REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS.

H.M.A.S. "AIR SAVE", At Alexishafen, June 10th.

Departed Sydney A.M. March 10th, in company with and under orders of H.M.A.S. "AIR MIST", Sub. Lieut. Needle in command. Kept to inshore route on passage Nth. keeping W/T watch on 2990 kilocycles.

2. On departure from Brisbane joined by Air Foam (then Air Wave) and Air Host commanded by Sub. Lieuts. Middleton and McLean

respectively. S/O. Sub. Lt. Needle.

J. Certain repairs to motors while at Townsville dealyed the ships. Air Host departed in company of Air Clan and Air Rest. Air Save, Foam and Mist continued in company, and arrived at T.I., having parted with Air Foam in Howe Islands.

4. Arrived Thursday Island April 30th. Departed A.M. May 2nd., for New Guinea. Anchored at Stephens Island overnight. Arrived Wile Island P.M. May 4th. Departed for Port Moresby A.M.

May 5th., arriving P.M.

5. Departed Moresby for Milne Bay via Port Glasgow arriving Departed Milne Bay for Lae via Oro Bay arriving May 14th. May 10th. Departed Lae for Madang arriving 15th May. Proceeded to Alexishafen o for slipping. Returned to Madang and departed for Aitape May 29th. Reached Manam Island where engine trouble forced me to anchor in Hansa Bay. Instructed to return in tow to Alexishafen for top Noverhaul on both motos. Overhaul nearly completed and trials showed a faulty oil cooler. Final adjustments now being effected. In view of trouble with oil cooler on four occasions and delay caused thereby, I request that spare coolers be made available to carry in The generating the event of further trouble in this direction. unit has been inefficient, and has been replaced with new rings. These rings (piston) were not carried as spares and those installed were made by Base Staff at Alexishafen. It is requested that spare rings may also be obtained and issued to ship, to prevent future breakdowns and delay.

6. The consumption of fresh food has been confined to a one-day basis, owing to inability of obtaining ice to keep fresh. At many places ice was improcurable, such being the case at Alexishafen. While here, the galley stove, after much trouble on the journey from Sydney, finally became useless. No burner spares can be got. Meals for Ship's company have been cooked, while at Alex. on an open fire on the beach. It is requested that present stoves be replaced by 3 primuses for the benefit of ship's company.

7. Fire, Action Stations and Abandon Ship exercises have been maintained. As a further aid to the prevention of fire, I have included in standing orders an instruction detailing a seaman to stand by automatic extinguisher with key ready for instant use, each time motors are started.

8. This ship is not, as yet, fitted with new types of rescue booms. When so fitted, approval is sought to remove sheerlegs which have been proved too awkward and somewhat dangerous for working in anything like weather.

9. The platform on the stern (not yet fitted) as approved

by Navy Board would be far more suitable.

10. No yellow or black paing being available and in view of the fact that ships (A.S.R.) in forward ares are not being painted foliage green, I request that the same be issued and defective paintwork be made good on Air Save.





H.M.A.S. "AIR SAVE" has not carried out may sea or harbour duties, being still in the cradle in Rushcutter Bay.
