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- 2 On the 3rd Nov 20 tons of stores for NICA were loaded at Bal ikpapan. On 4th Nov 12 NICA personnel were embarked and the ship sailed at 0600 I, arriving at the Barito River bar at 0900I/6th. Bar was crossed at 1900 and the ship proceeded up river to Banjermasin the following morning. Discharged personnel and stores and casta off again at 1600I with 9 Provost personnel aboard for Balikpapan. Kota Baru (Pulo Laut) was reached at 0900I/9th, where medical stores for the hospital were discharged; having sailed at 0900I/LOth Balikpapan was reached without incident at 0800I/11th;
- The ship sailed from Balikpapan at 1800I/14th for Macassar with 10 tons of mail, for slipping, and arrived at 1500I/16th;
- She was slipped on the 27th at the Dutch-controlled Macassar shippard without difficulty and repairs commenced immediately; a docking report will be forwarded on completion. No serious damage to the planking has resulted from the stripping of the sheathing and consequent exposure to borers.
- Orders have been received to proceed to Hong Kong as soon as the refit is complete; however, owing to the slowness with which bottom repairs are being carried out, it is not anticipated that the ship will be ready to sail before the 15th December at the earliest.
- On my supercession as commanding officer of the ship, the general condition of all equipment, deck and engine room, was most unsatisfactory and much was unserviceable through neglet neglect, largely due to an insufficient engine room staff and to the lack of any electrical knowledge aboard; good progress has, however, now been made towards serviceability of all equipment and general seaworthihess.

RANVE, as commanding officer on 23rd October, and on the same date Sub Lieut R.A. Clark, RNVE, succeeded Sub Lieut G. Sanders, RANE, as 1st bieutenant. Lieut Smith proceeded to Australia in HMAS Bahtoo on 25th Oct., and S/Lt Sanders to Moretai in LST 419 on 23rd October.

- The ship proceeded to Macassar on 30th Sept., escorting "Tokovama Marufa, LCT's 1308 and 1297, arriving 2nd October. She left again for Balik Papanam on 6th Oct., in company with the same ships, arriving without incident 8th for October.
- On 10th Oct one company of Z Div was embarked at Balik Papan; the ship sailed at 1900I/10th and arrived at Tanahgrogot, Pasir River, next day. She returned to Balik Papan on the 12th October.
- The ship sailed at 2300I/12th from Balik Papan in company with LCT's 1297 & 1289 for Banjermasin, arriving off the mouth of the Bonito River at 1300/15th, where HMAS Burdekin and HMAS Gascoyne were already anchored. On the 16th and 17th liberty parties from these two ships were taken up river to Banjermasin, returning in the evening. On the 18th the ship went up tox Banjermasin again, returning to the river mouth on the 19th and proceeding at 1300I/20th for Balik Papan in company with HMAS Grass Snake, LCT's 1297 & 1289, where she arrived at 0300/23rd.
- The main engine, for which few spares are available is becoming increasingly difficult to start owing to defective air starting valves, which cannot be repaired locally. Hull sheathing also requires attention as mentioned in last months letter of proceedings.
- The general condition of the ship, especially regarding rot in the woodwork, indicated that she will not be seaworthy for much longer if left in tropical waters. Attention to machinery and hull at a major base are required at the earliest possible moment.

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

The following letter of Proceedings in accordance with C.N.O. 97/43 is submitted for the month of September.

2. The ship remained at Morotai until IIth. September when she was sailed independently for Balik Papan, where she arrived on the I6th. September, coming under the orders of H.M.A.S. "Barcoo".

3; Army stores were loaded and the ship sailed on the 19th. September in company with H.M.A.S's "Inverell", "Alatna" and "Grass Snake" for Macassar. Rendezvous was made with H.M.A.S. "Barcoo and all ships were swept into Macassar, following six Japanese barges with "A" sweeps. Secured to Juliana Wharf, Macassar at 1630 Item/21st Cargo was unloaded on 22nd., using Japanese labour.

- 4. In company with H.M.A.S. "Grass Snake", ship proceeded on return to Balik Papan at 0700 Item/24th, arriving without incident on the 26th. September.
- 5. Ship was loaded again with Army equipment on the 29th. and embarking I2 Army Personnel, was sailed for Macassar on the 30th escorting S.S. "Tokoyama Maru" and L.C.T's I297 and I 308.
- 6. While on passage from Morotai to Balik Papan, several square yards of zinc anneal sheathing was torn from the ship's bottom, due to pounding into head seas. Without facilities it has not been possible to repair this in either Macassar or Balik Papan, and it is submitted that the ship should be docked at the earliest to prevent worms entering the timber.
- 7. The boat deck is affected with cellulose eating fungus, similar to that which affected "B" type Fairmiles in the tropics, and which necessitated their extensive refitting at southern ports. The deck planking is saturated with fresh water, it is impossible to keep paint on the wet timber, and the white fungus shows the area of the deck. The ship's derrick is similarly affected.
- 8. The discipline, morale and health of the ship's company remained satisfactory during the month.





The following letter of proceedings in accordance with C.C.N.O.

97/43 is submitted for the month of July.

The defects of the engineroom, terpede and W/T departments having been completed by the end of June, the ship was sailed on Sunday Ist July on an engine trial to Marsh Shoal and return, a distance of 65 miles. This trial was quite satisfactory.

After the Armament had all been checked over by Base Staff, and the guns' crews drilled by the Base Gunner's Mate, the ship proceeded on 5th July for gunnery exercises. At the same time, long range W/T tests were carried

out and all were satisfactory.

4. After loading special stores the previous day, the ship sailed on 7th July for Grant Island, where working up exercises, and exercises with

F.D. personnel were to be carried out.

5. Approximately four hours after sailing for the exercises mentioned in Para 4, the brake band holding the starboard anchor broke, releasing the anchor and cable which ran through the hawse pipe and were not recovered. A separate report on this accident has been rendered on Form S54I.

6. Three junior officers from S.R.D. ships were carried on these exercises to be given train ng in navigation. At the end of the cruise, great

improvment had been shown by them.

7. As instructed, soundings were taken in the bay on the western si de of Grant Island, and a plan prepared showing the location of the only two coral free beaches on the island. This plan is held in Chart Depot, Darwin

8. Return was made to Darwin via Clarence Strait, and the ship

anchored in East Arm on 14th july.

9. The ship remained in harbour, having minor defects made good until 24th July, when a S.R.D. party was embarked, and again with the officers referred to in Para 6, the ship proceeded to the vininity of Cape Fourcroy, Be urst Island for exercises and navigational training. Return was made to Darwin on 27th July.



- 3. On the I8th Sune the ship was towed to the dry dock for docking, and undocked on 23rd June, when she was steamed to the refitting jetty under own power. During this time, underwater valves were ground, zincs renewed, and the tail shaft wear down takeh.
- 4. For the remainder of the month, work was progressed on the shipwright items of the defect list. The W/T installation had been rewired and completely refitted, all electrical defects rectified or circuits renewed, and the n engine defects rectified by completion date, 26th June, awaiting sea trials. I have been particularly satisfied with the work done by the W/T and Torpedo Departments, especially as the major defects involved these two sections.
- 5. On 23rd June, new seamen personnel joined in lieu of those drafted for disciplinary reasons, and since that date, the cleanliness of the ship, and the morale of the ship's company have considerably improved.
