Senior School

In 2017 Senior Students participated in courses on and off campus which included: University courses (25), Certificate Courses (126), Diploma of Business (24) and traineeships and apprenticeships (6).

The scope of vocational subjects available for study at Canterbury College has grown. On campus students completed Certificates in Hospitality, Construction, Furniture Making, Early Childhood Education, Business, Tourism and Event Management, Rural Operations, Fitness and Written and Spoken English.

Trainees and apprentices attended the workplace one day per week and completed their formal training with Registered Training Organisations. Traineeships and Apprenticeships included Certificate III Retail Operations, Business, Hospitality, Health Care Assistant and Early Childhood Education and Care.

All Year 10 are expected to do Work Experience at the end of Semester 1. This proved to be an excellent opportunity for students to learn more about potential careers, the world of work and training pathways to future

employment.

The pastoral approach of staff at the College is reflected not only in their daily manner, but also in the teaching components of our Canterbury-specific Values across a wide range of domains. In Form Classes, at Assemblies and in personal conversations, the College Values of Respect, Integrity, Compassion, Social and Environmental Responsibility, Scholarship and Community were regularly used as our reference points. Our Pastoral programs provided students with guest speakers covering a wide range of topics including personal health, safe use of technologies, environmental protection and road safety.

Students are given regular advice on their academic program, especially in regard to areas to maintain and those which need improvement. Sometimes such academic reviews generate the need for change in subjects or even a change in school pathway.

The increased demands of university entrance, subject choice, intentions for further study, scholarship applications, enrolments at TAFE or Apprenticeship/ Traineeship programs in 2017 were challenges well met and ably facilitated.

Middle School Report

Core Curriculum Subjects of Spiritual Development, English, Mathematics, Science, Humanities and Social Sciences and Health and Physical Education continue to offer a depth of learning experiences. The electives of Music, Visual Art, Food and Textiles Studies, Industrial Technology and Design, French, Drama, Dance, Digital Technology, Extension English, Mathematics and Science, Business and Japanese were open to students in Year 9, with several as compulsory subjects in Years 7 and 8.

Year 9 Community In Action (CIA) program was a valued time for all students enabling them to have a special linkage to their Spiritual Development Lessons and their Pastoral Care program. The culminating event of the National Award winning Year 9 program – Community in Action was held on Friday 20 October with an Exhibition day in the Canterbury Events Centre.

The Year 8 Camp ventured to Emu Gully (near Toowoomba) for three days of excitement, team building and individual character development. The students participated in many different activities including a mini Kokoda track, twister buggies, swimming, camping, and cooking their own food.

The Year 8 Integrated Project of Semester 2 gave students the opportunity to link their courses of study in English, Mathematics, Science and Social Science. The theme of Sustainability proved to be valuable for students to research and present a quality report.

The Year 7 students enjoyed a memorable day at Palm Beach, for their Positive Mind excursion. They engaged in team – based and ‘getting to know you’ activities.

Junior School Report

The focus on PRIDE – Personal Responsibility in Developing Excellence – saw students committed to their studies and activities to achieve personal excellence across a range of areas. The concept of a growth mindset helped students to not give up and keep trying has made a positive difference to achieving goals. Year 5 and 6 students participated in whole day workshops entitled “The Learning Dip” in which students learnt about how they can manage their mindset, set realistic steps to reach a goal and remain focussed and committed.

Academically, a number of students participated in ICAS competitions in English, Mathematics and Science, in the Maths Olympiad and other relevant activities achieving very sound results. An ACE program (Academic Community of Excellence) was initiated in which a range of students from Prep to Year 4 participated in mathematical and philosophical challenges. An inaugural Spelling Bee was held.

In the emerging area of STEM students participated in Robocup Maze Challenges, the Da Vinci Decathlon, Griffith University STEM Cup and Australian Museum Eureka Prizes for the first time. These competitions were an excellent means to provide students with opportunities to learn new skills in coding and robotics. Students from Kindergarten to Year 6 were involved in a Junior School STEM day at the end of each semester. The first day had a fairy tale focus of “Enchanted Engineering” in which students had to solve a problem in a nominated fairy tale.

The Young Explorers ICT group were chosen to be in the finals at the University of Queensland due to their great entrepreneurial ideas. Each group developed a project which provided support for a community need and included a robotic dog to visit hospitals, and a safety game.

The clubs offered on Friday afternoon provide a variety of activities for students to learn new skills such as cartooning, robotics, sewing and sports. Our Year 5 students participate in an extensive leadership program throughout the final semester including a camp, culminating in a Leadership Day. There were also a number of addition experiences including Master Chef, Under 8's Day, discos and the Book Week parade. Through incursions and excursions, students experienced a variety of different activities whether in Science, Australian History with the Year 5 Gold Rush Adventure, Year 6 going to Old Parliament House, Year 2 visited the Beenleigh Historical Village

At the state finals, Canine Racing won 2 award categories: Innovation Award and Best Managed Enterprise. At the regional finals, the Professional Junior Class team, Bolt Racing, won twelve categories across both the Professional Junior and Senior classes, including being awarded Regional Champions. At the state finals, Bolt Racing won 6 award categories.

Australian Youth Rocketry Challenge: Canterbury College entered two novice Year 9 teams who narrowly missed podium places.

Gold Coast Robotics Challenge: Two Year 5 teams represented at the Gold Coast Robotics Challenge at Dreamworld.

International Space Design Competition: Canterbury College's Senior Australian Space Design Team won the Australian National Final for the third year in a row. Competed in the International Space Settlement Design Competition (ISSDC) in Titusville, Florida. Zac O'Reilly (2016 Graduate), Kyle Cossor (Year 10), Blake Roesler (Year 11) and Ayden Giess (Year 10) won the Runner's Up trophy. The students were invited to Parliament House to talk about their trip. They met with Ms Tracy Davis, Shadow Minister for Education.

Junior Space Design Competition: Year 7 team were one of 8 teams around Australia to make it to the national finals.

Maths Team Challenge: Intermediate Team A – 2nd Place, Senior Team B – 2nd Place, Senior Team A – 3rd Place.

Australian Mathematics Competition: Nicholas Murphy (Year 8) won both the Prize and Best in School awards.

Social Climate:

Students at Canterbury College learn about respect, integrity, compassion, scholarship, community and social and environmental responsibility through the delivery of a holistic Kindy to Year 12 pastoral care and well-being program.

Students from Kindy to Year 12 are engaged in a range of learning experiences designed to facilitate social, emotional, and moral development. Student wellbeing is supported through education in the following key focus areas:

Parental Involvement:

All parents must sign a confidentiality agreement to work in the classrooms.
