REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS - NOVEMBER 1953

I have the honour to report the proceedings of Her Majesty's Australian Ship under my command for the month of November 1953.

2. Departure was made for the Monte Bello Islands on the 3rd of the month, A call was made at Carnarvon for oil fuel. The ship anchored off Onslow on the morning of the 7th. The first party of scientists arrived that afternoon and the remainder on the following day. Owing to the jetty at Onslow being under repair the scientific equipment was brought off by DUKW.

3. Passage was made to the Monte Bello Islands on the Sunday night. The ships arrived off the islands at first light on the Monday morning. The clocks had been advanced two hours so as to make the most of daylight. Although certain buoys and navigational marks were missing little difficulty was experienced in negotiating the southern entrance to the lagoon. The weather was perfect which made the shallow patches easily diserrable, the tide at the time was low. When the ship had secured to No 2 buoy in the Bunsen Channel an all-out effort was made to disembark stores and equipment, taking full advantage of the fine weather. The equipment was landed and camp set up on shore by sun set.

4. A thorough search was carried out by parties from "KARANGI" and "FREMANTLE" for a 45 launch in the Hermite Trot area without success.

5. On completion of scientific investigations camp was struck on Saturday the 14th.

morning and the ship anchored off Barrow Island that afternoons on arrival 'Plym's' motor boat, which had proceeded ahead of the ship, took a party inshore to look for specimens of wild life for the University of Western Australia. Unfortunately luck was not with them. The lack of success was due to the shortage of time available (there had been no opportunity to reconneitre), the thickness of the serub and the fact that the small Wallabi type animals observed appeared fleeter of foot than those which had been observed on Garden and the Wallabi Islands. When the party returned Mr Campbell of C.S.I.R.O transferred to "KARANGI" who hoisted the motor boat, Both ships then proceeded independently.

7. During the time spent in the Monte Bello area the co-operation and help offered and given by "KARANGI" was of a very high order.



REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS - OCTOBER 1953

I have the honour to report the proceedings of Her Majesty's Australian Ship under my command for the month of October, 1953.

2. On the first of the month departure was made from the Abrolhos Islands. The ship arrived in Fremantle the next day.

3. Departure was made for Shark Bay on Thursday the 8th. The ship arrived in Turtle Bay on the 10th where she remained until Monday the 12th, departure then being made for Carnarvon, arriving on the same day.

4. The Naval Officer in Charge, West Australian Area having embarked in " JUNEE ", both ships sailed for Turtle Bay on Tuesday the 13th October. On completion of the N.O.I.C.'s inspection, both ships returned to Carnarvon on Thursday the 15th.

5. Departure was made for Geraldton on Friday the 16th. It was intended to arrive during the forenoon of the next day but progress was delayed by head seas and the ship arrived at 2300H.

6. Departure was made from Geraldton at 0600H on Monday the 19th to take part in exercise AUSTRALIA II. Owing to strong South Westerly winds it was necessary to shelter in the Abrolhos Islands. The ship eventually arrived on the Colombo-Fremantle shipping lane at 0700H on the 21st and remained in the vicinity of the exercise positions until 0800H on Thursday the 22nd when course was set for Fremantle, arriving p.m.

7. On Tuesday the 27th the ship proceeded to Cockburn Sound and discharged 47 tons of fresh water into M.W.L. 251, returning to Fremantle on the same day.

8. On Wednesday the 28th Gunnery Firings were carried out in area N.Y. The ship returned to Fremantle the next day.

9. There has been no opportunity for organised sport during the month.

10. The health of the ship's company is good. There have been several cases of German Measles among the trainees.

ll. The morale of the ship's company is high and the keemess shown at the time of the inspection was heartening. A ship's dance, held at the Royal Freshwater Bay Yacht Club on the 31st, was most successful.

TRAINING REPORT

The first batch of Seamen Trainees to complete their sea training returned to "LEEUWIN" on the 26th. They left a very good impression and we were sorry to see them go. A general "Quiz" during their last few days indicated that they had "hoisted in " their instruction fairly well.

2. It is unfortunate that similar remarks could not be made concerning the Stoker Trainees. These lads are good material but had to be driven to do anything. Eventually they were addressed by the Engine Room Divisional Officer and told that, if they did not show more interest and pass a written examination, their leave would be stopped and dog watch instuction given in lieu. This had the desired effect and only three failed to achieve 60%. It is hoped that these measures will not be necessary again as it is not easy to conduct a written examination on board. It is suggested that the lack of interest shown by the stokers is due to:

(a) An O.M.S. cannot give technical training to 20 at a time with any success. Therefore the instruction is not

sufficiently intensive to maintain interest.

(b) Their Instructor is "Fair "only.

(c) Several of our own stokers are typical "stroppy Jacks " and a bad influence.

3. The Seamen Trainees who joined on the 26th completed firings for their GL3's course on the 28th. The ship's officers were impressed with the high standard of shooting and lack of "gun shyness", all of which augurs well for the general standard of the class.

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
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

REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS - SEPTEMBER 1953

I have the honour to submit the proceedings of Her Majesty's Australian Ship under my command for the month of September 1953.

- 2. On September the 1st "FREMANTLE" was in Shark Bay carrying out Part 2 Seamanship Training with thirty "Hargraves" Recruit Seamen.
- Departure was made from Shark Bay for the Abrolhos Islands at 1300 on the 2nd. The ship continued training in the vicinity of the Wallabi and Easter Groups on the 3rd, anchoring in Good Friday Bay overnight. Departure was made from there on the Friday morning at 0800. The ship arrived in Fremantle at 0800 on Saturday the 5th.
- Departure was made for Cockburn Sound at 1500 on the 8th and Part 2 training commenced with sixteen Recruit Seamen. Evaporator trouble made it necessary to return to Fremantle on the 9th. The evaporator defect was made good by 1100 on Thursday the 10th when departure was made for Rockingham. On arrival at 1300 both cables were ranged, inspected and end for ended. The cables were hove aboard commencing at 0600 the next morning. Departure was made for Bunbury at 0700. The ship arrived at Bunbury at 1645 having passed east of Rottnest Island. Departure was made from Bunbury at 2200 on Sunday the 13th and the ship secured in Fremantle at 0800 the next day.
- 5. From the 14th to the 18th an internal and external boiler clean was carried out by the ship's staff and Recruit Stokers.
- Departure was made for the Abrolhos Islands at 1700 on Monday the 21st of September. The ship anchored in Good Friday Bay at 1600 the next day. On Wednesday the 23rd the wind backed and freshened making it necessary to shift anchorage to northwest of Fish Point, East Wallabi Island. Anchorage was shifted back to Good Friday Bay the Next afternoon.
- At 0800 on Friday the 25th departure was made for Geraldton. Single and double "Oropeas" sweeps were exercised on passage. After many snags with both kites and otters, both sweeps were running satisfactorily by sunset and the ship arrived in Geraldton at 1900.
- 8. On Monday the 28th departure was made for Good Friday Bay at 0800. Minesweeping exercises were carried out with "JUNEE" on passage and the ship anchored at 1500. The Gyro compass showed signs of a serious fault immediately after leaving Geraldton.

- On the 29th "A" sweeping exercises were carried out with "JUNEE" during the forencen. The Gyro was shut down with a suspected broken suspension. During the afternoon "JUNEE" took "FREMANTLE" in tow. The ship anchored in Recruit Bay at 1630.
- During the forenoon of Wednesday the 30th, "FREMANTLE" towed "JUNEE" with 150 fms of 4%" F.S.W.R., 35 fms of 8" Manila and 4 shackles of "JUNEE'S" cable. Revolutions for 10 knots gave a towing speed of between seven and eight knots. During the afternoon a compass swing was carried out. The ship anchored in Recruit Bay at 1800.
- 11. There has been no opportunity for organised sport during the month.
- The health of the ship's company is satisfactory. There is now an S.B.A. on board. Since his joining there have been no accidents.
- 13. The morale of the ship's company is high although there have been too many defaulters by comparison with previous months.
- A very great number of whales has been sighted and it has been quite impracticable to log and report them all. The general trend of their travel has been more Southerly than Northerly.




TRAINING REPORT

Thirty-one Seamen Trainees were given Part I Instruction until the 7th. Group "C" Trainees commenced Part II Seamanship Training on the 8th. This has continued through the month exept for the boiler cleaning period which the Seamen Trainees spent in "LEEUWIN". In addition to the Part II Syllabus, the Trainees have secured to a buey several times, ranged cable and assisted in minesweeping, towing and weighing anchor by hand. There has been a fair amount of boatwork. Five R.A.N.R. and four A.C.T. ratings have been embarked during the month. The standard of the R.A.N.R., A.C.T. and "Hargraves" Trainees has been good. The "Hargraves" ratings appear, at this stage, to have reached a higher standard of discipline and training than the previous entry.

REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS - AUGUST 1953

I have the honour to submit the proceedings of Her Majesty's Australian Ship under my command for the month of August 1953.

- Service Hargraves entry joined the ship on Monday the 10th of August. Departure was made for Careening Cove that afternoon. On Tuesday 11th Educational Test One was taken by nine ratings. A disused hut on Garden Island was used for this purpose and provided a rather more tranquil atmosphere than the ship's messdecks.
- The second whaler was embarked on Thursday the 13th in Fremantle. Departure was made for Abrolhos that afternoon. The next day the inner part of the Pelsart Lagoon was investigated as a possible training ground. The reefs show clearly and there is a fairly deep channel to the jetty near the southern end of Pelsart. Having reached a position two miles SSE of Middle Island it was decided to turn around as the wind had increased sufficiently to make identification of the shallow patches more difficult. Departure was made for Geraldton that evening.
- 4. Saturday was spent in Geraldton and departure was made for the Abrolhos on Sunday at 1100.
- During the following week the Easter and Wallabi groups were visited. There is an anchorage half a mile north west of the northern tip of West Wallabi Island. The approach is good ground for lead and line instruction there being between 32 and 5 fathoms of water. The wallabies on the islands appear to be similar to those found on Garden Island. The ship returned to Fremantle on Friday the 21st of August.
- 6. The Stoker Trainees left the ship on Saturday the 22nd and were replaced by thirty one Seaman on Monday the 24th.
- 7. Due to a defect in the distiller sailing for Shark Bay was delayed until the 25th.
- 8. On arrival in Shark Bay a strong NE wind was blowing making Turtle Bay untenable. A comfortable anchorage was found west of Cape Peron. The weekend was spent alongside, and in the vicinity of, Canarvon. The Australian Whaling Commission was most co-operative. All trainees were shown over the factory and twenty ships company and trainees went to sea in the Whale catcher "Canarvon".
- 9. Several games of football have been played during the month and three of the ships company have played for Navy teams.

REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS - JUNE 1953.

Her Majesty's Australian Ship under my command for the month of June 1953.

2. The majority of the ship's company and all the trainees took part in the Coronation March through the city of Perth. Two officers attended the Governor's Levee on Wednesday the third of June.

Sound where intensive training was carried out for two days in an endeavour to make up for the time lost earlier in the week.

4. One Reserve Officer joined on Monday the 8th. It was intended to sail for Shark Bay during that afternoon but the weather prevented this. Departure was made for Cockburn Sound where the ship remained until sailing for Shark Bay on the Wednesday. As a certain amount of practical training time had been lost through the weather the passage to Shark Bay was made at eleven knots. There was no appreciable increase in fuel consumption and half a day's training time was gained on arrival. The Saturday and Sunday was spent alongside at Carnarvon in company with "MILDURA". Most of the ship's company visited the whaling installation over the week-end. Twelve officers and ratings went to sea in the whale catchers 'Carnarvon' and 'Gascoyne' The visit and the trips were most interesting and instructive and the Chairman of the Australian Whaling Commission, Mr J.C. Bowes, was very helpful indeed. Very few whales have been sighted from the ship and it is understood that the annual northerly migration is late this year. On only one occasion has the ship been close enough to a whale for positive identification. Departure was made from Shark Bay on the 17th. A call was made at the Abrolhos Islands on the 18th and the ship arrived in Fremantle the next day.

Mid-winter leave commenced that week-end and the refit started on the 22nd June.

6. The ship's company and trainees took part in football and shooting matches in Carnarvon. Three pagyed for the Navy versus the R.A.A.F.

Despite the heavy rain there has been no appreciable increase in the more common ailments.

8. The morale of the ship's company remains high. The enthusiasm shown for the Coronation March was most encouraging. Many ratings spent a considerable amount of their spare time working on their equipment. One trainee was found to be smoking towards the end of the march. It is felt that this was a somewhat unique occurrence.


Fifteen "Eurke" (3 R.A.N.R) and fourteen "Blaxland" (3 R.A.N.R)
National Service Trainees were already on board for A.C.T at the
beginning of the month. These were given a considerable amount of
rifle drill and marching. They attained a fair standard for the
Coronation March through the city of Porth. On the Thursday and
Friday of their second week they underwent two very full days of
sea training to put them through the basic drills. In the time it
was just possible to complete one run each at seaboat, helmsman,
telegraphsman and leadsman. On the Thursday M.W.L 25% was towed
from Carcening Cove to Frementle, filled and returned. Most of this
evolution was done by the trainees. These trainees left on the 6th.


2. Twenty four "Eyre" (5 R.A.N.R.) and two "Burke" trainees joined on the 8th. During their time on board the ship steamed to Shark Bay and back. This gave plenty of steering practice as well as other routine duties under way. Seaboat, lead and line etc was done in Shark Bay. Unfortunately all attempts to arrange sailing instruction were foiled by the weather. This class was instructed in mires and minesweeping.

3. The spirit of the trainees in both batches has been good.

4. The higher rates training class completed their examination on the 8th. Three out of four passed for Leading Seaman.

REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS - MAY 1953.

I have the honour to report the proceedings of Her Majesty's Australian Ship under my command for the month of May 1953.

2. Departure was made from the Pelsart Group for the anchorage off Geraldton on the evening of Friday the 1st of May. The ship entered Geraldton on the Saturday morning, was open to visitors on the Sunday and sailed for the Pelsart Group on the Monday morning. As the weather appeared to be deteriorating it was decided to recover the 'Long Tom Cannon' from the "Zeewyk" wreck on the Monday afternoon instead of on the Tuesday as was the original intentione This was a fortunate decision as the wind had risen to force 6 from the northward by 1400 the next day. Departure was made for Fremantle on the 7th where the ship arrived at 1430 on the Friday afternoon.

3. Twenty nine National Servicemen joined for 13 days Annual Continuous Training on Monday the 11th, Most of the following week was spent in Cockburn Sound, On Thursday the 14th "FREMANTLE" assisted "MILDURA" in sinking the hulk of the trawler "Commilles" off Rottnest Island, Although the state of the side plating of the "Commilles" was not known it was interesting to note that the 40mm Bofors was making quite respectable holes in what had probably started life as 201b steel plate. The ship returned to Fremantle on the 16th, All trainess took part in the Empire Youth Sunday March through Ferth on Sunday the 17th.

4. Departure was made for Abrolhos on Menday the 18th of May returning to Fremantle on the 22nd. The traineed were discharged during the week-end and the next batch joined on Monday the 25th.

5. The 26th to the 29th were spent in Careening Cove and the greater part of each day was devoted to parade training in readiness for the Coronation Day March in Pertho On the 30th a full rehearsal of this parade was attended by all those taking part.

6. The health of the ship's company has been satis-EXTRIKT TAKEN factory. Since commissioning there have been a number of fairly serlous accidents, including, one very bad cut, one split head(hand lead) second degree burns and a large fish hook firmly embedded in a thumb. Fortunately these have occurred when skilled medical attention has ON been available from shore or other ships. It is submitted that there 4012 appears to be a very real need for a Sick Berth Attendant in ships 10 of this size.

7. Two games of Australian Rules have been played during the month. Recreation parties have been landed on Garden and East Wallabi Islands.

The last of the 'Forrest' National Service
Trainees completed their initial seagoing training on the
8th May 1953 and two periods of Annual Continuous Training
for 'Baxland' (1951) and 'Burke' (1952) Trainees respectively
were carried out during the remainder of the month. In all
65 ratings (including 7 R.A.N.R. ratings) were embarked
for 13 days training during this time.


Training for ratings undergoing A.C.T. has included dan-buoying, Oropesa minesweeping, securing to a buoy and alongside other ships (without the help of the ship's company), towing, dressing ship, part of ship and boatwork. 'Forrest' recruits assisted in the salvaging of two old cannons in the Abrolhos Islands, 'Baxland' Trainees took part in the Empire Youth Day Parade in Perth on Sunday 17th May, and 'Burke' and R.A.N.R. Trainees marched with the Naval Battalion on Coronation Day. The latter ratings spent most of their time practising for the Coronation Day Parade at the expense of sea training but it is felt that this was well worthwhile.


Although most of the 'Forrest' trainees were unenthusiastic the last class of I3 left a very good impression and we were sorry to lose them.

The 'Baxland' A.C.T. batch (29) were almost indescribably scruffy and dirty and a disproportionate effort was required before they were fit to appear in public for Empire Youth Sunday.



REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS - APRIL 1953.

I have the honour to report the proceedings of Her Majesty's Australian Ship under my command for the month of April 1953.

2. On Wednesday the 1st berthing, securing to a buey, and ship handling exercises were carried out in Careening Cove. These were very good value for the ship's officers and all the securing and letting go was done by trainees. It is hoped to do this more often in future especially when senior Reserve Officers are borne for training. On the next day departure was made for Bunbury in company with H.M.A.S"MILDURA". "A" Sweeping was exercised on passage. This was not a success. Delays in 'down kites' caused the ships to steam for too long at 6 knots. Sweeps parted twice on what must have been pinnacles of rock with the loss of 300 fathoms of wire.

3. Easter was spent in Bunbury departure being made for Bunker Bay on the 7th. General training and exercises were carried out until arrival in Fremantle on the following Friday. One Stoker Mechanic who received second degree steam burns was landed at Bunbury on the 8th. He has since returned to the ship. Ship's guns' crews and all trainees carried out a Bofors shoot at recket and floating targets on the 10th.

4. Departure was made for Shark Bay in company with H.M.A.S"MILDURA" on the 14th. Mail was landed and received by motor boat at Carnarvon on the 17th. Brown's Station on Dirk Hartegs Island was visited on the following Sunday. On Tuesday the 21st a landing exercise was carried out in Turtle Bay and an imaginary Radar Installation was 'demolished'. On the same evening departure was made for Fremantle via Abrolhos. A successful "A" Sweep was carried out on passage. Both ships arrived in Fremantle on the Friday. Twenty two trainees returned to H.M.A.S"LEEUWIN" on the same day.

5. Departure was made for the Abrolhos Islands on the 28th. On passage the ship steamed at 135 revolutions on one boiler making good eight point nine knots through the watere It was hoped that this might have produced a more economical consumption figure but it failed to improve on the usual 150 to 155 revolutions on two boilers for ten knots. The ship anchored one mile and a half north of Gum Island in the Pelsart Group and was joined by H.M.A.S"MILDURA" on the Thursday morning. Both ships sent parties to investigate the wreck in latitude 28 degrees 522 minutes south on the seaward reefe Two cannons have been recovered. They are of cast iron and, although the larger one, which was in deeper water, is in much better shape than the other, there are no identifiable marks. It is probable that these are either from the 'Batavia' (1629) or the 'Zeewyk' (1727) unless they belonged to some earlier unknown wreck. The position referred to is some two miles north to where the 'Zeewyk' is thought to have struck. The cannon, which weigh about 18 and 30 hundredweights respectively, were recovered without much difficulty. Oil drum rafts were used, 7 drums for the larger and 4 for the smaller. If photographs can be obtained they will be sent under separate covere Purely as a formality the Receiver of Wrecks has been informed. It is intended to investigate the reef to the southward when the opportunity offerso

6. On Manday the 13th three officers and twenty two ratings attended a Civic Reception in the Mayor's Parlour at the Fremantle Town Hall.

7. The morale of the ship's company remains high and there have been very few defaulters. I have been aware of a certain amount of discord in the Engine Room Department and have concluded that it is mainly due to the not uncommon friction between Artificers and Petty Officer Stoker Mechanics. It is suggested that this is almost inevitable when no Engineer Officer is borne. The Base Engineer Officer has been very helpful in this matter.

8. The health of the ship's company is satisfactory.

9. There has been little opportunity for sport although a cricket match between two scratch ship's teams was played at Bumburye The teams were composed of fifty-fifty ship's company and officers and traineese





TRAINING. 1 Apl to 8 Maye

35 Seaman and Stoker trainees were borne from the beginning of the month until the 24th when all the Stokers and 15 Seamen returned to H.M.A.S"LEEUWIN". One class of Quarterdeck remains until the 8th of May.


- 2. The Stokers have undergone Part I training for their first week on board and the remainder of the time has been spent in the engine and boiler rooms. The A.X Seamen have each done a watch in both the engine and boiler rooms.
- 3. All the Seamen have attended lectures on Minesweeping and Steering Gear from ship's staff thier own Instructors have given the remainder of the lectures and instruction. The trainees have received instruction, watched and assisted in "A" and "O" sweeping, danning, towing, weigh anchor by hand (deck tackle), securing to a buoy, spring on the cable, boat sailing, steering and boatswain's mate duties. About half of their time has been spent working part-of-ship.
- 4. Several of the trainees took part in a landing exercise in Turtle Bay and received elementary instruction in the use of explosives. The A.X Seamen carried out one week's gunnery training on board. All trainees have fired 5 rounds of Bofors at a floating target.
- 5. The M.T Stokers and A.X Seamen appear to be very much better types than the others with few exceptions. The A.X Seamen in particular have been very well behaved and we shall be sorry to lose them at the end of this week. It is regrettable that very little interest is shown by the trainees in general. They do as they are told but show no enthusiasm. It is submitted that if they were to be trained further from their homes and sent to sea in bigger ships their attitude to the Service would be better.

REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS - MARCH 1953.

I have the honour to report the proceedings of Her Majesty's Australian Ship under my command for the month of March 1953.

2. Having embarked Commander V.E Kennedy and Acting Sub-Lieutenant G Halley for passage to Fremantle departure was made from Adelaide on the forenoon of Monday the 2nd of March. Neptune Island was abeam at 2330 that night when course was set for Albany. The passage across the Bight was uneventful. Fuel, pay and mail was embarked at Albany. The ship arrived in Fremantle at 0830 on Sunday the 8th of March.

Jarwo Reserve Officers(for 13 days A.C.T), two Instructors and thirty Trainees (N.S Forrest) embarked on Monday the 9th. On Wednesday the 11th the ship proceeded to sea for elementary seamanship instruction, Asdic operating and tracking exercises for the Reserve Gunnery Class which embarked for the day. Also on board was Mr Ian Coles, 3rd Mate of the Blue Funnel s.s"Asphalion" who showed keeness and great interest in all that was taking place.

4. Departure was made for the Abrolhos Islands during the forenoon of Thursday the 12th in company with H.M.A.S"MILDURA". Officer of the Watch manoeuvres were carried out that afternoon and, having exercised seaboats at evening quarters the ships parted company for independent navigation exercises. Rendezvous was made with "MILDURA" at noon on the following day. The ship returned to Fremantle on Monday the 16th.

5. On the 18th and 19th exercises were carried out with H.M.S. "THOROUGH" the ship's Asdic being operated by the U.M training class from "LEEUWIN". Despite the fact that "THOROUGH" could not dive the exercises were still of good value if only to familiarise the trainees with seagoing Asdic conditions. A boarding party was put aboard "THOROUGH" under the command of Lieutenant J.L Jobson. Towing exercises were carried out with "MILDURA" concurrently with plotting exercises with "THOROUGH".

6. The Reserve GL 3 Class embarked to carry out qualifying firings on the 20th. A considerable number, and still insufficient, of starshell targets were expended by "MILDURA". Delay was caused because the seat of the Bofors mounting had to be adjusted for each man. At the same time "MILDURA" discovered that the splash target would not work and suggested using an oil drum. Despite further dealys with the target, the almost uncanny disposition of fishing boats and trouble with the feed mechanism of the after Bofors each man fired at least forty rounds. By the end of the day most of the class had gained a very fair degree of confidence and had shot the target flag to ribbons.

7. Departure was made for Careening Cove during the forenoon of Tuesday the 31st of March.

8. During the month Mrs E Curtin, who launched H.M.A.S "FREMANTLE", visited the ship for afternoon tea. Informal calls were exchanged with the Lord Mayor of the City of Fremantle (W.Fred Sampson Esquire). The officers and twenty ship's company have been invited to a reception in the Mayor's Parlour on Monday the 13th of April.

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9. The morale of the ship's company remains high and there have been very few defaulters

10. The health of the ship's company is satisfactory.

11. The ship's company have availed themselves of the sporting facilities afforded by "LEEUWIN". Several took part in heats and trials for the Inter-Service Sports. Now that the ship is operating from her base port more time will be devoted to the conducting of sporting activities.


APPENDIX II

TRAINING.

Three National Service Training Classes, totalling 30 recruits with two instructors, were embarked on the 9th and returned to "Leeuwin" on the 23rd for the period of the Inter-Service-Sports at which time the ship carried out a boiler cleans


- 2. The recruit seamen and one class of recruit stokers, who had previously been to sea in "Mildura" for Engineroom training only were all given Part I training. The second class of recruit stokers was employed in the engine and boiler rooms and on Part II technical training
- 3. On Monday the 30th, 35 trainees comprising the seamen and one stoker class who had previously been embarked, plus a new seamen class joined.
- 4. Besides covering the Part I training syllabus recruits have witnessed and taken part in the evolutions of tow forward, tow aft, danlaying and recovery, Oropesa Minesweeping, away boarding party, secondary and hand steering. They have also attended lectures on Damage Control, Minesweeping and the history of the R.A.N. Tours of H.M.A. 3 "SYDNEY" and H.M.S"THOROUGH" were arranged for all recruits borne for at the time the ships were in company.
- 5. Initially most of the recruits showed very little keeness and their attitude to the Service as a whole left a lot to be desired. Since the second batch joined the ship a marked improvement in keeness and morale has been observed,

REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS - FEBRUARY 1953.

I have the honour to submit the Report of Proceedings of Her Majesty's Australian Ship under my Command for the month of February 1953.

- 2. 'Fremantle' spent the first four days of the month in Garden Island Dockyard undergoing repairs to main engines. These repairs mainly concerned the adjustment of bearings. The Reserves and Recruits (39 in all) were embarked in 'Cootamundra' for training on the Monday and Tuesday, half going on each day.
- On Thursday the 5th engine trials were carried out the ship sailing for Melbourne on completion. After rounding Gabo Island speed was reduced to revolutions for eight knots on account of steep head seas which were causing the ship to pound heavily. During the same evening, the 6th, the sleeping billet situation was thoroughly investigated. It was found that, despite using settees, camp beds and stretchers to full advantage the sleeping conditions were most unpleasant which was further aggravated by the motion of the ship. The numbers embarked at this time were forty four Ship's Company and thirty nine Trainees. The Cruise Programme promulgated by the Commanding Officer H.M.A.S"Mildura" and approved by the Naval Officer-in-Charge West Australian Area allocated forty seven Trainees to "Fremantle" for six weeks. The Ship's Company at this time will be fifty three. There are insufficient lockers or sleeping billets for this number. I have represented this by letter to the Naval Officer-in-Charge West Australian Area, a copy of the letter is enclosed.
- 4. Shortly after rounding Wilson's Promontory on the morning of the 7th the Port High Pressure Bottom End bearing overheated. The ship anchored in Bolger Anchorage and the bottom end, which was badly wiped, was replaced. 'Fremantle' proceed at 1700 entering Port Philip at 0500 on the 8th securing alongside 'Gladstone' on arrival at West Wing Station Pier. Reserves were then disembarked and berth was shifted to Dockyard. The Recruits were transferred to 'Gladstone' the next day for passage to Flinders Naval Depot.
- 5. From the 9th to the 11th Williamstown Dockyard made final adjustments to the main engines completing at 1700 on the latter day when the ship sailed for Adelaide.
- Two junior Officers and twenty five Ratings from H.M.A.S "Torrens" were embarked on Saturday the 14th. The First Lieutenant (Lieutenant F.M.Murray R.A.N) who had been unwell for some days was discharged to the Repatriation General Hospital; he has since been relieved by Lieutenant I.H Nicholson who joined on the 27th. The ship sailed during the afternoon for Melbourne calling at Glenelg, Eastern Cove, Antechamber Bay, Victor Harbour and Guichen Bay. It was intended to call at Portland but, owing to the swell and deteriorating weather a through passage was made to Portsea and a complete day's training was carried out in Port Philip. To do this economical speed was exceed using an extra point eight of a ton of fuel.
- The ship spent the week-end at Flinders Naval Depot where the Reserves were inspected by the Commodore at Sunday Divisions. On the following day those who had not visited the depot before were taken on a 'round tour' by a Recruit School Instructor. The

remainder of the Reserves were taken to Instruction by their appropriate schools in the depot. It was hoped to have secured a day's Gunnery for the Ordinary Seamen but this could not be done owing to an acute shortage of Instructors in the Gunnery school. The ship left Flinders Naval Depot for Adelaide on the 24th calling at Guichen Bay and Edithburgh. The 'quarterly depth charge' was dropped between Guichen Bay and the Backstairs Passage. This operated satisfactorily but produced no fish. Despite a 150 foot setting and the fact that the charge exploded over 20 seconds after release at 14 knots the lights in both shaft tunnels were extinguished. The next charge will be dropped with a 100 foot setting which should bring further weaknesses to light. The Adelaide Reserves were disembarked on the 27th.

- 8. Miles steamed during the month 2235
 Miles steamed since commissioning 4662
- 9. The morale of the Ship's Company remains high and only one defaulter in two and a half months shows a creditable standard of behaviour. The Reserves and Recruits seem to have been of a generally happy and co-operative disposition.
- 10. The health of the Ship's Company has been good. No organised sport has yet been arranged although good use was made of the factilities at Fliders Naval Depot.

TRAINING CRUISE PROGRAMME. MARCH - JUNE 1953.

Submitted for the consideration of the Naval Officer-in-Charge West Australian Area that H.M.A.S"FREMANTLE" cannot accommodate the numbers referred to in the Commanding Officer H.M.A.S "MILDURA'S" letter M 5/1226 of the 29th December 1952.

- 2. The ship's complement is 53 ratings for whom 92 lockers of all types are provided. Fourteen out of the fifteen Chief and Petty Officers' lockers are in use as are thirty nine of the seventy seven installed for junior ratings. There is no space in the ship for fitting additional lockers. The numbers which can be accommodated as an absolute maximum are one Instructor and thirty nine Trainees.
- 3. The hammock billet situation has been thoroughly investigated. Seventy nine billets are shown on Form A.D 326 but several of these are fouled by extra fittings. Since commissioning the total number carried at any one time to date has been 48 Ship's Company and 38 Trainees. Using all available billets, settees, camp beds and stretchers this number still caused extreme congestion and discomfort more particularly in bad weather.
- 4. It is further submitted that, to relieve the situation, the first batch of Trainees could be embarked on the 9th March and remain on board over Inter-Service Sports Week. The ship could still get in as much sea time as is allowed.
