




PATRONS OF TERRACE




BROTHER CAMPBELL'S JUBILEE

THE ANNUAL REPORT 1971

My Lord Bishop, Members of the Official Party, Very Rev. Fathers, Members of Staff, Ladies and Gentlemen and Students of Gregory Terrace.

RELIGIOUS FORMATION

We have not evolved an ideal, or perhaps even a satisfactory programme for the religious instruction of modern youth. Perhaps, in spite of many encouraging activities in the school, our boys are not prepared to serve their faith with the same enthusiasm they display for altruistic causes. Of course the spirit of Christ permeates much of this altruism, and I am pleased to be able to record in the boys a growing response whenever human misery calls upon their charity.

But I do feel some measure of concern about the decline in the spirit of piety amongst Catholic Youth, which applies to Terrace as well as all other schools. It is partly a by-product of changes in society, but one would expect a religious education might have served as an effective anti-dote against an environment becoming increasingly agnostic in philosophy and hedonistic in conduct. However I am not convinced that a decline in piety, regrettable though it is, means a decline in the religious spirit of youth. We may have been somewhat simplistic in the past in trying to assess the religious spirit by the externals of piety.

The boys have the services of an enthusiastic band of priests who are delighted to be of assistance whenever needed. Our Chaplain, Fr. R. Wilson, and Fr. White are untiring in their duties, and we have had inspiring visits from Bishop Kennedy and several from Dr. O. K. Oxenham whose inimitable mixture of idealism and sound common sense appeals to the boys.

LIBRARIES

Modern educational trends place a heightened importance upon the part the pupil's own efforts play in their educational development.

The Seniors have at their disposal a library, limited in accommodation now but quite well-stocked with books. Mr. Edmonds, the Librarian is very generous in placing his free time at the disposal of the boys. The Junior Library has been an important factor in our teaching in the Middle School & Junior School areas for several years owing to the skill and enthusiasm of Mrs. Olsen and her associates among the Terrace mothers. Next year the Junior Library will be transferred from its present cramped quarters to more suitable accommodation.


RADFORD SCHEME

The Radford Scheme is in operation this year in Junior, in 1972 it will apply to the Sub-Seniors, 1973 to the Senior candidates. Recently the Parents' & Friends' Association

sponsored a lecture by an expert on the Radford Scheme. The evening was deserving of greater support than it received. Further meetings will shortly be called to explain how we intend to implement the scheme at Terrace. As was inevitable the Radford Scheme has received some criticism from teachers and administrators. While it is somewhat demanding on teachers, the system of seminars does lend itself to a new dimension in Queensland education which has been rather too obviously orientated to the University, and too academic in content. It should be possible to give students a more liberal education, to open to them their rich cultural heritage, and so develop in them a fuller and more varied response to life.

We have already made some efforts in this direction by the introduction this year of musical appreciation lessons and by encouraging drama groups on a class and college basis. It is satisfying to find groups composing and acting plays and studies, and practising other forms of self-expression. Our school drama group under the direction of Mr. P. Thomas, gained third place in the Jean Trundell Memorial Schools' Competition gaining an award of \$75 to be used to add books to the library. For a fledgling group this is highly commendable.

Our examination results last year were the most satisfactory for some years. We were pleased with the percentage of Matriculants which was well above the State level. Results in



Junior were, as usual, very good. There is every indication that fine work is being done in all sections of the school, especially the Junior School.

Clearly not all boys are proceeding in schoolwork as parents and teachers might wish. Some lack ability to keep up with the class, some lack incentive, some few are mal-adjusted and because of emotional difficulties are clearly under-performing. Help is available to those who need special assistance from our Remedial Teacher, Miss Ann McCallum, and from the Counselling service of Br. Purcell.

CADET UNITS

Boys are naturally gregarious, seeking the security and the approbation of the group, testifying to common ideals in a common manner. We talk together in demonstrations, sit together in protests, fast together to dramatize our cause. The Cadet Movement should provide our boys with a pattern in which to express their patriotism, their love of Australia, rich and fair and free, and with a means of expressing their dedicated service to her. Unfortunately if patriotism and this common sense of service are not present, then the activities of Cadet day may take on the quality of burlesque, or the mindless performance of automatons. On the other hand a cadet unit functioning well is of considerable educative value.

We did not hold our Passing-Out Parade on a Sunday because of the number of boys, who missing camp, were backward in their training. Some parents by furnishing their sons with flimsy excuses to absent themselves from parades are defeating the aims of the Cadets.

SPORT

Sport is also a valuable activity in the formation of character. I know the no-transfer-of-training psychologists deny this, but they do

grant that sport gives ample opportunity for the exercise of sportsmanship. For me this is sufficient in itself. The acquisition of skills and the achievement of successes are subordinate to this purpose. But nevertheless some measure of success is desirable and rewarding. Our swimming, football, and tennis teams and cricket teams met with a reasonable measure of success: our rowers had their best day for some years, and had the First Eight not tried conclusions with that fatal buoy we could easily have claimed that we had had a good day. I was delighted with the spirit of enthusiasm and optimism among the athletics. They had not had a very successful day, but almost all performed above their ordinary level, and they continued their, I hope, relentless climb from the cellar to the attic.

One claim I make for Terrace sporting competitors. Many schools in the Commonwealth produce boys more skilful at sport, but I doubt whether any produce better sportsmen.

PARENTS' & FRIENDS' ASSOCIATION

It is important that teacher—pupil—parent relationship be close so that incipient difficulties may be talked over and perhaps solved. I was rather proud that certain parents, when a problem, major or trifling, arose in school, came to me somewhat hesitantly perhaps but encouraged by remembering that in last year's Report I had announced that if a problem arose concerning their son's education, they should consult me and I had promised to render whatever assistance I could. As I have usually found parents level-headed in their judgments about even their own children I cannot recall an occasion when I seriously disagreed with something they proposed.

Our Parents' & Friends' Association was inaugurated with great eclat at a meeting at the College in the Second Term. An excellent Committee, with Mr. Jerry Gallagher as President, was appointed to draw up a Constitution, submit it to a Special General

Meeting, and generally conduct the affairs of the Association until the Annual General Meeting early next year. I must say the Committee is all that I had hoped for. It contains men, alert, businesslike, dedicated, and with a genuine belief in the future of the school.

I hope parents will support their Committee. Quite frankly I was delighted with the Inaugural Meeting, but somewhat disappointed by the numbers who attended the Special Annual Meeting, and also the social function for the fathers.


We outlined to parents at the Inaugural Meeting plans for the future of Terrace. I am very pleased with the response of the parents to the Voluntary Donation to the Building Fund suggested at this meeting. It seems that the financial policy of the Parents' & Friends' Association will be successful. But the aims of the Association are far wider than financial. It is hoped to promote better social relationships among all parents, who after all have this common bond; and it is hoped to develop dialogue about the school, its aims, methods, achievements, shortcomings and in fact every aspect of its work.

Terrace has many very noble supporters and benefactors. Some families increased the suggested donation to the Building Fund, some have been consistently generous with donations over the years, many have given generously of their time and their labour. The claims that a school like Terrace make upon parents are manifold and various. I have come to expect, but not take for granted, that anything done by our parents, usually, of course, by the mothers, will be done generously, even lavishly and with elegance and good taste.

STAFF

I should like to express my appreciation of the work of members of Staff who displayed professional competency in their duties, and a desire to devote their abilities and a generous





amount of their spare time to the extracurricular activities of your sons.

YOUTH TODAY

Reports by their very nature may seem trite accounts of brick and mortar, examination, functions, successes, excuses and what-not; and seldom do they catch the soul of a school, that vital, pulsating spirit that accompanies youth and seems so tangible when young men are massed together in common purpose as in a school situation. This last section of my Report will be a tribute to your sons. I can assure you that in spite of some evident signs of imperfections in the materials and the craftsmanship, the picture of Terrace is generally pleasing. I have found the 1971 boys more co-operative, more reasonable, more prepared to see other points of view than their own, then Terrace boys of my other years. Our activities were invariably conducted in a pleasant atmosphere of trust, respect, and friendship between teacher and pupil.

I have no desire to romanticize youth, nor by temperament could I belong to those who in a spirit of bewilderment condemn what they find is difficult or impossible to understand. There are many imperfections in youth to-day; and there have been flaws in every generation of the sons of men. But boys to-day have many virtues to a degree not present in other generations. The conformity so sought after in schools in former years, and which I am old enough still to value, is not necessarily the ideal. Still it is as immature to revolt against all conformity, and despise the past because it is the past, as it is to condemn the present because it deviates from the past. There is so much that is sound and wholesome and valuable in our heritage that is well worth preserving.

I feel that our young men still at school are more serious-minded, more idealistic, more mature and in general more promising that most other generations. They have their own special problems that they will solve at least as well as other generations solved theirs.

I should like to read you a few lines of poetry which says succinctly what I am suggesting:

I thank the Lord for blessings that are mine; That my young son grows tall and straight and fine.

And eats the bounty on my table spread With thoughts for those who lack their daily bread,

Who looks on anguish with a softened eve And not, in proud disdain, just passes by; Who in the fierce commitment of his youth Will follow the elusive gleam of truth Not circumscribed by my tormenting fears Nor lagging from the burden of the years. Emerging manhood seeks out other paths. And skelters in his search by other hearths: Why should my troubled spirit turn to stone To see him venture on his way alone? I who acclaimed the first proud steps he made A baby, tottering, without my aid Can I not lift my too protecting arm And see him stride a man without alarm, Dear God your patient confidence I need. Who knows our troubled world and lets it breed

As I understand it the theme of the poem is not a plea for emancipation from parental affection and interest, and in important matters control, but a warning against that fussy over-anxious nervous concern which alienates, whether it be a cloying or a hectoring over-protectiveness.

If you can retain your confidence, your cheerfulness of disposition, your affection, your understanding in spite of the heightened tensions of modern life you will be better fitted to be guide, philosopher and friend to your sons.

FAREWELL

And now at the end of my appointed term as Headmaster of Terrace I conclude my Report with the words of Brutus to his friends before the Battle of Philippi:

"If we do meet again, why, we shall smile, If not, why then, this parting is well made." May God guard you and yours forever.

The family that is Terrace realises that the contribution made by its latest Headmaster ranks with the most significant of the past. Its gratitude will be expressed in the searching Christian that he helped to fashion.

He has transferred to the Toowoomba Grammar School

Another Old Boy, Mr. Robert Maidens, has resigned to try for overseas experience. His sixth Grade was always a buzz of interested activity. His tennis prowess enabled him to assist many boys in this popular sport as well as to develop strong G.P.S. teams. We wish him a successful tour.

Mr. Col. O'Brien, Physical Education teacher has left to take up full time University studies via the special Rugby League squad of which he is physical trainer. He set this new branch of learning effort on a firm basis as his old school. Many boys are indebted to him for improved interest in their physical welfare.

Mr. Colle was able to give local colour to the teaching of his native tongue in three classes per day in the lower Secondary. We wish him success in his assignment in North Queensland.





The Dr. John Corbett medal for Debater-ofthe-Year, was shared equally by Ralph Devlin and Patrick O'Shea.





BUILDING DEVELOPMENTS

It must have seemed an ambitious scheme to many when in April 1875, Bro. Joseph Barrett, founder of Terrace, opened a subscription list with the name of Dr. Quinn, then Bishop of Brisbane for the sum of one hundred pounds, in order to establish a boys college for Brisbane catholic people. The site of the present buildings at Terrace, was a gift of a loyal old boy of the Brothers from Ireland Mr. Dan McSweeney. The first structure, we are told cost \$8000 and became a residence in stone facing the Terrace, Bro. Barrett might have been disappointed that only 19 boys enrolled for school on the first day but that small number was to increase to the present roll call of near 1000.

It has been felt for some time that something must be done to provide better conditions for middle and junior school pupils and Stage three of the overall plan for Terrace building development is being proceeded with at present.

In an area facing Victoria St., a new school block, including science rooms, is being built to house grades nine and ten.

Plans for the new building were prepared by architects Frank Cullen and partners and it is expected that the buildings will be in use in early 1972.

Part of the cost will be met by the Commonwealth Government and some assistance towards the payment of interest on the remainder will be given by the State Government. When the plan is completed, we hope that all science facilities at the college will be overhauled and brought up to date. At the same time the transfer of six classes from the old school buildings opening on to Billett Street, will make it possible for grades four to eight to be housed here in greater comfort, with smaller

classes and better facilities for audio-visual aids and a temporary junior library etc.

Stage four of the plan will be the construction of a larger and more suitably placed library for the secondary students. This has come about by the assistance that will become available to us in the near future from the Commonwealth Libraries Grant. The Commonwealth Government having inspected our library facilities through their Library Advisory Board in Queensland have made a substantial offer for the construction of an entirely new library. This we hope to avail of very soon.

With the centenary of Terrace coming up in a few years time 1975, every effort will be made to ensure that the generations of students who use these buildings in the next century of Terrace history will have even better surroundings than has been the fortune of their predecessors.


'THE MONS' RETIRES

Monsignor Grantly Sebastian Lake, O.B.E., who retired from the R.A.N. on December 14, after a career and effect on his fellows that can only be described as extraordinary, is a man who has won the praise of more Admirals and the trust of more men than probably any present serving member of the Navy.

He has "belonged" in the R.A.N. since he was Commissioned as a chaplain and joined H.M.A.S. Sydney in 1949. The 20,000 ton ship was an aircraft carrier in those years and was soon operating in the Korean War. Earlier, in 1943, he had become an Army Chaplain and was assigned to the 20th Brigade of the Ninth Division joining it in the Middle East. They lost 371 men in the landing against the Japanese at Finschafen. He was in the second wave.

Born in Sydney in 1914, he was later educated at St. Joseph's College, Gregory Terrace, where among other things he was the welterweight boxing champion.

He says of the men he serves: "There is still a certain mystique about serving at sea. I try to let our men realise that they're top draw. That they've been selected from the bunch—they're not just ordinary blokes. That's why they have to remember who they represent."

Students of his old school formed a guard of honour along Gregory Terrace in September for the funeral procession of Sir Joseph Sheehy, one of the State's most respected and best liked Supreme Court judges.

Two years ago, while administrator of the State of Queensland, he paid an official visit to Terrace and addressed the assembled school:

"Some 22 years ago, in 1947, when I was appointed a Justice of the Supreme Court of Queensland, I paid a visit to the College. It was for a definite purpose—to express my gratitude to those men who had trained me and taught me—the Christian Brothers. I freely acknowledged then that to them I owed, apart from my parents, whatever success in life I may have achieved.

I come here again today, in the exalted office of Administrator of the State of Queensland, to repeat and emphasise what I said on that occasion. It is a high honour to have assumed this office. I share the honour with my old school."

Mr. French was the manager of the team while David was one of its most useful forwards. Both the old boys addressed the school, and mentioned the groundwork in Rugby obtained at Terrace as invaluable.






NEW ZEALAND TOUR




G.P.S. CROSS COUNTRY

Terrace, fighting desperately to build up a strong points lead early in the carnival, could not hold off a fierce attack by the Grammar relay teams. Leading by six points before relays, Terrace finished second by the narrow margin of thirteen points.

Prolific point scorer J. Van Opdenbosch (57 points or 25% of the total score), swimming up an age in the Open division, broke two records and scored four firsts and a second. NOTES TO PARENTS

CLASSES-Classes range from Grade IV to Senior University.

The Curriculum includes all subjects required by the Revised Secondary Syllabus and all subjects normally required for Matriculation.

TRANSPORT—The College is centrally situated, being within one mile of the G.P.O. The Alexandra Road, Clayfield 'bus from the City Hall passes the College (Stop 7). Special buses leave the City Hall every morning and return to the City from the College each afternoon.

ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY—Regular attendance and punctuality are of the highest importance and in case of absence, the Brother in charge of the class should be notified by telephone or in writing. Unjustified absence is viewed as a serious breach of school discipline. Except in extraordinary circumstances, permission should not be sought for extra holiday periods, or for dental appointments within school hours.

CLASS HOURS—Classes commence at 8.35 a.m., and terminate at 3.30 p.m. During the day there are two recesses: one of 15 minutes at 10.45 a.m., and the other of three-quarters of an hour at 12.30 p.m. Boys are not allowed outside the ground at lunch hours. A Tuck Shop on the premises caters for all needs.

PROGRESS REPORTS—A report showing the percentage gained in each subject is posted to parents at the end of each term or semester except when Final Term results are published in the newspapers for the Senior Examination.

THE SPIRIT OF STUDY—At St. Joseph's a boy is expected to apply himself to study without undue pressure from teachers. It is an important part of a boy's training that as soon as possible he sould be brought to realise that his future is in his own hands; the best opportunities may be wasted through lack of application and perseverance. The co-operation of parents therefore is cordially invited by the Headmaster. Lack of interest in study noticed in the home is best remedied by consultation with the

College. Interviews with Headmaster or Staff may readily be arranged by appointment.

SPEECHCRAFT AND SINGING—Speechcraft is taught weekly in all classes up to Sub-Junior inclusive. Choral singing is taught in Primary Classes, and individuals are coached in both singing and elocution for the College and Combined Festivals. A Literary and Debating Society functions regularly in Secondary Classes.

COLLEGE UNIFORM—This consists of a dark grey suit, dark grey shirt, white shirt for night functions, dark grey pullover, College tie, grey hose (marked with School colours for wear with short trousers), grey hat and hat band, black leather shoes. The use of the full uniform is compulsory for daily attendance in class and for public functions in connection with the College. During the First and Third Terms the summer uniform is worn. It is recommended, too, that boys in competition teams procure a College blazer for sportswear.

SWIMMING—In the summer months the baths are available to all for swimming. Each class up to Junior has a regular swimming period in the College baths, and each Primary class a weekly coaching period in the Centenary pool. A Master is always in attendance while the boys are swimming.

SPORT—Every pupil in the College, unless he is medically unfit, is expected to take his part in the sporting life of the College, and to be prepared to do his duty to the full when given the honour of representation in any sporting activity. The decision to curtail sporting activities must rest with the School authorities. Competitions are fostered with the School to cater for those boys not selected to compete in inter-College fixtures. The dress peculiar to each sport to be worn. Boys may learn tennis from a professional coach who takes classes after school hours.

CADETS AND AIR TRAINING CORPS—Every boy in the Secondary School over fourteen years of age is expected to join one of the Cadet Units, unless there is an acceptable reason for not doing so. Parades are held one afternoon each week after school hours.




