New Board Member Biographies

Ted Snell (new Chair)

Professor Ted Snell, AM CitWA, is Chief Cultural Officer and Director of the Lawrence Wilson Art Gallery at the University of Western Australia. Over the past two decades he has contributed to the national arts agenda through his role as Chair of the Visual Arts Board of the Australia Council, Chair of Artbank, Chair of the Asialink Visual Arts Advisory Committee, Board member of the National Association for the Visual Arts, Chair of the Australian Experimental Art Foundation and Chair of University Art Museums Australia.

He is currently Chair of the Fremantle Biennale and on the board of the UQ Art Museum, ANAT (Australian Network for Art & Technology), and Balcatta Independent Public School. He has published several books and has curated numerous exhibitions, many of which document the visual culture of Western Australia. Ted Snell is a regular commentator on the arts for ABC radio and television and writes regularly for The Conversation.

Jim Morrison

Is a Goreng Minang Noongar Elder, a Traditional Custodian of WA's southern coast who has proudly passed his strong Aboriginal values to following generations of his extended family. He has been a prominent activist, advocate and leader in pivotal Aboriginal advancement roles for over four decades, working passionately to address the rights of the Stolen Generations and their families; Aboriginal child protection; the tragic mental health and suicide issues in his community; equity in access to culturally safe services in State and Commonwealth Governments; overdue prison reforms; Aboriginal employment, education and training; Aboriginal equity in universities; the protection of young street people and the formation and management of non-government agencies providing services to Aboriginal families and their broader communities.

For the past three years he has recently taken up leadership of YOKAI! Healing our Spirit, the operational umbrella of the WA Stolen Generations Aboriginal Corporation and Bringing Them Home (WA).

Jim is also well known in the community for the hundreds of fundraising events and funeral benefits he has managed for Aboriginal families, most particularly for Noongaroke, our version of karaoke.

Soula Veyradier

Soula has worked across the visual arts and museum areas, managing programs and sites, developing exhibitions, collections and special projects for organisations in Australia and overseas. She has undertaken many roles within the NFP sector, state and local government relating to the strategic planning and implementation of arts and cultural policies and programmes. Her experience and knowledge of the cultural sector of Western Australia gives her a rare depth of insight into opportunities around cultural planning and programming relevant to regional communities.

She has undertaken leadership roles within the cultural sector, is a former president of Museums & Galleries Australia WA and National Councillor, and currently Director of Programs for the International Arts Space (formerly IASKA).

Her work includes managing artist residencies across WA communities and beyond, site interpretation and activation for the National Trust WA, Historic Heart of Perth and Subiaco East Development, managing the Perth site of the Western Australian Museum, City of Melville Arts and Museums portfolio, Pierre Beres rare books and art and Pulsart Artists Cooperative, amongst others.

Industry activity includes consultative and committee involvement on a number of boards, including Community Arts Board (previously CANWA), Australian Museums and Galleries Association National Council and WA Branch President, the Cultural Development Forum WA, Collections Sector Advisory Committee, Department of Culture and the Arts, Cultural Chairs group, Chamber of Arts and Culture and assessment panels including Museums and Galleries (MAGNA) Awards judge, Catalyst Community Art Grants, Collections Sector and Arts Development Grants, DCA.

Soula acknowledges the important role regional communities play in the fabric Western Australia and would bring her skills and experience to Regional Arts WA to support a vision for a dynamic regional arts ecology.

Lesley Wilkinson
