Figure 1: Main destination of Year 12 completers, Calvary Christian College - Carbrook 2015




Figure 4: Main destination of Year 12 completers, Calvary Christian College - Carbrook 2011-2015





Figure 4 compares the main destinations of Year 12 completers from Calvary Christian College - Carbrook against previous years.

## PRE-PREP SPRINGWOOD

### Tales of the Terrific Tigers

Today we had five police officers, a police dog and a robot visit Kindy. The police have a big responsibility to care for us and today they told us how they do that and showed us some special equipment they use so that they can keep us safe.



Constable Sue from the Crime Prevention Unit talked to us about feeling safe and who we can talk to when we don't feel safe. We discussed how we can identify police officers by their uniform but especially by their badges. Sometimes our bodies tell us that we don't feel safe. Constable Sue drew a picture of Mr Blobby who knew he didn't feel safe because his tummy felt sick, he wanted to do a wee, he felt shaky, he had goose bumps and he felt sad and worried.



To help us feel safe, we can tell an adult and the children identified five adults they could trust and who could help them. The children thought of grown ups like mummies and daddies, teachers, doctors, grandparents and police officers. Constable Sue told us that we don't have to talk to adults that we don't know and that we should tell our parents or teachers if someone we don't know wants to talk to us or get us to go with them. If we get lost at the shops, we can get help from police, shop keepers or from another mummy who has children with them.

## MUSIC AND ARTS

Helpful hints on finding a suitable Music Teacher for your son or daughter.

Every now and then I get asked by people how and where to find a suitable music teacher for their child. Finding the right music teacher for your child is very important. Think of it as an investment in your children.

As with most things in life, you get what you pay for and this is usually the case with music teachers. The Music Teachers Association of Queensland recommends for a qualified teacher the minimum is \$68.00 per hour. Many schools including our College have done the hard work for you by arranging for highly qualified and experienced teachers to give lessons through their school music programs.

Most schools, as we do at Calvary, set tuition levies a little lower than this recommended rate to support the school community.

Things to be concerned about when looking for a music teacher:

Be wary of the teacher who approaches you saying they will teach your son or daughter for a lesser fee. Not only is this highly unethical and frowned upon by the music teaching profession, there is probably a reason behind a teacher poaching students from another teacher and that is usually they don't have the qualifications to attract their own students.

Don't trust your son or daughter's music education to an unqualified teenager or adult no matter how little they charge for lessons. You would not allow a teenager who can change a light bulb to rewire the electricity to your house. A student majoring on an instrument at a conservatorium or university is usually going to be suitable to teach a beginner student.

Almost like an interview, ask the teacher what their qualifications are, where they studied and who they learned from and if they have not obtained a minimum of Grade 8 or A.Mus.A. level (or equivalent Trinity College levels etc.) keep looking. If not learning at your school, you can always phone the Music Teachers Association of Queensland and ask for teachers in your area.

With only a few rehearsals until Calvary Showcase "Rock, Roll and Remember" on 16 October, students are busy with final preparations making sure your night at our College's cultural event of the year is one to remember. ## CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

### What would make you happy?

Would a better job, or better looks make you happy? How about a new car or a long holiday or if the Broncos won the finals? What about more money?

Social scientists have been able to ascertain that money, possessions and greater status might make us happy in the short term, but won't give us a lasting sense of inner joy, contentment and peace. In other words, their advice is to for us to stop our quest for status and to stop buying unnecessary possessions ('stuff').

A *Time* magazine poll found happiness tended to increase as a person's annual income rose to \$50000. However after that amount of income, happiness did not increase by much significance. They concluded that money ceases to have an effect on our happiness once an average level of income is attained. This explains why happiness increases when a person escapes poverty but people do not become happier as they become wealthy.

Connecting our happiness with our prosperity leads us to the pursuit of more belongings. Many of us have a tendency to compare our situation with that of our neighbours. We compare ourselves with others then compete with them. I find it interesting that three of the Ten Commandments restrain us from comparing ourselves to others. "Do not covet". "Do not steal." "Do not commit adultery." The reality is that there will always be someone with more than us!

According to Professor Martin Seligman, the author of "Flourish", the elements that are vital to a lasting sense of happiness and personal growth are:

- a positive attitude (optimism),
- engagement with our passions,
- close and healthy relationships,
- a sense of accomplishment,
- good health and, last but not least,
- a strong sense of meaning and purpose. Of course meaning and purpose directly relate to our spiritual faith and a personal relationship with the living God.

A deep sense of happiness has nothing to do with conforming to others and the competitive patterns of this world. Happiness to me means a deep sense of joy, inner peace and contentment. That is a true gift and blessing. I love the way the Message version of the Bible, by Eugene Peterson, amplifies 1 Timothy 6: 6-8. It says "A devout life does bring wealth, but it's the rich simplicity of being yourself before God. Since we entered the world penniless and will leave it penniless, if we have bread on the table and shoes on our feet, that's enough."

May you and your family find and hold on to true happiness.


