Enrolment Policy

Northside Christian College is a school for Christian families – we respect all Christian denominations and require our families to respect, accept and encourage your children to participate in the Christian education and practices of the College.

Application (one per child)

We invite you to submit your application online.
www.northside.qld.edu.au/application

Supporting documents:

- Pastor/Minister's Reference detailing your family's attendance and involvement within your local Christian Church (Compulsory)
- Copy of Birth Certificate/Extract (one per child)
- Copies of the two most current Academic Reports (including NAPLAN if applicable)
- All other information required as requested in the Application Forms (e.g. – medical, specialist, paediatrician)
- A non-refundable \$50 Application Fee (per child) – which applies to all applications

Once submitted, your application will generally be acknowledged within two (2) working days.

Application processing

Several factors are taken into consideration when determining if the applicant will be offered an interview.

- Availability of a suitable place
- Christian commitment/Church involvement
- Academic and behavioural history, including Educational Support needs
- Capacity to pay fees
- Siblings or previous family enrolment at the College

Interview

When the required information is complete, an interview with the Enrolment Panel may be offered. Alternatively, an applicant is notified that the application is unsuccessful. Interviews typically take place up to two years in advance of anticipated commencement date, except in Prep, where interviews are conducted 12 months prior to the anticipated commencement.

Additional information and another interview or testing may be required prior to a decision being made. Should an offer of a place result, this will be communicated in writing by a Letter of Offer.

Letter of Offer

The applicant will receive a Letter of Offer OR a letter advising the application is unsuccessful. Letter of Offer/Enrolment Contract is to be signed and returned within the specified period along with Enrolment Confirmation Fee.

Starting school

Closer to the date of your child(ren)'s commencement (usually within 90 days), you will receive further information regarding Family Administration Day, uniform shop, book lists, instrumental lessons, bus routes and fees. An orientation morning for all new starters is scheduled at the beginning of the year of commencement. This program is for new students and all Year 6 students. Also, the Year 9 and 12 students undertake a leadership program.



Our History & Governance

Northside Christian College was founded in 1985 as a ministry of Nexus Church (formerly Northside Christian Church) in order to provide a high quality education that would partner with and support the values of Christian families.

The Directors of Northside are appointed by Nexus Church and are responsible for the spiritual, legal and financial oversight of the College. Managerial responsibility for the College's operations is delegated by the Directors to the Principal.

A Christian Education

We believe that a Christian is a person who has made Jesus Christ both Saviour and Lord of his/her life. That is, a Christian is a person who:

- believes that Jesus Christ, God's only Son, died and rose again
- has recognised his/her sinful condition
- has received forgiveness of his/her sins through faith in Jesus Christ and
- seeks to live his/her life in obedience to God's Word.

Christianity is, in essence, an ongoing relationship with God – not just a Sunday morning event, but a way of life.

The Northside community is enriched by students from more than 100 churches of various denominations, although the majority comes from evangelical, charismatic or pentecostal churches.

The style of worship at the College is contemporary. As far as possible, students are the musicians, singers and leaders of worship and chapels.



Staffing

All teaching staff are fully qualified to teach and are registered with the Queensland College of Teachers.

It is an expectation that all employees at Northside are committed Christians and are actively attending a local Christian Church. We believe that values and lifestyles are more 'caught than taught'. Our staff are able to role model the Christian life for our students.

Faith in Action

One of the pillars of Northside Christian College is discipleship—older believers inspiring the younger.

Discipleship happens in the classroom as well, where students explore the tenets of the Christian faith. But it doesn't stop with facts and verses. Northside Christian College challenges its students to put action to their words and beliefs. They are encouraged to live lives that bring glory to God, care for His creation, and spread His love to the people around us.

Developing Servant Hearts

Service opportunities are wonderful experiences for students to grow in their faith and confidence. Students support World Vision sponsored children. Middle School students visit nursing homes and collect food items and practical goods for the needy. On Friday evenings, the Senior School Street Ministry Team cooks up a weekly barbecue for the homeless and lonely in Fortitude Valley. The College Chaplain oversees the spiritual life of the College, coordinating chapels, staff devotions, and Christian education.

Worship & Prayer

Northside Christian College's vibrant chapels bring worship to the school week. As the students advance through the school, they take on increasing amounts of leadership of the chapels. While younger children enjoy age-appropriate songs and lessons, older students contribute as singers, musicians, speakers and technicians to deliver meaningful worship services through prayerful collaboration. Students experience prayer throughout the day in class and in voluntary lunchtime discipleship groups.

Preparatory is based on active learning and investigations. It is the first year in the Early Phase of Learning, which spans from Prep to Year 2.

Our Prep classes share access to Junior School resources and participate in specialist classes such as physical education, music and library.

Full-time attendance, the curriculum content, teaching methodology and learning environment combine to provide a gentle, effective transition between informal pre-schooling and the start of the formal schooling phase of education.

The Prep curriculum provides opportunities for children to:

- listen, respond to and give directions
- develop their oral language, literacy and numeracy skills
- become independent thinkers and problem solvers
- learn how to cooperate with others, and
- develop physical coordination skills.

The Middle School caters for the unique needs of early adolescent learners (Years 7-9) and provides a supported transition from primary to secondary education. The Middle School recognises that these students are no longer young primary children, nor do they have the same interests and needs as older secondary students.

The main features of the Middle School include:

- a curriculum designed to engage young adolescent learners in the context of a strongly pastoral, Christian environment
- a leadership program – teacher and student-led programs providing social interaction and development opportunities
- life skills lessons on resilience and personal development
- specialist teachers and facilities
- Middle School Educational Support staff available to support identified students requiring assistance
- design thinking program and Challenge-Based Learning (CBL)
- opportunity for participation in a range of academic competitions (e.g. ICAS International Competitions and Assessments for Schools for computing, mathematics and science)
- dedicated Middle School form room
- gender streaming across Year 7 and some subject areas
- separate Middle School chapels
- regular assessment and reporting to parents
- participation in inter-house and interschool sporting carnivals
- participation in the Inter-Collegiate sporting carnivals



A Staged Introduction to Secondary Schooling

Year 7 students are taught core subjects in their home room by their form Teacher and one or two other teachers. They also have specialist teachers for music, physical education, drama, dance, Innovation and Discovery (art and computing), home economics, and design technology.

The Year 8 program is similar except students have a slightly expanded curriculum that includes graphics, digital information & technology, and languages (French and Japanese).

Year 9 students study the core subjects of English, mathematics, science, social science, and Christian studies. In addition, they study six elective subjects (for one semester each), such as business and information technology, Challenge-Based Learning, design technology, information & software technology, languages, performing arts, physical education, science extension and visual arts.

Northside believes that Year 10 is an important preparatory year for Year 11 and 12 studies. Consequently, the Year 10 program is identical in structure to the Year 11/12 program. This gives the students more time in each subject and greater choice over their study program than is usually the case.

All students from Year 10 to Year 12 study six subjects or qualifications plus Christian studies and life skills. Christian studies feature biblical studies and apologetics while life skills incorporates study skills, emotional and social wellbeing, digital citizenship and cybersafety, media skills, financial wisdom, personal development and more.

Senior students also have time allocated to career education and Core Skills Test preparation.

The main features of the Senior School include:

- a strong pastoral care program
- curriculum accredited by the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority
- specialist teachers and facilities
- career guidance
- a vocational education program including work placement, school-based apprenticeships and school-based traineeships
- flexibility to study TAFE courses or certificate courses either on campus or off site
- inter-house and interschool sporting carnivals
- weekly team sport for Year 10 with other team sport opportunities for Year 11/12 students
- opportunities in external academic competitions.



Camping Program

All grades from Year 3 to Year 12 attend an annual camp.

Camps create the perfect balance of challenge and fun where students collaborate to discover hidden strengths and build resilience. At the same time, students develop perseverance, responsibility, confidence, positive attitudes, and interdependence.

Northside Christian College equips students with the best technology skills for future employment in an increasingly competitive globalised economy. The program offered at Northside aligns with our Christian values and partners with families, supporting parents in managing technology in the home.

Junior School students gain important skills in the computer lab and their classrooms. Interactive whiteboards form part of I.T. lessons and daily tasks.

Students in Middle and Senior School receive a college-owned Chromebook laptop. The Chromebook program maximises students' educational outcomes by:

- providing systems that are ready for new online assessments including NAPLAN and Senior School assessment
- allowing for collaboration in the classroom through *G Suite for Education*
- using tools preferred by universities and corporate business
- promoting use of web-based resources not limited by device.

Infrastructure

The College campus has an excellent network infrastructure in place. A high quality dedicated internet connection provides fast internet throughout the College. Each building is connected by fibre-optic cable allowing maximum connectivity and network access. All College computers are networked and students enjoy using the high capacity and high speed wireless internet inside and out of the classroom.

While GoGuardian provides world-leading 24/7 cyber-safety protection for our students, we have also developed a number of resources to help both students and parents make the most of learning opportunities while staying cyber-safe.

Code of Conduct

The College aims to be a Christian community distinguished by love for God and love for one's neighbours as oneself. In particular, our students are expected to act responsibly and respectfully, to maintain a godly standard of living, to take full advantage of the educational opportunities afforded them through the College and to adhere to guidelines set down for them.

These expectations are published and made available through College policies and Student and Parent Handbooks. The College refers to these expectations and guidelines as *The Code of Conduct*, which is worded in age-appropriate language.

Curriculum & Academic Record

Curriculum

From Prep to Year 10, our curriculum aligns with the requirements of the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA), including implementation of the Australian Curriculum.

In Years 11 and 12, all educational programs are developed from syllabuses accredited and published by the QCAA and are moderated by the QCAA or by a Registered Training Organisation delivering a Certificate Course of Study.

Students are issued with a Senior Education Profile in December of Year 12, which may vary according to a student's course section. All graduates receive a Senior Statement issued by the QCAA, listing the results in the student's studies over Years 11 and 12.

Most students will also receive a Queensland Certificate of Education. Those who qualify also receive a Tertiary Entrance Statement issued by the Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre (QTAC),


giving each student's Overall Position (OP Score), which is a significant determinant for being offered a university placement.

Flexible Educational Pathways

Senior School provides two educational pathways. The OP path prepares students for tertiary enrolment and studies while the vocational path caters for students who wish to acquire a trade or pursue other career aspirations.

Students who are considering further education at TAFE, completing an apprenticeship/traineeship or gaining direct entry into the workforce may benefit from completing a non-OP pathway through their years of senior schooling.

Flexibility is a feature. Senior School students can study subjects from both pathways to achieve certain outcomes. Student Services advise pupils on the most appropriate course of study.

State-of-the Art Facilities

The new Centre for Innovation and Creativity will open in Term 2, 2017 providing state-of-the-art facilities. We aim to mentor tomorrow's social innovators, entrepreneurs and change-makers. The new facility will offer recording, drama and dance studios, labs for design technology, film, television & new media, music, and visual art, an art gallery and an entrepreneurial hub.

Co-Curricular Music, Drama & Performing Arts

Bands, orchestras, ensembles, choirs, and dance groups are fixtures in the co-curricular program.

Performing on stage builds confidence and poise and teaches young people valuable life skills about managing nerves and resilience.

Instrumental Music

Students can choose from a wide range of instruments as well as voice and speech and drama on a fee-for-service basis.

Lessons can occur before or after school, during morning tea or lunchtimes, or during class time on a rotational basis, where the parents and teachers agree that the student will be able to cope with the disruption to their classroom learning.

Fees are payable directly to music tutors, in advance.

Student Services at Northside Christian College are provided by the Director of Teaching and Learning, School Counsellors, Careers Officer and Vocational Education Coordinator. Our role is to assist Middle and Senior School students as they make decisions about study and work in secondary school to assist them to succeed, access complementary studies and future pathway options.

Student services can assist students with:

- Subject choices
- Vocational certificate qualifications (including TAFE courses)
- Special provision (to assist students with learning difficulties or health challenges)
- QCE (Queensland Certificate of Education) requirements
- Career and tertiary entrance information
- QCST (QLD Core Skills Test) information and preparation
- QCAA Learning Accounts.

Educational Support

The Junior School and Secondary Educational Support Centres provide support to students with significant learning difficulties. Teacher aides provide other assistance through various support programs. Students with special needs are identified and supported through case-managed adaptations to learning and have access to the range of curricular offerings at Northside including OP and vocational pathways through Senior School.

EAL – Students for whom English is not a first language receive support and instruction.

Textbooks

Northside operates a textbook lending scheme for Years 7-12, which saves parents the expense of purchasing texts. Textbooks are purchased by the College and loaned to Middle and Senior School students according to their subject needs. A number of textbooks are now available in a digital format which can be downloaded onto Chromebooks.

General College Campus and Facilities Information

Situated on a twelve-acre property in Everton Park in Brisbane's northern suburbs, Northside Christian College has approximately 1,150 students enrolled. The College is divided into Junior, Middle and Senior Schools.

- Oval, Hard Courts and use of 1000 seat auditorium



Frequently Asked Questions

Enrolment Process

Is a Pastor/Minister's reference required?

This is a required component of our enrolment pack and provides one perspective used to determine whether or not a student is offered a placement. Through this document, we are seeking to understand whether our future families are committed to their faith in Jesus Christ and a Christian life.

Does your child have to be dedicated, baptised, or christened in the church?

Northside is a Christian school for Christian families, with approximately 100 churches represented by the student body at Northside. Consequently, we respect the differences between various Christian denominations around such matters as infant, child or adult dedications, baptisms, confirmations or christenings. Northside requires our families to respect, accept and encourage your children to participate in the Christian education and practices of the College.

Are students required to be immunised to attend Northside?

Northside recognises the decision to immunise your child is a personal one. We recommend parents speak with their general practitioner and review the Queensland Government's publications on the benefits of immunisation.

Does Northside offer Scholarships?

We have recently laid the foundations of future scholarship program.

Does Northside accept International Students?
