company is satisfactory.
- 7. Fire exercises were held on 2, 9, and 23rd July.
- 8. Action stations exercised on 5,8,15,18, and 30th July.
- 9. Efficiency Report.

Main Engines - Satisfactory. To date no engine spares have yet come to hand. Considerable attention to worn parts is necessary.

Auxiliary Engine - Satisfactory when run only in the cool of the evening.

Guns - In excellent order.

- In splendid order following 'slipping'

Stores - Engine parts are in very short supply and orders sent in are urgently required especially S62 Champion spark plugs.

General Maval stores are quite unprocurable in this area.

1. Operations. During the month of June operations were carried out from Base at Tarakan, Borneo.

a. Rescue During the month three sireraft rescue alerts were covered.

June 5th, a Martin Mariner crashed in the northern Celebes. I proceeded to sea and stood by for confirmation of the position which later proved to be some 250 miles distant. The rescus was made by plane and I returned to Base.

June 13th, a C47 was reported crashed in the sea in a position approx. 85 miles RSE from Tarakan. Proceeded at 1849% and arrived at a position, allowing for drift some 25 miles north of the position given at 1850%, contact being made with a circling Liberator. A Martin Mariner was seen to land on the water while I was still 4 miles distant and on my arrival at the scene had picked up the 7 survivors. I returned to Base.

June 18th, Stood by the end of the Tarakan strip to cover crash landings of two Liberators.

With the opening of the Croydon Strip, Tarakan on 28th June more work may be expected. To date the airfield has not been suitable for heavy landings.

b. Prisoners. In co-operation with the Army through Airforce operations, on 29th June a Japanese prisoner was taken from a barge near the north western tip of Tarakan Is., brought in under guard and handed over to army authorities.

- 1. (c) Radar Co-operation. With the possibility of Japanese suicide small craft operating (according to Radar authories) a co-operation run was made covering the extreme navigable waters around Tarakan harbour entrances to enable Radar plots to be taken.
 - (d) On 19th June an inspection of Amal Beach, eastern side of Tarakan, was made with Wing Cdr. Marks OIC First Tactical Airforce to explore the possibility of its use as an emergency landing beach.
- 2. Air Raid alarms were experienced on 9th and 14th June.
- 3. (a) Action stations were exercised on 6, 9, 14 and 30th June.
 - (b) Fire Stations were exercised on 3, 11, 20, 29 and 30th June.
 - (c) Gallay stove. A small fire, quickly extinguished, from the galley stove occurred on 29th June. See separate report attached.
- 4. Crew. The general health of the crew has been good. Two ratings only received medical attention, one having a poisoned foot and the other a slight attack of dysentery. Both were treated satisfactorily and the necessary entries made in the ship's Journal of the sick.

One change in crew occurred when Sgt. Shipton due to unsatisfactory behaviour was replaced by Sgt Ryan RAAF. A report covering this was previously forwarded.

5. Efficiency report.

(a) Main Engines continue to function well, but if some engine spares are not received very soon the position with essential items such as spark plugs etc., will be desperate.

Signals and letters have been forwarded but to date no spares have come to hand. As mentioned in last month's report the urgent dispatch of engine spares is requested.

- (b) Batteries have been satisfactory. The auxiliary Onan generator due to overheating a common fault with other A.S.R. ships, can only be run in the cool of the evening.
- (c) All guns have operated efficiently and are cleaned regularly. Marksmanship generally is good.
- (d) Hull. The general condition is satisfactory. I expect to 'slip' for scraping and anti-fouling very shortly, arrangements having been made at an American P.T. dock.







b. Whilst on the slipway inspection of the hull was made. Considerable movement in planking and chines caused by heavy seas experienced off Jervis Bay had badly cracked the antifouling along the seams and large flakes of phenerock had peeled off. Filling over the screw holes had fallen out.

Under the direction of the B.E.O., the Chief Ship-wright had the screw holes refilled, phenerock repatched and the hull was anti fouled by ship's company.

- 8. Fire Drills. were carried out on 5, 11, 17, 22 and 29th.

LETTER OF PROCEEDINGS FOR MONTH OF FEBRUARY, 1945.

Submitted:

Following a period of preparation and refitting since commissioning on 20th October, 1944, the ship was removed from the cradle on 15th February, 1945.

- 2. Slipped at Halvorsons shippard Neutral Bay, February 15th-17th where ship was schaped free of marine growth, anti-fouled, bilges cleaned throughout under water fittings checked and some paintwork re-touched. All work on slipway carried out by ship's company.
- February, 19th, 1190 gallons 91 Octane fuel was loaded from Shell Company, Gore Bay. Considerable engine trouble resulted and 120 gallons of water and sludge, condemned by Engineer Officer, were pumped from tanks. Considerable work on engines was necessary on return from A.S.R. duties at Jervis Bay, ship returned to Shell Company, where tanks were de-fueled, opened up and thoroughly cleaned through before refueling with good clean spitit. A report of this defect was passed to Staff Officer, Coastal Craft, Sydney, Copy to Coastal Craft Office, "Bushcutter".
- 4. Engine trials were held on 21st and 23rd February the latter being satisfactory.
- 5. At 0600K on 25rd February, sea passage was made in a moderate sea from Sydney to Jervis Bay. The trip was satisfactory, the ship performed well.
- A.S.R. Flotilla. Carried out A.S.R. duties in conjunction with Aircraft Carriers under the direction of Lieutenant E.H. Couchman on M.L. 822. The assistance given by Lieutenant Couchman and his crew throughout the period was most beneficial. Individual A.S.R. exercises by ships company were carried out and considerable training and experience was gained. The improved efficiency of these operations after practice was most noticeable.
- 7. On 28th February, while operating at sea on duty under instructions from R.N. Nowra an exceptionally rough sea was experienced.


When port was finally made, considerable minor damage, as contained in report to Staff Officer, Coastal Craft, Sydney, was caused to the ship, fittings and stores and three crew members received medical attention. The general performance of the ship was pleasing, but it was realised that operations in rough seas can damage the vessel, considerably affect radio units and be particularly tring to a crew.


- S. During the month two R.A.A.F. Wireless Air Gunners joined to carry out R/T and W/T wireless communications.





2. During the month operational Air Sea Rescue patrols were carried out from Tarakan, Borneo; main points as follows :

(a) Two damaged planes were covered on their return

flight when approaching the airfield.

(b) Sea coverage was given to two main air strikes. (c) Rescue was attempted when a Kittyhawk plane crashed into the outer harbour. Both 'plane and Pilot were lost in the crash. A few pieces of floating debris only were saved.

(d) All peak take off and landing periods from Croydon Airstrip Tarakan, were covered.

- 3. On 8th July, I proceeded to a small village 15 miles inland on the Muara Liangau river where two (2) Japanese prisoners were captured and with them 5 hand grenades and a Japanese 'woodpecker' machine gun. They were handed over to the army authorities.
- 4. Between 25th. and 28th. July, the ship was in dry dock (P.T. dock) where the bottom was scraped, antifouled and the hull painted.

New cutlass bearings were fitted and underwater fittings checked.

The phenerock preparation on the hull had peeled and lifted badly and had fallen off in many places taking with it the anti-fouling surface and leaving bare timber. This seems to be a fault worth noting. In such cases the phenerock was well scraped down to a hard surface and covered with copperied supplied by the American P.T. Tender.

5. Due to constant trouble and unreliability the H.F. Radio (TCS-5 set) was replaced by the Airforce with a 58 Bomber set which has functioned satisfactorily since installation. All

 other radio units were serviced and are giving every satisfaction.
- 6. Health and morale of the Ship's company is satisfactory.

Main Engines - Satisfactory. To date no engine spares have yet come to hand. Considerable attention to worn parts is necessary.

Auxiliary Engine - Satisfactory when run only in the cool of the evening.

Guns - In excellent order.
