Welcome to Week 5 and already we are half way through Term 1, 2017!

Drop and Go Zones

I reminded parents last week but highlight again that the various drop and go zones around the campus are the best option to drop-off children in the mornings and collect them after school. These zones work well as long as vehicles continue to move up to the end of the line. Please continue around the car park and join the end of the queue if your child is not at the drop and go zone when you reach the front of the line – do not wait.

I have been distressed to receive reports from staff on duty that some parents have been queue jumping, even driving on the wrong side of the road, endangering children and causing frustration for other parents waiting patiently in the queue. Please follow the process detailed above and be reassured that the first few weeks of the year are the busiest – once routines have been established the volume of traffic will settle down.

Ecumenical Service

Last week, on Tuesday, 14 February, some of our senior staff and student representatives were privileged to attend an annual Ecumenical Service. Many in our community would be unaware that sixteen schools across the wider Sunshine Coast region comprise an association, with the common thread being an overt Christian mission and ethos. Fellow member schools are Caloundra Christian College, Good Shepherd Lutheran College, Matthew Flinders Anglican College, Nambour Christian College, Pacific Lutheran College, St Andrew's Anglican College, Siena Catholic College, St John's College, Suncoast Christian College, Sunshine Coast Grammar School, St Teresa's Catholic College, Unity College, Coolum Beach Christian College, Glasshouse Country Christian College and Noosa Christian College.

The principals of these schools meet each term and discuss a wide range of issues at a local, State and national level. Some may suppose that there is a degree of 'rivalry' between member schools (and their principals) and, whilst there may from time to time be some 'playful banter', the camaraderie is strong, with a focus on Christ-centred education.

However, unfortunately after the calendar was published, we received notification that the Sunshine Coast Show Day holiday will be on Friday, 16 June which means that Term 2 will conclude on Thursday, 15 June (not on the Friday as indicated in the calendar).

I ask parents to make every effort to schedule family vacations during school holiday periods in order to maximise the learning opportunities for your child/ren. It is important that students' learning is not interrupted during school terms, wherever possible, to ensure that critical curriculum and assessment items are not missed. It also places unreasonable demands on teaching staff when they are required to prepare and assess work for individuals outside of the timeframes being followed by the rest of their cohort. Your support in this regard is greatly appreciated.

Lent is a time when many Christians prepare for Easter by observing a period of fasting, repentance, moderation and spiritual discipline. The purpose is to set aside time for reflection on Jesus Christ – his suffering and his sacrifice, his life, death, burial and resurrection.

As we've come to the middle of the term and in the midst of a busy schedule that appears to be an increasingly common phenomenon, I want to share three reflections with you. Three occurrences that have given me food for contemplation.

The first came by way of a letter from a good friend in Germany. He was writing about events surrounding a major birthday he'd celebrated with friends and family. In conclusion, he formulated his own reflections as follows, **"I am a wealthy individual: my wife, our children, my profession and the love of shared singing that connects me to friends."**

'Yes!' I thought. 'Me too.'

Then, with the youngest children in our community, I did the Godly Play story of Creation. We began by wondering together about the biggest present we've received. But some gifts are so big we tend to overlook them. It pays to go right back to the beginning, or even a little before that: **"In the beginning, God gave us the gift of light...of water,... of dry land for plants to grow, ... of day and night and a way for us to mark time, ... all the creatures, in the water, in the air, on land... and a day to rest, on which to remember all the other gifts."**

'Yes,' I thought, 'precious gifts, all of them.'

A week or so ago, I went to visit a friend who is terminally ill with cancer. It had been some months since I saw him last, and meeting him in his lounge room that day, I was taken aback at how he'd changed. But his eyes were calm. And as we sat on the back patio with his wife, their children joining us as they arrived home from school, the chooks begging for scrumptious morsels and our conversation covering, amongst other things, his imminent birthday, the palpable composure and serenity of my friend spoke more than any words might've done.

"I will praise the Lord. I won't forget anything he has done for me." Psalm 103, 2

The wealth that truly matters, I realise, goes much deeper than even the biggest physical gift.

Impatience is an uncomfortable feeling – the jangling of a body and mind that are used to moving with pace through life, unwilling to idle for a moment. Impatience is also uncomfortable for those around us. It is frequently rude and self-focused and tunnel visioned. Impatience involves a narrowing of our perspective and tells us the lie that we can only be satisfied once that which we are seeking is granted. Technology breeds it, I think.

We no longer have to wait to express our opinion or vent our frustration. Electronic devices are our cure for the discomfort and discontent of impatience. Emails or texts can be fired off instantly, like powerful shots of steam that release the pressure rising from our own internal state and pump it straight into that of someone else. Instant relief for us. Instant pressure for the recipient.

Impatience disconnects. It prevents us from seeing the big picture and it rarely offers kindness or compassion. As I sit here tapping my fingers, watching the clock, I remind myself that this minute in which I am waiting can be a minute of gratitude, a minute in which I can take a breath or two, a minute to feel the ground under my feet, a minute to notice the sky. It can be a minute of peace . . .

Ah - finally! She is here! Gotta go!!

Karneval

Karneval (also called Fasching or Fastnacht) is a festival celebrated in many parts of Germany in the lead up to Lent. It has now also become a tradition at Immanuel Primary School. Monday, 27 February from 9.00am to 10.50am will see the College transformed as children and adults dress up for a costume parade followed by a range of engaging activities during the morning session. German speakers will come in to help with many tasks, so it will be both a cultural and language experience. All parents are most welcome to join the fun, regardless of language ability. Parent helpers would also be appreciated to assist in preparing for and running a Year 5 activity on the day.

Suitable costumes and masks will be discussed with children during German lessons. These include clowns, jesters, pirates, cowboys, Indians, firemen, policemen, astronauts, doctors and nurses (in fact any kind of job), princes and princesses, faeries, elves, mermaids and creatures (animals, birds and insects of all types). Characters from movies, television, computer games and books are not appropriate for this festival.

Children will be wearing their costumes all day so careful thought will be needed to ensure they are comfortable and able to manage their school tasks as well as meeting requirements for safety and dress code. Please avoid costumes that restrict normal movement including sitting down as well as those which are too hot to be worn in summer. Costumes also need to include appropriate footwear and provide sun protection (shoulders and midriffs should be covered). Sending cardboard or foam alternatives instead of sharp items like plastic swords will improve the safety of your children.

Creating a costume and mask should involve little or no expense but lots of imagination. Those children who need help will be able to collect a mask template from me. A search through your dress-up cupboard and a rummage through material and craft scraps should provide most of what is needed to make for a great day. Thank you for your support and assistance in making our Karneval exactly what it should be about – fun! Alaaf!

The exams are open to high achievers in Years 10 and 11 who have high aspirations in science and enjoy a challenge. The two-hour exams are challenging and test biology, chemistry, Earth and environmental science, and physics, and include a variety of question formats. They are a great way to test knowledge of scientific concepts and their application in contemporary contexts, critical thinking and problem-solving abilities, and skills of scientific inquiry. Students are welcome to attend Science Club and work towards either a CREST or SPECTRA award.

CREST enables students to experience the exciting world of scientific research and technological development through a structured program that supports them in choosing, organising and undertaking their own open-ended experimental science or technology project. Students complete a creative and original project that involves experimentation (for science projects) or design, construction and appraisal (for technology projects) under the guidance of a supervising teacher. Their project should have an application to the everyday world. CREST supports the Science Inquiry Skills strand of the Australian Curriculum and aligns with the Science as a Human Endeavour strand. Three award levels are available – bronze, silver and gold. For more information click [here](#).

SPECTRA aims to get students excited and interested in working at a series of science activities which:

- Are assessed by you and the teacher by taking into account your knowledge of what is a good standard for the student;
- Are well within the capability of average students;
- Encourage student initiative, either individually or as part of a group;
- Provide a tangible reward;

Students carry out a range of practical and observational activities, research, experiments and projects. When the required number of activities has been completed to the satisfaction of the teacher, the student is awarded a certificate and a badge. For more information click [here](#).

How to manage devices at home – online safeguards

During the school day when students are on the Immanuel network, we have various means to help students make appropriate use of their devices. This includes the filtering of internet sites for websites that are inappropriate and teacher monitoring of student devices via software as well as good old-fashioned physical observation.

However, once students take their devices home, these safety features are no longer active. There are many reasons why parents would want to manage devices at home. In a national survey conducted last year, 60% of parents of 8 to 17 year olds reported that their child is exposed to risks from being online. (Source: The Office of the Children’s eSafety Commissioner). Concerns included contact with strangers, excessive use and accessing inappropriate content. There is every reason to be concerned about such matters. For example, current research indicates that “three-quarters of 16-year-old boys are using pornography weekly or more often and the mean age at which they first look for it is 12 years. Over 60 per cent of girls have seen porn by the age of 16.” (Source: www.heraldsun140ct2016).

It’s common knowledge that the best way to manage devices at home is to have children use them in a common area of the house rather than in bedrooms. This, together with having frequent conversations about the hows and whys of staying safe, is paramount. However, it’s impossible to monitor the use of devices 100 percent of the time. A way to help manage devices at home is to set up parental controls. Note, the following suggestions come from The Office of the Children’s eSafety

Ways to set up parental controls

1. Hardware - through your router/modem (FREE)

Set up parental controls within the router itself, in order to restrict access to certain types of internet content. This will protect every device in your home, instantly.

To do this Immanuel Lutheran College recommends that you make use of the FREE **FamilyShield** service provided by the company **OpenDNS**.

FamilyShield is a completely free service that can be set up in minutes and blocks pornographic content, unsafe websites such as phishing sites attempting to trick people into readily providing personal and financial information, and many virus-spreading malware

sites. FamilyShield takes effect instantly and can protect all Internet-connected computers, gaming consoles and Wi-Fi devices in a household. (Source: OpenDNS).

To use FamilyShield, you will need to change the DNS server entries on the router to: **208.67.222.123 and 208.67.220.123**. If need be, contact your Internet Service Provider to learn how to do this. For further information about how to set up OpenDNS click [here](#).

2. Internet Service Providers (Possible small fee)

Some internet service providers offer parental controls to their customers either for a small fee, or free of charge. Some examples are provided below. However, your internet service provider may be able to assist further. For more information about Telstra, Optus and Vodafone, click [here](#).

3. Search safely. (FREE)

To find out how to set up searching in safe mode, click [here](#). Remember that you will need to do this for ALL web browsers on the device (Firefox, Chrome, Internet Explorer, Microsoft Edge, Safari etc).

Please note that while it is possible to purchase parental control software for individual devices, that this may not be compatible with the College’s internet security system.
