Dear Marist Family,

Reports – praise effort, not talent

In 1998, Carol Dweck took 400 eleven-year-olds and gave them a series of simple puzzles. Afterwards, each of the students was given their score, plus something else: six words of praise. Half the students were praised for intelligence and the other half were praised for effort. Dweck was seeking to test whether these simple words, with their subtle different emphases, could make a difference to the students' mindset; whether they could mould the students' attitude to success and failure; whether they could make a measurable impact on persistence and performance.

The results were remarkable.

After the first test, the students were given a choice of whether to take a hard or an easy test. Two-thirds of the students praised for intelligence chose the easy task; they did not want to risk losing their smart label by potentially failing at the hard test. However, 90% of the students praised for effort chose the tough test; they were not interested in success, but in exploring a potential fruitful challenge. They wanted to prove just how hard-working they were.

Next, the students were given a test so tough that none of them succeeded. Once again, there was a dramatic difference between the ways they responded to failure. Those praised for intelligence interpreted their failure as proof that they were not good at puzzles. The group praised for effort persevered on the test far longer, enjoyed it far more, and did not suffer any loss in confidence. Finally, the experiment came full circle, giving the students a chance to do a test of equal difficulty to the very first test. What happened? The group praised for intelligence showed a 20% decline in performance compared with the first test, even though it was no harder. Interestingly, the group praised for effort increased their score by 30%; failure had actually spurred them on.

All of these findings resulted from the difference in six simple words spoken after the very first test.

Dweck was so stunned by these results that the experiment was repeated three times with students in different parts of the United States and with very different ethnic backgrounds. On all three occasions the results were identical. Dweck concluded that 'praising children's intelligence harms their motivation, and it harms their performance.' The reason is not difficult to find: intelligence-based praise orientates its receivers towards a fixed mindset; it suggests to them that intelligence is of primary importance rather than the effort through which intelligence can be transformed. Furthermore, it teaches them to pursue easy challenges at the expense of real learning.

Dweck's findings remind parents that their discussions on their son's semester report should first and foremost focus on their son's effort, rather than achievement. The key is to praise effort, not talent. Parents should emphasise how abilities can be transformed through application and that challenges should be viewed as learning opportunities rather than threats. Finally, students should interpret failure not as an indictment but as an opportunity.

If your son's report indicates that effort is below standard, then you have something to work on. If your son is putting in the required effort, then you cannot ask more than that, regardless of the grading. It is also worthwhile viewing your son's progress as a member of a social setting. We know boys are generally very honest and will give a realistic assessment of their progress. They can, if encouraged, be very perceptive so take note of their opinion. We know when students are encouraged to assess their own progress they are more able and motivated to make the necessary changes to improve their academic outcomes.

We are currently working with Transport Canberra to ascertain exactly how these changes to school bus services will affect Marist students from 2019. When we have greater clarity surrounding the proposed changes, we will communicate with all parents so that there will be ample time to prepare for what is likely to be a significant change to school services to and from the College. 2018 NATIONALLY CONSISTENT COLLECTION OF DATA ON SCHOOL STUDENTS WITH DISABILITY

Independent schools, along with catholic and government schools across Australia, will again be participating in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). Our involvement in this process is crucial as it will provide valuable information about support required for a broad group of students in our schools.

The NCCD will enable National and State governments to better target support and resources in schools. This in turn will help all schools to access support for all students with additional needs.

The NCCD is not limited to students with diagnosed disabilities. It uses a very broad definition of disability, taken from the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992*

and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, which includes a range of health issues and learning difficulties where schools implement strategies to support students in participating effectively in their learning.

The Data Collection will take place in August. No personal or identifying information about any student will be included. However, if you decide you do not wish information about your child to be included in the NCCD, please do not hesitate to contact Jen Croker in the Enrichment and Learning Support Department to discuss your concerns.

FROM THE HEAD OF JUNIOR SCHOOL

Dear Parents and Carers

One of the earliest documents in the Marist world is the book called 'Constitutions and Statutes'. This book provides for us an essence of the charism set out by the early Brothers founded on the work and letters of St Marcellin to the early communities of Brothers. This core document maps for us how we might establish and continue as a vibrant lay Marist community here at the College. The qualities described below in 'Constitutions' provide for me and for us a reassurance that our actions and words are deeply rooted in the Marist charism and work in the care of service of others.

"The three Marial virtues of humility, simplicity, and modesty come to us from Marcellin Champagnat. These virtues give a quality of authenticity and kindness to our relationships with our Brothers and with other people, we meet. We willingly put our lives and our talents at the service of the Church and of the world, doing good quietly. We are aware of our limitations, yet, trusting in God and in Mary; we can undertake difficult tasks and carry them through to a successful completion, as the Founder did..." (Constitutions and Statutes: 5).

The last few weeks have sadly reminded us of the fragility of life and indeed the gift that our mothers are to each one of us. I know that as a Marist family many people have reached out in loving, practical support, care and love for a number of families that are experiencing illness, difficulty and loss. I thank each of you for the support and concern that you show for one another. Together as a family we can be, and are, strong.

I am pleased to let you know that enrolment offers for 2019 have been mailed to families keen to join the College in the Junior School. We have been able to offer places in Years 4, 5 and 6 next year. The process of application and interview has again reinforced for me the outstanding regard that the College is held in in the local (and wider) scene. All speak glowingly of the school as a whole and are impressed by our boys and the image they put forward as

confident, well-mannered, all-rounders. If I were to summarise the positives from interviews to some main themes I would put forward the following.

MARYMEAD'S 'BUY-A-BRICK' APPEAL

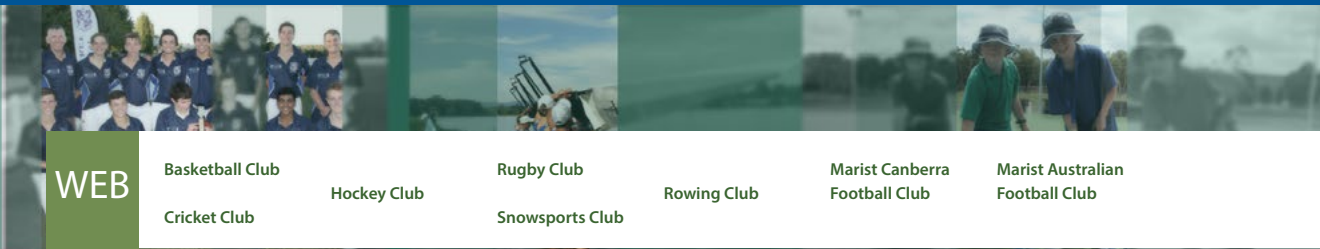
