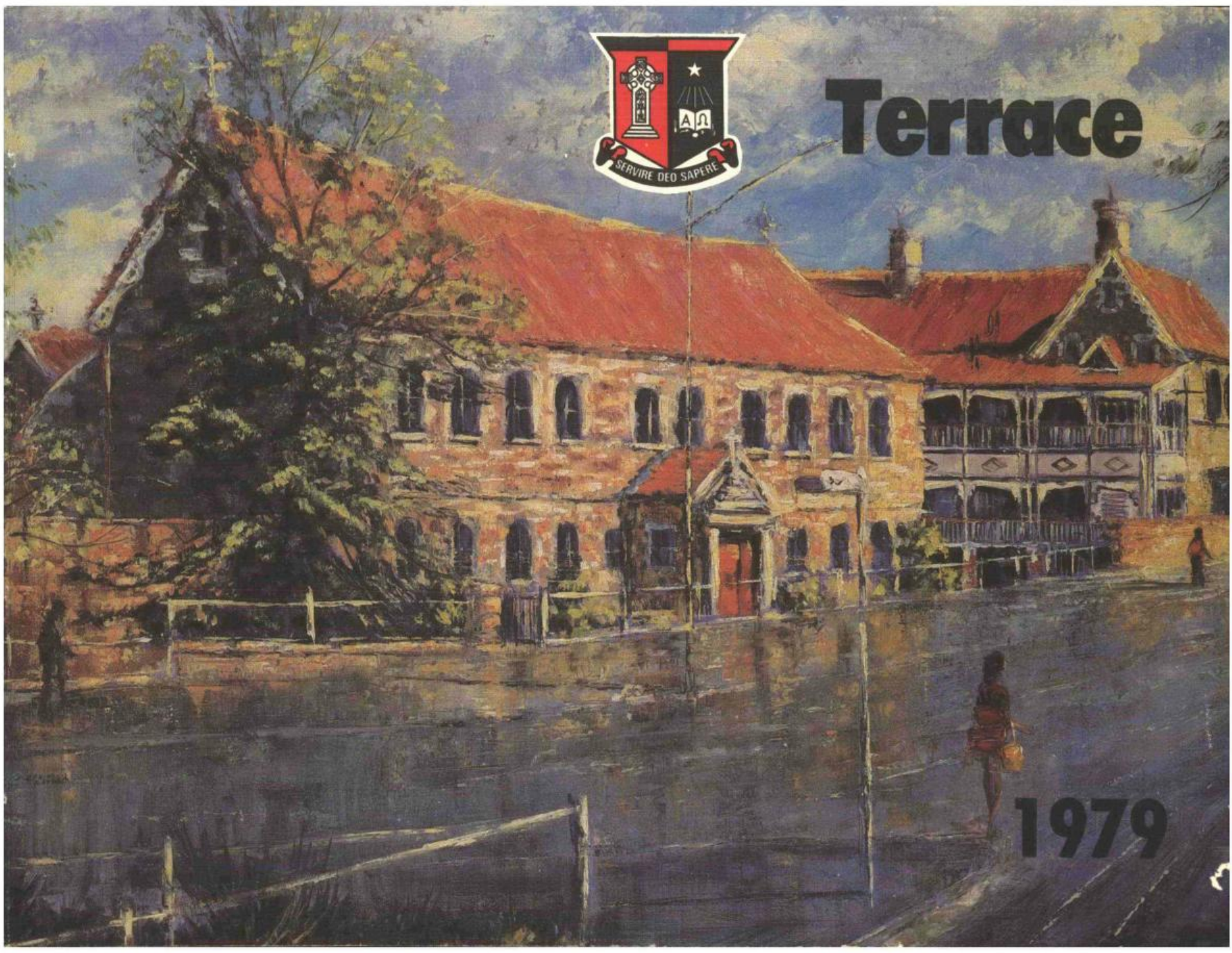

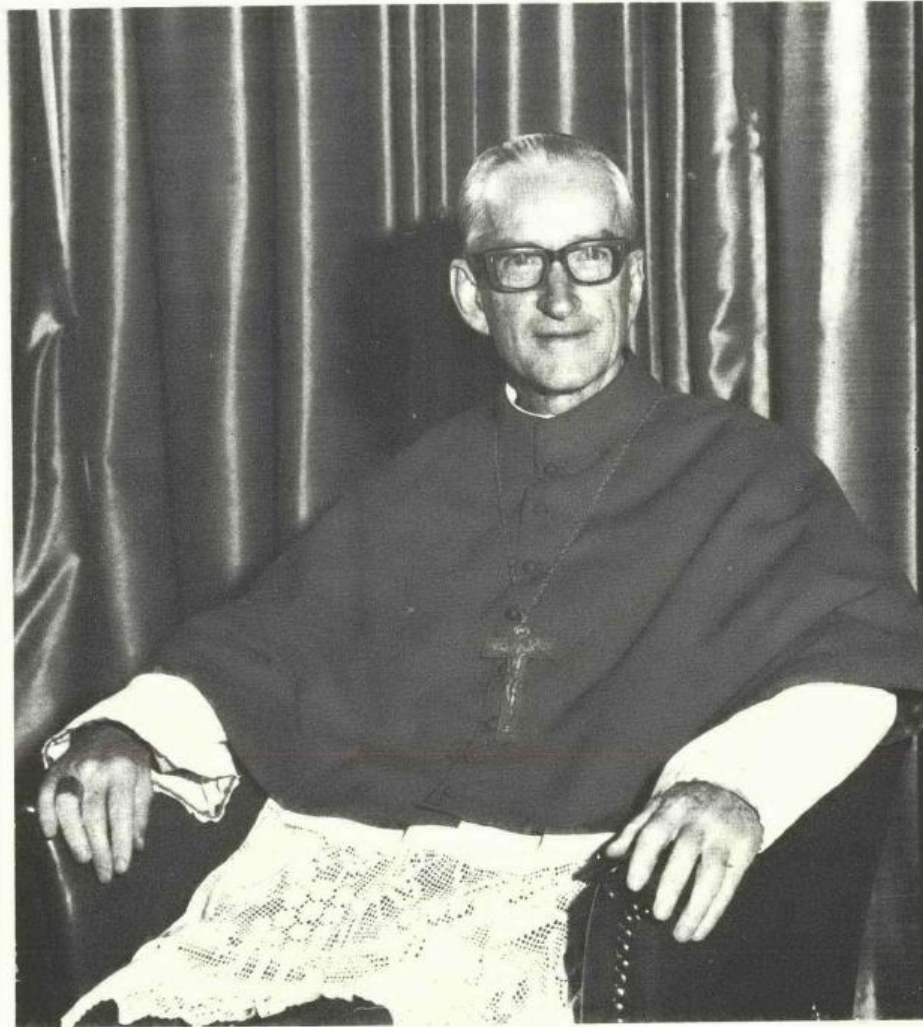

The Headmaster's Report

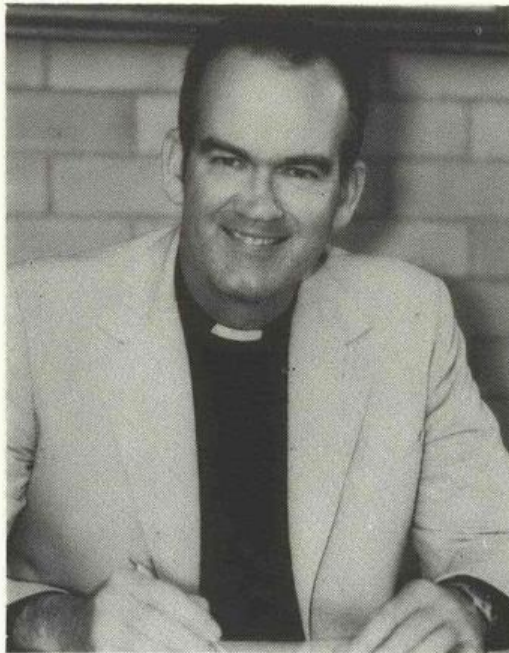
EXCERPTS FROM THE HEADMASTER'S REPORT:

We speak of our "Terrace Family" and sincerely hope that all who are members of it will feel a real sense of belonging.

Tonight I particularly welcome Bishop John Gerry. Any Catholic school is an enterprise that is a part of the teaching role of the Church under the authority and care of the Bishop. We value and esteem our Bishops and the service and leadership they give us and are always appreciative of their coming amongst us and of their interest in the College.

I also extend a particular word of welcome and congratulations to Mr. Peter Donnelly who was selected last week as the Queensland Rhodes Scholar for 1980. Peter is the ninth student from Terrace to attain this distinction. In the twenty-eight years from 1953—1980, seven ex-Terrace students have won Rhodes Scholarships, including three in the past seven years. It should be noted that only one of these Scholarships is awarded each year in the State.

Peter Donnelly attended Terrace from 1968—75. He was Dux of the College in his senior year and represented Terrace in under age rugby and interschool cricket (2nd XI 1975). Peter successfully studied for his Rugby referee's badge at school and acted as linesman for the

1st XV games in 1974—75. He was also involved in interschool chess and debating. In 1975 he was selected as a member of the Queensland Schools' Debating Team and he was also a member of the College's Air Training Corps for two years.

Since leaving school, Peter has gained further honours in the academic and debating fields. He has also returned to Terrace to assist in cricket coaching for two seasons. We congratulate Peter Donnelly, a worthy recipient of the coveted award of a Rhodes Scholarship.

INTERNATIONAL YEAR OF THE CHILD:

For a Catholic school, the importance and dignity of each and every individual child should be self-evident. The strength of Terrace is in the fine quality of good ordinary boys that we have.

We give recognition, and rightly so, where a particular individual does or achieves something outstanding, and we share in the joy of that occasion. The real test, however, of the quality of any body of people, including a school, is the quality of the "silent majority" of its members. In this, Terrace is fortunate to have a student body who as people are of such high calibre.

I would stress yet again that every student attending this school is uniquely important and has his own personal role to play in being part of the contemporary history of the College.

The "Year of the Child" is something of a misnomer, for it is we adults who have to re-learn the lessons — lessons of respecting

children and their dignity and also lessons from children. As Jesus taught us almost 2000 years ago, "unless you change and become like little children, you will not enter the Kingdom of God". (Mt: 18.3).

The question of the education of children is well summarised by Father Laurence Dunlop, MSc., STL., DSS., Rector of St. Paul's National Seminary, Kensington, N.S.W.

"Only a deep realisation on the part of parents and guardians of children of their dignity as human persons can protect them (the children). Since children are so utterly dependent upon parents, parents can be tempted to think as though they "owned" their children. But no human being can ever own another . . .

"The parent must of course, strive to communicate the values he or she lives by to the child.

"But the purpose of education is not simply to produce carbon copies of parents, but to produce human beings who are capable of freely choosing their way of life, and freely fulfilling something of the potential that is theirs as unique human beings.

"The really successful educator must be ready to suffer the pain of seeing the person he educates become independent of him and perhaps in many ways different from him. The parent who realises that, realises not only the awesome responsibilities that are attached to parenthood, but the limitations of that responsibility"

The school retains the confidence of the Brisbane community and demand for enrolments is high. The current position is that we are completely booked out for the next three years. Two determined fathers have even made bookings for their sons to commence Grade 8 in 1991.

Enrolment for 1979 is 941 with 718 in the secondary department and 223 in the primary. We commenced the year with our largest ever senior class of 150 students.

Captain of the College is Bryan Horrigan, and I would like to pay a special tribute to Bryan for his generous service to Terrace. He is a young man of considerable potential, some of which has already been realised. This year he won the Lions Youth of the Year Award for Australia.

As a point of interest, four of the six State finalists for this important award attend Christian Brothers' Schools. Another distinction Bryan achieved was to be appointed Captain of the

Queensland Schools' Debating Team and subsequently Captain of the Australian Schools' Team.

Vice Captain is Andrew Buckley, a capable, conscientious and generous member of the Prefect Body. Andrew and his two brothers must have some thing of a record. One (John) was College Captain and Andrew and his other brother (Chris) Vice Captains.

Appointment to these positions is on the vote of the senior class ratified by the staff and then approved by the Headmaster. We congratulate the Buckley family on this record.

SECONDARY SCHOOL:

At the beginning of the 1979 academic year, we welcomed to our teaching staff Mr. Pat Byrne, Sister Gabrielle Dore, Mr. Dennis Harvey,

Br. Peter Moss and Br. John Sayer. During the year we welcomed Miss Rose Metcalfe to our office staff and Miss Pier Wernigk as laboratory assistant.

We farewelled Mrs. Joanna Thomas, Br. Daniel Courtney and Br. Steve McLaughlin from the teaching staff and Miss Wendy Loveday from the laboratory assistant's position. We thank all these people for their contribution to the welfare of the College whilst they were here.

SPIRITUAL TRAINING:

Continued efforts have been made in all classes to fulfill the purpose of the school, namely to help all pupils come to a deeper understanding and appreciation of their religion and a closer relationship with God. We thank all the priests who have come in to the school to help in this, or who have assisted with groups of pupils at other times. I specially thank Brother Peter Moss in the Secondary for his efforts to co-ordinate the religious education programme and to foster the Christian atmosphere of the school.

Class and School Masses, the "Passion Plays" at Easter, Retreats and Christian Living Camps have been enthusiastically undertaken by the staff and well received by the students. Again this year, Mass has been available each Thursday morning in the College Chapel before school. We thank Father John O'Shea for giving us the opportunity as well as providing times for the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

During the year we welcomed back to the College, our most recently ordained old boy, Priest, Father Gerard Hefferan, who said Mass for the assembled school.

SERVICE:

During the year the St. Vincent de Paul Society was active and held a number of functions including a film night, "Third World" week and a dance held in conjunction with the Interact Club. Senior students made weekly visits to the Society's hostel in the city. An appeal for Kampuchea was conducted and during "Third World" week; \$1700 was raised and distributed to various Christian organisations.

The Rotary Interact Club has been well supported and active. The club is indebted to its sponsor club, the Valley Rotary Club and particularly to Mr. Bob George who assists with liaison. During the year funds were raised for various charities and money made available towards the cost of prizes in Terrace's Science and Geography competitions. On two occasions, work parties spent the weekend at our Lake Maroon site constructing steps on the steeper part of the slope down to the dam.

COUNSELLING:

This year the counselling department has grown to the point where over two hundred boys have made use of the personal service, while many others have made informal contact during lunch hours, between school periods and before and after school.

Mr. Rick Sheehan has joined Mrs. Rhonda White in this department. Mr. Sheehan works informally as a "student's friend" in the playground and study-flat areas. His work in the field of personal counselling has proved invaluable. Mrs. White has set up a counselling office and works in the fields of personal and

career counselling, including assisting with choices of subjects for particular courses, specific information on careers, decision making on career choices and assistance with job applications and interviews.

Most of the group activities planned by the counselling department have been to facilitate career decision making. This year a Career Experience Programme was made available to the Year 12 class. A Career Development Programme spanning ten class periods was introduced to Year 10. A Life Planning Programme also over ten class periods, was introduced to Year 9 as preparation for the Year 10 Career programme.

The communication with and interest and support of teachers, students and parents has greatly assisted the Counselling Department to develop as a caring individualised component of Terrace life.

CULTURAL:

A major musical production "Charlie Girl" was staged for the second successive year and ran for five nights at the Schonell Theatre. We thank All Hallows' School for giving us the opportunity to team with them for this production.

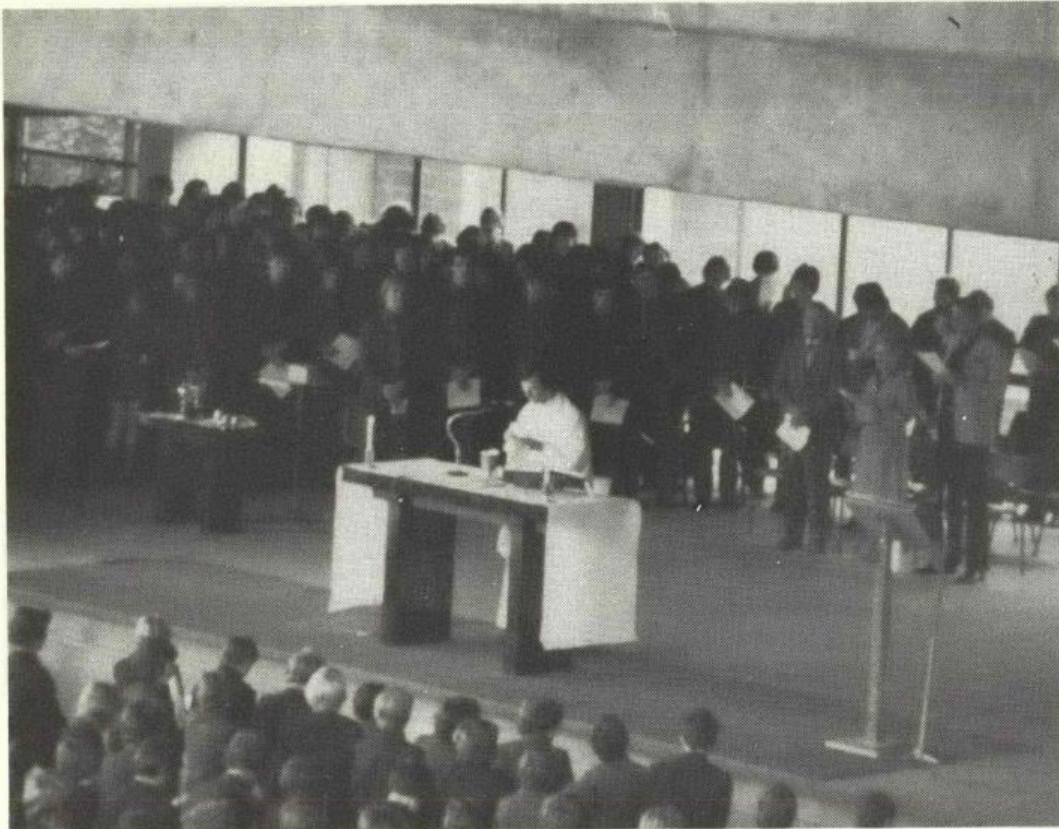
Debating continued to attract its adherents who attained excellent standards. Two students, Bryan Horrigan (Captain) and Brett Morgan were selected in the Queensland Schools' team of four. Both were subsequently selected for the Australian team. In the Wales/Q.D.U. Competition, our senior A team of Stephen Ohlrich, Bryan Horrigan and Brett Morgan were undefeated in winning the School's Championship.

SECONDARY SPORT:

In participating in school sport we need always to have the long-range view of what we are about, that is the development of the boy into a man. The question of the value of extra curricular sport, particularly when held on Saturdays has been raised in some quarters. The feeling of these people seems to be that it is interfering with family life and development. I can only say that much of the experience of Terrace families, at least the ones with whom I have raised the question, does not support this. In fact, it can have a unifying effect on family life when parents and brothers and sisters come to see their sons and brothers play. This can happen most easily with weekend sport.

Certainly we at Terrace consider the participation in extra curricular sport can play a valuable part in the development of the whole man. It is for this reason that teachers gratuitously assume responsibility for teams and generously undertake involvement (with other people's sons) after school and on Saturdays, with consequent trips to Southport, Ipswich and Toowoomba and at times even further afield. It is also for this reason that we maintain 40 acres of playing fields at Tennyson, a boat shed near the Storey Bridge and other sporting facilities and equipment.

I would hope that every boy who comes to Terrace wants to be fully a part of the school and see it as his school and be proud of it. This will only happen if he can identify with it by participating in at least some of the activities other than school work. If a boy did not feel that he wanted this or if parents did not want it for their sons, then they should (and here I speak in charity, not in judgement) find a school

which will endeavour to meet their wishes and at which they and their son will be happy. It is quite clear that a large number of parents do want what Terrace is offering. I hope they consider that the school is helping them. We endeavour to meet their needs and often they give us real help in doing so, as witnessed by committees for certain sports.

I particularly thank the Terrace staff for their generous assistance in the extra curricular

aspects of the educational development of our boys.

I would like to conclude this report by thanking those many people who have done so much to assist the College to continue its demanding and challenging apostolate of the Christian Education of Youth.

FATHER G.M. HEFFERAN

On Thursday, June 28, Gerard Martin Hefferan was ordained to the priesthood by His Grace, Archbishop F.R. Rush, D.D., assisted by Bishop J. Gerry (Auxiliary, Brisbane). Father Hefferan attended St. Brigid's Convent School, Red Hill for his early primary schooling and then came on to Gregory Terrace for Years Six to Twelve (1966-72).

He is the son of Mr. & Mrs. Edward Hefferan of 57 Beatrice Street, Bardon, and the nephew of the late Brother Edwin X. Hefferan, and we congratulate him on his ordination and rejoice that another son of St. Joseph's College has been raised to the ministry of the priesthood.

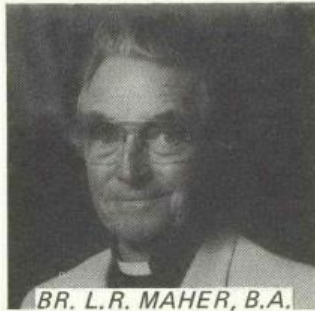
EDMUND RICE PILGRIMAGE:

In May 1979 the Archdiocesan examination of the life, works and sanctity of Brother Edmund Rice, the Founder of the Christian Brothers, was concluded in Dublin; the results, contained in 131 volumes, were then transferred to Rome so that the further investigation and process necessary as a prelude to his possible canonisation could proceed.

During the last week of August the mortal remains of Edmund Rice were transferred from the old mausoleum to their final resting place in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel at Mt. Sion, Waterford. Brother Maher, the Terrace teacher/librarian celebrated his Golden Jubilee this year and he accompanied the group who went to Ireland for this historic event. His account of this includes the following:

It was my privilege to be a member of the Pilgrim group that represented Australia; the group was composed of parents, prefects from Parade College and Brothers from the Australian Provinces. We were fortunate in our group leader, Mr. R. Stella, President of the Old Paradians; and doubly fortunate in our guide Br. R. Doyle who had spent several years in the Holy Land.

Despite war conditions, our week in Israel was a never-to-be-forgotten experience as we traced the paths of Jesus Christ and his Apostles. In Greece, we followed the footsteps of Paul through the islands, in Athens and in Corinth. Then came the spiritual uplift in Rome where the Pilgrim group was greeted by Pope John-Paul who told the great international assembly at the Audience who we were, where we were from and the purpose of our pilgrimage. From Rome we crossed to Ireland. Waterford was our destination. To get to that port we passed through Dublin where we saw

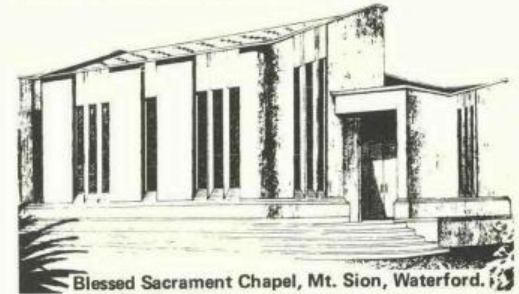


the great schools that are part of our history; Marino Training College (built by Br. Treacy on his return to Ireland after establishing the Australian Province and including St. Joseph's College, Gregory Terrace), Artane Industrial School which once was a self-contained city with 800 boys and of which now only the famous band remains. We met Br. Marcian Conlan who had just celebrated his 100th birthday. From Dublin the group passed through Callan, home town of Br. Treacy and Br. J.J. Mullen — one of Terrace's most illustrious headmasters. Then came Callan cottage where Edmund Rice was born.

This simple cottage is now a place of pilgrimage to which hundreds of visitors come every week; the Brothers' house is a House of Prayer at which visitors seeking peace and quiet and solace can stay. Waterford was next. We followed the Pilgrim Path along the fifteen stations in the town, each station showing some aspect of Edmund's work. On the day of the translation of the remains, Mass was con-celebrated by Cardinals O'Feich and Manning with the bishops of Ireland in the presence of a great gathering of priests, religious and visitors, not forgetting the residents of the suburb of Ballybricken one of the areas first evangelised by the Brothers. The Founder's remains are resting in a simple side chapel near the sacristy.

This sacristy is attached to the original tailor's shop and bakery established by the founder for the poverty stricken boys of Waterford. His approach to Christianity was through both the spiritual and corporal works of mercy. We met other pilgrim groups from Newfoundland, Zambia, England and San Dominico.

Some of the Pilgrims then had the opportunity of visiting notable shrines; it was my good fortune to see Knock (Ireland), Oberammergau and Lourdes. When I think over the far flung schools of the Christian Brothers, when I number the boys instructed in the faith by them over the past 178 years, the man Edmund Rice grows in stature, for without his sacrifice, none of these people would have received the graces that are so evident.

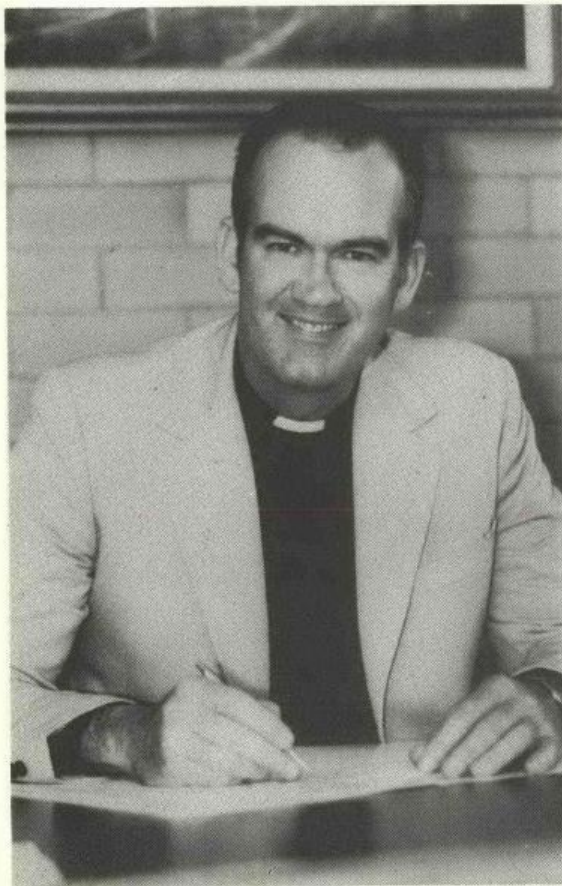

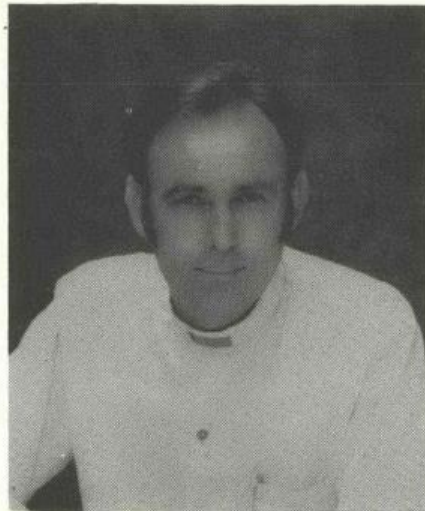
In the left hand corner of this picture are the restored bakehouse and tailor's shop where Edmund showed practical Christian charity to the impoverished and underprivileged boys of this town.

Old Boys' Association

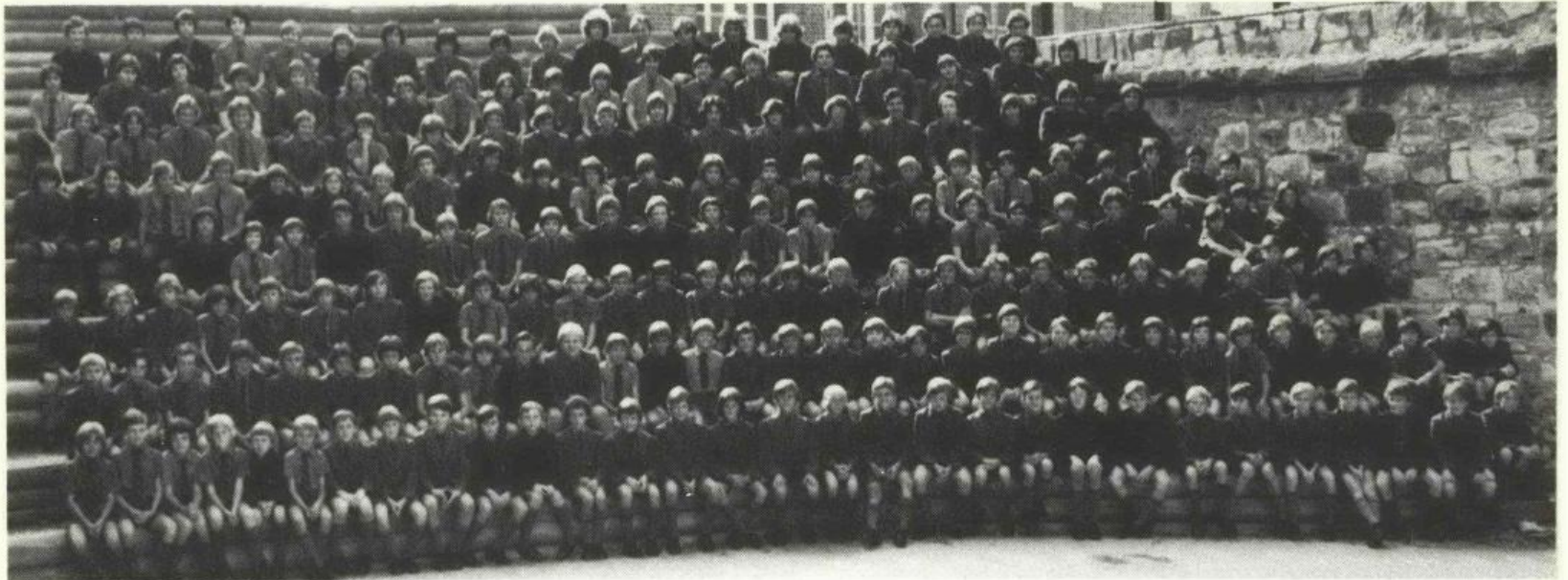
The Old Boys' 1st XI again took the laurels against the College 1st XI at the annual clash at Tennyson on Old Boys' Day in October.

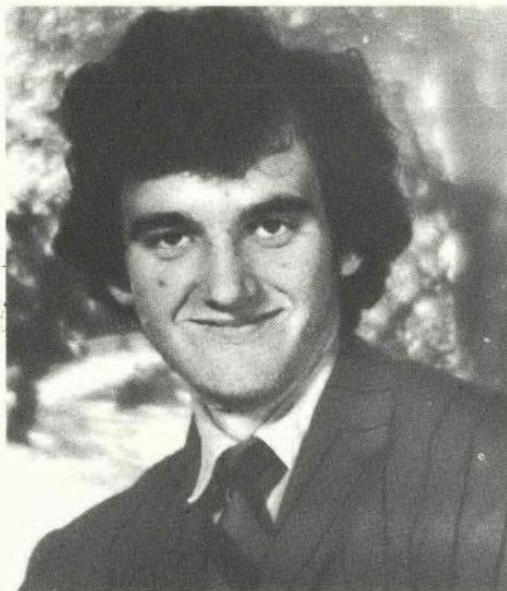
OBITUARY

**CRAIG RONALD ANDREWS
TERRACE 1975 — 1979
DIED JANUARY 12th, 1980.**

*"He has sought to please God
So God has loved him" (Wisdom 4:10)*

Craig attended Terrace for all of his secondary school career, enrolling for Year 8 in 1975. From the start he involved himself very fully in the life and activities of the school and in spite of having to endure painful medical treatment in periods from 1977 onward, he continued this involvement. In his earlier years at Terrace, he participated in rowing, athletics and cross-country, rugby and cricket. In his Senior year he was a College Prefect, qualified as a rugby referee and acted as a touchjudge for inter-school games. He was also timekeeper for the First XV games and was completing his Silver Award of the Duke of Edinburgh Scheme. In addition to this, he was a very capable student who won the prize for First Place in Year 12 Biology and qualified for entry to the faculty of medicine at the University of Queensland. As President of the Terrace St. Vincent de Paul Society, he played a major part in organising the "Third World Appeal" week in September of his Senior year to raise funds for needy peoples.

Those who were privileged to know Craig were struck by the qualities that he showed as a person, qualities that are portrayed by the statue of St. Joseph the Worker erected at the College in his memory. This statue has a dignity, strength, simplicity and composure and these were some of the qualities that characterised Craig.



The Headmaster's Report for 1980 reads, "All of us who were privileged to know Craig and to work with him closely, will ever remember the courage and resignation he exhibited and the example of Christian living that he gave. Terrace occupied a warm and large place in his heart".

Rev. George T. Montague, S.M., a well-known American author of religious books who met Craig briefly just before his death, wrote later as follows:— "I believe Craig taught all of us a lesson. The lesson is that God does hear our prayers but the way He decides to give life to us is not always the way that we prefer or envision. So it was with Jesus' prayer in the garden. His prayer was answered . . . But the answer was life and resurrection through death, rather than without it. So, too, with Craig". May he rest in peace.

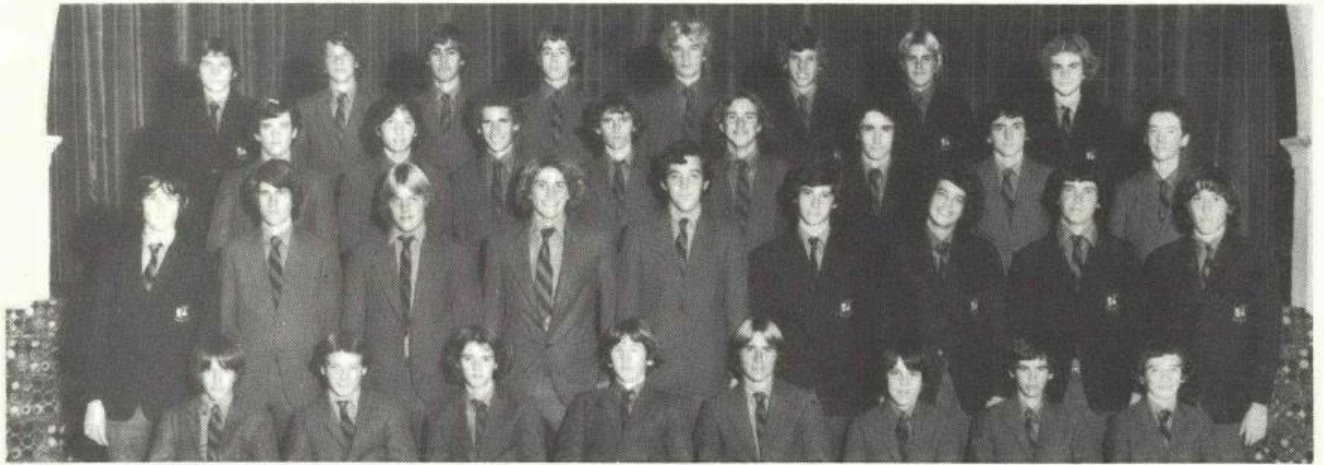

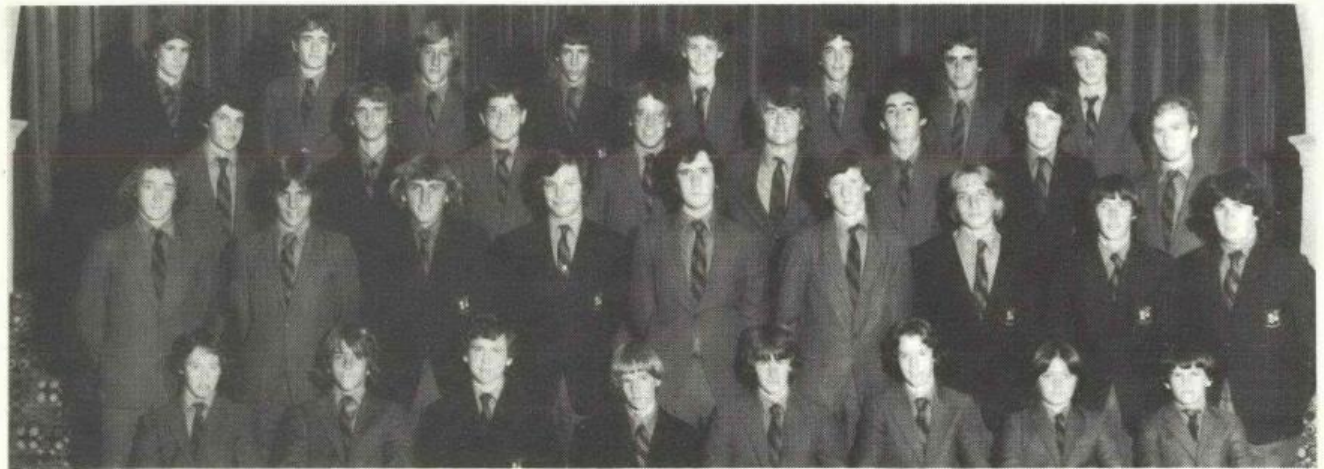

Major areas of activity during the year included operation of the Swap Shop on a regular basis, the Family Day, held at Tennyson in early August and sponsoring of Bingo at the Valley Centre Plaza.

The Swap Shop, as well as being a service to the parents and the pupils of the College, has been a regular source of income. I am grateful to all those who have put such a considerable effort into the successful running of this venture.

The Family Day was highly successful, netting the Association \$6,492.77. Of prime importance was its success from a social viewpoint.

The Bingo continued to be our major source of income and it is hoped to continue this activity for the next several years.

The Association was pleased to have assisted the Headmaster in the organising of a reliable source of supply for College blazers and other items of uniform from George Symons. Not only have the clothing items been obtained at reasonable cost, but the Association receives a

rebate on purchases, which in the twelve months, amounted to some \$450.

Early in 1979, the Association was pleased to have the opportunity of sponsoring a barbeque at the College for the teachers and their families. College Captain's Address

Mr. Chairman, My Lord Bishop, Br. Headmaster Guests, Members of Staff, Ladies and Gentlemen, and Gentlemen of Terrace .

At his Inaugural Address as President on January 20th, 1961, John F. Kennedy echoed his thoughts on his coming term – "Ask not what your country can do for you; rather, ask what **you** can do for your country". In many ways, Gregory Terrace challenges us to examine our adherence to that same principle – not simply giving, but being in a frame of mind where you want to give.

If someone had told me as I started at Gregory Terrace in Grade Five in 1972 that 1979 would usher in such achievements as a Rhodes Scholar, two members of The Australian Schoolboys' Rugby Team, six members of The Queensland Schoolboys' Team, two Australian Debating team members and the winning of the First Fifteen Premiership for the third consecutive year, I would have been slightly sceptical. That's because I would not have understood the nature of this place that we affectionately call "Terrace". Even now, it is sometimes difficult to comprehend the meaning of those words from the school song – "If we fight to do the right, ours shall be their fame then".

Tonight of all nights is a time to attempt to convey some of the impressions that my colleagues and I have of a school that, for many of us, has played a dominant role in the shaping of our lives. Many of us probably won't realise the full extent of the effect of Terrace life upon us until we've had the buffer of a few years' leave by which to measure our impressions and experiences.

Too often today, society pays lip service to a problem of polarisation. **Our** age group tends to be critical of our elders and **their** system. The members of the older generation may criticise us for allowing the system to fall to pieces, with a comment of "things aren't as good as they were in my day". That same communication problem exists at Terrace — and not just between staff members and students. There are students here who form a chain of generations of Terracians — each generation trying to convey, from father to son, some of the ways in which the ideals and traditions of the college are followed. I look out on the audience tonight and realise that there are some students present more than half a decade younger than the present seniors. And that presents a communication problem. It makes **me** wonder why we are all here. Obviously, there is something more to life at Terrace than the day-to-day drudge of gaining semester marks and calculating T.E. scores. This school has tradition, it has "men of spirit, bold and unjaded". It attempts to live up to a Christian ideal. I've only come to realise in my last years at school that these are some of the aspects that constitute the idea of a "Terrace Family", whether you're a member of the Administration, Student Body, P. & F. Association, G.T.O.B.A., or the Ladies' Committee, or in any way part of the school.

Perhaps this is why we can overcome this communication gap. We may not be able to close it, but we are able to bridge it. And the strange thing about a bridge is that it has to be started from **both** sides. It means learning from our mistakes. It means pushing for progress, where progress is necessary.

It's not simply a case of living up to somebody else's example. Br. Buckley often tells us that "you only get as much out of Terrace as you are prepared to put into it". That means "you don't get anywhere without striving". You don't achieve any worthwhile success without making the effort. Even then, you don't necessarily have to reach the top of the tree to be "successful". Those who do reach the apex may have gone farther, but they also have farther to fall, unless their climb is based on sound principles. There are many branches to the tree, and that is why the way in which you do things is sometimes more important than the way things finish.

To present and future students, particularly next year's senior class, I suggest that it doesn't hurt to adopt some of the ideals of our modern society. Make Terrace bigger, better and stronger in the values that make Terrace great, because you will eventually reap the rewards. In a big way, 1979 marks the passing of an era. True, the seniors are leaving in two weeks' time. However, someone who has known, organised, counselled and taught, many of us, is also leaving after six years of service to the College. On behalf of the seniors, Br. Anderson, best wishes and many thanks for the memories of good times past.

I mentioned the bridging of a communication gap.

The seniors are grateful for the advice, friendship and interest shown by those members of staff who have taught us during our years. If the real "Terrace Family" spirit exists, it is also due in no small way, to our own families, particularly our parents, whose unceasing support guarantees that we will be able to give of ourselves to the utmost. Sometimes we forget where much of the praise should really go.

I appreciate the support afforded to me by the school in general throughout the course of this year. Knowing that this support existed enabled me to approach confidently the National Final of the Lions Youth of the Year Quest. Without the backing and encouragement of the senior class, 1979 would not have been the year that it was. For their example to the rest of the school, I am grateful, and rest assured in the knowledge that we will continue our association with Terrace when this, our final year, draws to a close.

In all these aspects of life; the support, leadership, counsel and encouragement, we are continually striving to make Terrace a better place. I believe that attitude is embodied in Robert Kennedy's words: "People look at the things that are — and ask why. I look at the things that are not — and ask — why not?"

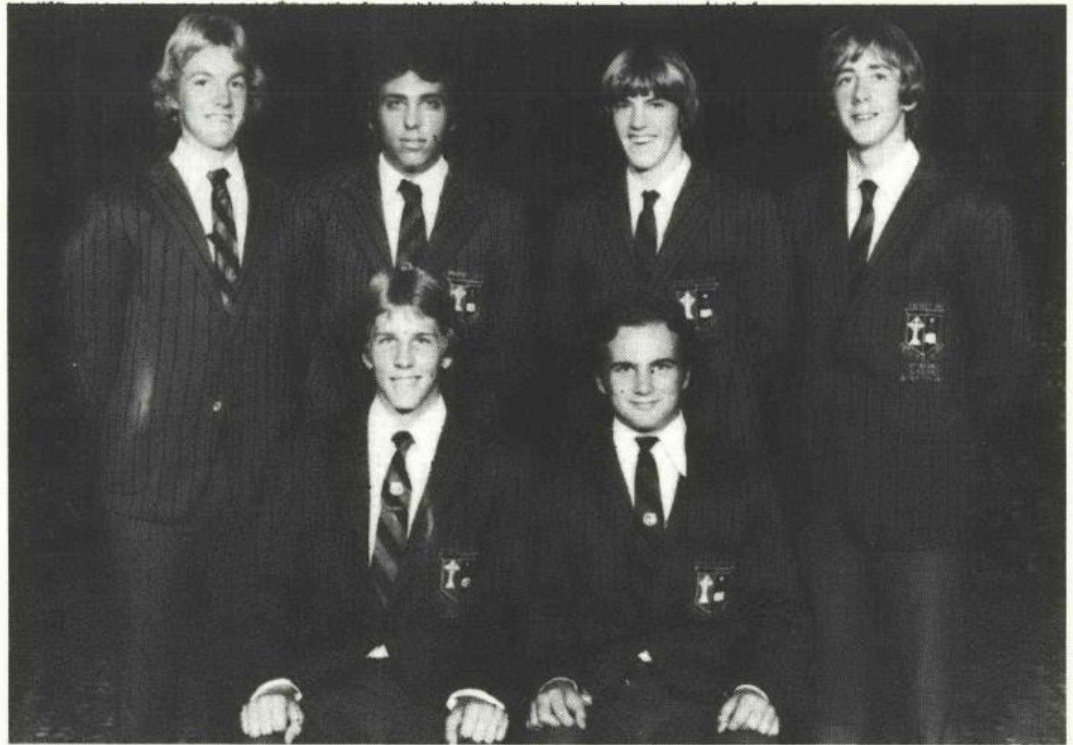

Charlie Girl

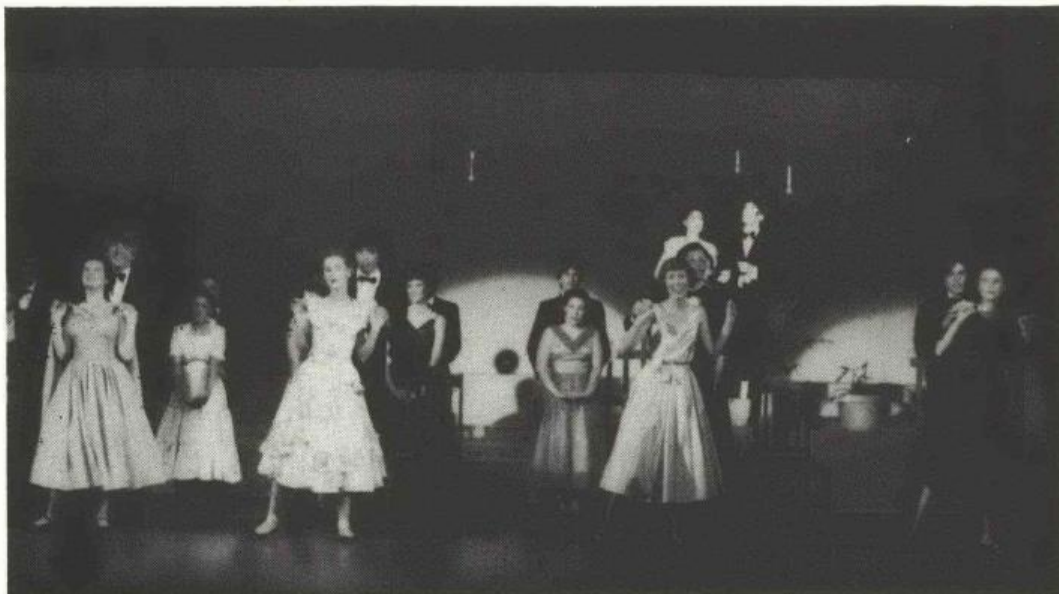

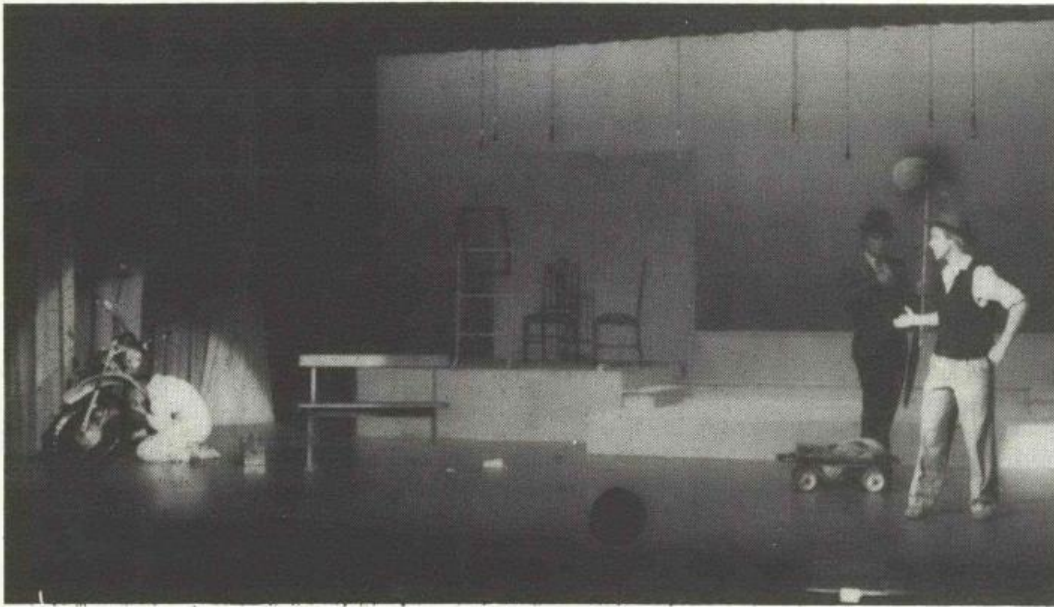

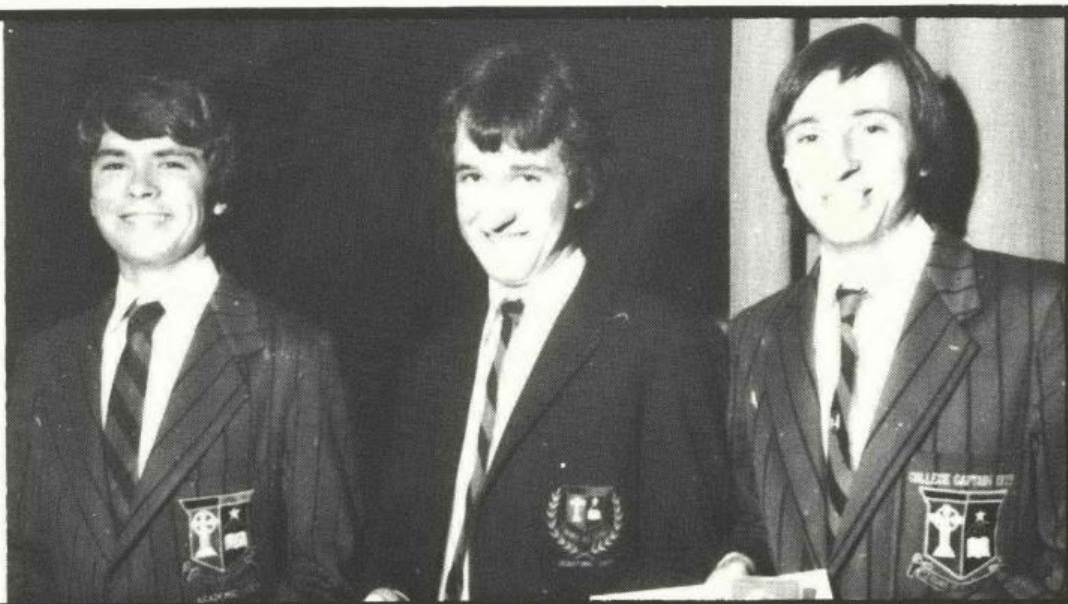

PHOTOGRAPHY CLUB:

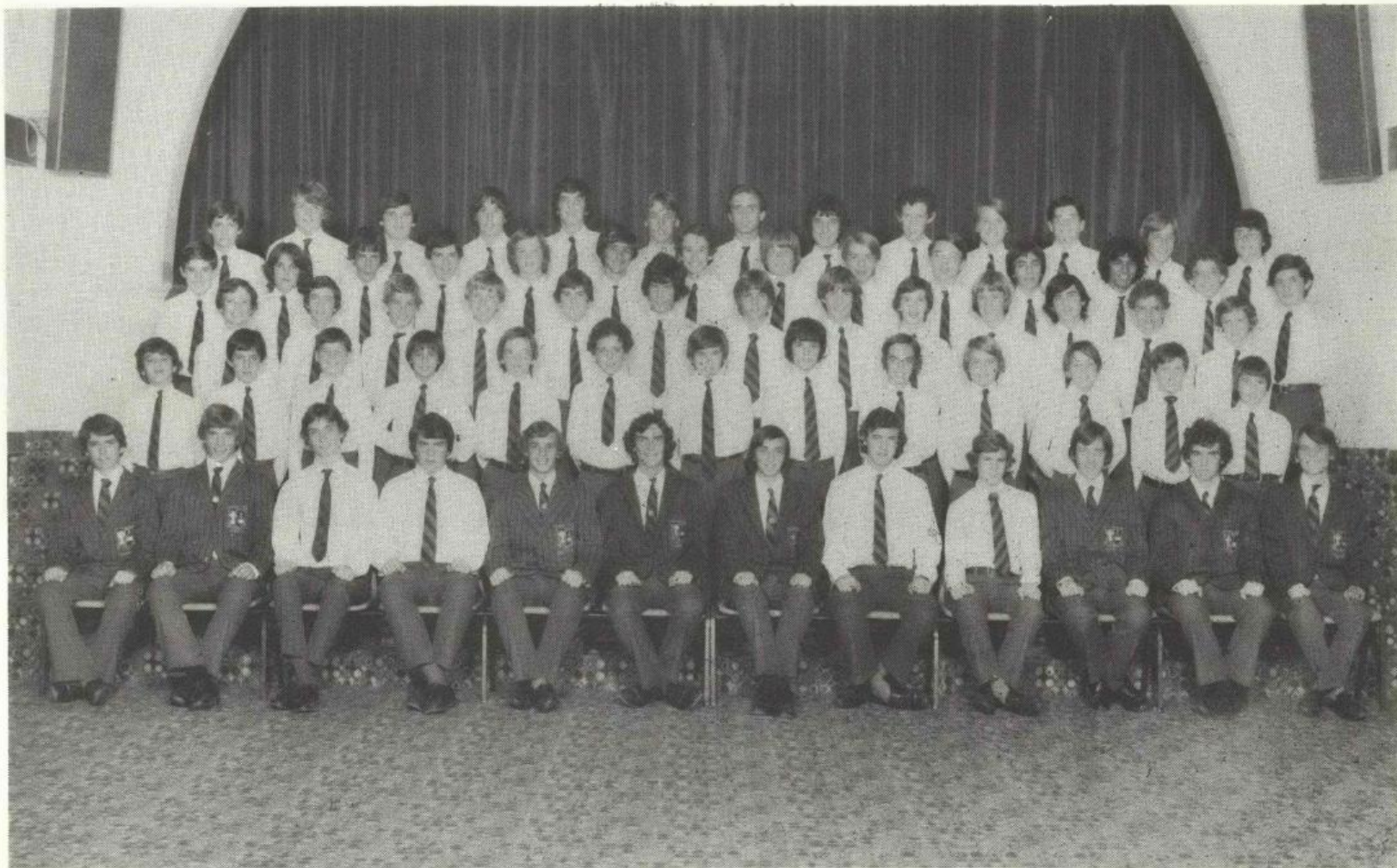

1979 was a highly successful year for Terrace rugby. The highlight of the season was that, in sharing first place in the G.P.S. competition, our First XV secured its third successive Rugby Premiership. Twenty teams regularly took the field and on occasions twenty-two. The sportsmanship displayed was commendable and the standard of play good. On every day of interschool fixtures, Terrace won the majority of games played and seven teams finished the season undefeated: the Second and Fourth XVs, the Under 14B, C and D teams and the Under 13B and D teams. The First XV, Third XV and the Under 16A team lost only one game each. The Second XV and the Under 13B team conceded only one try each in G.P.S. games.

While the dedication and enthusiasm of the boys played a large part in the successes of this year, nevertheless congratulations are due to the devoted band of coaches whose services have been available. Much credit is theirs.

The game has received valuable assistance through the support and activities of the Rugby Committee led by the President, Mr. Basil Porter, who made the arrangements for the beneficial New Zealand tour by the First XV squad.

Two members of the First XV, Michael Cook and Damien Frawley were chosen to play in the Australian Schoolboys' team against the English Schoolboys and these two, plus five others, achieved representative honours in the Queensland Schoolboys' side. These boys were — John Wells, Eoin O'Regan, Michael Green, Geoffrey Manteit and Michael Keefer. Boys selected in the Under 16 Queensland Schoolboys' team were Damien Peppin, Bradley MacDonald, David Morganti and Michael Lynagh.

FIRST XV:

G.P.S. rugby premierships at First XV level are strongly contested affairs and this year's success was not easily achieved. In the usual course of events, a successful team faces "grand final" pressure for each game, but, this year, having lost the first match of the season, the pressure on the team for the remaining games was

immense and it is a tribute to the temperament, skill, dedication and determination of the coach, Mr. Lester Hampson, team captain, John Wells, team vice-captain, Gerard Forde, and indeed of all team members, that history records that Terrace made it to the top rung of the premiership ladder this year. The team stood four-square in the face of the intense challenge and each of the remaining seven games was memorable for the character with which it was played.

For the statisticians the team scored a total of 179 points (28 tries) in competition games while conceding 67 points.

THE NEW ZEALAND TOUR:

The touring party, 41 strong, flew from Brisbane on Monday 7th May, returned Monday 14th May and in the interim the First and Second XVs had played three games each, obtaining in the midst of having a very enjoyable visit to the North Island, invaluable match practice against very worthy opposition.

The First XV performed very creditably while still in the drafting stage. In the first game against Papatoetoe High School., the Terrace

XV took charge of the match with the backs giving a particularly brisk display. The final score was 29-14. Against Tauranga Boys College, Terrace dominated the lineouts and out-mauled their opposition to have a major share of the ball. Two fine tries were scored and Terrace led for most of the match, but a rash of penalty goals in the latter part of the second half put the home team in front. The final score was 8-15. In the Te Awamutu game, Terrace was clearly the stronger team and even under the strain of three games in five days, still ran out winners 23-3.

- v. I.G.S. lost 11–13 (T. Gibbons, L. Robson tries, M. Lynagh field goal).

The game fluctuated throughout the first half with neither side able to mount effective, consistent attack and a converted try scored by the opposition as the half-time bell sounded worsened Terrace's plight. Increased determination in the second half enabled Terrace to head Ipswich twice. However with two minutes to go, Terrace was penalised for off-side play and Ipswich scored the winning goal. Lack of combination in attack and tentativeness proved to be our undoing on the day.

- v. C.E.G.S. won 27–9 (M. Cook 2 tries; M. Lynagh, try, penalty goal, field goal and conversion; J. Wells, penalty goal, 2 conversions).

Haunted by the ugly mistakes of the previous game, the Terrace team swept into the fray with a vengeance. They met early resistance, but inspired by two electric tries from Michael Cook, they took complete control of the game. The match will long be remembered for the unrelenting commitment of the whole team, but in particular, for the art of Michael Lynagh and Michael Cook, the vigour of Joe Vitelli, the power of Damien Frawley, the purpose of Michael Green and the drive of Gerard Forde.

- v. B.G.S. won 18–14 (M. Keefer 2, J. Vitelli, M. Green, tries, M. Lynagh, conversion).

Although Grammar led early as the result of a successful penalty goal, Terrace soon after reversed the situation with a fine converted try which Michael Keefer scored after a passing movement in which Eoin O'Regan handled twice. Terrace remained in the ascendancy well into the second half and what ball the forwards did not control, was effectively stifled by the aggressive defence of the backs. With an unbridgeable 18–7 lead, the team relaxed somewhat in the dying stages of the game and conceded a further seven points, but the victory was complete.

- v. T.S.S. won 12–6 (M. Cook, try; M. Lynagh field goal, penalty goal, conversion).

This was a close encounter of the rugged kind as play constantly see-sawed from end to end. A field goal and penalty goal from Michael Lynagh gave Terrace the lead and strong, bustling defence from the Terrace backs ultimately pressured Southport into a handling

error enabling Michael Cook to snap up an errant pass and score untouched between the posts. In the second half, Southport narrowed the gap with two penalty goals, but with Paul Facey, Damien Frawley and Michael Green dominating the lineouts, Terrace won the day.

- v. N.C. won 16–9 (M. Cook, L. Robson tries, M. Lynagh penalty goal, field goal and conversion).

Fast pressure and vigorous bustle by Nudgee kept the first half tryless as Terrace enjoyed a major share of possession. Michael Lynagh goaled twice in this session to give Terrace a six-point margin at the break. The second half belonged to Terrace, except for the last minute when Nudgee scored and converted a try. But by then, Terrace had put the issue beyond doubt as Michael Cook had slashed through tattered defence for a try and Laurie Robson had powered his way through two tacklers for another. A great team display in which many reputations were enhanced.

- v. Downlands won 24–6 (L. Robson, D. Frawley, J. Vitelli, M. Green, tries, J. Wells conversion, M. Lynagh conversion).

Terrace had a clear win, but it was Downlands who early posted first points with a converted try. This was the catalyst Terrace needed and they sparked into action to run in twenty points in twenty minutes from four tries and two conversions and take a stranglehold on the match by half-time. One try resulted from a memorable seventy-five metre passing-rush in which Joe Vitelli featured very prominently. Terrace ran the ball continually in the second half, but dedicated defence by Downlands limited the scoring to one try.

As the score indicated, Terrace continued on where they left off the previous week against Downlands by scoring eight tries and two conversions in handing B.B.C. a comprehensive defeat. John Wells continued to set the example for his team by his repeated slashing entries into the three-quarter line. The thrust and drive of the forwards enabled them to dominate the opposition's pack. At one stage they combined to press home a forty-metre, power-laden movement. Michael Cook was outstanding in scoring two superb tries through superior pace and side-step.

v. B.S.H.S. won 21–16 (L. Robson, J. Vitelli tries, M. Lynagh 3 penalty goals and 2 conversions).

Terrace dominated possession for the first twenty minutes, but State High exerted massive pressure and was leading 6–3, all points were from kicks, when John Wells characteristically burst at top pace into the three-quarter line and

unloaded a precision pass to put Laurie Robson over in the corner from twenty metres out. Michael Lynagh converted and Terrace was in front, not to be headed for the rest of the game. Joe Vitelli had his moment of glory in the second half when he plucked a Michael Lynagh "bomb" from the sky and dived over for a try amidst immortal scenes of Terrace jubilation to seal the fate of the game.

The forwards, magnificently led by Gerard Forde, paved the way for a masterful victory. Gerard set the example by scoring the first two tries of the match. Michael Gauld was over for another try before half-time and Terrace clearly had the match in hand. In the second half Terrace was completely dominant and the game was played in the Toowoomba half. Michael Cook virtually ran at will and set up two tries in exciting fashion, sending Michael Keefer down the right flank to score on one occasion

and a little later, reversing play to send Michael Green in for a try on the left-hand side. This was a fitting climax to a successful season as the team never eased up and finished off in true premiership style.

Although beaten in most games, the team gave of its best and showed considerable improvement in basic skills by the end of the season.

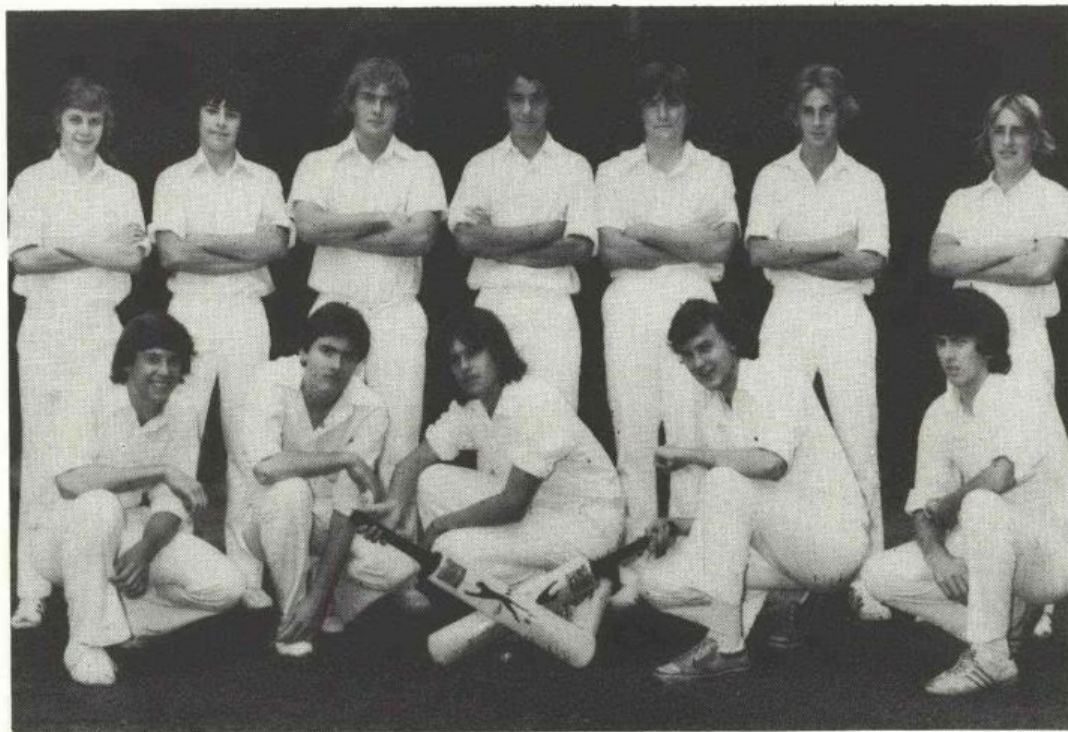
UNDER 13C:

In the G.P.S. Championships the Terrace team scored 229 points to be placed fourth behind B.S.H.S. (358), B.G.S. (276) and T.S.S. (243) and ahead of I.G.S. (224). The team was captained by Todd Gibbons. Vice-Captain was Michael Green who was presented with the Eisentrager Cup for the most outstanding performance at the carnival (two thirds and a second from his three events). This was the second successive year that Michael was awarded this trophy.

The Lance Hedley Memorial Trophy for the most improved swimmer was awarded to Tim Dodson. Although only Under 15, Tim represented the College in the All-Age 400m. Freestyle event.

In the course of the season, a number of new records were set. At the G.P.S. Carnival, three records were broken:—

Greg Hansen (U.13) swam 29.4 for third place in the 50 m. Freestyle event for his age. The previous record of 29.8 was held jointly by Mark Tonelli (1970) and Michael Crouch (1972).

Warwick Mortensen (U.13) recorded 34.0 for second place in the 50 m. Backstroke, thus breaking his own (eight days old) record of 34.6. The previous record of 35.3 was held jointly by Mark Tonelli (1970) and Ashley Van de Velde (1972).

Michael Green broke his own Open 200m. Freestyle record set by him at the College Championships. The new College Record is now 2.12.1. This was a new event in 1978.

At the College Championships Carnival, Colin Robertson (U.12) equalled the 50 m. Freestyle Record of 31.9 held jointly by Michael Crouch (1971) and Simon O'Kane (1976).

At the C.I.C. Carnival, Xavier Clarke (U.11) broke two records in the 100 m. Freestyle and the 50 m. Butterfly events. The new records are 1.12.6 (previously 1.13.0, Mark Waugh 1977) and 36.9 (previously 37.0, Mark Waugh 1977).

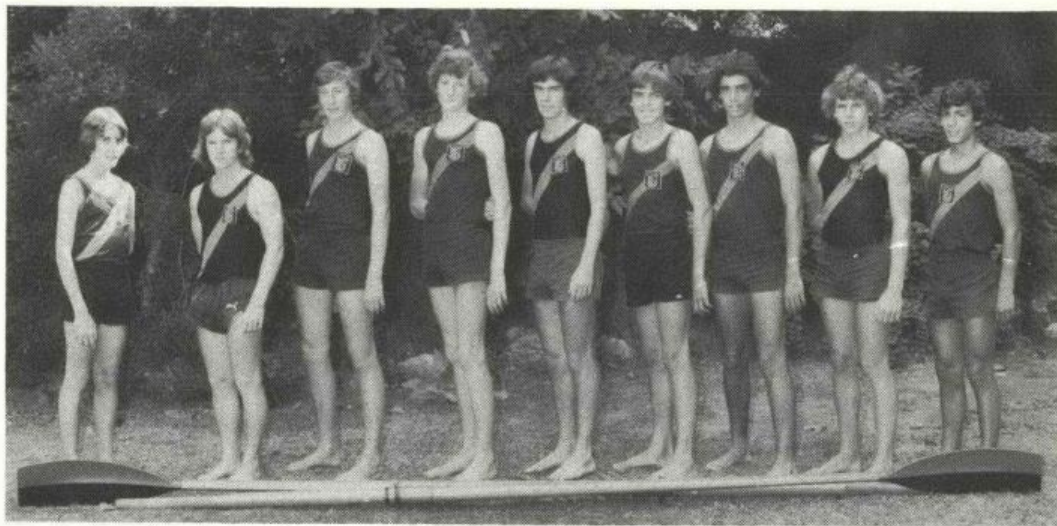

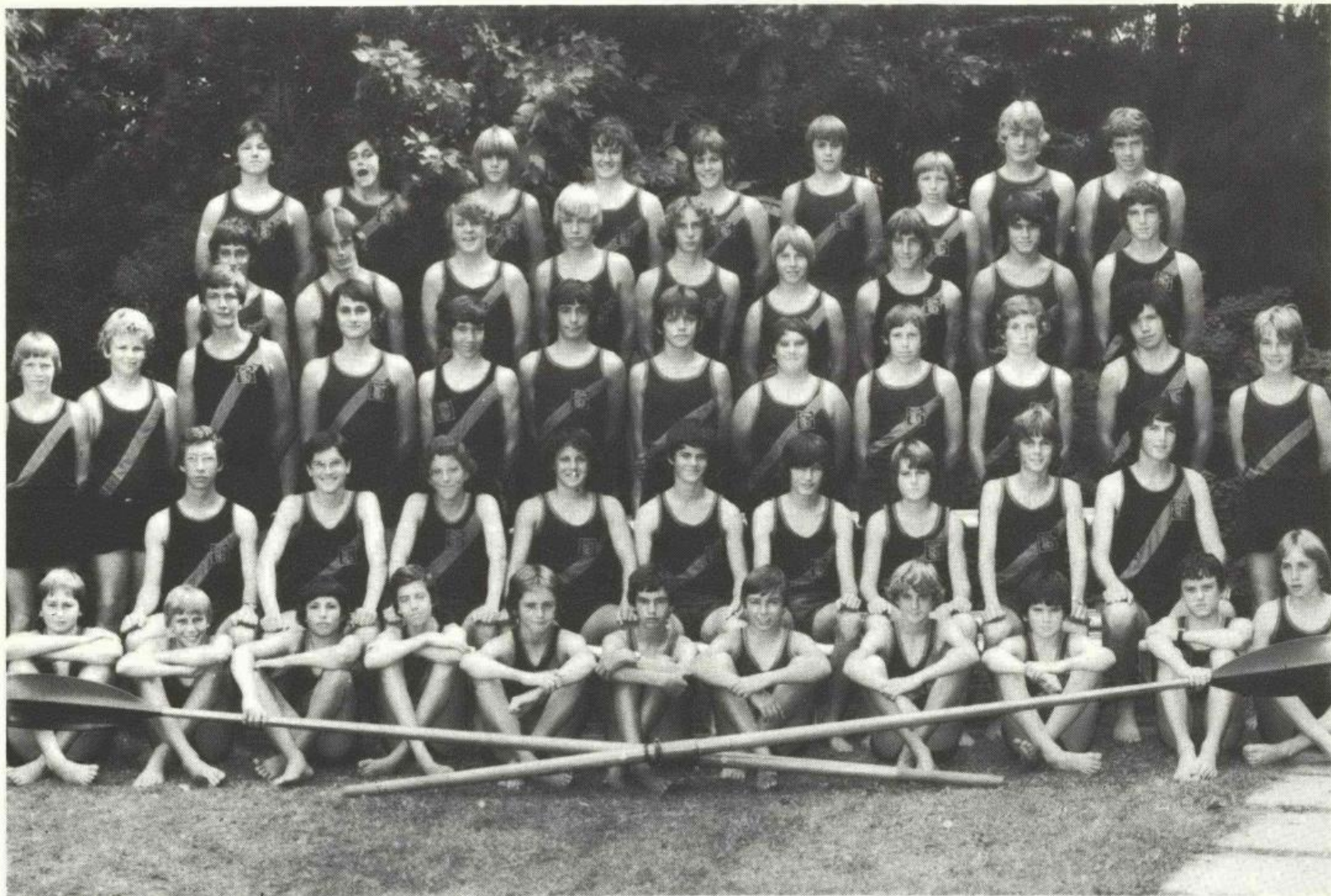

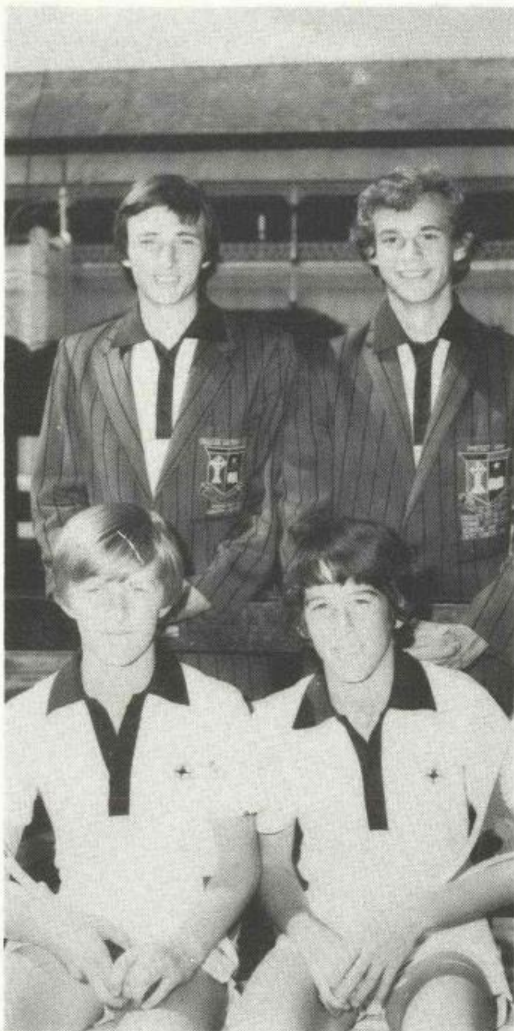

We thank Dr. John Keys and Mr. Kevin Horrigan for their generous assistance and coaching throughout an enjoyable season.



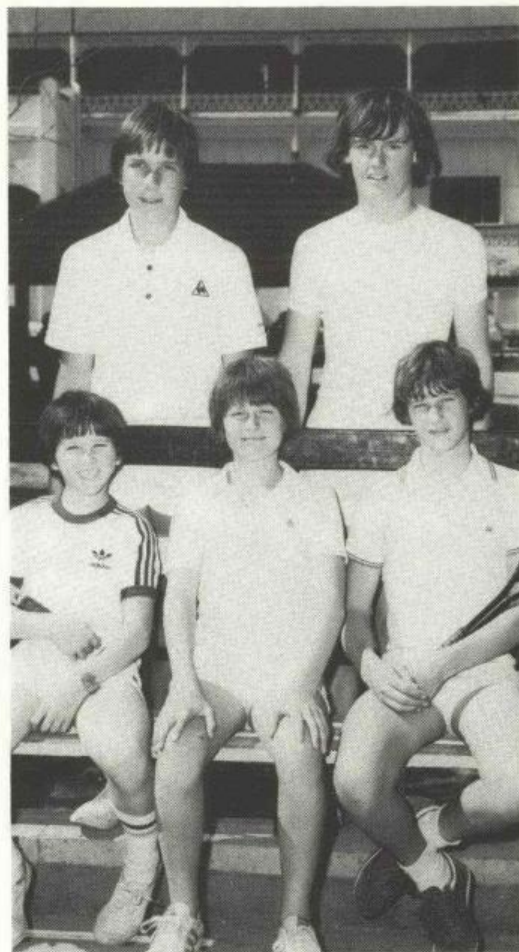

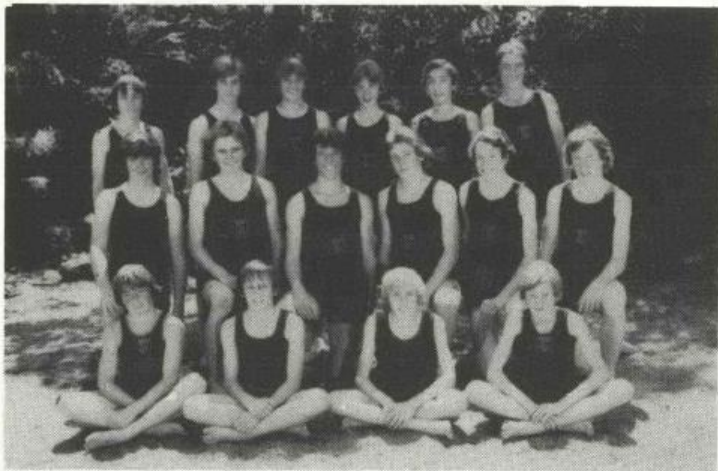

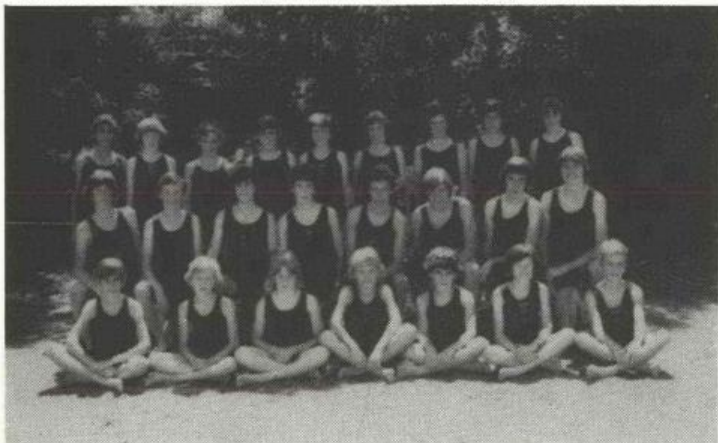

Cross Country

Our cross country course in Victoria Park was the venue for some early season competition with Brisbane Grammar and our own Championships. Terrace champions for 1979 were Robert Stone (Open), Brad MacDonald (U.16), Robert Sydes (U.15), Peter Steele (U.14) and Michael Philips (U.13).

Invitation meetings were also attended at Kedron High School and Nudgee College.

Our open champion Robert Stone performed well in the State Schoolboys' Championships and deserved his selection in the Queensland Under 19 team which finished a close second in the National titles held in Sydney.

The season's main event was the G.P.S. Championship. In running fourth in 1979, we gained our highest placing since the third place we took in 1975. The points scored by the team were fifty percent better than the total achieved in running sixth in 1978. Team Captain and Vice-Captain were Robert Stone and Damian O'Connell respectively. Team manager was Mr. Doherty.

Cross country events for the Under 13 to 15 age groups were over 3 kilometres. We failed to get a winner in the first twenty home in the Under 13's and scored only 3 points.

In the next race, the Under 14 event, we came a very good third and scored 7 points. Our best were Peter Steele, 3rd; Ian Ralph, 5th; and Guy Andrew, 10th. Another runner in the first twenty could easily have given us second place.

Best runners for the Under 15 team were Robert Sydes, 15th; and Liam Proberts, 19th. This result gave us a further 6 points. The Under 16 and Open races were over 5 km. In the Under 16 race we were unlucky to have Brad MacDonald severely restricted by a recurrence of injury. He was well in contention for two-thirds of the race, but was severely affected by the injury over the remaining distance. Our best was Robert Rodger, 2nd; and the team finished fifth, scoring 5 points. The last 400m of this were a neck and neck tussle between Robert and the eventual winner. It seemed, with only metres to go, that Robert must prevail. A final lunge by his opponent denied him the victory, but the warm applause from the crowd showed their appreciation of his gallant effort.

We who were watching felt that an outstanding result in the final event, if coupled with a bad finish by Churchie, might just give us third

place overall. Our Opens finished well enough. Robert Stone was second, Damian O'Connell 12th, and Geoff Rosbrook 15th. Churchie, however, did not slip. We were third in the event and scored 7 more points.

When all the points were totalled, we had scored 28 and were fourth in the field. It was a good result, and in keeping with the hard hours of training which the runners had put in, and the planning and organisation produced by the Committee. This Committee has become an important part of Terrace Cross Country. This year its members were Robert Stone, Damian O'Connell, Robert Rodger, Brad MacDonald, Mark Holmes, Peter Steele, Leofric Hampson, Robert Day, Gavin Houston and Craig Pandy.

Overall, 1979 was a year of consolidation and improvement for Cross Country.

FROM THE 1979 HEADMASTER'S REPORT — JUNIOR SCHOOL:

At the beginning of the year, we welcomed Br. Peter Parry as Master-in-Charge of the Junior School. Br. Parry replaced Br. Peter Harney who worked so capably and tirelessly for the primary boys. Br. Harney was on study leave during 1979 and next year he is to assume the responsibility of Headmaster of Nudgee Junior College. This year we also welcomed Mr. Michael Herd who took over the role of Junior School Sportsmaster when Br. Jacob was transferred to Nudgee Junior. We thank Br. Jacob for his significant contribution to Terrace during his stay.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION:

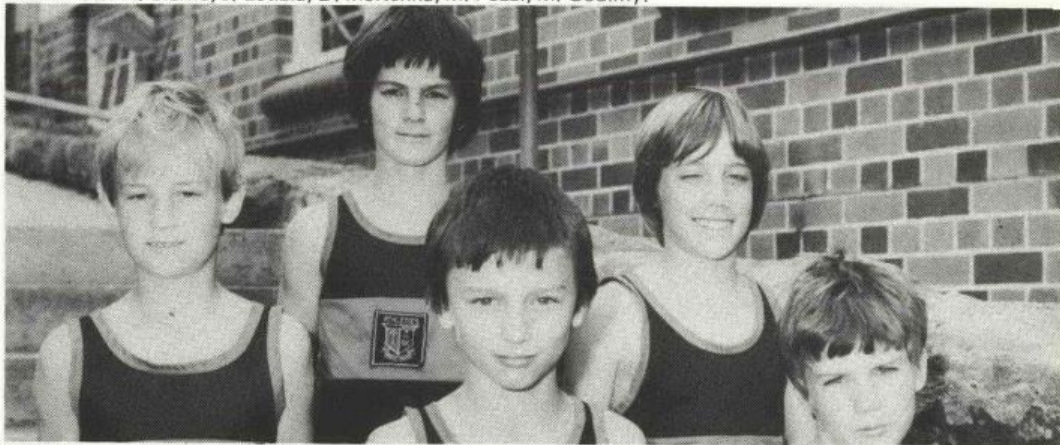

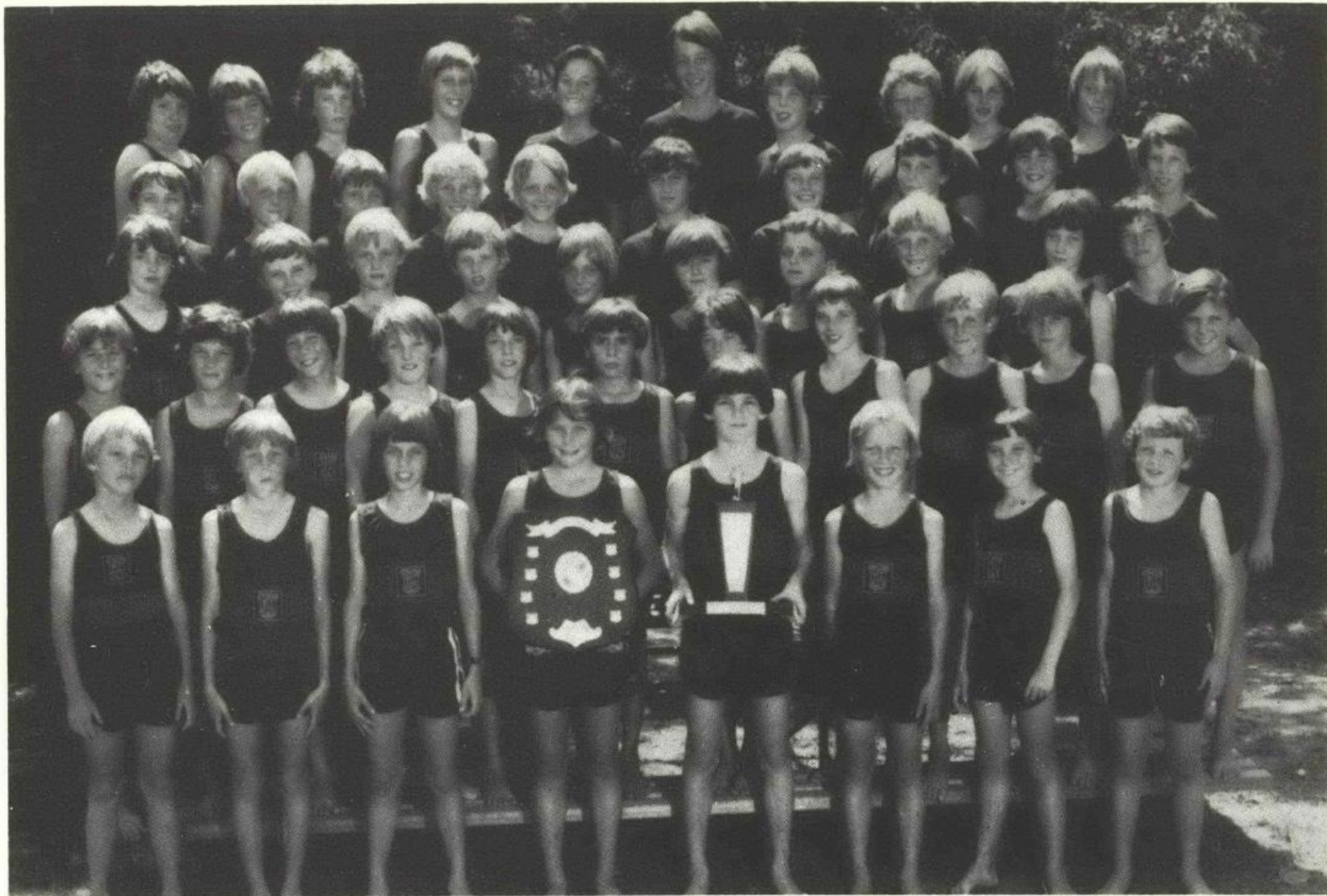
