REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS FOR MONTH OF DECEMBER 1945. SUBJECT

Submitted in accordance with N.O. 97/45 and C.C.N.O. 19/45.

- We departed from Malupi Island on the 1st arriving at Rabaul the same day. Remained at moorings in Simpson's Harbour until 4th when we piloted S.S. Katoomba to anchorage.
- On the 6th we left for Namatanai New Ireland arriving on the 7th departing the same day for Kavieng where we arrived on the 8th. Left for Rabaul on the 9th arriving the following morning.
- Remained in harbour until 13th making good main engine defects then in company with H.M.A.S. Sterna, 1 L.C.M. and A.B. 2365, we proceeded to Dreger Harbour. A.B. 2365 owing to main engine defects was taken in tow. Stops were made over night at Jacquinot Bay and Fulleborn Harbour on the 14th and 15th respectively. We arrived at Dreger on the 17th.
- We fuelled at Langemak on the 17th and left for Moresby the following day arriving on the 20th. Sailed for Thursday Island on the 21st arriving 22nd.
- Left for Townsville on the 23rd, but owing to the weather delay was experienced, shelter being found in the Flinders Group. We arrived at Townsville on the 28th.
- We remained in harbour until the 30th when an attempt was made to sail, but we were forced to return by the weather. There was no improvement on the 31st, remained alongside.

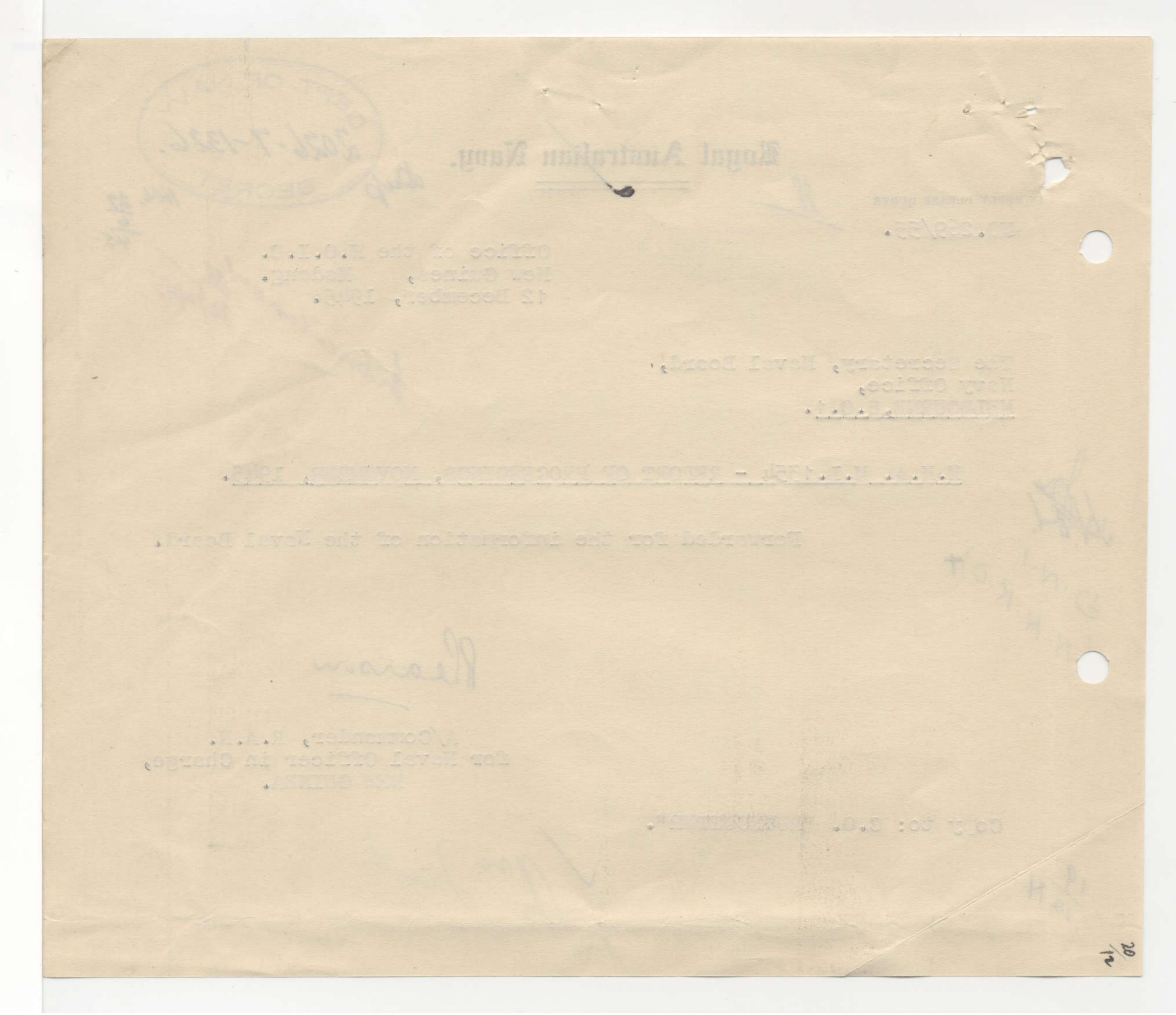

SUBJECT: REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS FOR MONTH OF NOVEMBER, 1945.

Submitted in accordance with CNO97/45 and CCNO19/45.

- 2. On 1 November M.L.1354 left Boang Island with ANGAU party for Lihir Island and arrived there that day, we remained overnight then sailed for New Ireland. Anchored off Namatanai until sunset when we sailed for Rabaul, arriving there on the 3rd.
- Remained at anchor until 6th when with Generals Sturdee and Eather aboard we visited the Duke of York Islands.
- 4. From 7th to 11th was spent at Rabaul. On 12th M.L.1354 visited Put Put remaining overnight and returned to Rabaul the following day.
- 5. The night of 12th was spent in an unsuccessful search for an army launch.
- 6. On the 13th we investigated and sank a mine in Greet Harbour.
- 7. We were again searching for an army haunch on the night of the 19th. This time was successful and found her on a reef off Tawwi Point, refloated and towed her to harbour.
- 8. On the 25th visited the Duke of York Islands returning Rabaul on the 26th.
- 9. Remained at anchor until the 30th when we visited the Duke of York Islands anchoring off Micke Island.

10. EFFICIENCY REPORT.

Main Engines - Need top overhaul. Replacement urgently required for Generator to oil pump coupling. Temporary replacement here requires 10 hours work and only results in five hours efficient running.

Auxiliary " In particularly bad shape. Three major oil leaks in engine casing, and salt water cooling pipes leaking and require replacement.

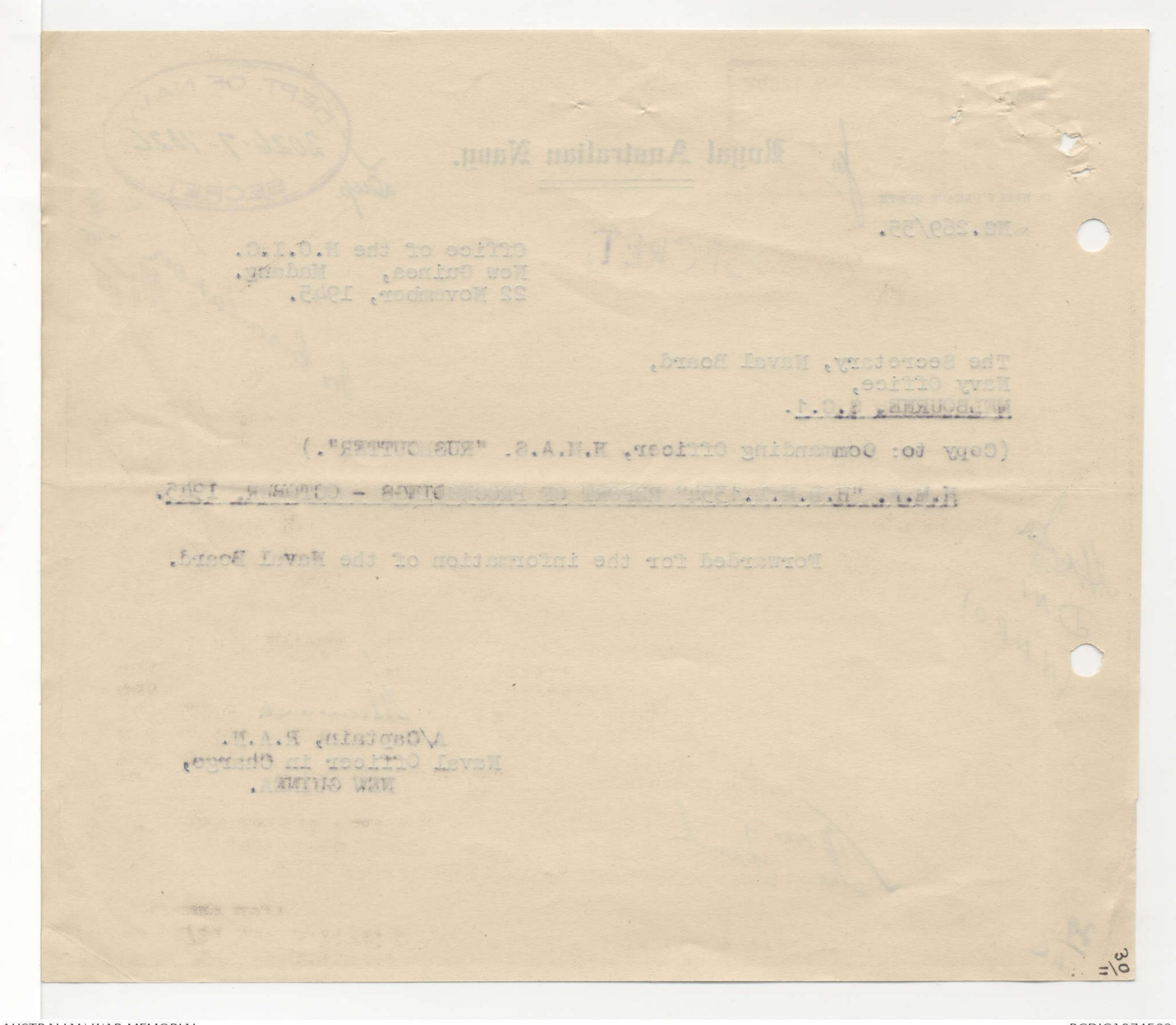

SUBJECT: REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS FOR MONTH OF OCTOBER, 1945.

Submitted in accordance with N.O.97/45 and C.C.N.O.19/45.

- 2. Left Finschhafen on the 1st for Rabaul arriving there on the 3rd. Fuel was obtained at Jacquinot Bay.
- Remained at Rabaul until the 5th when with Brig. Winning aboard sailed for New Ireland. Called at Namatani on the 6th Kavieng on the 7th and Ratabu on the 9th returning to Rabaul that day.
- At anchor until the 15th when we sailed for Put Put Harbour to investigate water supply there. The mouths of the Warorgoi River were visited the same day. Returned to Rabaul before dark.
- 7th we repaired one pipe line to a water point on the shore. Leaving there again that night we called at English Cove on the way back to Rabaul where we arrived on the 19th.
- 6. The 20th was spent at anchor at Rabaul. On the 21st embarked Colonel Hone and party and sailed for Put Put Harbour. On the 22nd destroyed three naval guns there and returned to Rabaul.
- 7. At anchor until the 27th when we left to visit islands off east coast of New Ireland. Anchored in English Cove New Ireland on the night of the 27th and watered ship. Raised anchoron the 28th arriving at Namatani on the same day.
- 8. With Lieutenant Seale, ANGAU and six native police we sailed for Ambelte Island on 29th arriving on the 30th. Leaving there on 31st we arrived at Boang Island that day

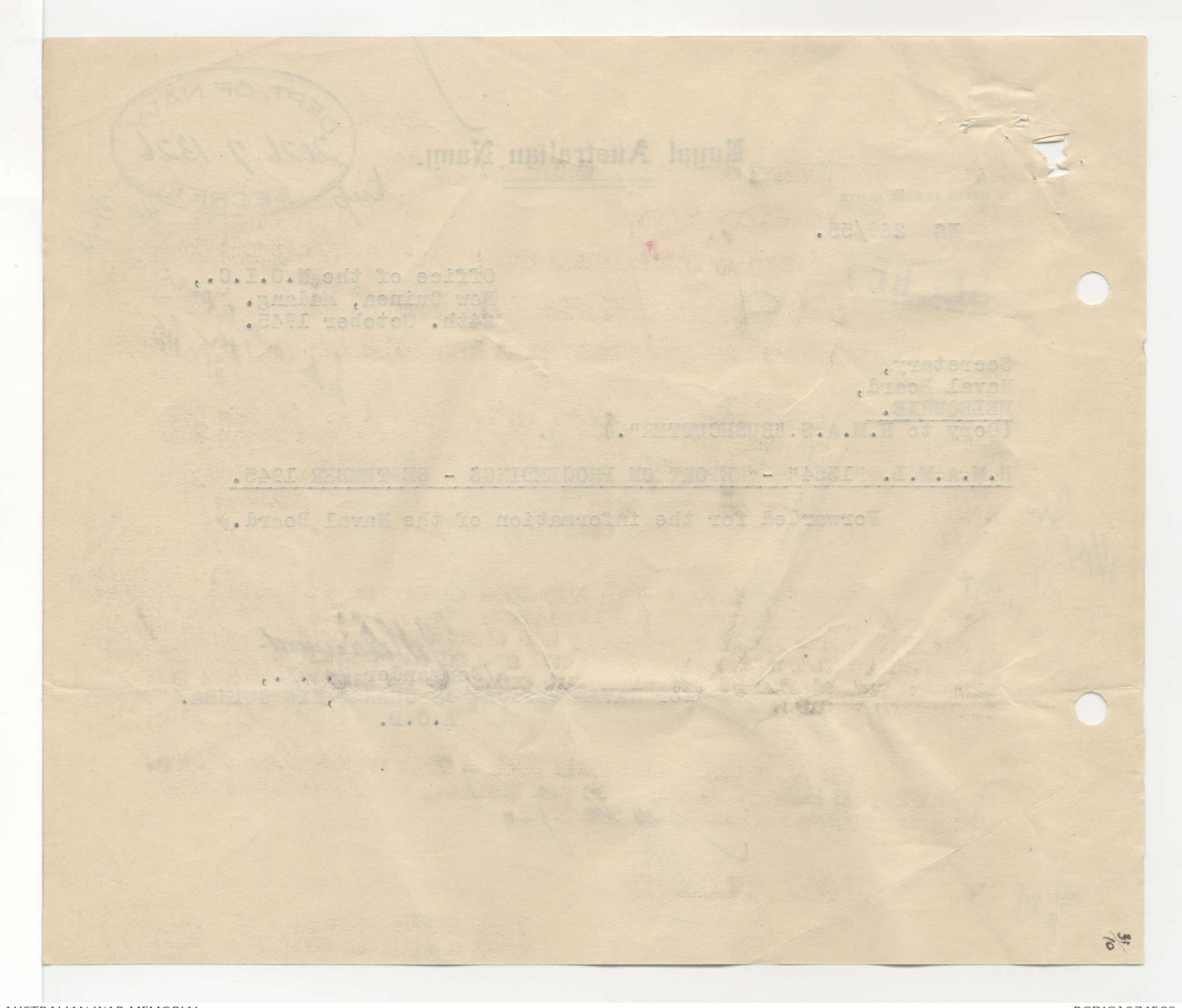

Returned from A/S patrol in Fuon Coldt Bay on the 1st and remained at moorings in Challenger Cove Hollandia until the 5th when we assumed A/S patrol returning to harbour. On the 9th. Remained at moorings andprepared to sail for Madang and on the 1th in company with M.L. 1358 proceeded, calling at Altape, Wewak and Dogmur Bay arriving at Madang on the 14th.

3. From the 14th - 16th remained alongside at Madang, landing A/s dome; depth charges and ammunition. On the 17th proceeded to Alexisharen for routine slipping and checking of underwater fittings. Returned to Madang on the 25th and stayed alongside muntil the 27th when we called for Finschofen, but owing to an engine defect was forced to return.

4. Was at Alexishafen from 28th - 29th undergoing repairs returning to Madang on the 29th and sailing for Finschafen that evening we arrived there on the 30th.

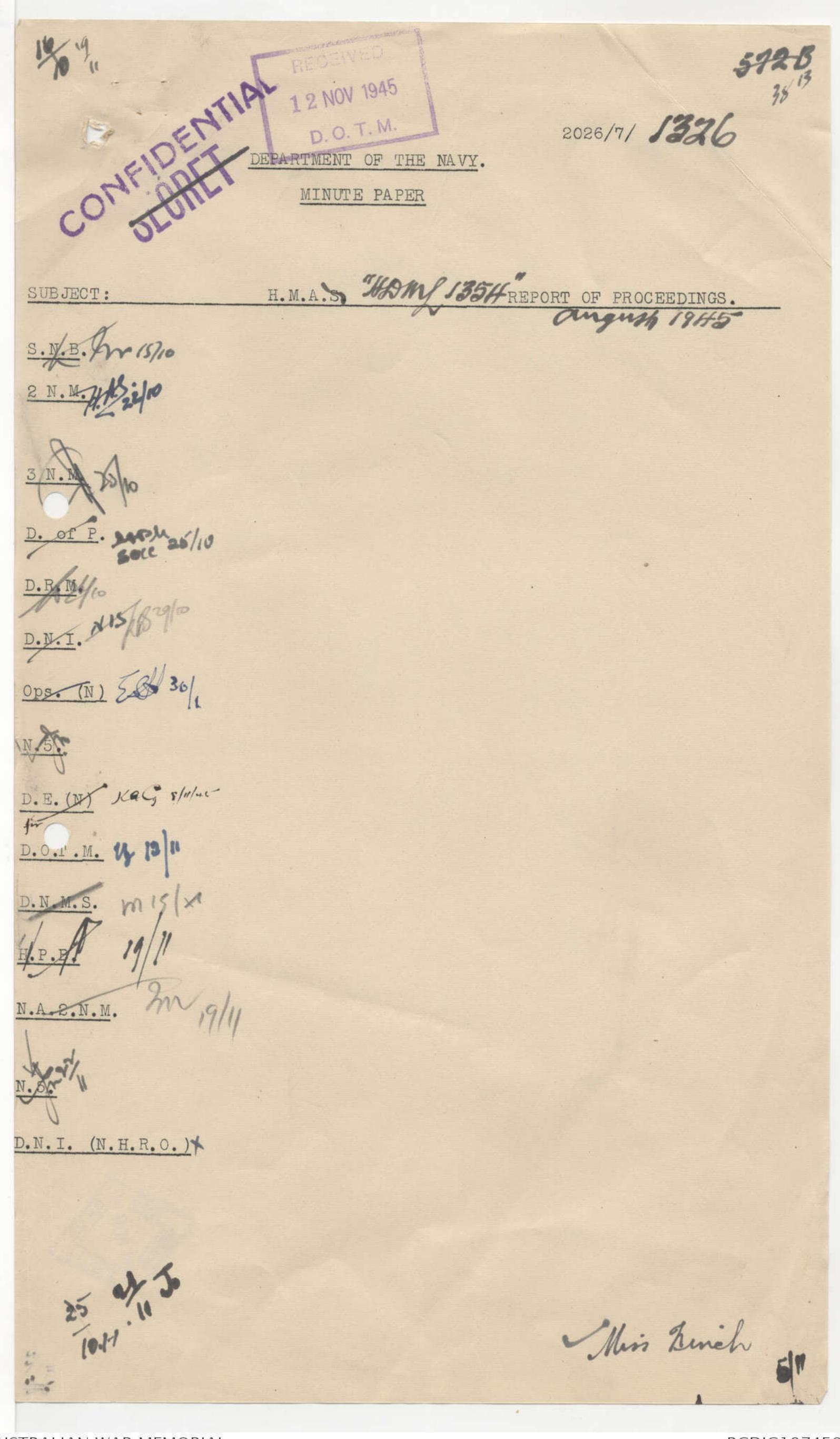

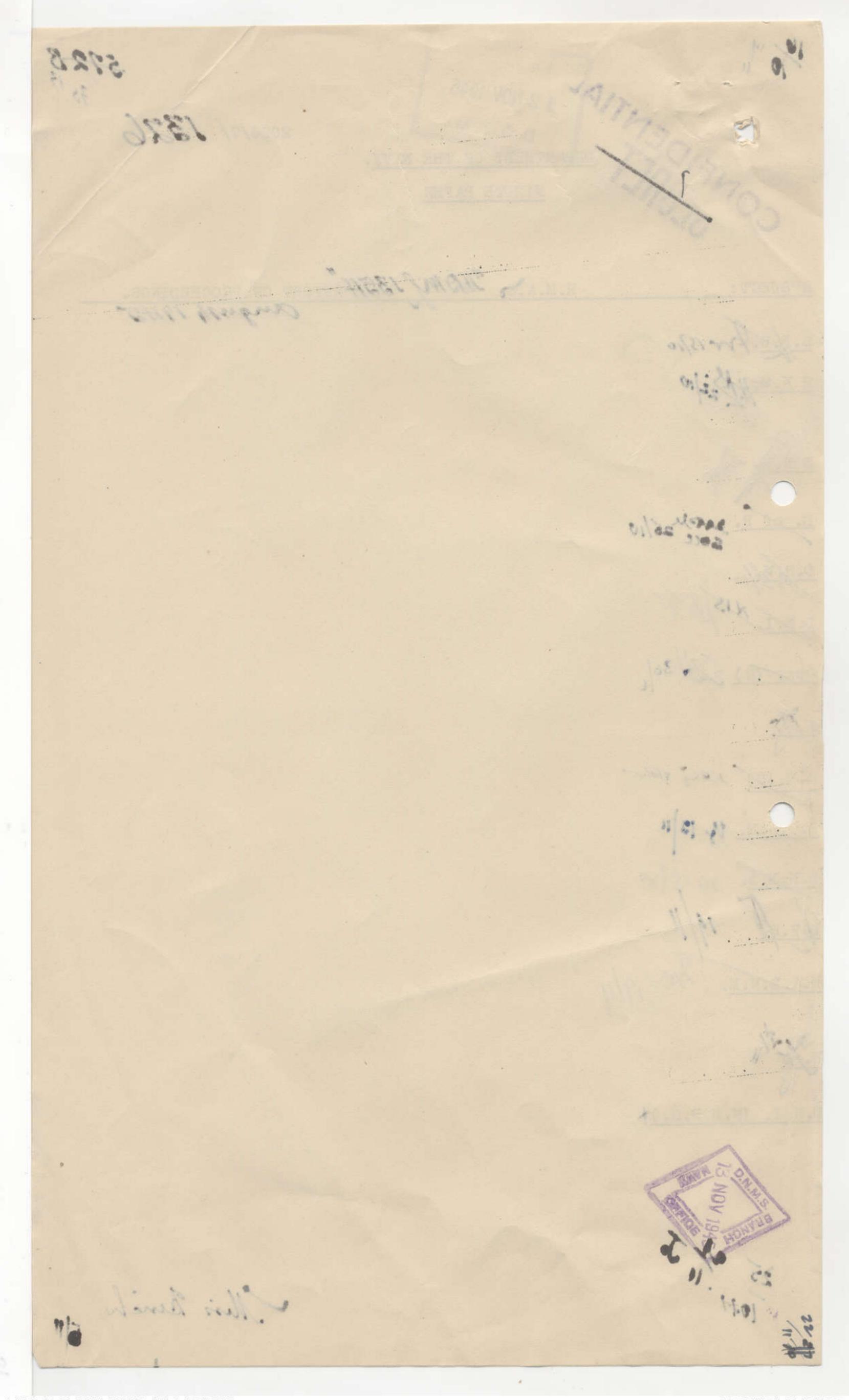

- 7. Was at anchor until the 30th when we assumed the "Inner" A/S. patrol, remaining on patrol until the end of the month.

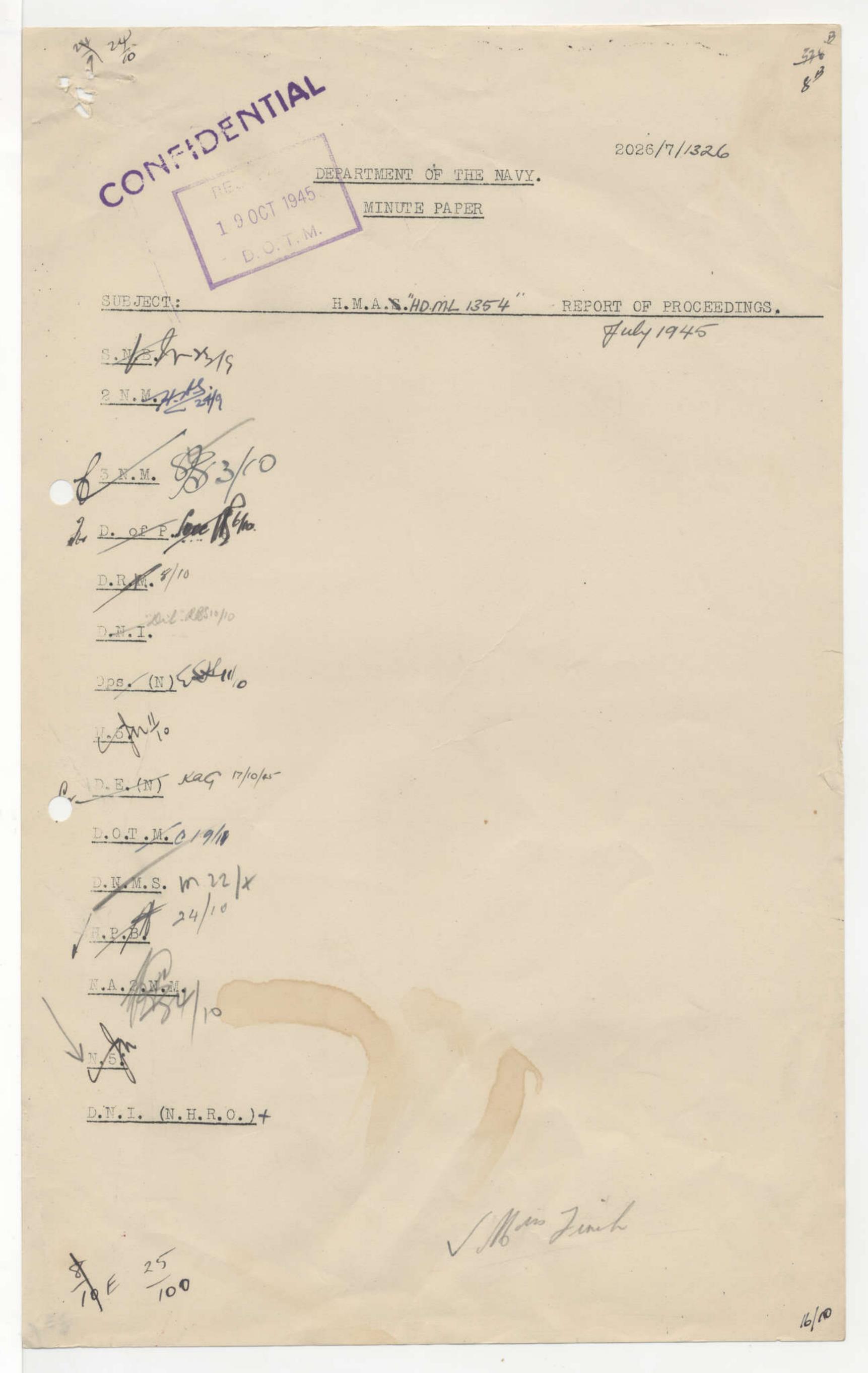

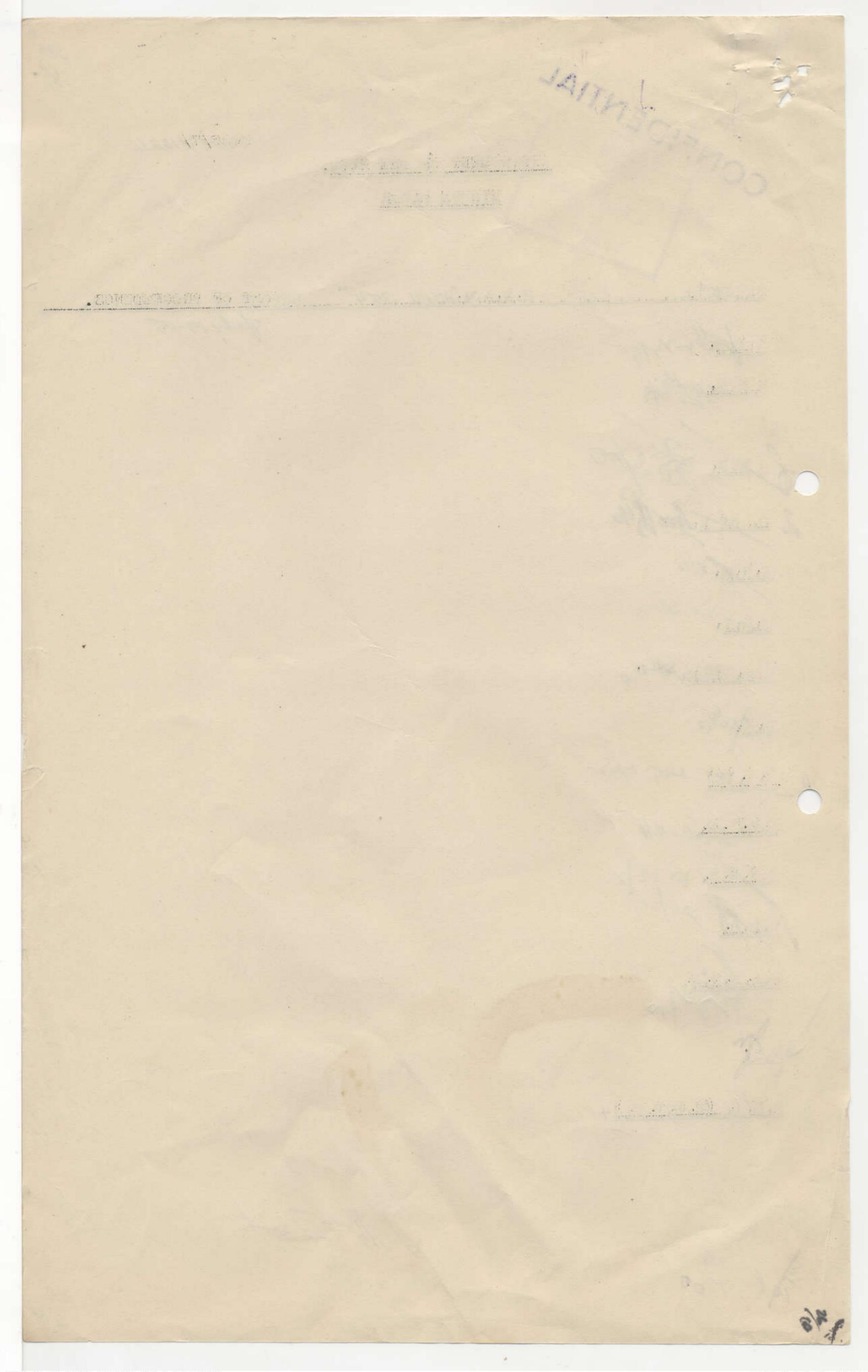

Alongside at Madang on the 1st. 2.

Proceeded to Coastal Force Repair Base, Alexishaven on the 3. 2nd and remained there until. the 26th. Whilst there underwent a 500 hour top overhaul and made good several minor defects to hull and fittings. Engine trials on the 25th were very satisfactory, maximum engine revs. of 1400 being obtained.

Proceeded to Madang on 26th and the period to the end of the month was spent in replacing the .50 cal. guns with a 20mm. Oerlikon. The A/S equipment was brought up to the mark by the diligence of the Base Staff whose keen effort is to commended.

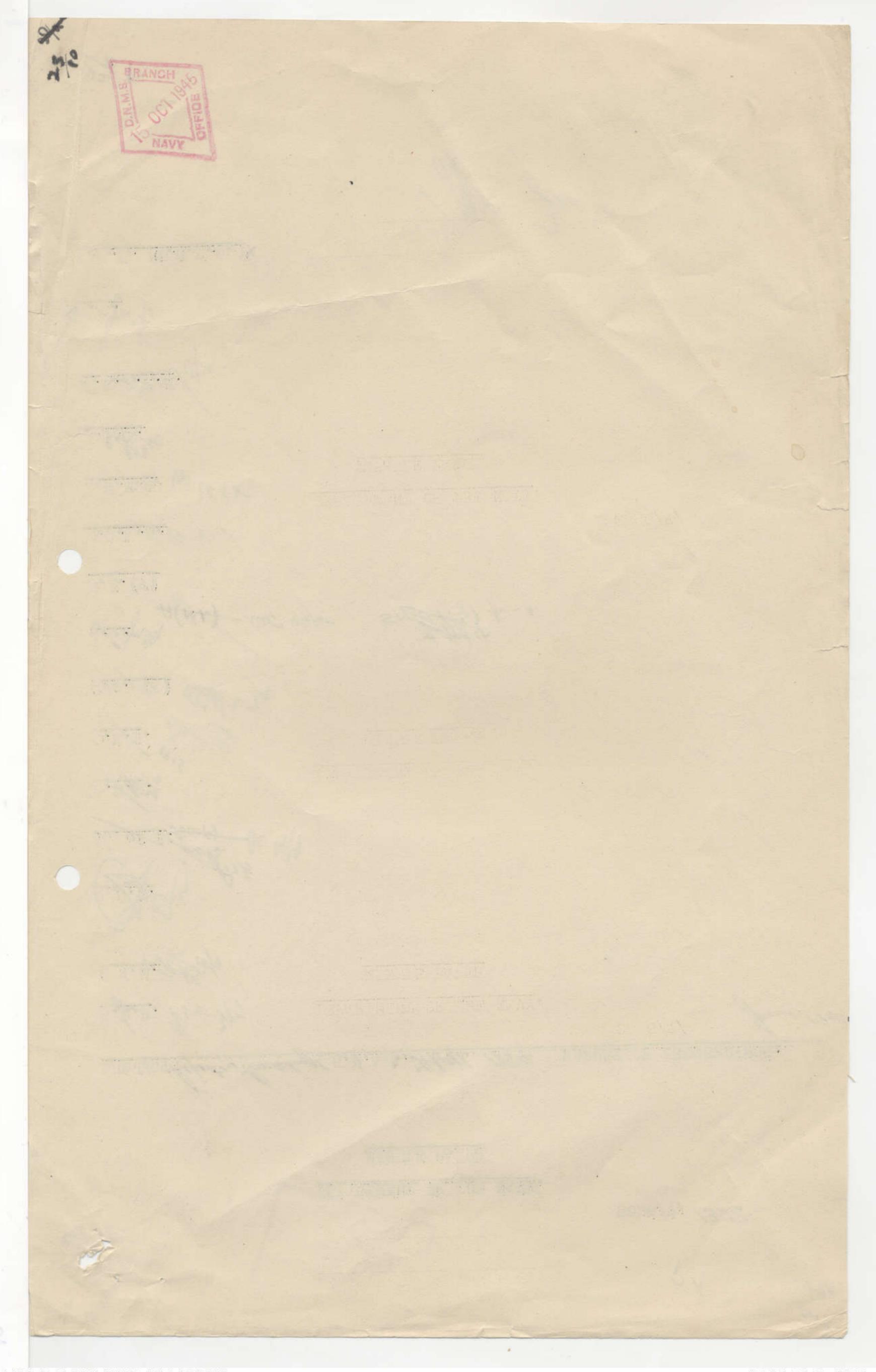

Submitted for the information of the Naval Board in accordance with N.O. 97/43 and C.C.N.O. 19/45, the following report

of proceedings for June, 1945.

On the 1st June at 0300 left Townsville for Thursday Island in company with H.D.M.L's. 1355,1347, 1341 and H.M.A.S. "KARINA". At 0930 on the 2nd anchored off Lizard Island, leaving there at 0615 the following morning for the Flinders Group. Anchored off at 1515 the same day. Underway by 0345 and secured alongside jetty at Portland Roads at 1547. Slipped at 1000 on the 5th and arrived in Margaret Bay at 1615. Ships were underway by 0500 on the 6th and proceeded direct to Thursday Island arriving there at 1725.

From the 7th to the thirteenth the boat was held at T.I. whilst repairs to main and auxiliary engines were carried out. Sailed for Moresby at 0900 on the 14th. Anchored overnight off Coconut Island arriving at 1507 and slipping at 0915. Sighted Wile Island at 0810 and arrived Moresby 1525 on the 16th. Routine for 100 hours was carried out on main engines during the 17th and 18th.

In company with H.D.M.L.1355 we left at 0625 on the 19th via the inshore route to Milne Bay, arriving there at 1412 on the 22nd. A night anchorage was made off Hula, and Abou and also in Fife Bay, arriving these places at 1700, 1700 and 1715 respectively and leaving again at 0709, 0715 and 0630. The skill and diligence of the native pilot Frank Ray is worthy of note. His local knowledge enabled constant fixes to be taken.

A/S Generator. At 1400 on the 24th with H.D.M.L. 1355 we sailed for Madang arriving 1530 on 26th. From 27th 30th we were in harbour. All stores were mustered. The A/S Dome was shipped on the 27th.

2. The health of the crew is good. One case of tropical ear being reported, medical attention was obtained from hospital at Abou; this infection has now cleared up. The Ship's Company's work has been satisfactory.

3. Efficiency Report:

Two supercharger chains on starboard engine broke during the period, one chain only giving 35 hours service. With the usual adjustments to the injector system the engine performed satisfactorily at 1200 revs. Have found the engines perform exceptionally well at 1200 revs., the vibtation being reduced and the engine temperature attaining the most efficient heat.

A/S Engines and Equipment -

Engine gave satisfaction. Own dome was found defective and was replaced. My experience has shown and it was again proven on the eccasion, that when the dome has been immersed for a period and then taken out of the water and allowed to dry it becomes defective. Otherwise the equipment is fair. The bow oscellater appears weak.

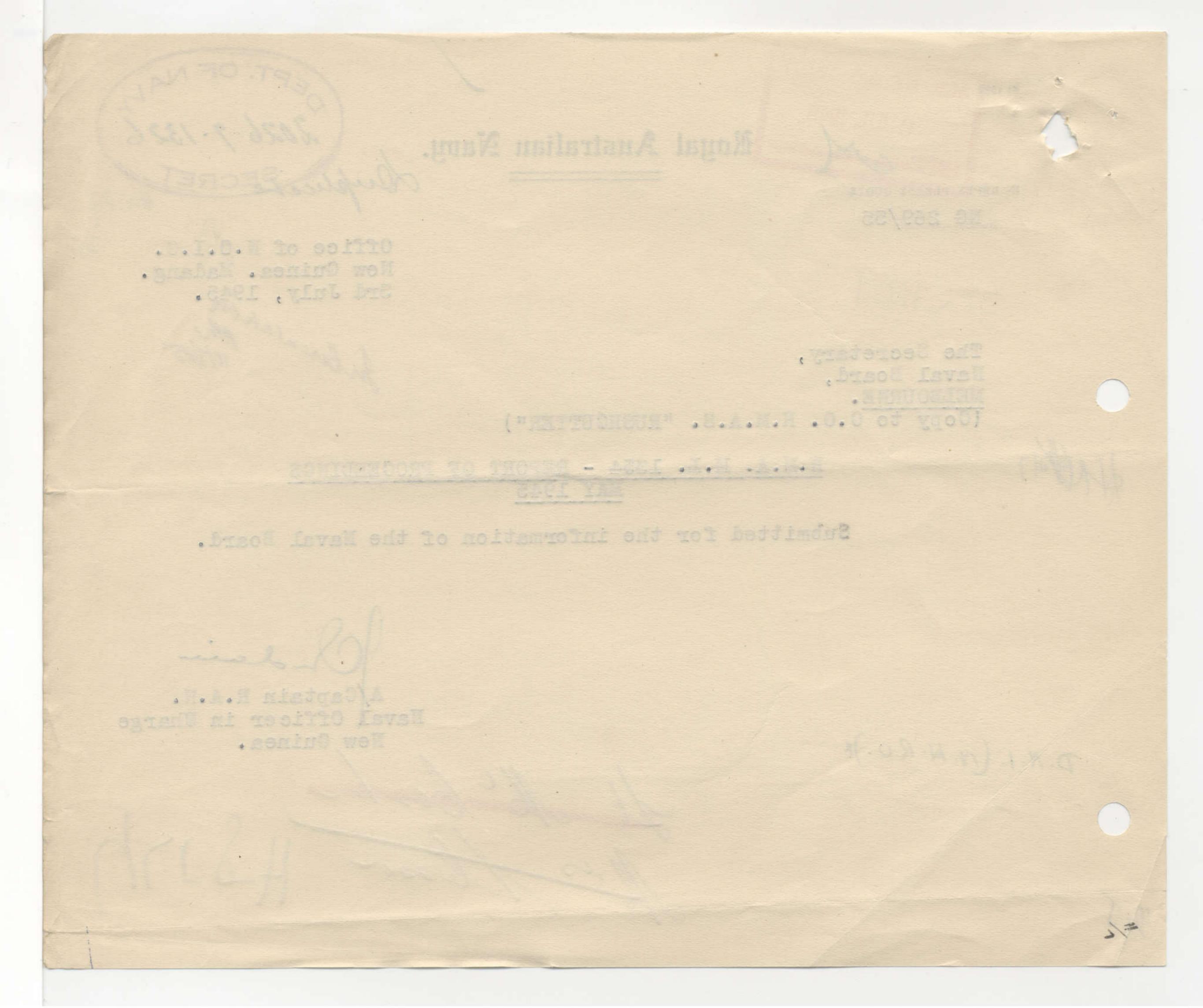

MAY 22nd-23rd: Left Gladstone at 0630 in company arriving Mackay at 1000 on the 23rd.

MAY 24th-25th: Left Mackay at 0700 still in company, arriving at 0350 on the 25th. in Townsville.

MAY 26th-31st: Secured alongside at Townsville. Sailing delayed by weather. Usual daily work carried on. The 100 hours routine carried out on engine.

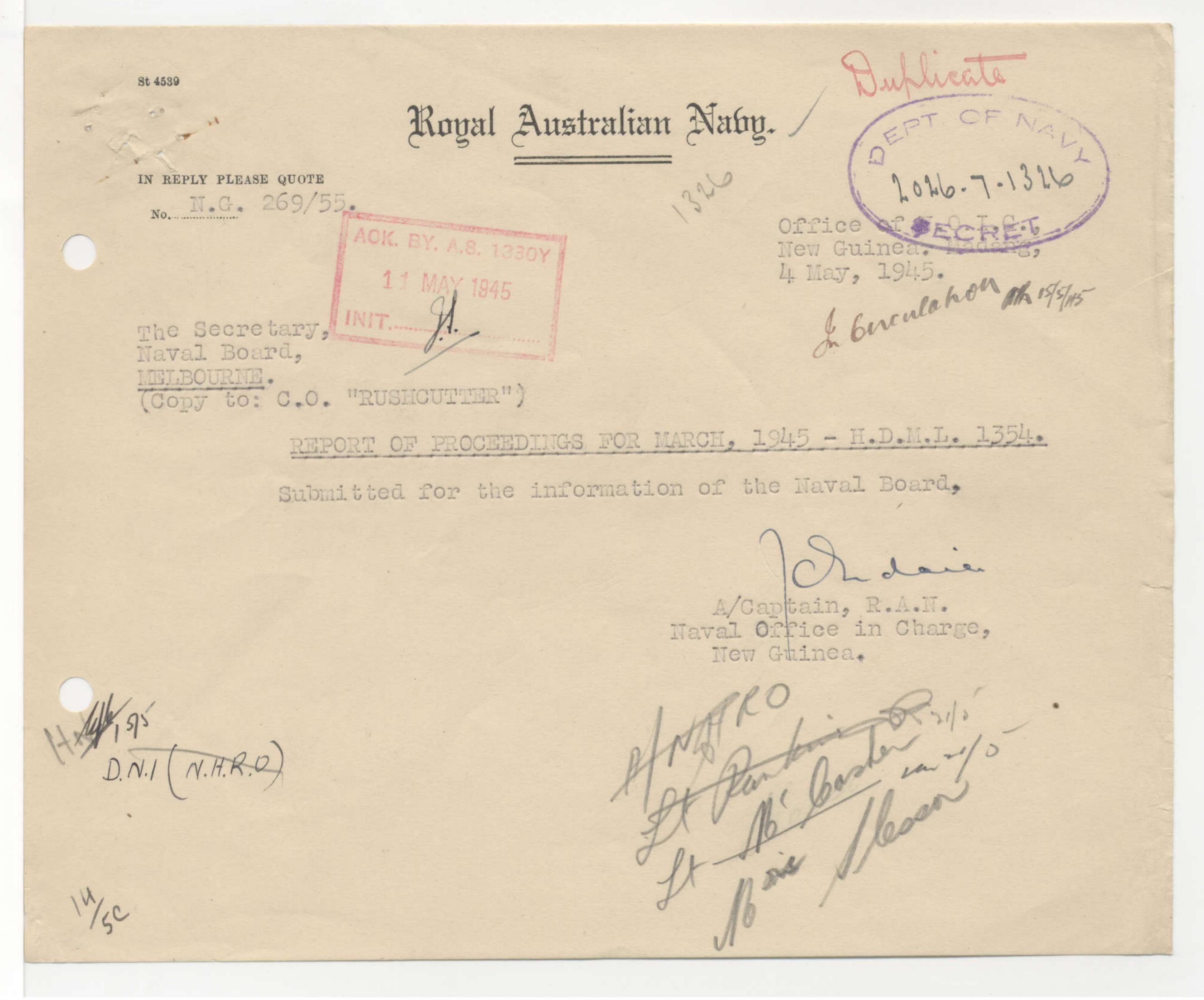

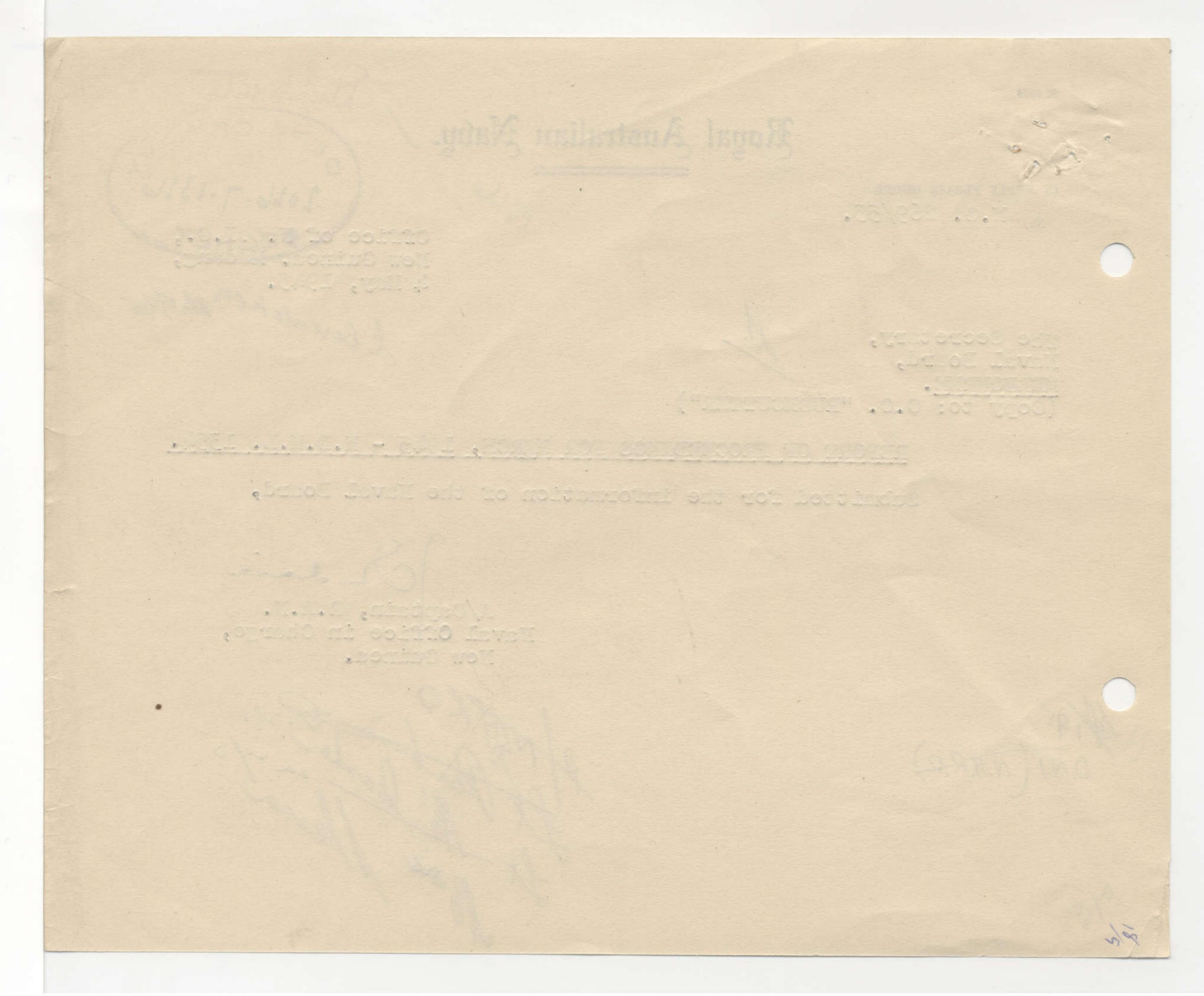

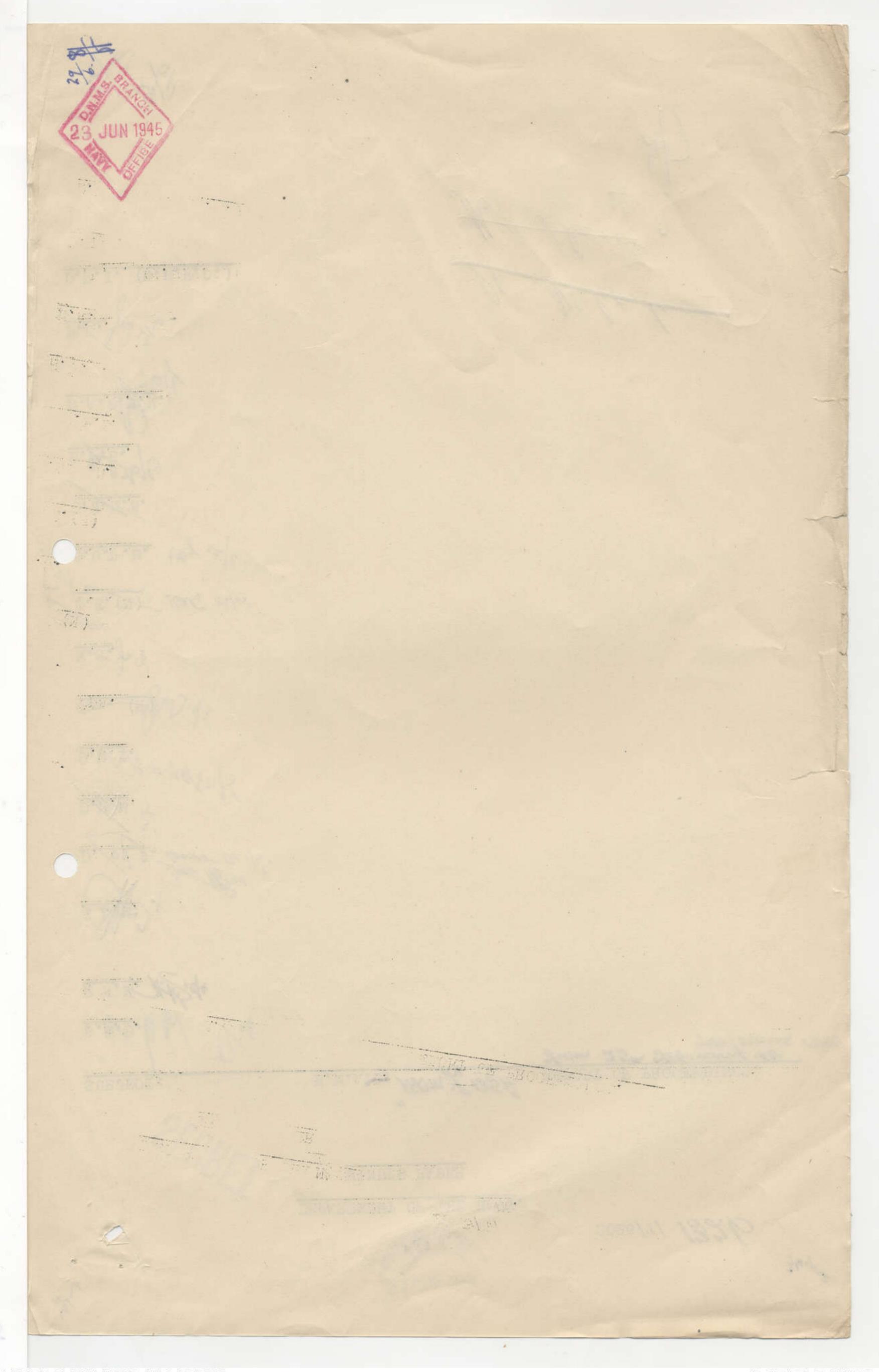

	H.D.M.L. 1354. 25TH FEBRUARY TO 7TH MARCH, 1945.

Submitted:

Acting under orders from Naval Officer-in-Charge, Brisbane, and following the programme drafted by Staff Officer Coastal Forces, Brisbane, H.D.M.L.1354 proceeded on Working-Up Exercises from 25th February until 7th March, 1945 inclusive.

25th February 0636K. Slipped and proceeded into Moreton Bay in company with M.L.821 and carried out Signal Exercises and "Conduct of the Fleet" acting under M.L.821's orders. In the afternoon Station Drills were carried out, culminating in a surface shoot at a moored target in company with M.L.821. In this shoot it was found that the firing gear of the 0.50 Calibre Browning Guns was defective, and that stoppages were occurring in one G.O.V. Gun.

26th February. A/S exercises were carried out in the forenoon using Pile Light as a target. For this purpose the wheelhouse was blacked out, so that operators and A.S.C.O's could have no outside assistance in locating the echo. In the afternoon acting under M.L. 821'sorders, A/S Hunting and Attacking exercises were carried out, signals being passed by flag and Aldis light. At the conclusion of these exercises the vessels proceeded to Bribie Island.

27th February, A.M. M.L.821 proceeded back to Brisbane. After cleaning ship, the crew were given instruction in Semaphore, after which H.D.M.L.1354 slipped and proceeded into Pumice Stone Strait where anchor was dropped, the operation being carried out as an exercise. The afternoon was employed preparing and rigging a towing pendant and bridle to be available for use in an emergency. On completion of this, H.D.M.L.1354 weighed and secured to Bribie Island Jetty. Weighing Anchor by use of the winch was found to be a slow and painful proceeding, the chain slipping over the gipsy of the winch. After trial of the winch, it was decided to weigh by hand.

28th February. The morning was employed carrying out further trials with the defective automatic guns in the Gunnery Practice Area, after which a Small Arms shoot at a towed target was held for all hands. At the conclusion of this H.D.M.L.1354 proceeded into Brisbane River for stores and fresh provisions.

1st March 0710K. Slipped Nixon Smith Wharf and proceeded to Moreton Bay. 0825K, turned about and returned to M.L. Base. Port Stern Gland and Shaft overheating.

2nd March. By 1140K the defect had been made good and trials satisfactorily carried out. H.D.M.L.1354 again proceeded into Moreton Bay and carried out "Man Overboard" evolution, rescuing wounded men from the sea, and "Officers Killed" giving every member of the crew a turn at handling the ship, bringing it alongside a lifebuoy, Fire Stations, Collision Stations, and Damage Control party were exercised for the remainder of the afternoon, securing at Bribie Island for the night.

3rd March. Trained Officers and Crew in Starting, Stopping and putting Main Engines in and out of gear. Exercised steering by engines. Exercised evolution "Steering Broken Down". It was found impossible to go into hand steering, as the hand tiller, even when rigged with a "handybilly" would not move the rudders, due to the gears connecting the two wheels forward. To use hand steering it would be necessary to disconnect the main steering rod. The Sea Water Pump Starboard Main Engine broke down while proceeding back to the M.L. Base. A new pump was fitted in the afternoon.

4th March. Alongside M.L. Base. Work carried out by Base Staff on electrical defect. Fuelled and watered ship.

5th - 7th March. Proceeded 0810K 5th in company with M.L. 821 and H.D.M.L. 1355 to sea and carried out a Depth Charge Attack exercise, orders being given by flags by M.L.821, each M.L. dropping a Depth Charge for practice in a predetermined position outside the hundred fathom line. M.L. 1354 dropped her depth charge set to 170' at 1558K. On completion of this exercise M.L.821 proceeded independently and at 1700K, M.L's 1355 and 1354 proceeded in company to rendezvous with M.L.821 off Double Island Light at 2230K. Due to bad weather M.L. 1354 reduced speed, M.L. 821 being sighted at 2320K and the rendezvous being effected at 2345K. The M.L's then proceeded to a position off Caloundra Point, M.L. 1354 altering course to enter Moreton Bay at 0450K 6th. At 0755 M.L. 1354 secured to M.L. 821 at anchor off Camboyuro Point. The remainder of the morning was spent cleaning ship and armament. At 1300K, R.T. watch was set on 4600K.C's and at 1315K slipped M.L.821 and carried out manoeuvres by R.T., securing at 1528K and setting R.T. watch on the Port Wave. 1615 secured alongside M.L.821 at Bribie Island Jetty. 0810K 7th slipped M.L. 821 and proceeded to M.L. Base, securing at 1100K, the Working-Up Programme being completed.

The period of twenty-four hours at sea was a most valuable part of the Work-Up Programme. After having had a week to practice station drills and evolutions, and to perfect the internal organisation of the ship, this period under way served the purpose of putting this organisation to the test, of exercising night lookouts, of giving the quartermasters valuable experience at the wheel, as well as illustrating to the crew what to expect when at sea in an M.L. (None of the crew had previously been to sea in small ships).

J. It is considered that the working-up was of great benefit to all hands, and a satisfactory state of efficiency was achieved.
