Jeff St. John and the Id:



## SAPIENTIA.

WAR:

On Monday June 25th. war broke out between Israel and the neighbouring Arab countries.

The fighting first started in the Gaza strip, a finger of Egyptian land reaching into Israel. At first only Egypt and Israel were fighting, but Syria, Jordan and Iraq quickly joined in the "Holywar". As the army was fighting in the Gaza strip, air raid sirens sounded in Cairo, Tel Aviv and Jerusalem. As dog fights raged, Israeli bombers and fighters were strafing the Egyptian airports, and claimed that they had destroyed or disabled 50 Egyptian planes.

Jordanian troops firing from Mt. Scopus opened a mortar barrage on Jerusalem and the Bethlehem area.

Syria announced that its troops and planes along the borders near the Sea of Galilee had set ablaze oil refinery at Haifa, Usrael's main port.

The first announcement of the war was made in Jerusalem by an Israeli spokesman. As the spokesman was reading his report to a newsmen, the lines were cut. Air raid sirens were sounding for the first time since the Sinai campaign. In Jerusalem the air raid sirens sounded about 8a.m. The wailing sirens sent people running off the streets to air raid shelters, but the all clear sounded 40min. after.

As the first new of the war was announced, the leaders of several large countries went to conference with their advisers. In Washington, President Johnson asked for peace and warned of tragic consequences. The United Nations Security Council held an emergency meeting to discuss terms. At this meeting both Egypt and Israel accused each other of starting the war. On Monday diplomats in Canberra said that the situation in the middle east was the gravest for the world since World War II.

Well, Israel has certainly won the war. The Egyptians have been well and truly beaten. Jordan has asked for a cease fire, Syria has agreed to a cease fire. Israel now controls the whole of the Sinai peninsula on an area 3-4 times the size of Israel. They effectively control one side of the Suez Canal, all the land west of the Jordan river, formally controlled by Jordan. It now remains to be seen whether they will want to keep this land.

The Israelis have proved to Egypt and the world that they are a nation capable of standing on their own two feet.

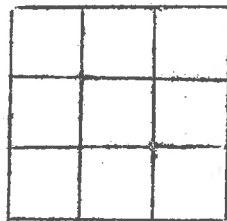

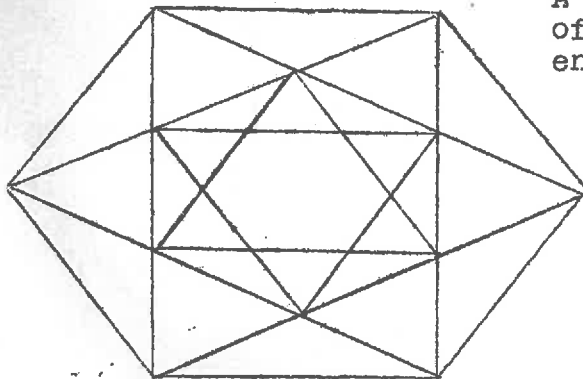
