Celebrating 35 Years of Excellence

2015 marks the 35th year of the establishment of Redeemer Lutheran College. Last year's graduating Year 12 students included the cohort of the first Redeemer Junior School students. While celebrating this, it struck me how long these students had spent at Redeemer. As this year unfolded, I also became mindful of the lengthy service of many of Redeemer's staff; such longevity is a true blessing.

Students blessed with being able to spend many years in a single school experience community and all the surety and security that is part of that sense of belonging. "Gone are the days when a school musical meant dodgy singing, forgotten lines, squeaking instruments, kids mucking up in the back row of the chorus and fridge carton sets. As I watched Redeemer Lutheran College's production of the classic

"My Fair Lady" I had to keep reminding myself that I was actually watching a school musical. The whole team know their stuff. From the sets that created a world where pillars became lamp posts and book shelves and race tracks appeared before your eyes to the amazing orchestra that never missed a beat as it handled an extremely difficult score with ease. Great costumes and lighting and from a technical point of view the performance I attended was faultless ensuring we never missed a line from the cast.


All the leads were outstanding. Tom Ryan & Peter Kleinschmidt as Henry Higgins and Colonel Pickering managed to capture a wonderful rapid-fire style of conversation, creating a rhythm of the banter required for this style of theatre. Both showed excellent comedy timing and Tom in particular handled what was a massive

role like a performer well beyond his years of experience. Speaking of massive roles, Sophia Cawte created an Eliza Doolitte that was warm yet showed the strength needed to give a depth to the character that obviously connected with the audience. She skilfully navigated the transition that Eliza goes through during the play. It was a great performance with her really nailing the many times that it was her job to hold the audience on her own. Carly Furlonger also gave a strong focused performance as Mrs Pearce and all four of them attacked the many scenes they did together with excellent pace and energy. These scenes can often pull back the overall pace of this show, particularly to a modern audience, but their performances, along with what was obviously insightful direction, meant they didn't drag and instead became highlights of the show for me.

Alessandro Spinelli as Alfred Doolittle did a great job giving us the two big comedy numbers of the show "With a Little Bit of Luck" and "I'm Getting Married in The Morning". The choreography for these songs were a real highlight. Nicholas Sayers as Freddy showed us a lovely vocal range in "Street Where You Live". It was great to see these young men performing these classic musical theatre tunes with such energy and commitment. Neve Ferreira's portrayal of Henry Higgin's mother was clever and concise giving us an insight into the upper class world that she and Henry come from.

I am a strong believer that the saying "a chain is as strong as its weakest link" was written with live theatre in mind. The biggest attraction to this production was the powerful evidence of ensemble. The level of commitment and professionalism that was evident in the show from the supporting actors, the chorus and the crew was the glue that held it all together. Every last person involved with the show needs to be congratulated for their hard work and commitment.

I am sure that no one will really know the actual amount of "man-hours" that went into making My Fair Lady come to stage.
I wouldn't dare to say. But one thing I know I can say after such an enjoyable night at the theatre is... By George, I think they got it!!"

Life With Dignity

Cambodia Team 2014

In December 2014, a group of 18 students and teachers from Redeemer Lutheran College and Cornerstone Lutheran College were invited by LWD (Life with dignity) to see the service and work the organisation does for the poor in rural Cambodia. I was fortunate enough to be a member of this team and witness first-hand the remarkable work of LWD. The Non-government Organisation (NGO) has the hopeful vision of "people living in peace, dignity and harmony in a democratic and just society, united in diversity and empowered to achieve their universal rights." Their approach through rights-based empowerment upholds and empowers the poor and oppressed. Through their core values of justice, equity, people's participation and transparency and accountability, LWD is working towards empowering vulnerable communities to claim their rights and improve their living standards. The outworking of this empowerment program is truly inspiring and certainly life changing for the two and a half million people included in LWD's Country Strategy.

Our team visited the districts of the Kampong Chhnang province where we were warmly welcomed by villagers who were very eager and excited to show off their successful businesses supported by funds from LWD. The pride and joy on their faces was wonderful to see as they shared their stories of how LWD helped them alleviate poverty from their lives. I was truly inspired by one young woman who told us about her incredible journey to empowerment. Through funds from LWD, she leant, as well

as taught her mother, to sew and together, and they were able to open up their own successful business. She said to us, "I can now feed my family for the whole year and send my children to school." To her, this meant that she and her family had escaped the poverty cycle and were able to provide for themselves.

She was so very grateful to the LWD staff for helping her break out of that cycle, as were all the other people we visited. Through LWD's aid, some bought their own land to produce rice crops; others started their own pig, cow and chicken farms. No longer living in extreme poverty thanks to LWD, they now have income generation and improved food security, access to education, knowledge on preventive health, water and sanitation. LWD helped them find a sense of purpose, identity and fulfilment which has transformed these people, their families and their lives.

LWD is changing lives, mine included. I was so moved by the work of the organisation and by experiencing rural village life in Cambodia. I was so inspired by everyone's story of empowerment and hope. The work of Life With Dignity is absolutely incredible and I am so grateful I had the opportunity to meet the staff of the organisation because their compassion and kindness is improving the lives of so many in need.

College Refurbishment Program







The Christmas school holiday period was a very busy time at the College, as a number of major refurbishment projects were taking place, particularly within the Senior School campus.

Senior School Courtyard Upgrade

A major landscaping project was completed, to transform the Senior School Courtyard area between SL Block and SM Block into a modern and highly usable hub for Senior School students. A number of special features have been incorporated, including an outdoor stage, seating nooks use of timber and multi textured surfaces, lighting, and new water bubblers. This redevelopment provides for both recreation and flexible, outdoor learning.

Middle Years Recreation Space

An additional Middle Years Recreation space has been developed at the rear of the Kleinschmidt Centre, and adjacent to SD Block (Years 7 and 8 precinct), which includes basketball and netball hoops, together with seating areas.

Senior School Air Conditioning

Air-conditioning was installed into SE Block with SH Block also to be completed soon. The installation of air-conditioning within these two buildings will see the majority of classrooms within the Senior School air-conditioned.

SM Block Flexible Learning Space

An additional large new creative flexible learning space has been created upstairs in SM Block, where once the House Leaders were previously located. This creative learning space has been furnished with a variety of furniture options, including bean bags, stools, lecture chairs, ottomans and flip tables.

Pool Toilet Upgrade

The toilet block at Redeemer Pool has now also been fully refurbished. This was the final amenities block to be refurbished within the College, meaning that all of the Redeemer's student amenities are each of the same high standard.



Some things change... Some stay the same

In the 35 year history of Redeemer Lutheran College, much has changed.

The students starting their Senior school journey back in 1980 would have been full of excitement to be a part of a new school and to start the first chapter of Redeemer's history. The school looked very different back then, with only a few buildings but there was a great vision for the future.

The first generation of Redeemer students were probably influenced by the musicians of the time – Irene Cara, Adam and the Ants, Pink Floyd, Michael Jackson and Split Enz. They entertained themselves by making mix tapes to play on their ghetto blasters, watching VHS or Betacam movies, trying to solve the Rubik's Cube, started playing Pac-Man and were caught up in the media hype of "Dallas' and "Who shot JR?"

The students would have been proud to wear their new uniforms featuring the beautiful hues of blue now referred to as "Redeemer Blue". Study included reading set texts and referring to the source of all knowledge, the 'Encyclopedia Brittanica'. Students sported a blue woollen blazer in the winter months and teachers were probably busy trying to tame the big hair sported by the girls.

35 years on, things look quite different. The physical landscape of the school has morphed, sporting a P-12 school with a Junior School and Senior campus with many new facilities and spaces. Simpfendorfer Drive, Scurr Oval, Stolz Sportsfields, Fred Davey Oval, Glover Fields and the Kleinschmidt Centre, all remind us of the influences of the past.

These days, the students are listening to One Direction, Taylor Swift and the two most followed artists on Twitter are Justin Bieber and Lady Gaga. Mix tapes are referred to as 'old school' and have been replaced by iTunes downloads and personal devices. They watch movies 'on demand', talk to each other via inbox chats and can research anything, anytime at the touch of a button; #how did we manage without Google? Students can now bring their own device to school and are able to access work from class on the Learning Management System, at home. Almost every student has a personal mobile phone.

Junior School News

This year saw the introduction of voluntary Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) across the College from Years 3-12. There were large numbers of students in Years 3-6 arriving on the first day of Term 1 with their signed permission slip and tablet or laptop, ready to actively use their device in the classroom.

There were even more students, as the term and semester progressed who brought in their devices, eager to engage in this approach to learning.

For some staff, parents and students, the learning curve has been steep, but one full of excitement. Our teachers have enjoyed exploring our Learning Management System, to extend students, provide homework and other learning opportunities. Many of the parents that regularly access My Big Campus have commented that they appreciate having immediate knowledge of what has been covered in class and tips on how to revise concepts with their children at home. Students not participating in the BYOD program have also had access to the Learning Management System on school devices and at home.

Whilst our staff and students are still exploring how they use BYOD in the classrooms, here are some of the ways that the various Years 3–6 teachers are allowing and encouraging students to use their device on a daily basis:

- Research of relevant class topics
- Access to online educational games and web based activities
- Teachers voice recording spelling tests for students to access at the end of the week
- Setting research challenges for history and science units.
- Students with BYOD share websites or clips they find during research time by plugging their device into the Interactive White Board to share what they have found.
- Class rotations in Literacy or Mathematics. Having a device that is accessible immediately allows students to transition from one rotation to another with ease, regardless of where they are placed in the classroom. The students can move freely around the room with their device.
- Students document their own group learning experiences. Those with BYOD are able to document their learning by taking photographs of group projects. Student print out these images and write reflections on their learning.

As technology continues to change, and students and staff continue to grow in their use of devices, students will be exposed to new ways to collaborate, and new ways to creatively demonstrate their understanding. There will be many more avenues and opportunities for our students to engage in technology and become proficient twenty-first century learners.

Notts Cottage was the home of Mr George Nott, the original owner of the land upon which Redeemer is situated. As a young bachelor in the early 1930's George built a tin shed which became his home. The old tin hut was located on the portion of land purchased for the college (where Redeemer Chapel is now situated), and featured in several ways in the early years of its history. Relocated in 1986 and substantially restored in 1988 as a bicentennial project, it still stands on the campus today and serves as a museum of local history, a valuable educational resource, and one which will be appreciated more by some people, and perhaps understood less by students, as the local area loses the rural character which was still so strong at the time of the college's establishment.

Alumni Profile

Mick DeBrenni (94)

In what years did you attend Redeemer Lutheran College?

I graduated in 1994 after completing Year 12. I commenced in 1990.

What was your favourite subject (or teacher) at school?

My favourite subject was Economics and my favourite teacher was without a doubt Paster Peter Bowmer. Economics taught me that there is a clear role of service to our community for those with progressive ideas. Pastor Bowmer helped me explore how I could make a positive contribution to society and encouraged me to leverage my strong interest in social justice into a career.

What was the most valuable thing that you learnt at Redeemer?

In Economics I learnt that a society that observed a more equitable distribution of income would lead to greater prosperity overall. This was a lesson learned in Year 12 economics that lead me to purse a degree in Commerce, a career as social justice advocate in the labour movement and ultimately becoming a Member of Parliament in 2015.

When you were at school, what were your career aspirations?

Originally at school I had planned to be an employment lawyer. An experience at the end of school where I observed an abuse of workers' rights lead me to change direction slightly. I spoke about this in my first speech to Parliament which you can read in here: www.mickdebrenni.com. au/first_speech

What did you go on to pursue after graduating from Redeemer?

I've been pursuing a more just society since leaving school. My first step was to get to work straight away and so I completed university through Griffith part time. My first success was introducing a Home Workers Code of Practice which ended exploitation of refugee workers in the clothing trade and later I pursued pay equity for workers in female dominated industries with vigour and multiple successes.



What steps did you take to end up in the position you are now?

To end up as an MP I did what I have always done. I have set out each day to set a high standard for the good of our community. I have acted with integrity in all things and have sought to influence others to do the same. I have consistently keep an eye for opportunities for me to reach a higher standard in what I can deliver. For me the most important position I hold now though is one of parent. It has given me extra purpose and extra context in which I do my work.

Describe your typical working day?

Very long days, with non-stop challenges, which is what makes it so rewarding! The days are often long, but when your job is representing our community, it really doesn't feel like "work".

What experiences have you had since graduating from Redeemer?

Becoming a father is the most profoundly moving experience I have ever had.

Marrying my beautiful wife and seeing our children grow are important to me, as was being sworn in as a Member of Parliament. Standing up to speak or vote in Parliament on behalf of my community, every time I do it is significant and moving.

How do you spend your leisure time?

We are lucky here in this community to have Daisy Hill right in our "backyard". I make the most of it by sharing picnics with our family in the parks, teaching my children to ride a bike or throw a frisbee, and hitting the mountain bike trails. When I can I also like to surf – riding short boards in waves from northern NSW to South Stradbroke Island.

Where do you hope to be in ten years from now?

It's less for me about where, but how. I hope to be able to look back and say that I've done my community proud, that I made decisions through a lens of care for others before self, that I made the most of the opportunities I have been given, that I always acted with integrity and that I really made a difference.

If there is one piece of advice that you could pass on to current students, what would it be?

Listen to others, often they've already made the painful mistakes.




