DOMINICAN SISTERS ARRIVE AT GLENORCHY

LAST Sunday afternoon, three Dominican Sisters arrived in Hobart, to found their first convent in Tasmania, and take over St. John's School, Glenorchy.

They were met by a large number of Glenorchy people to welcome them.

Their names are Sister Mary Damian, O.P., Sister Mary Celestine, O.P., and Sister Mary Clare, O.P.

The sisters were taken from the aeroplane to St. John's Church, Glenorchy, where another crowd waited to greet them.

The Rectory was visited, led by Father Wallis, who gave the Sisters a tour of the school buildings. He said the sisters that they were most welcome at Glenorchy.

Messages of Welcome

Letters and telegrams, messages, and gifts from other convents throughout Tasmania welcomed them. There were parties at homes of the Sisters of St. John's.

Dedication

This year we dedicate our College Yearbook to the Dominican Sisters of Eastern Australia who with the Salesians of Don Bosco in 1973, formed a new and joint educational endeavor - Dominic College.

2019 marks 60 years since the sisters arrived in Glenorchy to commence their educational pursuits with children and young people in Hobart. They were invited by the Parish Priest of Glenorchy, Fr John Wallis to come to Tasmania to offer a quality Catholic education of the highest standard.



The Dominican Sisters had developed an outstanding reputation as pioneers in first class teaching and learning since their arrival from Ireland in Australia in 1867. They had forged an approach to education that valued Humanities, the Sciences and Languages as well as the Creative and Performing Arts.

On Sunday afternoon, 25 January 1959, Sr Mary Damian Hunt OP, Sr Mary Celestine Shorten OP and Sr Mary Clare Murray OP arrived by plane and were met by, Fr Wallis and excited parishioners who escorted them to St John's Glenorchy where a large crowd were waiting to welcome them.

The Dominican Sisters had agreed to found their first convent at Glenorchy and to take responsibility for St John's Parish School. Building commenced for the convent and secondary school and in 1962 the first students in Year 7 began at Holy Name School, in the charge of Sr Mary Gerard OP.

Holy Name senior secondary students began co-educational classes with senior Savio College boys in 1967 and the two schools achieved fully integrated senior co-education in 1969 in the lead up to the amalgamation of Holy Name and Savio College in 1973 as Dominic College.

These pioneering sisters developed their schools with vision, courage and a lasting commitment to form a deep love of learning in each of their pupils. The Dominican tradition – to praise to bless and to preach – continues to be integrated within the contemporary life of Dominic College.

As we look back on 2019, we do so with thanksgiving for the dedicated service of the Dominican Sisters in the tradition of our patrons, St Dominic Guzman and St Catherine of Siena.

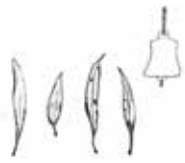

Principal's Report

Across 2019, there was a diverse range of opportunities for our K-10 students to challenge and stretch themselves in their learning and development. Students and staff alike continued to achieve excellent outcomes and the Dominican and Salesian spirits were ever pervasive in all activities and the many memorable events of the year.

We launched the year with the 2019 Strenna (message) by our Rector Major, Fr Ángel Fernández SDB. His message to the Salesian family worldwide focused on the call to holiness. The Rector Major affirmed that as children of God, holiness is already a part of all people and invited us all in our Salesian communities to embrace this holiness and draw upon it in our daily lives.

In our prayer life, masses and liturgies and our student retreats at the College, Jesus and his servants, our Patron Saints, St John Bosco, St Dominic Savio, St Dominic Guzman and St Catherine of Siena continued to act as inspirations. These saints and their acts of courage in the name of God, are deep sources of grace in the lives of our children and young people at Dominic College in their journey to holiness.

Increased Salesian Presence

This year we were blessed to have three full-time Salesians appointed to and focused on a variety of domains across the College. We warmly welcomed the return of Fr Peter Rankin SDB as College Rector. We also welcomed Br Barry Parker SDB who has been focused mainly on our 7-10 and Fr Damien Sladen SDB who worked with our K-6. In addition, we regularly connected with the new Parish Priest appointed to St John's Glenorchy, Fr Guy Riolo SDB.

We are unique in Tasmania in having this number of congregational religious within the College community. In 2019, these



Salesians worked with dedication, creativity, and a deep commitment to presence with and accompaniment of the young.

Annually we are privileged to host one or two young Salesians in theological training in Melbourne. This year, Br Aung Ko Myint (known as Br Dominic), came to the College in February to have an experience of pastoral ministry immersion. Originally from Myanmar, Br Dominic was involved in a variety of classes and activities in a comprehensive immersion program organised for his placement. He had a natural and engaging presence with our students and we hope we continue to be involved in this pastoral ministry program.

The Faith Life of Dominic College

The faith life of the College remained strong and constant and was further deepened in a number of ways. The College staff launched their professional year with a Spirituality Day in January, facilitated by Fr Elio Capra SDB. The theme for the day focused on areas such as our service to the community, leadership and what it means to work in a Catholic school in the Salesian tradition.

With a renewed Salesian community on site, all students enjoyed the opportunity for regular, meaningful Masses with their classes in the College Chapel. With improved audio-visual capacity and the installation of screens in the Chapel, student involvement and participation in our liturgies were greatly enhanced.

Hullabaloo Studios were invited to work with the College to develop a mural for the Chapel this year to provide inspiration and reflect our spiritually uplifting environment at the foot of Mount Wellington. Our 7-10 students, working with Ms Audrey Durbridge, created the basis of the artwork that was translated into a three panel mural by Chris Sage at 'Hullabaloo'. The mural was hung in November and our Year 10 students, the leaving Class of 2019, generously raised funds for the artwork as their 2019 Leavers' Gift to the College.

Spiritual Experiences for Students

Our camps and retreats and our immersion experiences all honoured and used the Salesian Good Night as a framework for daily spiritual reflection when off site and away from the College community.

We held a highly successful inaugural three-day Year 10 Retreat in Term 4 at Spring Beach, Orford. Our Deputy Principal, Mr Steve Casni developed the retreat in order to



support the K-10 Mission Team. We were fortunate to have members of the Salesian's Cagliero Team as well as our own staff, under the direction of Mrs Alicia McMahon, to co-facilitate the retreat.

Apart from our Opening School Mass, Advent Mass and traditional Feast Day Masses, we held several special masses to honour important occasions in the life of our community. In 2019 we held our inaugural Mother's Day and Father's Day Masses as well as a Mass to mark All Souls' Day in November.

Spiritual Reminders Project

The aim to develop daily spiritual reminders for our students as to how they live their lives was further developed with the completion and installment of our 7-10 Inspirational Quotes.

Inspirational quotes from our College patron saints were selected for display in our 7-10 Homerooms as wall decals. Each quote has the saint's name beside it or underneath it.

Students are able to see the quotes daily.

Because there is no retained written word of Dominic Guzman, we have used St Francis de Sales quotes as the Guzman homerooms overlap with the St Francis de Sales Science Centre.

Cagliero Program Involvement

Former student of Dominic College, Ben Dowling (Class of 2017), who completed Guilford Young College as their 2019 Vice-Captain, continued his involvement in the Salesian Youth movement. Ben represented Dominic College on the Cagliero Immersion Program to Cambodia mid-year. Ben and his leadership friends held a fundraiser 'Concert for Cambodia' in June at GYC's Don Bosco Theatre. The 'Concert for Cambodia' raised funds to donate to Salesian schools and programs in Cambodia. Our Salesian Youth Dominic College (SYDC) have also supported Ben in his efforts to raise much needed funds for these disadvantaged communities in Cambodia.

Belling In – a new Tradition Commences

As our Year 7 students commenced in February this year, the College's Year 8-10 students and staff officially welcomed them into their secondary education with a Guard of Honour and a 'Belling In' to Dominic College.

This new ritual was the prequel to a 'Belling-Out' ceremony, where the College farewelled our Year 10 students at the conclusion of their education at the College in November.

Our College Captains and Vice Captains, leading the procession of Year 7 through the Guard of Honour, rang three of our historic bells as they led Year 7 students up to the 7-10 top yard.

The three bells used for the occasion included a bell that was used by the Salesians of Don Bosco since 1952, from our Boys' Town days. The second bell was used from 1959 onwards by the Dominican Sisters at our primary school and the third bell began to be used in 1962 when the Dominican Sisters began the first secondary classes for girls at Holy Name College.

Aboriginal Student Program and Reconciliation

In 2019, our program for Aboriginal students continued to grow. We have over 50 Aboriginal students in the College and our Aboriginal students were offered a range of cultural development opportunities, especially in conjunction with TMAG in 2019.

In July, we held our annual NAIDOC assembly in the Savio Centre. Marking NAIDOC is a key event for us in the ongoing path to Reconciliation. Aunty Cheryl Mundy and Dominic College parent and mentor, Angela Triffett were our

presenters at the assembly. Angela spoke with passion and commitment to our students and is a wonderful role model to all students in our community – Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal.

In June, Reuben Oates, a local Aboriginal artist, began work with our Aboriginal students on a unique piece of art that reflects the beauty of kunanyi and the native animals of Tasmania. Our Aboriginal students from Prep-10 had the opportunity to collaborate with Reuben on the artwork and the finished piece was presented to the College as part of our NAIDOC assembly. It is currently planned that the mural will be placed outside of the Oratory Space.

Two Narragunnawali workshops were hosted in our College Library in August. Narragunnawali workshops are designed

for teachers, principals and Early Years educators. It is a program of Reconciliation Australia encouraging Reconciliation Action Plans, professional learning, curriculum resources and encouraging connection to people and place locally. This is one significant way we are contributing resources to reconciliation.

In 2019, the College commenced a process of name changing our K-6 classes and rooms. With Kindergarten classes named more appropriately after native animals, we were honoured to be granted permission from the Tasmanian Aboriginal Centre (TAC) to use palawa kani names for our Kinder classes.

The three classes are now called timita (Possum), larila (Platypus) and tuminana (Little Fairy Penguin). Later, our older

classes will be named after revered saints in our tradition and those named as blessed in our Church so that students will learn about these holy ones whose lives serve as a model and inspiration.

Destination - Japan and the Development of our Sister School Relationship

In April, a group of eleven of our Year 9 and 10 students, together with Mrs Susie Allan and Mr Steve Casni set off to Japan on our cultural immersion, visiting Osaka, Kyoto, Hiroshima and Tokyo.

They also visited our new sister school Shizuako Salesio for the first time and were eager to commence the beginnings of our friendship and partnership. Our Salesian sister school is K-12, with a total enrolment of around 1000.

The students had a memorable and highly successful two night and two day visit to the Shizuoka Salesio school community, experiencing generous home stays for the first time. It was a highly successful people-people contact with our new sister school extending wonderful hospitality.

As part of our initiative to strengthen ties with Salesio, and as part of our commitment to building relationships and connections between our two schools in 2019, we trialed a teacher exchange in 2019.

Our Director of Creative Arts K-10, Mike O'Brien, commenced our inaugural Japanese Teacher Exchange at Shizuoka Salesio in Term 2.

Mr O'Brien was placed in Salesio's Middle School with Years 5-8. He made a significant impression and under his direction, Year 5 students developed a play based on Aesop's Fables for their English Learning Camp in July at Mt Fuji. He was involved in a



range of other memorable learning situations for Salesio.

As we welcomed back Mr O'Brien in Term 3, Shizuoka Salesio teacher, Mr Akihiro Shimomura, arrived to spend Term 3 with us. Akihiro was an amazing Salesian presence across the College.

Whether it was teaching our K-2 songs, playing lunch time soccer, developing language conversation skills with our Year 9 and 10 Japanese language students or rehearsing and performing with our Taiko troupe or Concert Band, Akihiro showed us what authentic friendship can be across international borders.

The Principal of Shizuoka Salesio School, Mr Koji Sueyoshi and I have both agreed that the inaugural teacher exchange between our two schools in 2019 was beyond dreams. Both our schools were gifted with a talented and creative teacher steeped in

understandings of Salesian presence. Our school communities have been enriched and we look forward to the next phase in our relationship building.

The Creative Arts

The Creative Arts continued to grow from strength to strength in 2019. In August, our Senior Concert Band undertook their

inaugural interstate band trip. Thirty-four members of our Senior Concert Band and Woodwind ensembles travelled to the Queensland Catholic Schools and Colleges Music Festival in August with generous sponsorship from the Derwent Valley Concert Band.

This was an exciting opportunity for our musicians to extend themselves in performance and have the experience of a band tour, raising their technical and performance skills. This was a first for the College's Music students and the Band and Ensembles returned home with silver medals.

In another opportunity, the College's Senior Choir took on the role of the 'Children's Choir' in the production of the famous epic cantata *Carmina Burana* at the Farrall Centre in June. The Senior Choir joined with 50 choristers, 3 soloists, 2 pianists and 6 percussionists to perform the cantata. They not only carried this off extremely well but acted as outstanding ambassadors for Dominic to packed public audiences over three performances.

Our elective Dance Program continued to expand. For the first time we had two Year 8 Dance classes of 24 students each, and a Year 9/10 class of 12 students, being the largest numbers we have had studying Dance. Our partnership with Jenina Evans, the Principal of Jenina's Dance Workshop (JDW) has been significant for the College. Ms Evan's knowledge, ability and outstanding choreography is a unique asset to Dominic and we are so grateful for the work she does with our students.

At the initiative of the Parents & Friends Committee and with the ready support of the Creative Arts Faculty K-10, in 2019 we held a new K-10 College Carols to celebrate

Christmas as a community on the evening of Thursday 12 December.

This event replaced the K-2 Carols scheduled during school time. We wanted this to be a wonderful whole of College gathering in Tolosa Park for both our own families and their extended families as well as friends of the College.

Student achievements in the Arts was evident in the full range of dramatic performances including the 2019 Talking Heads, the Music & Dance Showcase and the quality of art works and photography in various public exhibitions.



Course Offerings Diversified

The range of courses available for our students has continued to create opportunities for them to have diverse learning experiences and particularly to explore possibilities within specific educational and vocational pathways.

In 2019, we introduced Cert I VET Hospitality into our Year 9/10 Applied Studies Elective Program with Mr Cameron Golding teaching our inaugural class. In May, the VET Hospitality Class took the opportunity to extend student gratitude to our P&F Committee in the lead up to National Volunteer Week. They prepared and served an amazing three course meal for the P&F in the College Library which was transformed into a restaurant for the evening.

The VET Hospitality Class, under the expert leadership of Mr Golding, ended their year preparing and serving wonderful taster plates for visitors to the College Community Fair in November. These were widely praised and we were indeed very proud of our first VET Hospitality Class.

2019 Science Fair

The College's Science program continued to provide rich and engaging experiences for our students under the expert leadership of Mrs Jane Myers. Most notable was the College's Science Fair which took place in August. The Fair launch commenced with a vibrant and highly engaging K-10 Assembly in the Savio Centre where students were exposed to the wonders of Chemistry by Mr Fred O'Leary and Mr Brad Parkin.

Students had been planning and carrying out experiments in a diverse array of interest areas in the lead up to the Fair. Students spent Science Fair Day showcasing their own projects and experiments and sharing with their K-10 peers the process of inquiry they undertook.

Students thoroughly enjoyed the day and it was also wonderful to welcome some of St Therese's Catholic Primary School students into our Savio Centre to learn about the projects and see the demonstrations by our senior students.

A Hot Air Balloon Comes to Dominic

The culmination of our Year 5 Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) project this year, saw the arrival of an amazing hot air balloon at the College in April.

The Year 5 unit was focused on states of matter and properties of gases. Students had designed and tested their own prototype mini hot air balloons in class and then got to



see and experience the real thing – observing how ignited helium is used to keep the balloon in flight.

The balloon was inflated and ready for a rich learning experience on the main oval and students had the opportunity to go inside the balloon as it was being inflated, and then in small groups, actually had rides in the basket as it was floated upwards whilst being securely tethered.

The incursion, organised by Mrs Barbara Moulton and Ms Michelle O’Grady, explored the basic physics of flight, how the balloon is able to fly and be controlled to the materials and equipment used in this process. The chief pilot and balloon owner gave tips to the students and advice for improvements to the students’ own prototypes of hot air balloons.

Neighbourhood Celebration – The Biennial College Asian Festival

2019 saw the College hold our biennial Asian Festival at the end of October to broaden the perspectives of our students and increase their understanding of different cultures and places in the Asia region.

We continue to want students to be deeply connected to our Asian neighbours and to

appreciate the region as a great place where many will eventually work, study or live.

Our Asian Festival Assembly was the culmination of much learning by students with the Year 8 Dragon Dance display and the Year 4 Taiko drumming troupe being just two of the many highlights. This year the quality of the students’ work K-6 was excellent and the spirit of the festival wonderful in unifying our K-6 students. The activities, static display and the assembly were a great showcase of learning.

Our senior language students were involved in key ways in the Festival. Our Japanese teachers Mrs Belinda Kumashiro and Mrs Susie Allan are to be commended on their leadership of the program as well as our K-6 staff.

Our community understands that Australia is geo-politically, economically and socially part of Asia and we must ensure that our students are Asia-literate and Asia-wise. Students in the 21st century need to be prepared to be citizens of the Asia region and one of the many ways we support this is through our biennial Asian Festival.

Pastoral Care Programs

The College’s Pastoral Care programs continued to be a significant aspect of the



school supporting students to develop their relationships, personal resilience and focus on forming and implementing goals.

There was an identified need for students to be brought together as year groups in Years 7-10 in order to ensure there are strong coordinated processes to induct and develop students as an age cohort within the philosophy, expectations and standards of the College at different stages in their growth. Regular, timetabled Year 7-10 Year Assemblies were scheduled and undertaken within the EMPOWER Program in 2019.

In February, Dana Kerford introduced K-6 teachers and parents (in separate workshops) to a program which focuses on developing self-confidence and friendship skills for our Year 1-6 students. Founder of URStrong, Dana has developed a program called Friendology 101 Junior. Across 2019, we began to embed the URStrong program into the EMPOWER program in Years 1-6 as a strategic means to develop students’ friendship skills.

Mental Health Week 2019

In August, we had a fabulous 2019 Mental Health Week, led by Coordinator of Pastoral Care 7-10 Mr Aaron Davey, the Coordinators of Pastoral Care K-6, Mrs Olivia Stephen and Mrs Allison Lowe and College Captains Maddison Cockerill and Lachlan Rowlands. The week was aimed at

the prevention of mental health conditions in our students, building strong social connections and personal relationships as well as developing a sense of belonging within the Dominic community. The week featured a range of excellent workshops, student gatherings and special treats for students.

Various workshops included Speak Up, Stay ChatTY, self-defence conducted by Dominic Old Scholar Alec Mielke, sessions on men's grooming and women's grooming, nutrition and body image. All Year 8s had sessions on Mental Health First Aid and what to do when a person close to them is experiencing mental health issues. The Little Help Project, including our 2018 College Captain, Maggie Baker, worked with our Year 7s about improving self-care skills and building confidence in supporting their peers.

A particular feature of the week was having Project Rockit, dedicated to creating a safe space and talking about sensitive subjects such as judgment and stereotypes and dealing with bullying.

As part of Mental Health Week, we welcomed Clinical Psychologist, Ms Lisa Ford to present to K-6 parents on developing 'Resilience in Children'. Approximately 70 parents attended the evening workshop which was generously subsidized by the Dominic College's Parents & Friends Association.

Dominic College Outstanding Contribution to the Cancer Council's Relay for Life

In March, we all felt huge pride in our students in Years 5-10 and our staff who formed the 2019 Dominic Relay for Life Team. They gathered for 20 hours overnight on the weekend of 23-24 March, to honour our donors' \$30,000 commitment to the



outstanding work of the Cancer Council and walked hundreds of laps at the Domain for the cause.

The Dominic College Relay for Life Team was established by our inspiring College Captains, Maddison Cockerill and Lachlan Rowlands, and led by the indomitable Mr Aaron Davey, our 7-10 Coordinator of Pastoral Care. Together Maddi, Lachlan and Mr Davey harnessed the energy of our students and staff to be a genuine team, supporting each other and focused on making a difference with our combined energy and resources.

Dominic College has never raised this amount for a charitable cause and we were grateful to all in and beyond our community who gave generously to our efforts to support this cause. It was with great pride that we participated in this change-making event in 2019.

Implementation of Review of Outdoor Education and Camps

Last year, our Deputy Principal Mr Steve Casni led an internal review of our Outdoor Education and Camps Program. The K-10 review team spent time considering our current program and the benefits and drawbacks within these programs. They looked at how we best use our resources

across the whole College. Part of their brief was to look across the educational sector to identify our areas for development within best practice models.

The team developed a very comprehensive series of recommendations for the College Leadership Team to consider and assess. One of these recommendations was the recruitment of a specialised Outdoor Education and Camps Coordinator K-10. We have been fortunate to appoint old scholar, Mr Phil Hyatt into this position in 2019.

Based on the Review recommendations and discussions, Mr Hyatt drafted a new camp framework for consideration by the College Leadership Team. The program will be focused not only on Outdoor Education skills development but will have at its core, outcomes from the Australian Curriculum. In particular, the program will be rebuilt around the General Capabilities and Cross Curricular Priorities within the Australian Curriculum.

The new camp program will be phased in, commencing in 2020 with the re-location of the Year 5 Camp to Port Arthur, the development of a Year 4 Camp and the instigation of a new Year 9 Camp on Maria Island.

Quality Teacher Program - Teacher Clarity

Our 2019 Quality Teacher Program continued to be characterised by constant work on pedagogy and improvements in our pedagogy, linked with scheduled Collaborative Meetings. Collegial classroom observations and feedback continued to be aligned with the formal implementation of Professional Learning Plans aligned to the College's Annual Plan.

Teacher Clarity and the mandatory use of Learning Intentions and Success Criteria were targeted for implementation in 2019. All teachers were asked to begin each lesson with Learning Intentions and Success Criteria with their students and refer back to them throughout the lesson as a key strategy in our focus on improving teacher clarity. This is now a mandatory practice at the College.

Research on Teacher Clarity has shown improved student engagement and academic achievement with such strategies. Learning Intentions and Success Criteria signs (magnetised) have been provided so all teachers can place these on their whiteboards or other suitable places in classrooms so these are visible to students. Every room now has a set of these signs including teaching facilities other than general classrooms.

As part of our Human Resource framework, K-10 teachers were involved in a collaborative process to develop a K-6 Classroom Teacher role, a 7-10 Classroom Teacher role and a 7-10 Pastoral Teacher role description. The Australian Institute for Teaching and School Leadership (AITSL) standards were the basis for the framework for the role descriptions.



International Day Breakfasts

Annually, the College celebrates International Women's Day and International Men's Day with two special morning breakfasts. These breakfasts are a way to connect our students and their parents to the issues facing young women and men locally and globally and to encourage them to use their lives to make a difference in our world. At both events we continue to host an inspiring guest speaker.

In March, we marked International Women's Day with Old Scholar and Mercury journalist, Jessica Sargent (nee Howard), as our special guest speaker. Likewise, in November, Carlton Football Club Player and Old Scholar, Liam Jones joined us for our International Men's Day Breakfast.

Both gatherings raised much needed funds for scholarships for girls and boys to attend school at the Don Bosco High School on the island of Salelologa in Samoa and the Don Bosco Technical Centre for boys in Alufua.

Individual Achievements within the College

Each year Dominic College students take part in the International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (ICAS). Over one

million student entries are accepted from more than 6,300 schools in Australia and New Zealand annually and students from over 20 countries participate in ICAS, organised by the University of NSW.

Two ICAS medals were awarded to two of our Year 9 students



in 2019 for placing first in the state in one of the ICAS assessment areas. Cassandra McLoughlin was awarded a medal for English and Oscar Breslin was awarded a medal for Mathematics.

Year 9 Visual Arts student, Shakira Cate was named as the winner of the Arch's Archies, a Religious Art competition initiated by Catholic Education Tasmania. Shakira entered a drawing of our Patron Saint, St John Bosco. She also won the People's Choice Award for the Art competition.



Annalize Moase, one of our Year 10 students, had an artwork entered in the Royal Hobart Show, Youth Art Works competition,

elevated by the judges to the Adult Art competition. Annalize was subsequently awarded equal first as the 2019 Emerging Artist.

Year 9 student, Harry Breslin achieved our highest Humanities recognition, being placed in the top 1% of students in Australia in the Australian Geography Competition.

Our Japanese teacher, Mrs Belinda Kumashiro was awarded an Australian Council for Educational Leaders (ACEL) TAS Teacher Leadership Award for her outstanding initiatives and excellent leadership in the development of Japanese at the College. This highly regarded award was presented to Belinda at the 2019 ACCEL Awards function in August at the University of Tasmania by the Minister of Education

In our 2019 Awards

Ceremony, we took the opportunity to recognise



two Old Scholars of the school, inducting Dr Brett Williams (Class of 1987) and Dr Melanie Wuttke (Class of 1995) into the Dominic College Hall of Achievement.

Dr Williams is now Head of the Department of Community Emergency Health and Paramedic Practice in the Faculty of Medicine at Monash University. He has been an academic leader in pre-hospital educational research, scholarship and mentorship for over 15 years in Australia and works internationally to improve paramedic education and clinical practice.

Dr Wuttke is a medical oncologist at the Royal Hobart Hospital where she established the Breast Clinic, is devoted to public patient care and support, and mentors junior medical staff. She has embraced support and care for rural and regional communities

and has researched risk reduction strategies in familial breast and ovarian cancers, and trained and presented at peer conferences nationally and internationally.

Review and Re-design of the College Uniform

In 2019, we commenced and completed a major review and re-design of the College Uniform K-10. This has been a significant project and parents, students, staff and old scholars were consulted closely in the review. We worked carefully with Perm-A-Pleat who are one of the country's prominent and experienced designers and our current supplier, in the new design.

Over six months, a College Uniform Review and Re-design Committee worked effectively consulting stakeholders, reviewing feedback data and considering designs and options. As well as the Principal, the Committee comprised: Mrs Nicola Rayner, Mrs Mary Moase, Mr Brad Parkin, Mr Cameron Golding, Mrs Natalie Davey, Mrs Olivia Stephen, Mrs Natalie Diprose, Ms Leesa Baker, Ms Tracey Reid, Mr Andrew Pritchard, Mr Steve Casni, Mr Dylan Chivers and student leaders who were active members of the Committee: Lachlan Rowlands, Maddison Cockerill, Thomas Atkinson, Ella Fitzpatrick, Klay Mustchin, Priyannika Kumrai, Jack Gilligan and Caitlin Stevanovich.

There was strong and consistent feedback that the quality of the fabrics used in the uniform currently needed significant change. The style and cut of the uniform was felt to be outdated and needed to be more contemporary in meeting the needs of students for better fit, flexibility for movement and stretch.

With the constant changes in weather in our region, it was felt that the uniform

had not catered for changes in temperature and managing the regular prospect of rain. There was strong consensus that the uniform needs to be strategically layered to enable students to manage both warm and cold temperatures.

As requested by all stakeholders, K-2 will remain in the Sport Uniform and in Year 3 the Formal Uniform will be introduced. We have worked to streamline the basic uniform items of the anticipated compulsory uniform and added a range of optional items such as a summer dress and a winter waterproof over-jacket.

This is a project that will take the College through 2020. The new uniform will be introduced in 2021 with all students able to wear the new uniform from the start of the 2021 school year. However, the College will have a transition phase where both uniforms can be worn across 2021 - 2022. All students will not be required to be in the new College Uniform until the 2023 school year. We hope this gradual roll out will give parents plenty of time to plan for the transition.

Installation of Rotary Peace Pole

In October, the College held a peace vigil and ceremony, led by Year 6 students to commemorate the installation of a Rotary Peace Pole on the school grounds. A gift from the Rotary Club of Glenorchy, the Pole is now a constant reminder for us to think and act in the spirit of peace to all. It is marked with the words 'May Peace Prevail on Earth,' written in English, palawa kani, Japanese and Hindi.

Dominic College is the first school in Tasmania to install a Peace Pole and this is one of 100 poles to be placed in schools across Australia to mark the centenary of Rotary in Australia.



More than 200,000 Peace Poles stand in 200 countries around the globe, symbolizing the common wish for a world at peace and they have been placed in such notable locations as the North Pole, the Hiroshima Peace Memorial and the Egyptian Pyramids in Giza.

The Rotary Club of Canberra invited Rotary Clubs across Australia to consider gifting a Peace Pole to their local school, if the school visited Canberra's Peace Bell in Nara Park. Dominic College Year 6 students visited and rang the Bell during their September visit to Canberra. This was a memorable and moving experience for them and will form part of our future visits to the national capital.

Thanksgiving for 2019

2019 has been a highly successful year for Dominic College, as we continued to enact our Mission and pursue our Vision. It is with great anticipation that we look forward to 2020, especially as we have commenced in Term 4, our new K-2 development, near our main oval. This is an exciting phase in the life of the College as we begin the construction of new facilities for our Early Years students and staff.

The year has been devoted to planning, consulting and decision-making about the nature and design of the buildings and their internal and external connectivity as well as

Launch into Learning

Now in its third year, our Launch Into Learning (LIL) program has gone from strength to strength as we welcome many new families into the growing circle of pre-kinder learning.

Studies show that the ages of 2 to 5 years are critical in the development of a child's brain. Children who have been involved in LIL sessions of play-based learning with an experienced educator, make the best transition to Kindergarten and school. To have that familiarity of expectations, enthusiasm for learning and ownership of space is wonderful.

This year we were able to offer four sessions on Thursdays and Fridays during term time. All sessions were run by Mrs Linda Douglas, an experienced Kindergarten and Early Years educator. Given our large space for 2019, we could accommodate up to 30 children and parents/carers at a time. We have established a wonderful relationship with Discovery Early Learning (DEL), and pre-kinder children and carers patronise the program every week.

Next year we will offer LIL again to our families for the fourth year. The program is open to pre-kinder children and parents who want to enjoy a family-centred environment. Grandparents are welcome to bring their grandchild if parents are working or ill. Come along and join in the fun!





Teaching & Learning

K-2 Teaching & Learning

Early childhood education is the key to the betterment of society. Maria Montessori

Teaching at Dominic College is full of rewarding experiences every day. Our students provide the most amazing palette of experiences, ideas and wonderings. Our teachers take these and develop an array of activities which support, challenge and extend. This ensures every child is able to learn in their own way, at their own rate every day. Indeed as Maria Montessori wrote, in this way we are developing citizens who will be able to make a mark in their future with the skills they are developing from the Early Years at Dominic College.

Our K-2 staff develop the skills our students need to be successful. Hard work is required to acquire these skills and many opportunities have been provided for every student to reach their potential.

With the introduction of a third Kindergarten this year, we took the opportunity to integrate the Kinder students into our playground with other Early Years students. They have really created a wonderful environment and are highly visible in their fluoro vests as they run around the sandpit and playground. Duty times are certainly entertaining for our teachers and students as they participate in games of make believe with our youngest students.

Hands-on learning is always successful in the Early Years. This year we have investigated and used the outdoors as our classroom. The Reggio Emilia philosophy in our Kindergarten program naturally lends itself to including outdoor learning because of its play-based curriculum, which focuses on discovery and inquiry based learning. In Prep-Year 2, gardening has become an integral tool in Science, MMK, Maths and English as students have tended garden patches in various parts of the school grounds and developed seeds in their



classrooms. Year 1 has had a battle to strike their seeds but eventually with love and care and worms from their classroom compost bin they have experienced success. Visits to Animal Husbandry have also delighted our younger students.

Assessment has many purposes in the Early Years: to identify children achieving benchmarks, to inform planning and determine the success of programs we have implemented. This year our students have participated in AUSPIPS and ICAS. Both of these assessments are conducted across Australia and provide teachers with information with which to develop programs and indicators of student achievement and growth throughout the year.

The results of the AUSPIPS assessment were the basis for the introduction of a phonics trial called Letters and Sounds. It was implemented by Ms Graham, Miss Bailey and Mrs Gray, using extra support from

Mrs Carol Otten and Mrs Alicia McMahon. This enabled the Prep cohort to be divided into five groups consisting of 12 students. This has proven to be a very successful implementation and will be rolled out across Years 1 and 2 as well next year.

One of the most important aspects of the Early Years classroom is the relationships we build and maintain with our parent body. We thank our parents for the trust they show in us to be with their children as we educate them.

We also thank them for their continual support, whether it be in classroom programs such as Magic Words or Home Reading or in our kitchen as we prepare meals. Without this valuable support we would not be able to provide as many programs as we do at Dominic College.

Year 3-6 Teaching & Learning

No one day at Dominic College is the same but every single day is filled to the brim with learning opportunities.

Everything we do at Dominic is designed to help our students become confident and creative individuals who are active and informed and ready to take their place in our society. For students in Years 3-6, the days are filled with exciting, challenging learning activities, caring teachers and wonderful friends.

This year there have been many learning highlights. Some experiences had our students travelling to explore outside locations. Year 3 students visited Molesworth Environmental Education Centre where they participated in activities that complemented their work on special people and places within the Aboriginal culture.

A cruise on the Lady Nelson gave Year 4 students the chance to gain first-hand experience of what life would have been like for a world navigator, explorer or trader in the 18th century. Year 5 students were taken back in time to the early settlement of Australia with a visit to Port Arthur where they spent the day sketching, notetaking and discovering more about the life of Tasmania's convicts.

Year 6 students were excited to hear internationally acclaimed children's author Morris Gleitzman speak in person at the Derwent Entertainment Centre, a real treat after completing a study of his novel, *Boy Overboard*.

Other wonderful learning experiences happened right here at school.

Science Week was a highlight with every student in Years 3-6 presenting to a wider



audience. Year 3 shared their work on living and non-living things with their vertical gardens, while Year 4 provided interactive workshops with a range of experiments that demonstrated force can be exerted by one object on or through another. Year 5 showcased their hot air balloons that explained how solids, liquids and gases behave in different ways and Year 6 displayed their disaster-proof housing models that were wired with working electric circuits.

The Terrapin Theatre production 'Egg' was a delight. Intricate sets, thought provoking characters and an unforgettable story had something for everyone with many messages. Set in a futuristic world, this adventure explored the importance of paying attention to the world around us and respectfully using our resources.

Other learning memories were created in each student's classroom. Teachers designed activities to ensure the delivery of Australian Curriculum content and skills through interesting and challenging learning opportunities that were tailored to meet the needs of each child. Students could demonstrate their understanding and knowledge of their learning in many ways.

Students in Year 3-6 also took part in a number of state, national and international competitions and challenges this year. Future



Mathematicians put their wits to the test at the annual Maths Relay Championships in August. Keen wordsmiths took part in the interschool debating challenge and an intrepid group of Year 4, 5 and 6 students spent time after school and on weekends preparing for the Tournament of Minds Competition in September. Other groups represented the College in Chess Championships and the annual Reader's Cup preparing for both a quiz and creative challenge. Finally, 102 students from Year 2 – 6 took part in the University of New South Wales Numeracy, Reading, Spelling and Science Tests. Overall Dominic students did an outstanding job in these tests with a large number of merits, credits and distinctions.

"Learning Intentions" and "Success Criteria" have been displayed in every classroom. Research indicates this clarity is a vital tool in helping students excel.

In February, students from across the College came together to celebrate their love of books during World Read Aloud Day. Also in Term 1, Year 7 students used picturesque Fortescue Bay as their classroom as they learned to surf, build rafts, explore the beach and hike through native bush. Camps and retreats have enabled students to build bonds with each other and take their learning outside of the traditional classroom.

Many students had immersion learning opportunities this year. In April, a group of staff and students travelled to Japan to explore the culture and participate in Dominic's first homestay with our sister school. A large group of Year 9s participated in the Central Australia Immersion Tour at



the end of Term 3 while a group of budding young writers in Years 7 and 8 headed to Melbourne for the 2019 Melbourne Writers Festival in September.

Closer to home, two teams of Year 10 students represented our College at the Model United Nations Assembly in Deloraine, sponsored by Rotary Clubs. Other students participated in Debating, the Da Vinci Decathlon, Maths Relays and the Tournament of Minds.

Our Music & Dance Showcase, eisteddfods, the Step Up Program, Book Week, the Science Fair and retreats were some of the many opportunities students had to extend themselves.

Year 10 students could discuss their career paths as they toured the University of Tasmania. They also liaised with GYC staff to discuss subject selections and then undertook Work Experience at numerous businesses and institutions throughout Hobart.

There were a large number of Academic Certificates awarded to students from across Years 7-10. These were testament to the hard work and dedication of these students. In September, many students also participated in the annual ICAS English, Maths and

Science competitions gauging their skills against those from around Australia and the world. NAPLAN went fully online this year for our students and a small group of Year 10 students were selected to participate in this year's NAP Civics and Citizenship in October.

Feast Days are a highlight on the College calendar. Students participated in an Academic Challenge for the first Feast Day and this was followed with the inaugural Academic Relay for the second.

It has been a wonderful year of learning with students being offered a variety of experiences by the talented and dedicated teachers at Dominic College. It is rewarding to see our students working to achieve their full learning potential while being innovative, creative and responsible young citizens.

Individual Learning

At Dominic College we recognize, nourish and celebrate the individual and diverse needs of our students. We strive to understand and respond to the individual needs of each student by providing differentiated experiences tailored to their unique academic, social, emotional and physical skills. This involves the development and implementation of a range of strategies focused on making adjustments to the physical environment, modifying content and instructional methods, incorporating assistive technology and developing and reviewing individual learning Plans.

Interventions and support throughout the College are tailored to both individual and group needs. Learning support is provided in a variety of different ways. In the classroom environment, teachers and support staff work collaboratively to develop and implement learning experiences that allow equality of access and participation for all students. We offer a specialised Speech and Language Program as well as Literacy and Numeracy Intervention programs and specialised programs targeted at student health and well-being.

Dominic College Learning Support staff work closely with students, parents and K-10 staff members to provide a strong cohesive support network for our students. We work closely with external agencies such as Speech Pathologists, Occupational Therapists, Psychologists and Pediatricians to ensure we are providing students with support tailored to their individual needs and strengths.

Student progress is monitored and reviewed through observations, documentation of adjustments and the utilization of a range of different assessment strategies. Data is collected, analysed and discussed and then informs decision-making regarding the



individual and collective learning needs of students.

Dominic College participates in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability. This process assists us in providing additional support for students with diverse learning needs who may require a more specialized approach to intervention. Congratulations to all students on the completion of another productive academic and social year.

Another successful addition to the spiritual development of students has been extending the times and days that our College Chapel is open. This year the Chapel has been opened every Monday and Tuesday at lunch time for all students and staff to enjoy some quiet time in personal prayer.

The Salesian Strenna for the 2019 school year was entitled "Holiness For You Too". The call to holiness is a natural part of the Salesian tradition (Saint Francis of Sales). The appeal of Pope Francis attracts attention above all on account of the force and the determination with which he maintains that holiness is a call addressed to everyone, not just to the few, in so far as it corresponds to God's fundamental plan for us. It is aimed therefore at ordinary people, at those people we accompany in their ordinary daily lives consisting in the simple things typical of ordinary people. The theme was taken from

John's Gospel (Jn 15: 11) and encouraged us all to look at the little things we can do as individuals to be a holy person.

Religious Education K-6

In Kindergarten-Year 6, prayer is a highlight of each morning in classrooms. Students and teachers can be seen gathering in a variety of ways to pray every morning. Some of the activities include student-led prayer, meditation, formal traditional prayers, singing, Scripture reflection and prayer circles.

Each classroom has a special prayer space as a focal point which displays different symbols and colours related to the Religious Education Curriculum and unit of study on which each class is currently focusing.

Fr Damien gave students the opportunity to ask many questions and explain the rituals within Mass. English

The English Curriculum has been designed to help students be confident and successful communicators across a range of genres and formats.

Students continue to develop their language skills in order to successfully build on their communication skills in a rapidly developing society. Students communicate with peers, teachers, individuals, groups and community members in a range of face-to-face and online/virtual environments. They experience learning in a variety of contexts that relate to the school curriculum, local community, regional and global contexts.

The year started with a celebration of books across the college. World Read Aloud Day in February gave staff and students the opportunity to share some of their favourite stories and to interact across the year levels. Sharing interesting stories and wonderful characters was a magical way to come together across the year levels to embrace a love of reading.

Students can continue to access a wide variety of novels partly through the generosity of the Rotary Club of Salamanca who donated boxes of quality and engaging novels to the College. These books were distributed to various English classrooms around the school and students have been enjoying the luxury of being able to pick one up to take home or to simply read it at school for pleasure.

We were privileged once again, to host humorous and engaging presentations by



Bell Shakespeare’s travelling acting troupe on Wednesday 22 May. Year 9 students were treated to a lively exploration and celebration of William Shakespeare’s language and words through Bell Shakespeare’s presentation of “Words, Words, Words”. The actors masterfully took the students on a dramatic journey of epic proportions as they discovered some of the literary techniques that Shakespeare used to help make his work so memorable. Year 10 students enjoyed “Shakespeare: The Human Experience”. This show used key speeches and scenes from across Shakespeare’s works to explore what it means to be human. Bell Shakespeare’s actors helped students connect their own experiences with the universality of Shakespeare’s themes and characters.

Once again this year, a small group of Year 7 and 8 students travelled to Melbourne for the Melbourne Writers Festival. Amy Charlton, Alexa Sayer, Maggie Wilby, Briana Shaji, Neena Fraser, Bianca Russell, Heidi Lobb, Sophie Cockerill, Iszaabella Zielinski and Priyanka Jibi were selected through a writing competition.

Australian Young adult writer Will Kostakis presented a writing workshop about belonging and identity at the Immigration Museum. Another workshop was called ‘What is Love?’ In this session writers Sean M Elliott and Jenna Guillaume discussed the different types of love and explored the

different ways authors can approach the topic of love in their own writing. Another session discussed the use of gaming to tell stories while another humorous workshop discussed the worst love poetry ever written. Perhaps the highlight was the opportunity to attend the Victorian Grand Final for the Poetry Slam. 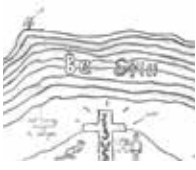
2019 has been a wonderful year for our students to develop and build on their skills in language, literacy and literature as they actively engaged with the Australian Curriculum.

Science

There is no area of study that is having a greater impact on the world today than that of science.

Everywhere we turn, science is having an impact on our lives and will continue to do so into the future. This can be seen in local councils, state legislatures and federal parliament, as debates rage about what we should do about climate change, mining and the mountains of rubbish we produce and leech into the oceans. In each case, different sides attempt to use “science” to back their arguments. It is seen on the streets as groups such as Extinction Rebellion protest against the mass extinction of the world’s species or students strike against climate change.

Once again, all sides are using science to back their positions. Science is a constant presence in our homes as we become smart-device-driven. Should we be eating a paleo diet and should we be vaccinating our children? We need to be better informed to practise our democratic rights at the ballot box or by understanding the impacts modern breakthroughs are having on our lives. Science teaches how to use data to make objective decisions to make rational choices to improve our lives. Science teaches us how to objectively analyze and evaluate evidence.

Science also feeds into our natural curiosity about the wonders of the universe. Science allows us to explore and understand. Can cars drive themselves? Can we predict when earthquakes happen? Where do rainbows come from? Could people live on different planets? These are all topics to be explored as we learn and experience the world of science. Asking questions is the daily bread of scientists who go about answering them in a very special way known as the scientific method. What is important for us to understand is that we can all be scientists in



our own way. We can all dream and wonder and we can all use science to help us answer our questions.

Exploring and experiencing was the purpose of this year’s Science Fair. Students from Kindergarten to Year 10 were involved in investigating, creating and discussing their science projects. It was a true K-10 event with students from all year groups interacting.

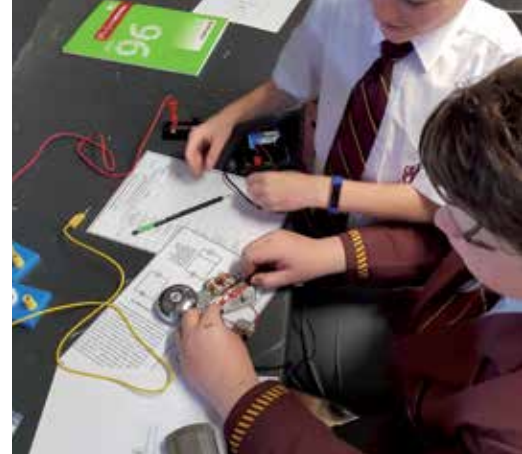
Preparatory students displayed their Weather Experiments. Year 2 students were each tasked with building a toy that could be pushed or pulled. They explained to us the forces at work in making their toys move. Year 3 students displayed their models and vertical garden and told us the characteristics of living and non-living things while Year 4 students got us to explore forces with a variety of experiments. Year 5 students learned about Hot Air Balloons and demonstrated the balloons they had made and the Year 6 students showed off their designs for disaster-proof housing.

Year 7 students were tasked with problem-solving activities for the day and Year 8 students were encouraged to find and

demonstrate a scientific experiment. Year 9 and Year 10 students each designed and carried out their own scientific investigation of which the diversity and thoroughness was a credit to our students. The Science Fair was an opportunity for students and adults to engage and marvel at the wonders of our universe. What was so very special on the day was the way that students of all ages were interacting with each other to discuss and learn about Science.

Many other fantastic events took place this year and the Hot Air Balloon launch was a real highlight. Year 5 students were able to experience feeling the lift of a real hot air balloon. It was a super exciting day for the students who were very engaged. It was a perfect science of learning through experience as students were able to learn about the physics of hot air ballooning and flight.

The Year 9 and Year 10 Physical Science students worked on a self-water system. The design brief they were given was to build a watering system that saved on water and was cheap enough for local residents to be able to purchase and use in their gardens. Students had to learn a great deal about electronics

and engineering to accomplish this task and produced a watering system that senses the moisture levels of the soil which triggers the system to start when the moisture levels drop too low and stop when they are too high. This device is sure to be a success as it will help our gardens grow while ensuring we are not overwatering. What a great introduction to the world of engineering!

Prep students had a great introduction to the world of living things with the help of Fr Damien Sladen SDB. Scientists will often argue about the fine lines between living and non-living but generally agree that all living things need nutrition, energy, they move, excrete, grow, reproduce and are sensitive to their environment. Students were first introduced to these concepts by studying earthworms and comparing them to lolly worms. They then turned their attention to the plant world where they learned how seeds grow into plants and carried out a variety of experiments to see what would affect how they grow. By being able to pose questions and test their results these students have truly taken their first steps to becoming scientists.

Year 10 students took part in the Brain Bee again this year. The Brain Bee is a national competition which introduces and engages the students in the topic of neuroscience. This is a competition that Dominic College students have won on more than one occasion. Congratulations to Alyssa Haremza, Abbie Hayden, Emily Klaffer, Isabelle Lucas, Angelica Matusewicz, Kasey Nikel, Isabella Roberts and Ella Triffett who made it through to the final round of the state competition. Students visited the facilities of UTAS School of Medicine in Hobart and undertook a range of activities, tours and talks that introduced them to the field of neuroscience and medicine.



We often see science and the arts as existing in very different spheres. Kinder tuminana showed us this is not necessarily the case as they had a focus on colour and integrated Art and Science to study this fascinating topic. They undertook experiments with colour where they had to predict, observe and record their process. This was combined with learning to mix colours in art, studying author/illustrator Eric Carle and an excursion to the botanical gardens to explore the amazing colours of the flowers.

Animal Husbandry students did their usual excellent job of displaying our animals at the Royal Hobart Show. It was great to see them showing off the results of all their hard work this year. In addition, the program saw the delivery of twin Nubian goats. What a great program and a credit to the College! As part of the Marine Science component of Animal Husbandry our students went to the Woodbridge Marine Centre for four days, where they learned about marine ecosystems and studied the damage humans are doing.

Some of our Year 9 and 10 students took part in the UTAS Science and Engineering Challenge, a fantastic opportunity for students to visit the University and take part in challenges to really stretch their

problem-solving skills. Groups of students were given challenges such as building a mechanical hand, making a model of a Mars rover or building a bridge which can hold the greatest weight. Not every problem has an easy solution but with perseverance they can be solved. Our students performed very well and made the College proud. The day reiterates that University is not out of reach for any students who are willing to put in the effort.

Dominic College students also put in a great showing at the Festival of Bright Ideas. This is an event that draws exhibitors from around the country with everything from Marine discovery to virtual reality and game-design available to see. The Dominic College exhibit was packed with people learning about the Physical Science watering system, building models of the human body and extracting DNA from fruit. To see our exhibit so busy in such illustrious company only goes to show the quality of the work our students are producing.

What a fantastic year and we are looking forward to more from Science next year!

Mathematics

Maths Week

We also had a number of hands on problem-solving activities like tangrams and puzzles, which students enjoyed completing as a challenge at lunchtime.

In the classroom students continued to learn their mathematics curriculum through engaging activities such as a trigonometry maze, index laws treasure hunt, defusing the bomb math warm up activity and many more.

All the activities were thoroughly enjoyed by the staff and students. Students are commended for their outstanding participation and enthusiasm for the whole week.

Mathematical Association of Tasmania Annual State Maths Relays

This year Dominic College entered three teams from 7-10 and four teams from 3-6, consisting of four students each in the biggest and fastest State Maths Relays, held at Rosny in September.

Teams were entered in all age divisions; Primary (Years 3 & 4), Primary (Years 5 & 6), Junior Secondary (Years 7 & 8) and Upper Secondary (Years 9 & 10) divisions. This competition is organised by

Students also enjoyed challenging the Maths teachers, Mr Harris, Ms Kumrai and Mr Davey, to a game of The Chaser, where students had a head start and all had to answer revealed Maths problems on a whiteboard to move forward or be caught and eliminated by the Chaser. Giant dice and Snakes and Ladders at lunchtime. Students across all years enjoyed problem-solving inside and outside the classroom.

the Mathematics Association of Tasmania (MAT) and involves events in three regions across the state.

Students work as a team to solve as many of the 20 questions (gradually becoming more difficult) as they can in the allocated 45 minutes. Problems are given to teams one at a time (so initially they only have problem 1). Once a team solves the problem or pass on it, they are given the next problem.

Three students solve a problem and one of them 'run' the answer to a marker. Students need to think quickly, co-operate, work as a team and solve a problem (without a calculator!).

It was fantastic to see the enthusiasm of the students, as they worked as a team to solve very complex mathematical problems. All students enjoyed the experience very much.

All teams performed really well. The best result was achieved by the Boys' Upper Secondary team (Ilar Flynn, Max Brideson, Harry Breslin and Oscar Breslin), who were placed second in the State. We are so proud of all of our participants!

Mathematical Association of Tasmania Problem Solving Competition

In Term 1, a number of our students competed in a very difficult State-wide problem-solving competition, conducted by the Mathematics Association of Tasmania. We had 15 entries in the Primary Division, nine in the Junior Division (Years 7 & 8) and six in the Intermediate Division (Years 9 & 10).

This was an extremely difficult competition, with students being given two hours to solve as many of the 12 complex problems as they could. Two of our students managed to



achieve major placings and received both a certificate and a monetary prize.

Priyannika Kumrai was placed first in the Primary Division. Harry Breslin was awarded outstanding achievement certificate in the Upper Secondary division.

Congratulations to all 30 students who participated in this competition for facing up to such a difficult challenge and for doing the College proud.

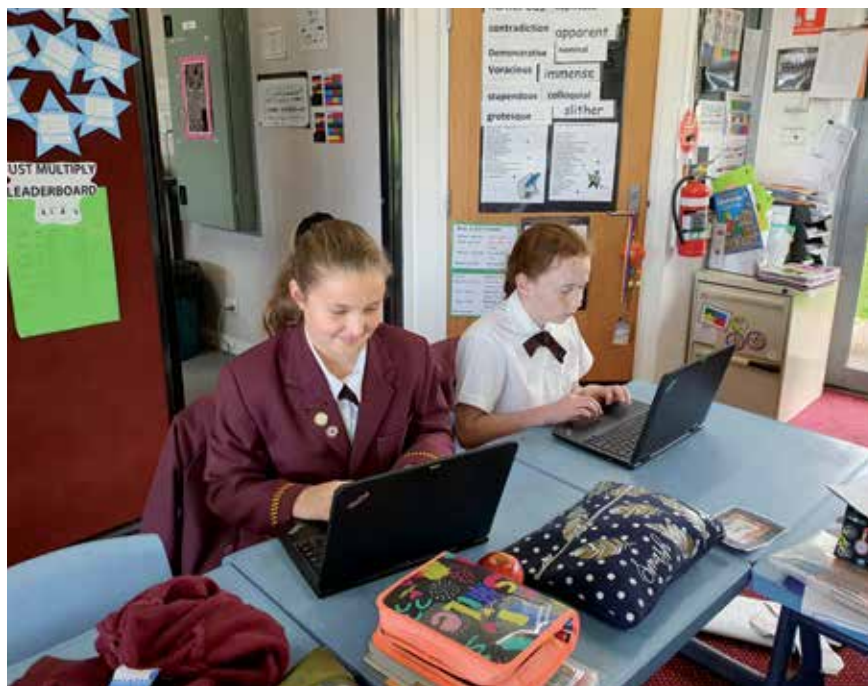
Maths Help

This year our Academic Captains Sarah Fulton, Annalize Moase, Ursula Harris and Angelica Matusewicz were involved in providing Maths help. Each academic leader was allocated a day to be available at lunchtime and help students under the supervision of Mr Harris and Ms Kumrai.

Our Vice Captain Ella Fitzpatrick and Bosco House Creative Arts Captain Sarah Fitzpatrick also provided help in these sessions. Research suggests there are many benefits of peer tutoring such as higher academic achievement, improved relationship with peers, improved personal and social development as well as increased motivation.

These sessions were open to all students from 7-10, regardless of their ability or the mathematics course studied. This service was for students who needed help in understanding a particular mathematical concept or how to do questions they may be struggling with in class or if a student needed help in catching up with any work that they missed due to absence.

A number of students found it particularly useful in the lead up to tests or in completing assignments as well as consolidating their understanding of concepts taught in class.

NAPLAN

In 2019 100% of Year 9 students, 99% of Year 7 students, 98% of Year 5 students and 95% of Year 3 students met or exceeded the National Minimum Standard.

ICAS Maths Competition

This year 31 students from 7-10 competed in the University of NSW ICAS Maths competition. Oscar Breslin attained High Distinctions (top 1% of the nation), taking out the ICAS medal for the top student in the State for his age group.

Harry Breslin and Max Brideson (Year 9), Max Peters and Zoelle Lin (Year 8), all gained Distinction awards (top 10% of the nation), whilst there were nine students who received Credits. We continue to improve each year in this competition,



with a significant increase in the number of students gaining awards.

Humanities

The Humanities Department has enjoyed another exciting and engaging year in 2019, including electives such as Introduction to Psychology & Sociology, Commerce, Geography and Japanese, as well as the core curriculum of Humanities.

Throughout Years 7 – 10, students have been on experiential learning excursions such as to the Tasman Peninsula in Year 8, have worked collaboratively and individually on creative and authentic products, and incorporated Information Technologies into both their learning of content and in presentations and assignments. The Humanities Department has overseen the College observance of ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day.

The Australian History Competition and the National Geography Competition are growing in popularity amongst our students. This year we had over 20 participants for each competition, where students test their knowledge and skills on a national level. We had great feedback and results, with Harry Breslin achieving in the top 1% of the country for Geography.

The core curriculum of Humanities includes both History and Geography in Years 7 and 8, and History only in Years 9 and 10. This year we have introduced learning opportunities to enhance student experience, as well as maintaining effective experiences that have been shown to shape students' ideas about the world around them.

In Year 9 this year, one of our in-depth studies included World War I. To engage the students in this topic we looked at Wilfred Owen's poem *Dulce Et Decorum Est*, which questions the glorious and patriotic perception of war. Students responded to the poem through a process called Ekphrasis, and they produced a range of visual products

that reflected the sentiments and themes of the poem.

Our Year 8 students had a very 'hands-on' year in Geography through a study of landforms and landscapes. Students created models of Karst landscape with sugar cubes, reproducing the process of chemical weathering with water and food colouring. We also travelled to the Tasman Peninsula where we observed and recorded some spectacular coastal landforms through field sketches, annotated photographs, and field notes.

Our elective classes this year produced some fantastic work from students. Introduction to Psychology & Sociology is always popular and includes some very engaging assignments. We look at social norms and codes of behaviour: students are asked to perform an experiment where they investigate the responses of society when an individual acts against the unwritten rules of the community. There are always some peculiar things going on during this task! In the study of Psychology we look at the brain, its functions, and its enormous potential to confuse and fool us, with interactive posters on the complex messaging system of the brain and its components.

In Commerce, students have had many opportunities to investigate the foundations of our economy and the legal system that ensures it functions effectively and fairly.



In addition to the strong student support of ANZAC Day community marches and ceremonies, the College held ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day services during assembly on 30 April and 11 November respectively. These were an opportunity to come together and reflect on our heritage, what it means to be an active citizen, and what we want our future to look like; all key ideas within the Humanities curriculum. We are appreciative of all the students involved in these events, as they are largely student-led. From the student leaders who address the College so well, to the Concert Band and Choir who perform hymns and musical items for us, to the student Cadets who proudly represent the Defence Forces in full parade uniform. We were also very fortunate to have members of the Tasmanian Army and Navy Band give up their time to be with us and take part in our services.

We look forward to an even bigger and brighter 2020.

Japanese

2019 has been a wonderful year for Dominic College's blossoming Japanese program!

Japan Study Tour and Sister School Relationship

Some of our Year 9 and 10 students travelled to Japan in April this year (see the Immersion Learning section of this Yearbook). April was chosen in order to avoid peak travel times with the World Cup Rugby this year, and the Tokyo Olympics next year. The next Year 10 trip to Japan will be in 2021 for current Year 8 students. Year 8 students in June enjoyed a visit from Dominic College old scholar, Ben Dowling (2017), who spoke of his excellent experiences on the 2017 Japan Study Tour and advised students to set their savings goals and put money away in advance.

Whilst this year's tour group was in Japan, they visited our newly established sister school, Shizuoka Salesio. Establishing relations with this school has been a focal point for the Japanese program this year. Students were graciously hosted for two nights by sister school students and their families. It was the highlight of the trip for most members of the group.

Other special developments established this year include:

- A teacher exchange program. Our Director of Creative Arts, Mr Mike O'Brien lived in Shizuoka and worked in Shizuoka Salesio for Term 2, and Mr Akihiro Shimomura travelled to Tasmania and worked in our school for Term 3.
- Year 9 and 10 students of Japanese have begun individual pen pal relationships with students in Year 9 at Shizuoka Salesio.



- Year 4 students at each school have exchanged personal profiles and are sharing videos of elements of school life with each other.

We anticipate further connections in 2020 to mutually benefit our students.

Hobart's Children's Day Celebration

2019 saw Hobart City run their inaugural Japanese Children's Day Celebration in May. It was held at the Botanical Gardens, and strongly supported by Dominic College. Students of Japanese from Kindergarten through to Year 10 collaboratively created large koinobori (carp fish) to put on display. Students from Year 2 to Year 6 learnt a Japanese song and a large group of students performed acapella beautifully. Other students recited speeches, sang songs, and our newly formed senior taiko group performed for the first time.

Japanese Calligraphy

Senior students of Japanese tried their hand at shodou (calligraphy) using traditional brushes and ink. It requires concentration and also relaxation to produce good quality work. The best pieces of work were chosen

by Shimomura sensei, and submitted to the Tasmanian Japanese Calligraphy Competition. Some students received extra special recognition for their work, including Sally Quinn, second place in the Primary School Brush Section; Sarah Fitzpatrick, second place in the Senior High School (Year 10-12) Brush Section; Bianca Russell, second place in the Junior High School (Year 7-9) Pen Section; and Ella Fitzpatrick, first place in the Senior High School Pen Section.

Tasmanian Japanese Speech Contest

To prepare for the Tasmanian Japanese Speech Contest 30 students from Year 3 to Year 9 wrote and memorised their own speeches, then practised their presentation skills. It takes discipline, persistence and determination to deliver a masterful speech. All students from Dominic did an excellent job.

Shimomura sensei assisted students with their calligraphy skills, taught senior students how to write haiku in Japanese, participated in concert bands and taiko drumming groups, coached students for the speech contest, played fun communication games in classes and played sports in break times. He quickly became a friend to everyone, and has been greatly missed since he returned to his own school in Japan.

Dominiku Daiko

Since the P&F generously supported the purchase of our own taiko drums at the end of last year, Dominiku Daiko (Dominic's taiko drumming troupe), has been going from strength to strength. This year saw the inception of Junior taiko, an enthusiastic group of Year 4 students who quickly picked up the basics of taiko playing. These students have practised every week during lunch time since May.

The Senior taiko group began with one experienced player, and some new members. Year 8-10 students of Japanese had their first taste of taiko drumming early in the year, when students attended a concert by professional taiko drummers Makoto Sekine and Morimitsu. Sekine and Morimitsu also conducted a challenging taiko workshop for Dominic students. Students who committed to taiko drumming then used their lunch breaks to practise hard to prepare for the Children's Day event in May. During Term



3, they were funded by a University of Tasmania Asia Institute grant to participate in after school taiko lessons with Hobart group, Taiko Drum.

The Senior students demonstrated their new talents at the Music & Dance Showcase in September, and were joined by Junior taiko drummers to perform the finale at the Asian Festival assembly in October. They also enjoyed performing for the College community at the Fair. The students have developed their Japanese language skills, teamwork, musicality, stage presence and confidence by being a part of this unique opportunity!

Health & Physical Education

2019 has been another amazing year for the Health & Physical Education (HPE) faculty at Dominic College. We welcomed three new staff members with Miss Talia Stopp joining us from South Australia, Mr Phil Hyatt joining the team from Mt Carmel College and our Sport and Rec Trainee (Dominic College Class of 2016) Miss Madison Shaw joining us for a gap year. All three have brought their own skills and knowledge to the team and have fitted in very well. All of the seven HPE teachers in the Department have brought teamwork, passion and commitment to their teaching in 2019 and we are improving the program and teaching every year which is exciting for our students.

We provide activities which are broad, engaging and dynamic with continued emphasis on challenging and stimulating our students in their learning and development in HPE. The HPE Department always strives to provide authentic and relevant learning for all students involved in the program and we have certainly been able to achieve this.

A significant factor in delivering relevant and engaging units in HPE is our ability to secure Sporting Schools Funding which has been very positive and enabled external providers to assist in delivering fantastic athletics, soccer and tennis units in our program, which have been thoroughly enjoyed by the students.

Students from 9C HPE participated in a Hockey Sport Education unit. Athletics coach, Paul Mommers, takes a Year 9 HPE class through a lesson on reaction time. Year 5/6 boys loved the chance to participate in the 5/6 STCPSSA round robin in 2019 which is an extension of their HPE classes. With the emergence of AFLW, our girls have fully embraced every AFL opportunity; our 5/6 girls AFL team participated in a AFL gala afternoon in Term 1 at Dominic, as an extension of our HPE classes. Tennis is a popular aspect of the striking skills unit in HPE. Gymnastics classes are held at HGA Bridgewater. Athletic Development students experienced local fitness facilities, including Hybrid Training Centre Glenorchy. Year 9/10 Adventure Recreation students thoroughly enjoyed the surfing unit this year at Clifton Beach. Adventure Recreation students overcame their fears and embraced the challenges at the high ropes course at Fusion Adventure in Kingston. Mountain biking is a fantastic unit in Adventure Recreation in Term 3. Students utilize the College's ovals and the surrounding tracks at Glenorchy Mountain Bike Park.



Creative Arts

In 2019 our students faced new and different challenges in the school environs and the wider community. They responded with imagination, energy and commitment.

The Senior Choir took the role of the Children's Chorus in a local production of Carmina Burana at the Farrell Centre in June. A group of Visual Art students collaborated on a Mural Project which now adorns the Chapel. This year has seen a continuation of the development of partnerships with Jenina Evans, from Jenina's Dance Workshop, Darryl Beaton's Songwriting Workshop and the Derwent Valley Concert Band Spring School, both of which were held at the College in the Term 3 break.

There were performances in The Oratory Space of Drama and Music and exhibitions of student artworks in Fra Angelico. Assemblies and Liturgies were enhanced with contributions from Dance, Drama, Music and Media students. The year ended with a Community Carols event which was held in Tolosa Park.

On the staffing front, Ms Crummy replaced Mr O'Brien for Term 2 when he went to Japan on a teacher exchange to our sister school, Shizuoka Salesio. Mrs Healy took a position at an international school in Moscow and a new staff member, Ms Scales, quickly settled in and took over the afterschool Junior Drama Club and Years 3-6 and 7-10 Drama classes. At the end of the year, Ms Durbridge left us to pursue her own projects in her art practice.





Drama

2019 was full steam ahead in Drama. Teachers delivered programs designed to give students strong foundations in making, performing and collaborating in Drama practices.

Say it Loud, the Year 6 playbuilding project, produced three plays, all using the same starting point, a suitcase. This prop was emblematic and became something different for each class. In 6A, it was a dangerous object capable of losing you in time. For 6B, it not only released an evil creature, but was a portal to another realm. 6C had a time transmogrifier, allowing you to go forward or back in time to stop problems from occurring. Audiences were very appreciative of the stimulating material. The project has quickly become an entrenched part of the creative life of our Year 6 students.

Years 7 and 8 Drama students took advantage of the range of Drama experiences on offer ranging from developing communication skills to creating Self-Devised and Scripted Drama, Improvisation and developing voice and movement skills. Year 8 attacked the short film unit with energy and creativity, storyboarding, shooting and editing their collaborative products in a tight time frame.

Years 9 and 10 explored Commedia del'Arte, Verbatim Theatre and The Monologue. Talking Heads 2019 extended performance skills and was followed immediately in Term 4 with a two-week season of a Children's Theatre of Aesop's stories entitled, Fables, which was performed for our K-6 students.

At the end of Term 1, **Theatresports** threw together experienced improvisors alongside newcomers to the activity, resulting in entertaining and fantastic fun. In the true spirit of Theatresports, the competitive aspects proved to be less important than the process of coming together and celebrating the skills of all our students. Years 3-6 enjoyed their own Theatresports Competition on Feast Day in Term 3. The Drama Intensive for selected students in Years 7 and 8 was again conducted by Dominic College old scholar, Andrew Casey in Term 3.





Visual Arts

In Visual Arts we enjoyed our second year in the wonderful facilities of Fra Angelico. The light-filled art rooms, the courtyard space that can be utilised for outdoor art making, and a purpose built and fitted out printmaking room, are now a vital aspect of the Visual Arts at Dominic College. The rooms are alive with creative energy as students explore their artistic potential.

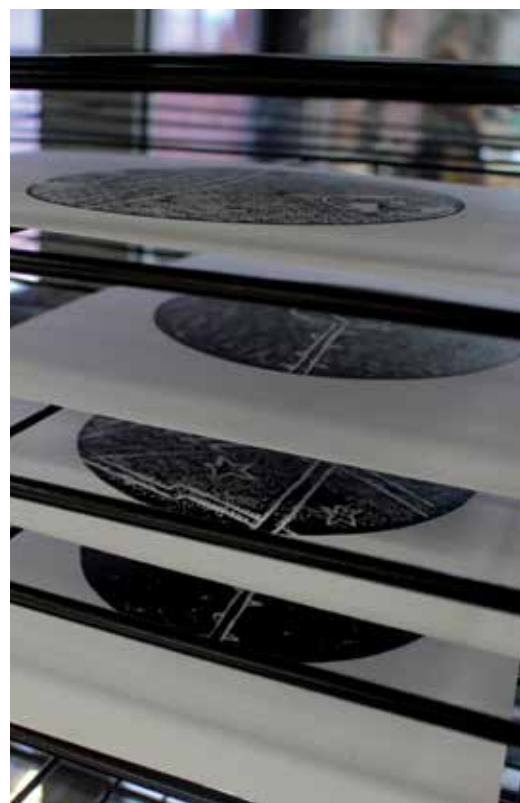
Years 3-6 have come to this inspiring art space to produce a variety of drawings, collages, and mixed media artwork. All our students experience sequential technical skill building that increases the joy and confidence in their creative abilities. Year 3 also enjoyed collaborating with renowned sculptor, Matt Calvert, on a design that is intended to be erected on the Civic Green in Glenorchy.

This year in Visual Arts, Year 7 have mastered the art of intaglio printmaking, taking advantage of the excellent printmaking facilities in Fra Angelico. This is a highly technical process and all students developed skills in producing a drypoint etching and learning all the technical aspects of this complex technique. They also explored 2D and 3D mixed media materials.

Year 8 have had a wonderful year of creative exploration and experimentation in many art styles and processes. Designing and painting a skateboard deck has been a highlight. Students learned relief lino printing and worked on contemporary grid formats with a mixed media exploration that extended their art making skills learned throughout the year.

Our senior elective students have had immersive projects each term requiring them to develop and extend their skills and techniques and challenge their creative processes. Producing major drawing studies, a printmaking portfolio and a painting study, students finished their year with a self-directed project in a medium of their choice. They used their Visual Journals for design, research and critical analysis throughout the year.

Visual Art students were well represented in the Youth Art Awards at the Royal Hobart Show in 2019. Dominic College students who were recognised with prizes and commendations were Jasmine Good, Emma Turner, Aliya Wilson, Daniel Watkins Reynolds, Kyle Curtain, Annalize Moase, Lucas Hoare and Ella James. Shakirra Cate won the Catholic Education Tasmania Arch's Archie award with her portrait of Don Bosco.





Music

2019 was also a year for wonderful activity in Music. Students in the three choirs and three bands have participated in and achieved consistent success in both the Hobart and Clarence Eisteddfods. The Year 3-6 students took out The Rotary Club of Howrah, Primary School Aggregate Award for being the most successful Junior School at the Clarence Eisteddfod, a significant feat. The Senior Concert Band toured to Brisbane to perform in the Queensland Catholic Schools Music Festival, and they are our first music ensemble to travel interstate for many years.

We have again hosted Music Soirees for our 88 instrumental students, there were lunch time concerts performed by the Rock Band and a very successful Song Writing Workshop during the Term 3 holidays, facilitated by international music director Darryl Beaton. The 5/6 Band program has continued to strengthen with many of the students flowing into one of three concert bands. Choirs have continued their success with the 5/6 Choir participating in Festival of Voices and the Senior Choir taking the role of the Children's Chorus in a local production of Carmina Burana. A highlight of the year was the Music & Dance Showcase, where 140 students performed at GYC Performing Arts Centre to another booked out show.

Students in K-4 have been exposed to music making and exploring through movement, listening, singing and playing various classroom percussion instruments. Year 4 students have spent the year preparing for the band program by learning to read music notation and playing the recorder.

The band program in Year 5 and 6 is supported by music tutors, Mark Schmalfuss and John Keenan. They work alongside Martin Smith, our Band Coordinator, to introduce and guide our students in learning their chosen instrument and in developing their musicianship.

Year 7 students learned both the guitar and piano through the year and had the opportunity to play, perform and create music. Year 8 students studied topics such as Blues Music, Chords, Film Music and Musicals, whilst all the time continuing to develop their instrumental skills on their chosen instrument.

Our Senior Elective Music students have excelled in all they have done this year. During Term 1, they studied Australian Music, with an independent study focusing closely on one artist and their music. Every student wrote a very successful song as part of their Song Writing Unit, with three of these songs being performed at the Music & Dance Showcase. Year 10 student, James Lane MacDonald, wrote his piece for the Senior Concert Band and he had the privilege of conducting the band playing in front of an audience of nearly 500 people.







Dance

Dance at Dominic has continued to grow, with the introduction of a second Year 8 dance class for the first time. Under the direction of Miss Jenina Evans, from Hobart's renowned Jenina's Dance Workshop, these two Year 8 classes and our Senior Class performed beautifully in both the Southern Tasmanian Dance Eisteddfod and our Music & Dance Showcase.

Many Year 8 students are new to Dance and have bravely pushed themselves out of their comfort zone to learn new skills, master difficult technique and combine this all together into complex choreography whilst learning the strategies and skills involved in performing on stage.

The 12 Senior Dance students have excelled in everything they have done, continually pushing themselves to extend their technique and flexibility. They have embraced several special guest teachers across the year, along with very creatively choreographing some of their own routines.





Media Arts

There were three Year 9/10 Elective Media classes in 2019. Students immersed themselves in a study of visual image, its power and purpose in the world of advertising, social media, print and film. Students developed skills as filmmakers, producers, script writers, editors and project managers.

Photography featured as students learned how to make a cohesive series or body of work. With an array of opportunities to exhibit and enter various competitions from still to moving image, it has been a busily creative year.







Technology & Applied Studies

The Technology & Applied Studies Faculty covers a wide range of subjects focused on practical and hands-on skills. Students enjoy these subjects as it gives them a chance to use their hands along with tools, equipment or software, to design and make products.

In Woodwork this might be a wooden 'lazy susan,' in Metalwork a tool box, in Engineering they create a metal spade and in Construction they build a saw-horse demonstrating their skills in specific joints.

In Home Economics students learn about healthy ingredients and use these to design a muffin. Students also developed textiles design skills in creating their Sashiko cushions. In Food Studies they design decorations for cakes which results in some wonderful and unique creations. Food Studies students prepare ingredients for Sushi as a part of their unit on finger foods. They begin by focusing on hygiene, safety and knife skills and by cutting the vegetables into julienne strips. Students also implement organisational techniques of preparing and arranging their ingredients, which is called mise en place.

Students in Food Studies in Years 9 and 10 further expand their knowledge through the preparation of more extensive recipes. Nutrition and diet constitute an important part of the course. Students will plan individual dishes by selecting and utilising a range of ingredients and equipment while considering time management and nutritional factors.

In VET Hospitality they learn a variety of cooking techniques and ways to prepare and present dishes. Students prepare and serve meals for special occasions, including a multi-course dinner for the Parents & Friends Committee and a high volume catering pop-up at the College



Fair. Incursions from chefs and excursions to professional kitchens are part of the program.

In Digital Technologies students have been using coding to design games and working collaboratively to design an App while in Information Technology students have made a game by coding it in Python. Robotics & Game Making students have been learning to use Unity, an industry standard game-making product to design 2D and 3D games.

Year 7 Digital Technologies students have shown great determination this year to learn new skills. They jumped right into role-playing calculating binary code and engaged in excellent debates about digital systems and technology. To develop programming skills they were challenged to re-design a Scratch game with some working with Scratch for the first time.

Digital Technologies in Year 8 has been full of new challenges. Students found the mobile app planning project interesting and have some very innovative ideas. There were excellent discussions around suitability, risks and legal and moral implications. The algorithms topic had students out of their chairs and away from computers to work together and think like a computer when sorting data and using a simple binary search algorithm.

Year 9/10 Information Technology students did a Web Design Challenge with Grok Learning, a great online tool for programming such as HTML and CSS. Next they created their own authentic web project such as a website for the Concert Band or web tutorials for Minecraft. Some students have committed to the Advanced level of the NCSS Python coding challenge where they will learn to program Artificial Intelligence (AI).

Year 9/10 Robotics students were challenged to design, build and program Lego Mindstorms robots, reviving the 2015 First Lego League game 'Trash Trek'.

It's been a busy year of designing, making and evaluating these designs to discern if they have met the success criteria for the product.

The Australian Curriculum states: 'In an increasingly technological and complex world, it is important to develop knowledge and confidence to critically analyse and creatively respond to design challenges.'

Our teachers in the Technology & Applied Studies Faculty teach skills and provide learning opportunities that give the students the chance to develop confidence in the world they live in. Students are always so proud of that which they have made with their own hands!

Three teams came together to compete: DC United, Matthew Rime (Yr 7), Abel Vellara Sony (Yr 6) and Ethan Lane (Yr 6), focused on Standard League Soccer. DC Dominators made up of Year 5 boys, Leo Newman, Kyan Cubit, Sebastian Bush and Samuel Anis, focused on Primary Rescue. 'Z' included Year 8 girls, Zoelle Lin and Xin Chan, who focused on Secondary Rescue.

They worked hard and were rewarded by success, gaining places in all their events. Their next endeavour was to enter the Robocup Junior Tas State championship. It was a great day of competition and once again our students performed extremely well with all teams placing and 'Z' being awarded 'Best in Class'. There was no stopping them!

All students worked very hard throughout the competition season, often coming into school in holidays and on weekends to make sure they were ready for the Nationals in October.



Only a small number of teams make it into the finals but our teams' scores showed that they were very competitive and ranked quite highly against the 40 other teams.

It was an excellent learning opportunity, with our students showing particular strength in problem-solving, strategising and team work. Congratulations to our wonderful competitors who are keen to start preparing for next year's Robocup Junior competition.

Robotics: First Lego League

Another group of keen Robotics students came together to compete in the First Lego League Tas Tournament consisting of Year 5-7 students: Lucy Eastley, Juditte Uwineza, Leo Newman, Kyan Cubit, Jacob Campbell, William Campbell and Matthew Rime. They worked very hard over only a few weeks to program their robot to solve challenges and developed an innovative project on an issue relevant to the school community. The students achieved qualification to compete in the Nationals which is a fantastic achievement given the short time frame they had to prepare.

VET at Dominic College

Dominic College is a member of the consortium of Catholic Colleges that offers a VET in Schools Program as part of our elective offerings.

Students can undertake 3-4 units in the following courses:

- Introduction to Construction
- Introduction to Engineering Pathways
- Introduction to Hospitality

The VET process is a very important aspect of a student's pathway to a career of their choice. At Dominic College students who undertake VET are made aware that the workshop or kitchen environment simulates a work place. Key aspects of a real life work place are implemented in the Introduction to VET electives.

As well as learning and developing skills, students are gaining valuable personal skills which are attributes that employers look for in young people. Some of these are:

- teachable attitude
- excellent work ethic
- prepared to do extra
- passionate about their work (task)
- ability to tackle challenges head-on

At Dominic College, the aim is to teach the basic skills very well and develop a career pathway through to an apprenticeship/traineeship, giving the students experience in hands-on and practical aspects of the industry.

In Introduction to Construction students engage in skills such as carpentry, bricklaying, tiling and plumbing. The Introduction to Engineering Pathways course includes practical tasks like welding, fabricating and fitting and machining. The Introduction to Hospitality course teaches food preparation and presentation techniques as well as food handling skills and knowledge.

We encourage our Dominic College students to always aim high and think about post-trade careers such as becoming an Architect, Engineer, Surveyor, Hospitality Teacher, Project Manager and many more options.

A recent survey of employers stated that the top three attributes that they want young people to have are: problem solving skills, critical thinking and creative thinking.

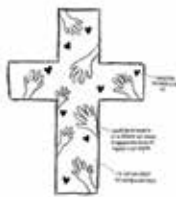
Introduction to VET electives are a perfect way of developing and practising these skills. Students work independently, read and follow plans or recipes and they are continuously encouraged with constructive feedback.

Debating

The art of debating and public speaking continues to develop at Dominic College.

Students from Years 5-10 engage in the deliberate practice of writing speeches, constructing arguments, and speaking in front of an audience. We are growing our presence in the Tasmanian Debating Union (TDU) Secondary Schools' competition, and our House Debating competition in Term 3 has become a well-known and much anticipated fixture of the College Calendar.

We have also been working at promoting public speaking events through Rostrum, UN Youth, and the Ethics Olympiad, which promotes a high level of discussion, team work and critical thinking.

The Tasmanian Debating Union's competition is a tremendously well-organised opportunity for Year 7-12 students. We now have students who have been a part of this competition for four years, and the growth and development in their confidence, communication skills, and critical thinking is clear. The experienced team of volunteers and adjudicators at the TDU provide a wealth of support and feedback for students and the fortnightly debates provide a safe and positive environment in which to practise their skills.

Being involved in this competition is certainly a commitment and I commend the students involved for giving up time for meetings and drafting and preparing speeches. I think all would agree that the most important ingredients for a successful debate are team work and preparation!

The House Debating Competition occurs each year in Term 3. This is an opportunity for those students who don't necessarily participate in the TDU competition to experience the structure of a debate and to learn the basics of debating. Our amazing



Academic Captains organise teams of Year 7/8 students and Year 9/10 students each week. Topics this year ranged from the Mount Wellington Cable Car issue, to the benefits and risks of genetically modified crops. It is great to see such a diverse range of students get involved in this competition, and it is great for them to have teachers and House Coordinators attend to support and adjudicate these debates. This year Bosco House prevailed in both the 7/8 and the 9/10 competition. Well done!

Our Year 5 and 6 students are also involved in an inter-schools competition during Term 2, and this group of students has certainly reaped the rewards in terms of their academic development, examining a range of local and relevant issues and working together to compose argumentative speeches. Once again it is fantastic to see the self-motivation and commitment of these students, travelling to a range of venues after school to compete.

Both of these competitions are hosted by participating schools, including Dominic College. In June and July we hosted the TDU and Primary competitions respectively, showcasing our facilities and involving the broader school community in hosting duties. By all accounts our hospitality is first rate!

Finally, Year 9 student Alexander McMillan represented the college at the Rostrum



Voice of Youth competition early in Term 2. This public speaking competition requires students to prepare and deliver a speech on a range of open-ended topics, as well as deliver a short preparation speech, where they have only 15 minutes to choose and compose their speech. Alexander's composed speech on the topic of 'A Genuine Treasure' was well received by the audience and judges.

We look forward to another year of growth and development in 2020, and hope that even more students choose debating or public speaking opportunities as part of their co-curricular activities.

Year 9 Central Australia Immersion journey

Every year towards the end of Term 3, the now traditional Dominic College Northern Territory Trip commences. This year, 46 Year 9 students and six staff members gathered at the Hobart Airport to set off on this amazing 12 day adventure.

Since its beginning in 2013, the NT trip fast became a rite of passage for our Year 9 students and this year was set to be the biggest and best trip yet.

We started our trip at the top end of Australia in Darwin. We arrived at our camp ground at 2am and the heat hit us like a brick wall, it's fair to say we all suffered a little that night, 32 degrees is too hot for tired Tasmanian travellers!

At 7am the next day, we travelled to Litchfield National Park. Litchfield is an hour past Darwin but well worth the drive. We spent the day swimming at Wangi Falls and Florence Falls. We spotted a baby croc and had our first taste of the top end. For thousands of years these waterfalls were a life source and meeting place for the local Aboriginal clans, and we felt truly blessed to be able to visit and share in the magic.

The next day we met our coach driver, Chris and all 46 students, six teachers and our cooks Fiona and Sabine, piled onto our beloved bus 'Sheila' for the first time and set out for Kakadu. We made it in time to take full advantage of the resort style pool and to set up camp for the next two nights. Whilst at Kakadu we cruised Yellow Water, a wetland highway for crocodiles and thousands of bird species. Our local indigenous guide shared dreamtime stories with us throughout the two hour cruise and taught us how his family use the wetlands to survive. During our stay at Kakadu, we also



visited Nourlangie rock and learned about the ancient artwork that survives there still to this day. On our last night, we watched the sun set at Ubirr rock. We knew this trip was going to be life changing.

From Kakadu we headed to Katherine where we cruised Nitmiluk (previously Katherine Gorge) and even managed a swim in the croc-infested waters (our guide assured us we were safe with him). From Katherine we headed for the Alice, stopping along the way at the iconic Daley Waters Pub, the Devil's Marbles, and Renner Springs where we managed to catch the last quarter of the AFL Grand Final.

One we arrived at Alice Springs we set up camp for a quick one-night stay. We spent the evening getting up close and personal with Rex the Snake man and his 'guests' of the reptile kind.

Next morning we headed for the supermarket and spent \$500 of our Save and Learn grant purchasing fresh fruit and non-



perishable items to donate to Karrke, the Aboriginal community we visit each year. Afterwards, we visited the Alice Springs Desert Park for a birds-of-prey show.

After leaving the Alice, we made our way to the community of Karrke where we were taught about bush medicine and tucker, Aboriginal art, weapons and survival. We felt truly blessed to visit and our students presented our gifts and donations with open hearts and eyes at the end of our time there.

From Alice Springs, we set off for the Centre, Uluru on our minds, stopping only for a Camel Ride and a one-night stay at Kings Canyon to walk the Gorge. When we finally arrived at 'The Rock', we knew that this was the moment that would stay with us forever. For the final three days of our trip, we had this natural wonder as our backdrop. On Wednesday, we walked most of the way around Uluru, we had an incredible guide in Leeroy and we learned many dreamtime stories from him as he travelled with us along the 'Mala' walk all the way to Mutitjula Water Hole. On Thursday, we walked the first part of the Valley of the Winds at Kata Tjuta.

In 12 days, we saw and experienced so much. Perhaps the most important and rewarding experience is travelling amongst friends, through our homeland, and experiencing all she has to offer us as a team. Although we were many, we came back as one, a little dusty, very tired but with hearts full.

Indigenous focus

At Dominic College we are very proud we have over 50 students who identify as Aboriginal students; they are a living connection to one of the oldest continuing cultures in the world.

We started the new school year with all three of our Kindergarten classes being named after animals native to Tasmania. With permission from the Tasmanian Aboriginal Centre (TAC), Dominic College was able to use palawa kani in the naming of the three new Kindergarten groups. We feel privileged to access and use the language in such a way as to educate our students and affirm the unique place of our Aboriginal students. Our Kindergarten classes are now proudly known as Kinder *tuminana* (*little fairy penguin*), Kinder *timita* (*possum*) and Kinder *larila* (*platypus*).

Once again Aboriginal students from Prep to Year 10 attended the TMAG excursion held early in Term 2, titled "In All of Us is History..." planned around acclaimed Tasmanian Aboriginal artist, Julie Gough's exhibition, *Tense Past*. The excursion encouraged Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students to see themselves, their identities and their culture reflected in the Australian curriculum.

Our NAIDOC ceremony was again an important and special part of the academic year. One of our Aboriginal parents, Angela Triffitt was very involved in preparing our students and advising the College on the best way to celebrate this significant occasion. As we entered the Savio Centre students and teachers witnessed a Smoking Ceremony led by Auntie Cheryl Mundy and Angela Triffitt which provided an opportunity for everyone to walk through the smoke together as a community with clean open hearts and minds to better understand, to accept and to invite those gathered to walk with the Aboriginal people of Tasmania in a movement for a better future.



To officially begin our NAIDOC observance, Declan Triffitt-Haney, Isabella Triffitt-Haney and Jolie Everett gave the Acknowledgment of Country spoken in the language of the Tasmanian Aboriginal people, palawa kani. We also had a record number of our Aboriginal students involved in a variety of roles throughout the observance.

This year's theme for NAIDOC was 'Voice, Treaty, Truth.' We were very fortunate to have Auntie Cheryl Mundy take part in our NAIDOC Observance. Auntie Cheryl is a singer songwriter, in English and palawa kani, who has worked for 40 years for land return, and across Aboriginal health and well-being in policy and services development and implementation. She was instrumental in developing the first, and only, statewide Aboriginal community-controlled health service. Tasmanian Aboriginal Activist for Human Rights and Children's Rights, Auntie Cheryl has been actively encouraging a Treaty with Aboriginal people in Australia.

A major highlight for our Aboriginal students was the chance to work on an original artwork with local Aboriginal artist Reuben Oates. Students from Kinder-Year 10 could work alongside Reuben to create a beautiful artwork depicting kunanyi, our local surrounds and animals native to Australia.

On 11 September, Year 8 student, Phoenix Lorbach was selected to participate in the 2019 Youth Speakout celebration, an activity organised by

Reconciliation Tasmania for secondary students aged 12-18. Indigenous students across the state were invited to prepare a short speech, poem, short film, art piece, or musical performance or dance, in response to how Tasmania can achieve reconciliation through voice, truth and treaty.

Phoenix and a selection of students presented their entries at Government House to her Excellency the Honourable Professor Kate Warner. Phoenix's artwork entitled 'We come from the land' honours Tasmania's first people, those who came before us and painted their hands upon the land. It recognises the sacrifice of Aboriginal people through their bloodshed and displacement.

Dominic College also hosted Reconciliation Tasmania again this year. A whole day workshop and a shorter evening workshop, were run with a focus on teachers incorporating high quality teaching and resources with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander focus. Staff from Dominic College and other schools, colleges and Early Learning Centres attended this day.

Relay for Life

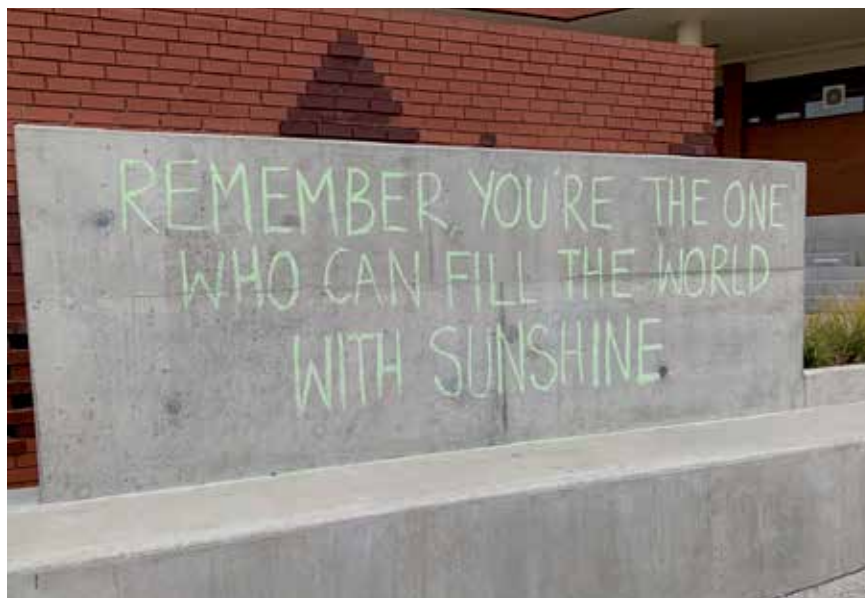

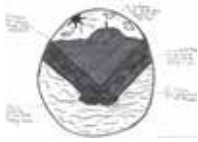
that it was worth it. The next day we walked out from Wineglass Bay and just wanted to get back to base camp.

College Development

Development of the K-2 Precinct

In October 2019, we commenced the construction of the College's new Kindergarten to Year 2 Precinct. This is an exciting development and a significant investment for our current and future K-2 students. The project will improve the appearance of the College and provide our students and teachers with new, vibrant and contemporary learning spaces, to enhance teaching and learning. The development will also provide the opportunity to build our capacity within K-2 to ensure we manage our growing enrolment demand.

The project will be undertaken around the existing Magone, Year 5 and Out of Hours School Care classrooms. The classrooms have been designed in groups of three to allow for an extra stream of students and enable better team teaching and teacher collaboration within the year levels.

There will also be a significant upgrade to the existing Years 5 and 6 carpark and the construction of a purpose built Out of Hours School Care Centre for our students and families.

As part of the building works, provision has been made to ensure there is a substantial upgrade to the adjoining outdoor learning and play spaces within the new K-2 Precinct. These new landscaped spaces have been designed to promote a range of stimulating outdoor play activities and to enable simple transition of indoor to outdoor learning.

All classrooms are planned to be completed by the start of the 2021 school year with students moving into the new spaces from mid-2020. The new carpark will also be completed in 2020 with the Out of Hours School Care Centre completed by the end of 2021.



K-4 carpark and Business Office parking

At the start of 2019, works were undertaken to increase the number of carparks onsite and improve the layout of the K-4 carpark. These works included the realignment of parking near the Business Office, expansion of the K-4 carpark, new footpaths and new pedestrian crossings. These changes have increased the number of carparks by 14 spaces, improved traffic flow and increased pedestrian safety whilst moving around the school.

Excursion Management

Our new excursion management process was rolled out in Term 4 2019. This completes the full automation of our excursion risk management. The system will continue to allow parents to electronically provide excursion consent whilst also enabling the updating of family and student medical details before each activity.

The automation of our excursion risk management will further improve our current process providing our teaching staff

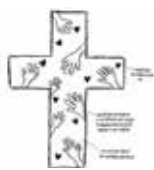
with better risk management tools, access to current family and student information, and improved student safety whilst undertaking offsite activities.

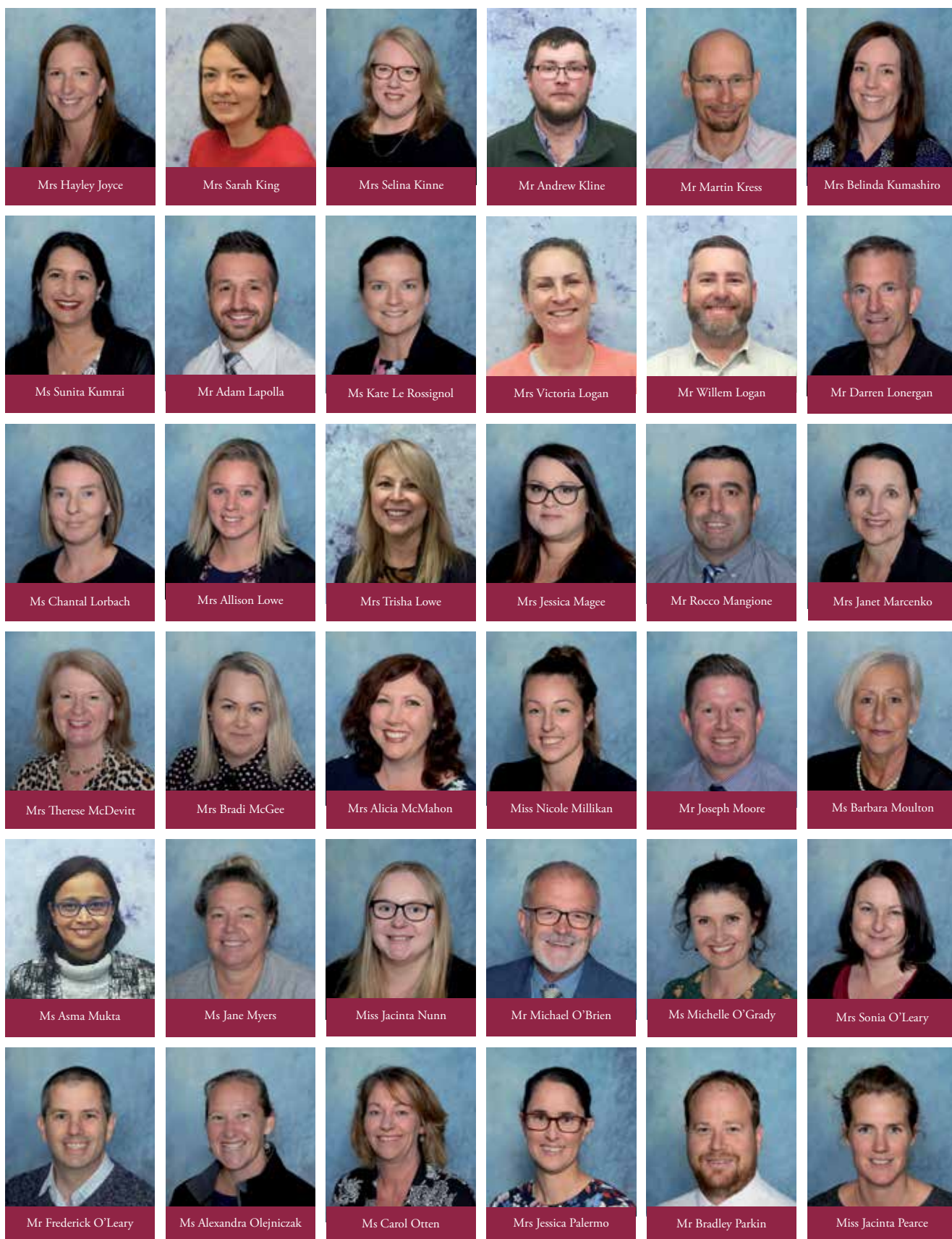
